### GAME PREVIEW:

*Riding Momentum from Top 25 Win, Blue Hens Return Home to Face Longtime Rival Wm. & Mary*



NEWARK, Del. -- Coming off its first road victory over a Top 25 ranked team in four years, the University of Delaware will be looking to continue that momentum Saturday as the Blue Hens host longtime rival William & Mary for a Colonial Athletic Association matchup at Delaware Stadium. The Parents & Family Weekend contest will begin at 3:30 p.m. and will be broadcast live throughout the region on NBC Sports Philadelphia+, SNY, and COZI TV.

Delaware (3-2, 1-1 CAA) earned a pivotal win last Saturday as the Blue Hens knocked off No. 23 ranked and CAA co-leader Stony Brook on the road with a 24-20 victory. The Blue Hens rallied from a 13-point halftime deficit and used a fumble return for a touchdown by **Malcolm Brown** late in the third quarter to get within striking distance and scored the eventual game-winning touchdown on a six-yard burst by **Kani Kane** two minutes into the final stanza. Delaware's defense preserved the win by stopping the Seawolves at the Blue Hen 18-yard line in the final seconds.

The victory snapped a personal six-game losing streak vs. Top 25 opponents for the Blue Hens and was the team's first win over a ranked team since downing then No. 7 Towson 32-31 during the 2013 season.

This week Delaware, which has earned votes in both the STATS Inc. Media and FCS Coaches Top 25 poll, will meet longtime foe William & Mary (2-3, 0-2 CAA) for the 42nd time since 1915 and for the 25th straight season and will be looking to avenge last year's 24-17 setback in Williamsburg, Va. The Tribe will be looking to snap a two-game losing streak and win its first CAA contest of the season after dropping consecutive verdicts of 21-18 to Stony Brook on Sept. 30 and 25-17 at Elon this past Saturday.

This week's game will match two of the top defensive units in the CAA as Delaware enters ranked No. 3 in the league in scoring defense (16.8 points per game) and sixth in total defense (319.2) while William & Mary is No. 5 in both scoring defense (17.8) and total defense (310.8).

**LAST MEETING**

**WILLIAMSBURG, Va.** (Oct. 15, 2016) -- Delaware suffered late-game heartbreak for the second straight week as host William & Mary scored 21 fourth-quarter points to rally for the 24-17 win at Zable Stadium.

Delaware (2-4, 0-3 CAA), which suffered its fourth straight setback, took a 14-3 lead into the final quarter after QB **Joe Walker** broke through for a 34-yard scoring run with 6:17 left in the third quarter.

But the final stanza was littered with pitfalls for the Blue Hens as William & Mary intercepted a pass in the end zone on the first play of the quarter, drove 80 yards to cut the deficit to 14-10, and then used a successful inside kick to regain possession and move 54 yards for the go-ahead score with 4:12 left.

The Tribe (3-4, 1-3 CAA), which snapped a three-game losing streak of its own, sealed the deal when Aaron Swinton intercepted his second pass of the day and returned it 63 yards for a touchdown with 1:43 remaining for a 24-14 lead.

Walker completed 9 of 19 passes for 112 yards and also rushed for a career-high 109 yards and a touchdown to lead a 379-yard effort. Walker became the first Blue Hen quarterback to surpass the 100-yard rushing mark since 2003.

Despite playing without leading rusher **Wes Hills** due to a lower body injury, the Hens still managed to pile up 267 yards on the ground thanks to Walker. **Thomas Jefferson** added 94 yards rushing while **Jalen Randolph** gained another 57 yards. Delaware cornerback **Nasir Adderley** led the Hens with a career-high 10 tackles while linebacker **Charles Bell** added eight stops.

After William & Mary kicked a 41-yard field goal on its first possession, Delaware came right back to take the lead, driving 82 yards in 6:07 capped by wide receiver **Jamie Jarmon** running around the left side for a nine-yard touchdown, the first score of his career.

That lead stood up into halftime and the Hens built on it midway through the third quarter when Walker found a seam on a third-and-four play and sprinted untouched 34 yards for the touchdown to give UD a 14-3 advantage at the 6:17 mark.

But things went awry from there. Delaware was driving for another likely score late in the third quarter and had the ball on the Tribe 14-yard line. But Walker's pass to **Diante Cherry** in the end zone on the second play of the final quarter was picked off by Swinton.

The Tribe then drove 80 yards on 11 plays and pulled to within 14-10 on a one-yard dive by Anderson with 9:05 left. Things changed in a big way on the following play as William & Mary attempted an inside kick and recovered it at their own 46-yard line. Ten plays later Cluley sneaked in from four yards out to give the Tribe the lead for good at 17-14 with 4:12 remaining.

## HEAD COACH DANNY ROCCO

University of Delaware Director of Athletics and Recreation Services Chrissi Rawak announced on Dec. 14, 2016 that Danny Rocco, who enjoyed outstanding success at NCAA Division I FCS members Liberty University and University of Richmond over the last decade, had been selected to lead the Blue Hens as head football coach.

Rocco, 57, who led the University of Richmond to back-to-back 10-win seasons and three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, becomes just the 23rd head coach in Delaware's 125-season history and just the sixth head coach since 1940.

"I'm thrilled that Danny Rocco will be the new head coach for the Fightin' Blue Hens," said UD President Dennis Assanis. "Like all of us at UD, Danny is committed to excellence in everything he does. He brings significant coaching experience at both the collegiate and professional level. Most importantly, Danny is dedicated to the success of our student-athletes, both on the field and in the classroom. We know he will build a powerful team of players and coaches and take UD Football into a strong and winning future."

"We welcome Coach Rocco and his family to our Blue Hen Football family," said Rawak. "This is an exciting day for the University of Delaware, our football program, our student-athletes, and everyone who loves and supports Blue Hen football. During our search we wanted to find someone who had demonstrated outstanding success not only on the field but in building young men as leaders, citizens, and achievers. In Coach Rocco we found the perfect fit and someone who is committed to excellence in every area. We are excited to see the direction he takes us under his leadership. His impact will be felt immediately."

A veteran of 33 seasons as a football coach, including the last 11 as a head coach at the NCAA Division I FCS level, Rocco has found nothing but success. He has never posted a losing season and owns a career record of 90-42 (.682), including a 10-4 mark this past fall when Richmond went 5-3 in the Colonial Athletic Association and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the third straight year.

The No. 12 ranked Spiders defeated No. 17 North Carolina A&T 39-10 in the opening round and rallied to down No. 8 North Dakota 27-24 on the road in the second round before falling at No. 3 Eastern Washington in the quarterfinals this past Saturday.

"It is with great enthusiasm that I accept the head football coaching position at the University of Delaware," said Rocco. "I am very excited to take on this challenge, recognizing that I have full and total support from President Assanis and AD Chrissi Rawak. I have always had an appreciation for the history and tradition of Delaware Football and I am highly motivated to return Delaware to its winning ways and to a position of national prominence."

A native of Huntingdon, Pa. and a 1984 graduate of Wake Forest University, Rocco inherits a program that has won

six national championships, finished as national runner-up five times, made 20 NCAA Tournament appearances, and captured 16 conference championships.

Rocco transformed the Spiders back into a national power during his five-year tenure. He inherited a team that went 3-8 in 2011 and led the 2012 squad to a five-win turnaround with an 8-3 overall record and a share of the CAA title.

He went on to lead Richmond to a five-year record of 43-22 that included three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, including a berth in the semifinals in 2015 and a trip to the quarterfinals this past season.

He was named the Touchdown Club of Richmond Coach of the Year in both 2012 and 2015 and was a finalist for the FCS Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year award both of those seasons.

