Regular Season Recap...

For the Delaware baseball team, the 2007 season began with the unbridled optimism that a season to remember was about to unfold. However, after only a few weeks, the season looked more like one to forget than one to remember.

The Hens stumbled out of the gate, losing their first seven games and being outscored 51-19 in the process.

Looking to rebound in their home opening series, the Hens instead lost two of three to Towson. The Hens seemed to get the ship righted in their next conference game, downing Hofstra, 8-4. However, the Hens fell to Hofstra the next day, 5-4, in a game in which they grounded into four double plays and stranded 13 baserunners. The next day everything fell apart as the Pride scored 11 runs with two outs and five unearned runs on their way to a 16-8 win. Sitting at 4-12 with a 2-4 conference record, the Hens hit rock bottom on Tuesday March 27 against Temple when they fell to the Owls 18-7 at home. After a mid-week win over intrastate rival Delaware State, the Hens headed south to take on Georgia State.

In Atlanta, the Hens captured the first game, 2-1 and seemed to be back on track. However, the next day the Hens dropped a 10-inning decision after taking a lead to the bottom of the tenth, and then on Sunday the unthinkable happened. Delaware led 7-3 in the bottom of the ninth with two outs and no baserunners. After two singles and a walk, Hens pitcher Matt Heppner held on 0-2 count on Charlie Pelt. Heppner's next pitch was left over the plate, and Pelt lost it over the wall in left to tie the game. The Hens loaded the bases with no outs in the top of the 10th but did not score, and eventually lost in 13 innings.

While a game like the Georgia State loss can be the knockout blow to a struggling team, the Hens instead started punching back. Since the shocking loss, the Hens have posted a record of 23-6 and have leapt to the top of the CAA standings.

After losing by a run on Friday at George Mason, the Hens responded with their finest all-around game to date in a 6-2 win on Saturday. With a chance to win the series, Chad Kerfoot brought his best stuff to the hill and the offense exploded as the Hens routed the Patriots, 12-0. Carrying their momentum from the GMU series, the Hens pulled off an abbreviated sweep of UNC Wilmington before a trip to Old Dominion. Delaware lost two close games to the then conference-leading Monarchs before using its trademark offense to take a 12-9 win on Sunday.

The Hens really got rolling during a weekend in Boston. Facing a Northeastern team in second place as the Hens sat in seventh, Delaware blitzed the Huskies, sweeping them on their home field in dominating fashion with an aggregate score of 35-11, including a 10-1 margin in first innings. Delaware returned home and swept William & Mary to set up a battle of heavyweights in Richmond against VCU. The Hens lost a tense 6-5 game on Friday night before taking Saturday's and Sunday's contests behind strong pitching from Kerfoot and Brent Gaphardt. The Hens finished out the regular season by taking two of three against James Madison.

Throughout the turnaround the team known for its offense has done outstanding work on the pitcher's mound. The overall team ERA has fallen from 6.87 after the huge loss to Temple to 4.66 at the end of the regular season. The offense has sprung back to life as well, keyed by Alex Buchholz and his .392 average, 55 RBI and 25 doubles, as well as the 15 home runs off the bat of senior slugger Bryan Hagerich. Ryan Jablonski and Brandon Menchaca, the 1-2 men in the lineup, have combined for 110 runs this year, and Adam Tsakonas is hitting 62 points higher than one year ago.

After a 2-10 start, the Hens have turned the ship around and are once again playing for a season to remember.

2007 University of Delaware Post-Season Notes

Perfect Six...

Senior Billy Harris has posted a perfect 6-0 record in CAA play this year, including wins over Hofstra, George Mason, UNC Wilmington, Northeastern, William & Mary and James Madison. In addition, Harris got a no-decision when he struck out 11 in 7.2 innings against Georgia State and when he struck out 10 in seven innings at Old Dominion. For the season, Harris has an ERA of 3.59 with 72 strikeouts in 62.2 innings in CAA play.

Well Menchie Would've...

With his home run against James Madison on Friday afternoon, senior leftfielder Bryan Hagerich tied head coach Jim Sherman for second on the all-time home run list with 46. As impressive as Hagerich and Sherman's numbers are, both are well short of the school record for home runs, held by Kevin Mench, who hit 71 round-trippers in only three seasons as a Blue Hen.