During his 11 seasons as a head coach (five at Richmond, six at Liberty), he has been a National Coach of the Year Finalist five times, and has won six conference championships and four conference Coach of the Year honors.

He has coached 156 all-conference honorees and 30 student-athletes who garnered All-American honors, including four Richmond players in 2015 - Brian Brown, Jacobi Green, David Jones and Nick Ritcher; and three in 2016 - Brown, Griffin Trau, and Winston Craig.

Twelve different players under Rocco's tutelage have gone on to earn professional contracts and his teams have finished in the final FCS Top-25 poll in eight of the past nine seasons, including finishing No. 3 in 2015 and No. 12 this past season.

During his time with the Spiders, Richmond defeated 14 nationally-ranked opponents, including a victory over then-No.3 James Madison during the 2015 season when ESPN's College GameDay was in Harrisonburg, Va.

Rocco becomes only the third man in Colonial Athletic Association Football (formerly Yankee Conference and Atlantic 10 Conference) history to serve as head coach at two different institutions. Jim Reid coached at former CAA member Massachusetts in 1986-91 before moving on to serve as head coach at Richmond in 1995-2003. Current University of Michigan defensive coordinator Don Brown was head coach at Northeastern in 2000-03 before moving over to UMass in 2004-08.

At Liberty, Rocco made an immediate impact, taking over a program that had gone 1-10 in 2005 and building the Flames into a Big South Conference power. He led his first team to a 6-5 record (the largest turnaround of any FCS program that season) and guided the squad to Big South Conference Championship four times in six seasons.

He posted an overall record of 47-20 (26-5 in league play) and was named Big South Coach of the Year four times. He was a finalist for the national Eddie Robinson Award and Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year Award in each of the final three seasons in Lynchburg. Liberty finished the last four years ranked inside the Top 25 in both major FCS polls.

Before becoming a head coach, Rocco spent 23 seasons at the NCAA Division I Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and National Football League levels.

In January of 2016, Rocco was elected to the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees.

Malcolm Brown picked up a fumble and raced 45 yards for a touchdown with 4:04 left in the third quarter to pull the Blue Hens to within three points and Kani Kane's six-yard scoring burst just two minutes into the final stanza proved to be the game-winner as Delaware (3-2, 1-1 CAA) picked up the pivotal Colonial Athletic Association win.

Stony Brook (4-2, 3-1 CAA), which entered the game tied atop the CAA standings with an unbeaten mark in league play, had a four-game win streak snapped despite leading 20-7 at the break.

Delaware snapped a six-game losing streak vs. Top 25 teams, earning a win for the first time since a victory over No. 25 William & Mary in 2015. It was also the Hens' first victory over a Top 25 team on the road since a 32-31 triumph over No. 7 Towson in 2013

Delaware's defense came up big down the stretch as the Blue Hens held the Seawolves out of the end zone on the final drive of the night. Delaware's defensive line trio of Blaine Woodson, Bilal Nichols, and John Nassib sacked SBU quarterback Joe Carbone at the UD 18-yard line on a fourth down play in the final seconds to preserve the victory. Stony Brook gained possession on its own nine-yard line with 3:12 left to play and drove 73 yards on 14 plays, converting six first downs on the way. But the Hen defense stiffened, forcing two incomplete passes and the final sack to save the day.

Delaware QB J.P. Caruso, a first-year transfer from Appalachian State, took over for starter Joe Walker in the first quarter and led the Hens to the victory as he completed 7 of 14 passes for 80 yards and a touchdown and also rushed for 65 yards. His scrambling 23-yard scoring strike to Jamie Jarmon with 12:37 left in the first half tied the game at 7-7 before the Seawolves took a 20-7 lead into intermission thanks to two scoring throws from Carbone to Ray Bolden.

Kareem Williams led the Delaware ground game with 75 yards on 16 carries while Kane finished with 57 yards, including a 32-yarder that set up his game-winning touchdown.

The defense had seven tackles for loss, a sack, and four pass breakups with Nasir Adderley and Troy Reeder leading the way with 12 tackles each. Reeder and Jalen Kindle helped strip the ball from SBU's Donald Liotine and forced the fumble that Brown picked up and took to the end zone to spark the comeback.

Delaware kicker Frank Raggo came up big for the second straight week, sparking the rally with a 50-yard field goal with 8:47 left in the third quarter to pull the Hens to within 20-10.

LAST WEEK FOR WILLIAM & MARY

ELON, N.C. (Oct. 7) -- Malcolm Summers ran for two touchdowns, Davis Cheek ran for another, and Elon held off a second-half rally and capped it with a safety to beat William & Mary 25-17 on Saturday to win its fifth straight.

The Tribe (2-3, 0-2 Colonial Athletic Association) scored 14 unanswered points in the third quarter while holding Elon (5-1, 3-0) to two yards, but with 3:39 left in the game Elon's Warren Messer sacked Brandon Battle in the end zone to preserve the win.

Summers capped Elon's opening drive with a 20-yard touchdown run. Late in the second quarter, Greg Liggs Jr. picked off a pass by Battle and the Phoenix scored three plays later when Cheek ran 18 yards for a touchdown for a 23-3 halftime lead.

Cheek was 12 of 16 for 179 passing with an interception and scored on an 18-yard run. Summers gained 81 yards on 17 carries and Elon outgained William & Mary 319 yards to 271.

Battle hit Riley Wilson on a 1-yard scoring pass after completing a pass on fourth down, and the Tribe closed to 23-17 after Nate Evans's 2-yard plunge in the third quarter. Battle scrambled to convert another fourth-down play on the Tribe's next drive, which ended with a missed 31-yard field goal.

Battle was 11 of 21 for 155 yards passing for William & Mary while Evans gained 77 yards on 19 carries.

BLUE HENS TRIO EARNS WEEKLY TOUCHDOWN CLUB AWARDS

A trio of Blue Hens earned weekly Blue Hen Touchdown Club Player of the Week honors for their contributions in Delaware's 24-20 CAA comeback victory at Stony Brook Saturday evening.

Junior QB J.P. Caruso was named the Offensive Player of the Week; junior defensive end John Nassib was selected as the Defensive Player of the Week; and sophomore punter Nick Pritchard was tabbed Special Teams Player of the Week.

Caruso, a first-year transfer from Appalachian State, saw his most extensive action of the season as he took over for starter Joe Walker in the first quarter and went on to complete 7 of 14 passes for 85 yards and a 23-yard scoring toss to Jamie Jarmon in the first quarter. He also ran for 65 yards on nine carries for a 7.2 average and had a long run of 24 yards.

Nassib, making his first start of the season in place of the injured Cam Kitchen, recorded six tackles (one for loss) and two pass breakups. Although not credited for a tackle, he was in on the final defensive play of the game when he assisted Blaine Woodson and Bilal Nichols in a sack of Stony Brook QB Joe Carbone at the Delaware 18-yard line to preserve the win.

Pritchard, a first-year transfer from Maryland, continued to be one of the top punters in the CAA as he averaged 42.3 yards on seven punts, including a pair of punts that pinned Stony Brook on its own six-yard line in the first half and its own nine-yard line

on its final drive of the day. Among his punts was a season-long 60-yarder.

The Delaware coaching staff will select Players of the Week after each victory this season. Those individuals will be honored at the following Blue Hen Touchdown Club Luncheon held each week at the Bob Carpenter Center Club. This week's lunch will be held on Friday, Oct. 13, at 12 noon.

**TROY REEDER, FRANK RAGGO HONORED BY COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION**

Delaware earned its first two individual Player of the Week citations by the Colonial Athletic Association this week as junior LB **Troy Reeder** was named CAA Defensive Player of the Week and junior kicker **Frank Raggo** was selected as the CAA Special Teams Player of the Week.

Reeder recorded a team-high 12 tackles (seven solo), one tackle for loss, and assisted **Jalen Kindle** to force a fumble that was returned 45 yards for a touchdown as Delaware knocked off Stony Brook, 24-20. The junior led a Blue Hens' defense that held Stony Brook scoreless in the second half and the third-quarter forced fumble helped UD rally from a 20-7 halftime deficit.

Reeder was also named to the STATS Inc. National Defensive Player of the Week Honorable Mention for his efforts.

Raggo connected on a 50-yard field goal to help Delaware overcome the 13-point halftime deficit vs. Stony Brook. The field goal was the fifth-longest in UD history and marked the second straight week that he's made a kick from 50 yards. Raggo, who is 6-of-8 on FG's for the year, also converted all three of his extra point attempts.

In addition to Reeder and Raggo, Richmond quarterback Kyle Lauletta was named Offensive Player of the Week and Villanova defensive back Jaquan Amos was picked as Rookie of the Week.

**BLUE HEN GREAT, NFL STANDOUT MIKE ADAMS TO SERVE AS HONORARY CAPTAIN**

One of the greatest success stories in the history of University of Delaware football, former standout Blue Hen defensive back and 14-year National Football League veteran **Mike "Pops" Adams** will serve as Honorary Captain for Saturday's matchup vs. William & Mary at Delaware Stadium.

The Honorary Captain program - which takes place at each home game during the season - honors friends of Blue Hen football who continue to make outstanding contributions. Adams will be the special guest of UD Athletics throughout the day and will take part in the pregame coin toss.

A native of Paterson, New Jersey, Adams was a standout defensive back for the Blue Hens during a five-year career in 1999-2003 under head coaches **Tubby Raymond** and **K.C. Keeler**.

He played a key role in the Delaware defensive secondary from the time he set foot on campus, seeing important action as a freshman in 1999 and leading the team to the Yankee Conference title and a berth in the NCAA FCS semifinals as a sophomore in 2000. He missed almost the entire 2002 season with an early-season injury but returned in 2003 to lead the squad to one of the finest seasons in school history. Serving as co-captain with **Jason Nerys**, he led a dominating defense that held opponents to 10 or less points seven times. The Blue Hens went 15-1, won the Atlantic 10 title, and breezed through the NCAA Tournament, outscoring opponents 149-23, including a 40-0 win over Colgate in the national title game.

Adams, who earned his degree in human services from Delaware in 2004 and was a Dean's List student, garnered All-Atlantic 10 honors as a senior in 2003 when he had 70 tackles and recorded four interceptions.

He has gone on to an outstanding professional career despite breaking into the league as an undrafted free agent with the San Francisco 49ers in 2004. He played three seasons with San Francisco, five with the Cleveland Browns, two with the Denver Broncos, and three with the Indianapolis Colts before joining the Carolina Panthers prior to the 2017 season. He has played in 195 career games, the most all-time among former Delaware players, and has recorded 805 tackles and 25 interceptions. His 14 NFL seasons are second all-time among UD players behind only quarterback Rich Gannon, who played 17 seasons in 1987-2004.

Adams played in Super Bowl XLVIII with the Denver Broncos following the 2013 season and earned All-Pro honors as a safety twice in 2014 and 2015.

One of the NFL's most civic-minded players, he has been active in numerous youth initiatives in his hometown and has returned to the Delaware campus several times to talk to students and athletes about giving back to the community.

**FORMER BLUE HEN ALL-AMERICAN EDDIE CONTI TO JOIN RADIO BROADCAST TEAM**

A familiar name to University of Delaware Football fans will now become a familiar voice to the Blue Hen faithful.

**Eddie Conti**, one of the all-time great wide receivers and kick returners in UD history who set 43 school, conference, and NCAA records and was inducted into the UD Athletics Hall of Fame in 2012, will join the 94.7 WDSF-FM and iHeartRadio broadcast team for Delaware football broadcasts beginning this week and will serve as color commentator alongside of play-by-play announcer and Voice of the Blue Hens **Scott Klatzkin** and sideline reporter **Cory Nidoh** for the remainder of the 2017 season.

"We are excited for the opportunity to add an all-time great and fan favorite to the broadcast team," said Klatzkin. "His knowledge of the game and familiarity with the rich history of Delaware Football will bring a unique perspective for our listeners."

Conti, who currently serves as community liaison for PIVOT Physical Therapy in Delaware, enjoyed a spectacular career in 1994-98 and helped lead the Blue Hens to three NCAA Tournament appearances under head coach **Tubby Raymond**. He was a consensus All-American in 1998, played in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game, earned NFL tryouts with the Jets and Patriots, and played two seasons with the Barcelona Dragons in NFL Europe.

As a senior in 1998 he caught 91 passes for an NCAA-record 1,712 yards. He also competed for the UD track & field team and earned his degree in physical education studies from Delaware in 2002.

"I am proud to be a former UD football player and now honored to be joining the Delaware football radio team," said Conti. "Playing the game is a lot different than announcing the game but the great thing they have in common and what I am most excited about is that I am part of the team and in the game again."

94.7-FM is in its 19th consecutive season broadcasting Delaware Football, which includes each week the pre-game show that begins an hour prior to kickoff, game coverage, and exclusive pre-game and post-game interviews with head coach **Danny Rocco**.

Conti replaces longtime analyst **Matt Janus**, who will announce Colonial Athletic Association-produced football broadcasts for the remainder of the 2017 season.

**KINDLE A FINALIST FOR PRESTIGIOUS CAMPBELL AWARD FOR ACADEMICS**

University of Delaware linebacker and graduate student **Jalen Kindle** has been selected as a semifinalist for the Campbell Award which recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation.

He is one of 181 semifinalists nationwide, which includes 37 players from the NCAA FCS level. Among the other FCS semifinalists are William & Mary tight end Andrew Caskin and New Hampshire safety Nick Marino.

Kindle, a four-time member of the CAA Academic All-Conference team and Delaware's CAA Chuck Boone Leadership Award nominee, is currently pursuing his MBA master's degree in strategic leadership at Delaware after earning his undergraduate degree in finance in 2016. He graduated with a 3.44 grade point average and currently carries a 3.78 GPA in graduate school.

The National Football Foundation (NFF) will announce 12-14 finalists on Nov. 1, and each of them will receive an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship as a member of the NFF National Scholar-Athlete Class, presented by Fidelity Investments.

The finalists will travel to New York City for the 60th NFF Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 5, where their accomplishments will be highlighted in front of one of the most powerful audiences in all of sports. Live during the event, one member of the class will be declared as the winner of the 28th William V. Campbell Trophy® and have his postgraduate scholarship increased to \$25,000.

**BLUE HENS REACH MILESTONE CAA WIN**

Delaware picked up win No. 150 all-time in Colonial Athletic Association (previously the Yankee Conference and Atlantic 10 Conference) play in the 20-6 win vs. Towson on Oct. 29, 2016. The Hens have now put together a record of 152-99 in league games, good for a winning percentage of .605 that ranks tied for No. 1 among all current members.

Delaware became just the fifth league program to reach the 150-win plateau and joined the likes of former members Massachusetts and Connecticut and current members New Hampshire and Maine.

**DELAWARE'S CAA SUCCESS**

Delaware has enjoyed great success in conference play since joining the Yankee Conference (now the Colonial Athletic Association) back in 1986. The Blue Hens, who have won outright or shared nine league titles during that time, are tied for the best record in league games among all current CAA teams that have played more than two seasons, posting a record of 152-99, good for a .605 winning percentage.