Keep Poundin' The Zone...

The Hens have three pitchers on their post-season roster who have posted strikeout to walk ratios of better than 3:1 for the 2007 season. Brad Miller struck out 23 against only seven walks, Chad Kerfoot struck out 49 and walked 13 and Billy Harris was right on the mark with 81 punchouts and 27 walks. Throwing strikes is nothing new to Kerfoot, who as a sophomore in 2005 posted an outstanding ratio of better than 6:1.

Not So Grand Slam...

For all its power and might, the Hens did not have a single grand slam among their 59 home runs this season.

Eight Is Enough...

Delaware has become a formidable team during their ascent from 2-10 to 29-21. One reason for its success has been their ability to shorten games in the back end of the bullpen. When leading after eight innings, the Hens boast a gawdy 25-1 record. Perhaps even more impressive, the Hens are 24-2 when leading after seven and 24-3 when leading after six.

Score Early, Score Often...

The powerful Delaware offense scored 6.76 runs a game this season, and outscored opponents in every inning except for the eighth, when they were outscored 25-20. The greatest gap is in the first inning, when the Hens are outscoring opponents 55-31.

Start Me Up...

Ryan Jablonski and Brandon Menchaca man the 1-2 slots in the Delaware lineup. The duo tied for the team lead in runs scored in the regular season with 55 apiece. The 110 combined runs accounted for 32.5% of the Hens run total.

We're Going Streaking...

The Blue Hens put up some impressive streaks both collectively and individually in 2007. Brandon Menchaca carried a 26-game hitting streak into the season and got a hit opening day to extend it to 27, just one short of the school record. Alex Buchholz had an 18-game hitting streak dating back to last season, and had a 19-game streak late in the 2007 season. Leadoff hitter Ryan Jablonski has a current 13-game hitting streak going. Bryan Hagerich hit multiple home runs in three straight games to tie a school record set by Kevin Mench. As a team the Hens won seven straight road games, and posted overall winning streaks of nine and 11 games. The Hens also won 12 straight at home before a 5-4 loss to James Madison in the regular season finale.

Put Me In Coach, I'm Ready to Play...

Ryan Jablonski, Brandon Menchaca, Alex Buchholz and Bryan Hagerich not only comprise the first four hitters in the Delaware lineup, they also are the four Blue Hens to start and play in all 50 games of the regular season. This year marks the first time four Hens have played in every game since the 1996 season.

Safe At Home...

The Blue Hens posted a 16-8 mark at Bob Hannah Stadium during the 2007 regular season, including a mark of 9-5 in CAA games. The Hens home record is especially impressive considering they started the home slate 4-7. Delaware reeled off 12 straight home victories before falling to James Madison, 5-4, on the last day of the regular season.

Closing Time...

Delaware closer David Slovak had one of the best seasons of any pitcher in program history. The Louisville, Kentucky native set new single-season records with 31 appearances and 11 saves. He has a 2.58 ERA and has held opposing hitters to a .209 batting average and finished 29 of the Hens 50 regular season games. The .209 opponent batting average is the lowest allowed by a Delaware pitcher since Steve Franzini held opponents to a .200 batting average against in 1996.

Slide to the Left...Slide to the Right...

On opening day, Delaware had an infield consisting of Ryan Jablonski at first base, Alex Buchholz at second, Kyle Davis at shortstop and Adam Tsakonas at third. After some early season defensive struggles, the Hens found consistency and success by flipping their opening day infield, trading Jablonski with Tsakonas and Davis with Buchholz. The move has paid off offensively as well as defensively, as Jablonski is hitting .392 as a third baseman and Tsakonas sports a .390 mark at first.

It Works and It Hurts...

After missing the 2006 season with Tommy John surgery, senior LHP Brent Gaphardt has rebounded with a solid 2007 season. Gaphardt finished the regular season first on the team with a 2.57 ERA. In 11 appearances, Gaphardt was 4-2 and struck out 41 batters in 42 innings. Opponents are hitting only .259 against him.

When I Was at Miami...

Former University of Miami (FL) standout Brian Walker is in his first season as the pitching coach at Delaware in 2007, and the results have been immediate. After establishing a new program record for highest team ERA (5.95) in 2006, Walker has guided a pitching staff that has posted a 4.66 ERA and held opponents to a .259 batting average. The .259 opponent average is the lowest for a UD staff since the 1995 team held opponents to a .228 mark. This year's staff has also given up the fewest home runs (28) and hits (438) since the 1996 and 1995 teams, respectively.