Delaware's .605 winning percentage is tied with Villanova (144-94, .605) and ranks ahead of James Madison (119-78, .604), William & Mary (109-87, .556), and New Hampshire (235-187-10, .554) in the top five.

Old Dominion owns the top spot all-time with a .813 (13-3) win percentage but the Monarchs played just two seasons in 2011-12. Massachusetts went 236-139-4 (.628) in conference play before leaving for the MAC.

**BLUE HENS AT DELAWARE STADIUM**

Delaware boasts one of the top home-field advantages in all of college football. Not only do Blue Hen fans turn out to Delaware Stadium each week - helping UD become the only NCAA FCS team in the nation to average 20,000 or more fans per regular season home game 12 seasons between 1999-2010 - they see consistently winning football.

Delaware has won 46 of its last 69 home games (.666) and is 303-104-4 (.743) in 65 seasons all-time at Delaware Stadium, including a mark of 20-5 with eighth straight wins in the post-season. Delaware claimed its 300th win all-time at Delaware Stadium in the 2016 season opener Sept. 1 vs. Delaware State with a 56-14 victory.

The Hens, who went 2-3 at home in 2016, posted a winning or .500 season at home nine straight years between 2007-15, and in all but three seasons since 1984.

Delaware has ranked in the top 10 nationally for home attendance among FCS programs each of the last 21 seasons since 1996. The Hens ranked No. 8 in NCAA FCS in average home attendance in 2016, averaging 16,478 fans per game, an increase of 652 from the previous season.

Delaware's current home attendance average of 16,375 this season ranks No. 9 among all NCAA FCS programs, trailing only James Madison (24,390), Jacksonville State (23,944), Montana (23,777), Prairie View (23,432), Montana State (19,454), North Dakota State (18,567), North Carolina A&T (17,164), and Florida A&M (16,945).

**HENS EXTEND IMPRESSIVE SCORING STREAK AT DELAWARE STADIUM**

A rarity occurred Aug. 30, 2014 when Delaware was shutout in a season-opening 62-0 loss at the hands of host Pittsburgh. The shutout loss snapped Delaware's streak of 220 straight games scoring a point - a streak that dated all the way back to a 27-0 setback to Villanova back on Sept. 14, 1996.

It also marked the first time Delaware had been shutout on opening day since a 21-0 loss to Lehigh in the 1950 opener while also snapping a streak of 99 straight road games scoring a point. The 220-game streak was the longest among CAA teams.

That rarity happened again on Oct. 10, 2015 when Delaware suffered a 20-0 shutout loss at Rhode Island, snapping streaks of 211 straight games scoring vs. FCS opponents and 156 straight games scoring in conference games. Both streaks dated back to the Villanova loss in 1996. The Blue Hens were also shutout by a 19-0 score at Towson on Oct. 3 and 27-0 at Virginia Tech on Sept. 9.

**Still, one impressive scoring streak continues to live on for the Blue Hens. Delaware has not been held off the scoreboard at home at Delaware Stadium since suffering a 24-0 setback to Holy Cross back on Nov. 12, 1983 - a streak of 225 straight games.**

Delaware has been shutout just six times in its last 402 games since 1983 and just eight times in its last 502 games since 1975. In CAA play, the Hens have been shutout just three times in 250 games since joining the Yankee Conference (which became the Atlantic 10 and then CAA) in 1986 and have never been shutout in 125 conference home games at Delaware Stadium.

**NOTES, MILESTONES, AND RANDOM FACTS TO PONDER....**

- In five games this season, Delaware has already held possession of the football for an average of 32:28 minutes per game. The Hens held the ball for 39:50 vs. Delaware State, 36:47 vs. Virginia Tech, 34:46 vs. Cornell, 26:02 vs. James Madison, and a season-low 24:57 vs. Stony Brook. Delaware ranks No. 2 in the CAA and No. 19 nationally in that category from among all NCAA FCS schools. North Dakota State leads the way at 35:53.

- Senior wide receiver **Diante Cherry** caught three passes for 41 yards vs. Virginia Tech on Sept. 9 and went over 1,000 career yards receiving with his first catch of the day. He now ranks No. 25 all-time at Delaware with 1,097 yards. He reached another milestone vs. James Madison when he caught three passes for 28 yards. His first reception in the first half was his 100th career reception. He now ranks No. 17 all-time at Delaware with 105 receptions.

- Delaware has committed 38 penalties for 358 yards to rank No. 77 in the nation in that category. That is a far cry from the 2016 campaign when the Blue Hens were the least penalized team at the NCAA FCS level, committing just 40 penalties for 356 total yards. Delaware was whistled for 11 penalties for 84 yards vs. Virginia Tech on Sept. 9, the most by a UD contingent since 2014.

- Junior running back **Thomas Jefferson** notched his sixth career 100-yard rushing game with his 102-yard outing against Delaware State back on Aug. 31. He ranks second on the team with 197 yards this season and now has 1,787 career yards rushing to rank No. 22 all-time for the Blue Hens. He needs just 8 yards to crack the all-time Top 20 and 428 to move into the Top 10.

- Delaware junior running back **Kareem Williams** reached an impressive milestone in the season opener vs. Delaware State as he rushed for 67 yards on 14 carries. On his final carry of the night, he went over the 1,000-yard mark for his career and now has 1,232, including a season-high 121-yard effort vs. Cornell. He ranks 47th all-time at Delaware in career rushing yards.

- Junior quarterback **Joe Walker** also has a few milestones just around the corner. He enters the William & Mary game with 2,121 career passing yards and 881 rushing yards. He needs just 119 yards rushing to become only the fifth quarterback in UD history to reach 1,000 yards on the ground. Walker would join **Rich Gannon** (1984-86), **Bill Vergantino** (1989-92), **Leo Hamlett** (1993-96), and **Andy Hall** (2002-03) as the only players in UD history to pass for over 2,000 yards and run for over 1,000 yards in career. In the win over Stony Brook, Walker became just the 18th player in UD history to reach 3,000 total yards of offense for a career.

- Junior kicker **Frank Raggio** has enjoyed an outstanding season so far in 2017, converting on all 11 extra point attempts and on 6 of 8 field goal tries for a team-high 29 points. He has now made 47 straight PAT conversions since 2015 and is 20 shy of the UD record of 67. He had kicked at least one field goal in seven straight games before being held scoreless vs. Virginia Tech. That streak was third longest in school history and two shy of the UD record of nine set by **Don O'Brien** in 1987-88 and by **Jon Striefsky** 2007. Since that game, Raggio has converted four field goals, including two against Cornell, a school-record 55-yarder vs. James Madison, and a 50-yarder last week vs. Stony Brook (No. 5 all-time at UD). His 55-yard kick broke the Delaware record of 54 yards by Steve Leo in 1992 vs. Navy and was also the fourth longest in CAA history. The kick was the second longest in the NCAA FCS this year, just a yard shorter than Northern Colorado's Colin Root, who booted a 56-yarder vs. College of Idaho on Sept. 2. Root and Raggio are the only two kickers in FCS this season with two field goals of 50 yards or further.

- Speaking of kickers....Delaware sophomore **Jake Roth** continued to show a strong foot on kickoffs for the Blue Hens. Of his five kickoffs vs. Delaware State, four of them went through the end zone for a touchback. His only kickoff vs. Virginia Tech also sailed through the end zone and he was 4 of 8 vs. Cornell and 2 of 3 against JMU. Over his first two seasons as the Hens' kickoff specialist, Roth has booted 36 touchbacks in 70 attempts, good for a mark of 51 percent.

- The Blue Hens had 15 interceptions during the 2016 season and ranked No. 21 in the nation and No. 6 in the CAA in that defensive category. Delaware picked off just seven passes the entire 2015 season and just five during the entire 2014 campaign. The 15 interceptions were the most for a Delaware team since the 2011 squad had 18. Delaware already has six thefts this season to rank No. 34 in the NCAA and No. 6 in the CAA.

- Several Delaware players are expected to continue impressive starting streaks vs. Williams & Mary this Saturday. Senior defensive tackle **Blaine Woodson** has started 38 straight games since the 2015 season, senior center **Brody Kern** has started 33 straight games, and defensive back **Nasir Adderley** and linebacker **Anthony Jackson** have each started 27 straight games for their careers. Linebacker **Charles Bell's** streak of 25 straight starts ended last week due to a season-ending back injury suffered vs. James Madison on Sept. 30.

### DELAWARE SEASON TICKET SALES SURGE

Enthusiasm surrounding the start of the 2017 Delaware football season and a new era under head coach **Danny Rocco** has resulted in a surge of season ticket sales this summer.

Delaware had doubled its total of new season tickets (900) from last year. In addition, Blue Hen football season ticket holders renewed their seats at a rate of 88 percent. Both totals are the highest since the 2010 season when Delaware advanced to the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision title game. The increase in new season tickets sold also represents the first growth in that area since that 2010 season. Delaware's season ticket total for 2017 currently stands at approximately 5,800.

### REAL. LIVE. ACTUAL BLUE HENS AT DELAWARE FOOTBALL HOME GAMES THIS FALL

University of Delaware football fans who have never seen an actual Blue Hen in person will get their chance this fall as the University will have Blue Hens on display during home games as part of their pre-game tailgate festivities. The birds will be on site in the Anchor Buick GMC Fan Zone two hours before the games begin.

Having the Blue Hens at the games is the result of an interdisciplinary collaboration between UD Athletics and the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources (CANR). **Chrissi Rawak**, director of Intercollegiate Athletics and Recreation Services, and CANR Dean **Mark Rieger** initially talked about the possibility of having a live mascot in December 2016, and the two teams have been working together ever since to bring the concept to fruition. Athletics and CANR have worked together on everything from game day logistics to coop design to blue hen color selection.

A trailer, designed by **Dan Hougentogler**, research associate in the Department of Animal and Food Sciences (ANFS), has been constructed to house the Hens for the pre-game activities and is equipped with a mock up football field and goal posts, as well as fans to keep the birds cool.

The Blue Hen flock at UD features descendants of birds that were originally donated by **S. Hallock du Pont** in the 1960s for teaching and research, as well as three newer birds that were donated in 2016 by **Wesley Towers**, a 1964 UD graduate who majored in animal and poultry health during his time at UD and went on to serve as the Delaware state veterinarian for over 37 years. He is also a former member of the University's Board of Trustees.

**Bob Alphin**, senior instructor in ANFS and manager of the Allen Laboratory, explained that this is a great opportunity to provide educational outreach to the Delaware community on the importance of the poultry industry to the state, as well as educate them on the history and biology of the Blue Hens. Alphin stressed that the safety and health of the birds is of the utmost importance.

"The trailer has a nice design with good air flow, with fans, we'll provide water and feed, along with plenty of space for the birds. I don't expect that we'll have any issues but we are prepared just in case," said Alphin.

Three student interns—Anna Desmond, Melanie Lopez and Meaghan Young—from the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources have been working with the birds since June and will be on site at the games to help educate the public and to keep an eye on the birds.

While there will most likely be five birds total at the games, there have been two male birds that have been chosen to represent the Blue Hens as they are the biggest birds in the flock and look the most like iconic Blue Hens.

Lopez said that it is easy to distinguish the two Blue Hens from one another and that they both have their own unique personalities.

"One is more energetic and vocal and then the other is quieter but has his bursts where he moves quick all around," said Lopez.

Young added that "One is a little bit more curious. As soon as you walk in, he'll kind of go up and check you out and then the other one just chills in the back a little bit."

### BLUE HENS PICKED NO. 5 IN CAA POLL; THREE EARN ALL-CAA HONORS

**Danny Rocco** is confident that his 2017 squad is ready to turn the corner and return Delaware to relevance in the Colonial Athletic Association race. Looks like his fellow head coaches agree. The league held its annual CAA Football Media Day on July 25 at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md. and released its preseason head coaches/media relations director poll and all-conference team.

The Blue Hens were well represented as Delaware earned a No. 5 pick out of 12 teams in the league standings and three seniors - linebacker **Charles Bell**, defensive tackle **Bilal Nichols**, and center **Brody Kern** - earned All-CAA honors.

James Madison, the defending NCAA FCS national champion and league title holder that visits Delaware Stadium Sept 30, was the prohibitive preseason favorite, earning 21 first place votes. Richmond earned the other three first place votes followed by Villanova, New Hampshire, Delaware, Albany, William & Mary, Stony Brook, Maine, Towson, Elon, and Rhode Island. Richmond, New Hampshire, and Villanova also advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2016.

"We are going to go to work and do everything we can to better our program, better our product, and prepare ourselves to win and have success on a daily basis," said Rocco. "When all is said and done, the thing you want to be is relevant in November. I believe we have a great opportunity to be relevant come November. Hopefully this team is ready to accept that challenge."

**SENSATIONAL SIX SELECTED AS 2017 DELAWARE FOOTBALL CAPTAINS**

The top student-athlete leadership unit for the 2017 University of Delaware football squad stands at six.

New Blue Hens head coach **Danny Rocco** announced last week that a trio of standout players - senior defensive tackle **Bilal Nichols**, senior tight end/fullback **Kyle Yocum**, and junior quarterback **Joe Walker** - have been named co-captains.

The trio joins the three captains - senior center **Brody Kern**, senior linebacker **Charles Bell**, and junior linebacker **Troy Reeder** - who were announced at the Blue-White Spring Game in May.

The six captains is the highest total ever in Delaware history, surpassing the previous high of five during the 2011 season and four each during the 1996, 2008, 2014, and 2016 campaigns.

"At the end of camp, we went back and revisited our captains," said Rocco. "This is something I have been doing for a while. We had a few in the summer, and as we head into the end of camp, it gives guys the opportunity to take over some leadership roles. It is one of the greatest honors you can receive as a student-athlete and one of those things that stays with you for a long time. It gives more people the opportunity to work towards having a leadership role on the team and being recognized for that."

Bell is serving as captain for the second straight year and becomes just the sixth player in UD history to serve in that capacity during multiple seasons.

**John Scholato** (1961-62), **Marc Sydnor** (1990-91), **Matt Marcorelle** (2007-08-09-10), **Paul Worrirow** (2011-12), and **Andrew Pierce** (2012-13) are the only other UD players to serve as captain for more than one season.

Bell, Kern, Nichols, and Reeder all earned All-Colonial Athletic Association honors a year ago with Bell, Kern, and Nichols being named to the CAA preseason all-conference team.

**BLUE HEN HEAD COACHING DEBUTS**

**Danny Rocco** made his debut as head coach at the University of Delaware last week vs. Delaware State, becoming just the sixth full-time coach since 1940 to head the sidelines for the Blue Hens. Below are some of the recent debuts for Delaware head coaches.

**Bill Murray** - lost at Hampden Sydney, 7-0 Oct. 5, 1940. A second quarter scoring pass from Walt Sprye to Syd Weed clinched the win for Hampden Sydney.

**David Nelson** - defeated Lehigh 7-0 under the lights of Wilmington (Del.) Ball Park Sept. 22, 1951. The Hens won despite completing just one pass and being outgained 254-167 in total yards. A first quarter touchdown run by Joe Scarcia was all the Hens needed to post the victory.