Power Outage?...

The Delaware offense posted 59 home runs this season, a high number but nowhere near the PlayStation-like 111 put up in 2006. Of returning position players, only Bryan Hagerich has matched last year's home run output. The Hens have also stolen 49 bases this year, down from 96 a season ago. However, the Hens overall winning percentage has gone up 24 points, and they have gained 6.5 games on their conference record from a year ago when they were 12-18 in CAA play.

Nine Is the Magic Number...

Delaware's explosive offense has averaged nearly seven runs a game in 2007 and has scored nine or more in nearly a quarter of its games. The Hens are a perfect 12-0 when scoring nine or more runs in '07, and 10 times have reached double digits.

Up On the Bump...

After starting in rightfield the last two seasons, junior Dan Richardson has seen time on the pitcher's mound in 2007. In seven appearances, Richardson has a 2-0 record and a 7.71 ERA. He has struck out five in seven innings and has flashed the arm strength he displayed in rightfield by consistently being clocked at 93 mph.

Oh Captain, My Captain...

In 2007, senior LHP Mitch Heckert became the first two-year captain since associate head coach Dan Hammer in 1995-96. Unfortunately for him and the Blue Hens, Heckert has suffered season-ending injuries in his first appearance of both seasons. He suffered an elbow injury that required Tommy John surgery at Richmond in the Hens second game in 2006, and then tore a muscle in his forearm at Richmond in the Hens second game of the 2007 season.

NORFOLK, VA-

ODU took two of three from the Hens on the strength of outstanding pitching. On Friday night Monarch starter Dan Hudson struck out 15 Blue Hens, while the Monarchs could muster only an unearned run against UD starter Billy Harris, who struck out 10 in seven innings. ODU scored the winning run in the eighth and then won game two on a complete game shutout by Anthony Shawler. On Sunday the Delaware offense came back to life and scored nine runs against the Monarch bullpen, highlighted by a three-run blast by Alex Buchholz.

RICHMOND, VA-

In a battle of CAA heavyweights, the Blue Hens emerged victorious in two of three playoff-like games. VCU won Friday night by pushing across the winning run in the bottom of the eighth. Delaware came back and won the next day on the strength of eight innings of one-run pitching by Chad Kerfoot. In Sunday's finale Brent Gaphardt, Mike McGuire and David Slovak stymied the VCU offense, allowing only three hits and no runs over the first eight innings. Ryan Jablonski had two hits and an RBI in Sunday's finale.

NEWARK, DE-

Delaware used timely hitting and took advantage of UNCW mistakes on its way to an abbreviated sweep. In game one, the Hens scored four runs in the sixth inning to turn a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 lead. With two on and one out in the ninth, UNCW's Jonathan Batts grounded into a double play to end the game. On Saturday, the Hens led off two innings with home runs and scored four runs after a two-out error by UNCW starter Jeff Hatcher in the fourth inning to take an 8-2 lead. Sunday's game was wiped out by torrential rains along the east coast.

FAIRFAX, VA-

The Hens season began to turn around in Fairfax. The Patriots took game one, 7-6, in a game in which they scored four unearned runs. Frustrated by Friday's loss and fresh off the shocking losses at GSU, the Hens had had enough and put together their best all-around game to that point in a 6-2 win behind seven strong innings from Billy Harris. On Sunday, the Hens put an exclamation point on their resurgence with a 12-0 demolition of the Patriots behind eight innings from Chad Kerfoot and five RBI and two titanic home runs from Bryan Hagerich.

ATLANTA, GA-

The Blue Hens dropped two extra inning heartbreakers in Georgia. The Hens took game one, 2-1, behind Brent Gaphardt and a three-inning save from David Slovak. On Saturday, the Hens trailed, 6-3, after a wild first inning. Billy Harris came on in relief for UD and allowed one run and struck out 11 in 7.2 innings. The Hens forced extras and took a lead in the top of the 10th, only to see it slip away for a 9-8 loss. On Sunday the Hens were up 7-3 with two outs in the bottom of the ninth, but with the bases loaded, Charlie Pelt's slam tied the score and GSU won in 13 innings.