**Tubby Raymond** - defeated Hofstra 35-13 Sept. 24, 1966 before 10,140 fans at Delaware Stadium. Delaware rushed for 255 total yards and held the Dutchmen to just 65 total yards and eight first downs. Quarterback Frank Linzenbold threw for 118 yards and rushed for 136 yards while Stu Green rushed for 79 yards and three touchdowns to lead the way.

**K.C. Keeler** - defeated No. 22 Georgia Southern 22-19 on Aug. 29, 2002 before 19,056 fans at Delaware Stadium. Antawn Jenkins scored two touchdowns, including a 45-yard scamper in the opening five minutes of the game. QB Andy Hall completed 7 of 14 passes for 99 yards and rushed for 88 yards and one score.

**Dave Brock** - defeated Jacksonville (Fla.) 51-35 on Aug. 29, 2013 at Delaware Stadium as the Blue Hens scored 24 unanswered points to overcome an early two-touchdown deficit. Delaware piled up a whopping 611 yards of total offense - the highest for a UD team since 2000 - while the defense held the Dolphins to just 224 total yards and negative 37 yards rushing, the third lowest total allowed in UD history.

**Danny Rocco** - defeated Delaware State 22-3 on Aug. 31, 2017 at Delaware Stadium as Diante Cherry caught one touchdown pass and ran for another the UD defense held the Hornets to just 11 first downs and 224 yards while forcing two turnovers.

**NOW THAT'S CONSISTENCY**

Since 1990, only three schools that have competed at the NCAA FCS level during that entire time period have won at least four games every single season. Delaware, Montana, and Northern Iowa are the members of this exclusive club of consistent winners. Eastern Kentucky dropped out of the club following a 3-8 season in 2016.

The last time the Blue Hens failed to win at least four games in a season came in 1967 when Delaware went 2-7 under Hall of Fame head coach **Tubby Raymond**. For Montana, the last time it did not reach four wins was 1985 and for Northern Iowa it was 1978.

**DELAWARE AND THE NFL**

Delaware football continues to make a big impact in the National Football League. Six former Blue Hen standouts - tied for the second highest total of any NCAA FCS program - are currently on active NFL rosters.

The group includes 14-year veteran and two-time All-Pro FS **Mike Adams** of Carolina; former Super Bowl MVP QB **Joe Flacco** and TE **Nick Boyle** with Baltimore; LB **Paul Worrirow** with Detroit; DT **Zach Kerr** with Denver; and DB **Marcus Burley** with Houston. Burley was released by Cleveland in August but signed with the Texas several days later.

OC **Gino Gradkowski**, who played the last five seasons in the NFL with Baltimore, Denver, Atlanta, and Carolina, was released by Carolina earlier this fall. OT **Connor Bozick** was released by Detroit prior to the start of the regular season.

Special notice goes to former Blue Hen WR/RB **Brett Veach**, who earlier this summer was named the general manager of the Kansas City Chiefs. The Chiefs' offensive coordinator is former Blue Hen All-American QB **Matt Nagy**.

Flacco led Baltimore to a Super Bowl victory and was named the game's MVP following the 2012 season. He will start for the Ravens for the 10th straight season this fall. Worrirow led the Atlanta Falcons in tackles as a rookie free agent in 2013, did so again in 2014 and 2015, and was a key special teams player for the team's Super Bowl run in 2016. Adams led Denver to the Super Bowl in 2013 and Indianapolis to the AFC title game in 2014. He earned All-Pro honors in both 2014 and 2015.

**The six players ranks Delaware first among CAA schools and tied for second among all FCS programs with Northern Iowa and Montana. North Dakota State is tops among FCS programs with seven players currently on NFL active rosters.**

**MORE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE TIES**

Current Blue Hen juniors **Kareem Williams** and defensive end **John Nassib** also have some strong ties to the National Football League as both have brothers playing on Sundays. William's brother Andre, a 2013 Heisman Trophy finalist at Boston College, played two seasons with the New York Giants before joining the San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers in 2016. He is currently a free agent.

Nassib has two brothers playing the NFL. Ryan (Syracuse) played quarterback for the Giants in 2013-15 before being released by the New Orleans Saints this fall. He signed with Jacksonville earlier this month. Brother, Carl (Penn State), is a second-year defensive lineman for the Cleveland Browns.

**DELAWARE TO AIR THREE HOME GAMES ON TV FOR 2017 SEASON**

University of Delaware Athletics has agreements with NBC Sports Philadelphia (formerly Comcast SportsNet Philadelphia), NBC Sports Washington (formerly Comcast SportsNet Mid Atlantic), SportsNet New York (SNY), and COZI TV (Delmarva's NBC affiliate in Rehoboth Beach), to broadcast Blue Hen football home games from Delaware Stadium during the upcoming 2017 season.

Delaware will produce three games for live broadcast: Sept. 30 vs. James Madison, Oct. 14 vs. William & Mary, and Nov. 11 vs. Albany.

The James Madison game was broadcast on NBC Sports Philadelphia, NBC Sports Washington, COZI TV, and SNY. The William & Mary game will be broadcast at 3:30 p.m. on NBC Sports Philadelphia+, COZI TV, and SNY (one-hour tape delay at 4:30 p.m.). SNY will also re-air the game on Oct. 14 at 8 p.m., Oct. 15 at 1 p.m., Oct. 16 at 2 p.m., and Oct. 17 at 7 p.m.

The Albany game will be broadcast at 3:30 p.m. on NBC Sports Philadelphia, COZI TV, and SNY with the SNY broadcast on a one-hour tape delay at 4:30 p.m.

Delaware collaborated with James Madison University to produce the Sept. 30 match up. This game aired live on CSN Mid Atlantic (now NBC Sports Washington) via CSN+, serving 3.4 million homes throughout the District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia as well as on CSN Philadelphia (now NBC Sports Philadelphia), SNY, and COZI TV, bringing the game to the homes of over 20 million fans.

The agreements place the excitement of Delaware football into the homes of over six million viewers in the Philadelphia area, Southern New Jersey and Delaware via NBC Sports Philadelphia and NBC Sports Washington. SNY reaches 12 million nationally and is available to viewers throughout New York, Connecticut, New Jersey, and northeastern Pennsylvania, and nationally on DIRECTV, Verizon FiOS, Comcast Cable, and AT&T U-Verse. COZI TV can be seen throughout the Delmarva area in southern Delaware and eastern Maryland.

"This is a wonderful moment for the University of Delaware, Delaware Athletics and Delaware Football" said Director of Athletics and Recreation Services **Chrissi Rawak**. "We are excited for the opportunity to highlight the great things happening on our campus to over 20 million households."

Jet Media will produce the televised games on behalf of Delaware. The University was represented by Collegiate Sports Management Group during the negotiation of these agreements.

In addition to this three-game deal, Delaware football will also be featured three other times on linear or digital broadcasts this fall (*see note below*). Delaware's Sept. 9 game at Virginia Tech aired as part of the Atlantic Coast Conference Network Extra package. The Blue Hens will also appear twice as part of the Colonial Athletic Association's new "Game of the Week" partnership with CBS Sports Digital announced earlier this month – at home vs. Richmond on Oct. 21 and at Maine on Nov. 4.

### **CAA FOOTBALL PARTNERS WITH CBS SPORTS DIGITAL TO STREAM GAME OF THE WEEK; BLUE HENS TO APPEAR TWICE IN '17**

University of Delaware Football will appear twice this fall as part of the new Colonial Athletic Association Game of the Week digital broadcast.

The CAA announced in August that it had signed an agreement with CBS Sports Digital to stream a "Game of the Week" for football and men's basketball throughout the next two seasons. Games will be available for free on College Sports Live online (collegesportslive.com) and on the College Sports Live mobile app.

As part of the 12-game football package in 2017, Delaware will be featured during its Oct. 21 home game vs. Richmond and its Nov. 4 road game at Maine to be played in Portland.

College Sports Live is a streaming service from CBS Sports Digital offering subscribers the ability to watch and listen to more than 10,000 live events from top universities and conferences across the country. It is the most comprehensive collegiate sports streaming service available covering more than 30 sports.

"The CAA is extremely pleased to be able to enter into this partnership with CBS Sports Digital," CAA Commissioner Joe D'Antonio said. "We have seen a dramatic shift in the way our fans are watching CAA sporting events. Through this relationship, we hope to continue delivering to our fan base top quality digital programming that will highlight the competitiveness of our Conference as well as the talent of our student-athletes."

The CAA Football "Game of the Week" schedule includes 12 contests and features 11 league match-ups. The slate kicks off on Thursday, August 31 with the Battle for the Brice-Cowell Musket between long-time rivals Maine and New Hampshire. All 12 CAA Football members will appear at least once in the package.

Scott Sudikoff will handle the play-by-play duties for all 12 football telecasts, while former NFL player Brandon Noble will work as the analyst. Noble, a collegiate standout at Penn State, played four seasons (1999-2002) at defensive tackle for the Dallas Cowboys and one for the Washington Redskins (2003).

In addition to the football coverage, College Sports Live will feature a "Game of the Week" package in CAA men's basketball that includes 12-15 contests. College Sports Live will also offer coverage of conference championship action in women's basketball, baseball, men's soccer, women's soccer, softball and volleyball.

For the third straight year, the University of Delaware football squad has placed a record number of student-athletes on the Colonial Athletic Association Football Academic All-Conference team in 2016.

Delaware placed 34 student-athletes on the 2016 squad, surpassing the record of 30 set in 2015, which had broken the previous mark of 28 in 2014.

### **HENS AND NORTH DAKOTA STATE TO BEGIN SERIES IN 2018**

The University of Delaware and North Dakota State University agreed to a two-game contract for football games during the 2018 and 2019 seasons on Aug. 10, 2016.

NDSU will host the Blue Hens on Sept. 22, 2018, at Gate City Bank Field at the Fargodome. Delaware will host the Bison at Delaware Stadium in Newark on Sept. 14, 2019.

These will be the first two meetings between Missouri Valley Conference leader North Dakota State and Delaware, which plays in the Colonial Athletic Association.

Delaware won the FCS national championship in 2003 with a 15-1 record as a member of the Atlantic 10. The Blue Hens joined the CAA in 2007 and were national runners-up in 2007 and 2010. NDSU won five straight national titles in 2011-15. One of the two teams has played in 8 of the last 14 FCS national championship games.

North Dakota State will be Delaware's first Missouri Valley Conference opponent since hosting South Dakota State on Sept. 11, 2010.

**A BLUE HEN IN THE WHITE HOUSE...AND AT DELAWARE STADIUM**

When former U.S. President **Barack Obama** and running mate, former Delaware Senator **Joe Biden**, won the 2008 presidential election, it was big news. And even bigger news for the citizens of Delaware and those affiliated with UD. In November, 2012, Obama and Biden were elected for another four-year term to lead the country.

A 1965 graduate of the University of Delaware with degrees in history and political science, Biden played on the Blue Hen freshman football team in 1961 under head coach **Scotty Duncan** but did not play varsity football after that. Biden, a member of the UD Wall of Fame and an ardent Delaware football fan, considered himself “a half-baked halfback” during his brief UD football career.

Biden made his first visit to Delaware Stadium as Vice-President on Saturday, Oct. 9, 2009 as he attended the Maine game and sat with then UD President **Patrick Harker** and current New Jersey Governor and 2016 Presidential candidate **Chris Christie** (also a UD graduate) throughout the entire contest.

He made another visit to Delaware Stadium in 2010 when he attended Delaware’s 16-3 NCAA quarterfinal win over New Hampshire on Dec. 10. He also attended the Hens’ 2010 national championship game in Frisco, Tex. with Christie and former Delaware Gov. **Jack Markell**.

Biden met with then head coach **K.C. Keeler** and members of the team on Sept. 19, 2008 when Biden’s plane was parked on the same tarmac as the Delaware charter at New Castle County (Del.) prior to its trip to Furman. Biden later made an appearance at the Blue Hens’ game vs. Maine at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 11, 2008.

**SHAMELESS SELF PROMOTION**

University of Delaware Assistant AD for Athletics Media Relations **Scott Selheimer** will be on hand to cover his 313th straight UD football game this week vs. William & Mary.

He has staffed and represented UD athletics at every football game - home and away - since the 1992 season opener vs. Massachusetts. The streak includes 28 NCAA playoff games and three national championship contests. Delaware’s overall record stands at 198-113-1 (.636) during those 312 games.

He has missed just two home games since 1985 (Dec. 6, 1986 vs. Arkansas State and Nov. 30, 1991 vs. James Madison - both playoff games) and has currently staffed 174 straight games at Delaware Stadium and 216 overall.

**NEWARK, Del.** -- The Delaware football team opened the Danny Rocco Era on a high note as a stingy Blue Hens defense forced three turnovers to key a 22-3 victory over Delaware State.

Senior wide receiver Diante Cherry led the Blue Hens (1-0), making four catches for 83 yards and a touchdown and also had a 19-yard acrobatic run off a reverse for another score. The 102 all-purpose yards earned Cherry the Nate Beasley MVP Award as the game's outstanding player.

The Blue Hens offense finished the opening night performance by racking up 432 yards of total offense, but it was the defense that truly shined.

That unit, which returned all but one starter from last year's team, held Delaware State (0-1) to just 224 yards of total offense, and to 3-13 success on third downs.

Delaware allowed just a 24-yard field goal late in the first half after stopping the Hornets on the one-yard line.

The Blue Hens defense forced three turnovers, recovering a pair of fumbles before sealing the win with an interception by redshirt freshman Nijuel Hill late in the fourth quarter.

Blue Hens quarterback Joe Walker went 13 of 26 for a career-high 192 yards and the touchdown to Cherry while redshirt junior running back Thomas Jefferson ran for 102 yards on 19 carries for his sixth career 100-yard effort.

Rocco won his first game as head coach at Delaware and improved to 91-42 all-time as a head coach. He served as head coach at Liberty University in 2006-11 and at the University of Richmond in 2012-16. He became the fifth straight Delaware coach to win his UD coaching debut. The team presented him with the game ball in the locker room.

Delaware has now defeated downstate opponent Delaware State in all eight meetings since the first game in 2007 with an average winning margin of 27 points per game.

Delaware kicker Frank Raggio converted field goals of 21 and 25 yards, the second giving Delaware an 8-0 lead late in the second quarter. He has now converted 10 of his last 13 attempts.

**BLACKSBURG, Va.** -- Delaware's defense put in a big effort vs. No. 18 Virginia Tech, but one special teams lapse swung the momentum and an inconsistent offense could not put points on the board in the shutout setback to the NCAA FBS Hokies.

Delaware (1-1), coming off a season-opening 22-3 win over Delaware State Aug. 31, held the Hokies offense to just 303 total yards and only two offensive touchdowns, but the offense could not hold up its part of the bargain.

Virginia Tech (2-0), which defeated No. 22 West Virginia 31-24 in its opener, held the Blue Hen offense in check all day as Delaware managed just 223 total yards, turned the ball over twice, and was forced to punt 10 times. Delaware was also called for 11 penalties for 84 yards, the most by a UD team since 2014.

Delaware quarterback Joe Walker completed 8 of 17 passes for 116 yards and also rushed for 26 yards while Thomas Jefferson ran for 27 yards and Diante Cherry caught three passes for 41 yards. Defensively for the Hens, Nasir Adderley had a team-high six tackles and blocked a field goal attempt and Bilal Nichols had five tackles and a sack.

Virginia Tech quarterback Josh Jackson threw for 222 yards with touchdown passes of four yards to Travon McMillian and 28 yards to Cam Phillips. Phillips finished with six catches for 90 yards. Kicker Joey Slye added field goals from 50 and 24 yards.

The big blow just happened to be the first score of the game when Greg Stroman returned a punt 61 yards for a touchdown with 2:45 left in the first half to give the Hokies the lead for good. Slye kicked his 51-yard field goal midway through the second quarter and McMillian scored his short touchdown just before halftime to give Virginia Tech the 17-0 halftime lead.

Phillip's 28-yard catch from Jackson early in the fourth quarter and Slye's 24-yard field goal capped the scoring.

Delaware, which suffered its first shutout since 2014, knocked on the door several times but could not put points on the board.

Frank Raggo's 28-yard field goal attempt with 3:40 left in the first half was off the mark. The Hens drove to the Tech 13-yard line late in the third quarter but Walker was intercepted by Terrell Edmunds, who returned the ball 55 yards to set up the Phillips touchdown.

**NEWARK, Del.** -- Five first-half turnovers set the tone for a dominant day as the Blue Hens jumped out to a big halftime lead and pulled away for the non-league victory.

Delaware (1-1), which won its second straight home game, turned those five turnovers into 27 points and never looked back as the Blue Hens spoiled the season-opener for their Ivy League foe and first-time opponent Cornell (0-1).

The Blue Hens recovered a fumble on Cornell's first play from scrimmage in the opening minute and intercepted four Big Red passes in the first half on the way to a 27-0 halftime lead.

Delaware quarterback Joe Walker hit on 20 of 30 passes for a career-high 202 yards and two touchdowns, wide receiver Jamie Jarmon set career-highs with eight catches for 84 yards and scored his first career touchdown, running back Kareem Williams rushed for a game-high 121 yards, including a 49-yard run to set up a Delaware touchdown, and running back Kani Kane scored three short touchdown runs - all in the opening half - to pace the offense.

The Blue Hens piled up 427 yards of total offense and gained 200 or more yards on both the ground and through the air for the first time since the 2013 season.

Delaware's defense held Cornell to just 315 total yards, intercepted four passes, broke up six other passes, and had three sacks.

Blue Hen defensive tackle Bilal Nichols recovered a fumble on the first play from scrimmage to set up Delaware's first touchdown and later intercepted a pass inside Cornell territory to set up another score. He also had a sack as part of a dominant day.

Linebacker Colby Reeder, safety Nasir Adderley, and cornerback Malcolm Brown also intercepted passes and linebacker Charles Bell recorded a team-high 12 tackles for the defense.

**NEWARK, Del.** -- Delaware hung tough with top-ranked James Madison throughout the day, but some missed opportunities and a key fumble return for a touchdown in the first half was the difference as the Blue Hens dropped their Colonial Athletic Association opener.

Delaware (2-2, 0-1 CAA), which entered its CAA opener having won both home games earlier this season, took a 10-7 lead early in the second quarter and was on the Dukes' heels the entire game but could not complete the upset.

JMU defensive end Andrew Ankrach returned what appeared to be an incomplete pass into a 23-yard fumble return for a touchdown with 6:53 left in the first half to take the lead for good and used two field goals by Tyler Gray to preserve the win, the 17th straight for the defending NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision national champions.

Delaware's defense held strong throughout the day, holding the high-powered James Madison offense to just 347 total yards and one touchdown, well below their CAA-leading averages of 47.3 points and 560.0 total yards per game. The Dukes (5-0, 2-0 CAA) entered the game having outscored its four previous opponents 189-48.

Blue Hen quarterback Joe Walker completed 5 of 11 passes for 47 yards and hit Jamie Jarmon with a 15-yard scoring pass with 12:07 left in the second quarter that gave Delaware its final lead at 10-7. Walker also rushed for 46 yards while running back Kani Kane led the running attack with a career-high 81 yards.

Defensively for Delaware, linebacker Troy Reeder recorded 12 tackles and intercepted a pass, junior defensive tackle Blaine Woodson made 12 stops, and linebacker Jalen Kindle, seeing extensive action after starter Charles Bell went down with an injury, had 10 tackles, including a sack.

Delaware kicker Frank Raggio gave the Hens an early 3-0 lead and made some history in the process as he booted a UD record 55-yard field goal with the wind at his back six minutes into the game. His kick, which was also the fourth longest in CAA history, broke the Delaware record of 54 yards by Steve Leo vs. Navy in 1992.

James Madison quarterback Bryan Schor, the 2016 CAA Offensive Player of the Year, was held in check most of the day as he hit on just 10 of 19 passes for 93 yards and an interception. Trai Sharp led the JMU offense with 36 carries for 185 yards rushing, including a six-yard scoring dive with 6:57 left in the first quarter.

**STONY BROOK, N.Y.** -- Delaware picked up the signature win it's been searching for as the Blue Hens rallied from a 13-point halftime deficit and downed No. 23 Stony Brook.

Malcolm Brown picked up a fumble and raced 45 yards for a touchdown with 4:04 left in the third quarter to pull the Blue Hens to within three points and Kani Kane's six-yard scoring burst just two minutes into the final stanza proved to be the game-winner as Delaware (3-2, 1-1 CAA) picked up the pivotal Colonial Athletic Association win.

Stony Brook (4-2, 3-1 CAA), which entered the game tied atop the CAA standings with an unbeaten mark in league play, had a four-game win streak snapped despite leading 20-7 at the break.

Delaware snapped a six-game losing streak vs. Top 25 teams, earning a win for the first time since a victory over No. 25 William & Mary in 2015. It was also the Hens' first victory over a Top 25 team on the road since a 32-31 triumph over No. 7 Towson in 2013.

Delaware's defense came up big down the stretch as the Blue Hens held the Seawolves out of the end zone on the final drive of the night. Delaware's defensive line trio of Blaine Woodson, Bilal Nichols, and John Nassib sacked SBU quarterback Joe Carbone at the UD 18-yard line on a fourth down play in the final seconds to preserve the victory. Stony Brook gained possession on its own nine-yard line with 3:12 left to play and drove 73 yards on 14 plays, converting six first downs on the way. But the Hen defense stiffened, forcing two incomplete passes and the final sack to save the day.

Delaware QB J.P. Caruso, a first-year transfer from Appalachian State, took over for starter Joe Walker in the first quarter and led the Hens to the victory as he completed 7 of 14 passes for 80 yards and a touchdown and also rushed for 65 yards. His scrambling 23-yard scoring strike to Jamie Jarmon with 12:37 left in the first half tied the game at 7-7 before the Seawolves took a 20-7 lead into intermission thanks to two scoring throws from Carbone to Ray Bolden.

Kareem Williams led the Delaware ground game with 75 yards on 16 carries while Kane finished with 57 yards, including a 32-yarder that set up his game-winning touchdown.

The defense had seven tackles for loss, a sack, and four pass breakups with Nasir Adderley and Troy Reeder leading the way with 12 tackles each. Reeder stripped the ball from SBU's Donald Liotine and forced the fumble that Brown picked up and took to the end zone to spark the comeback.

Delaware kicker Frank Raggio came up big for the second straight week, sparking the rally with a 50-yard field goal with 8:47 left in the third quarter to pull the Hens to within 20-10.
