## THE SERIES

**All-Time:** Delaware's most spirited and closely contested rivalry, the Blue Hens and Villanova meet for the 37th time this week since the first game back in 1895. Villanova leads the all-time series by a slim margin of 18-17-1 with two straight wins and six wins in the last eight meetings. Three of the last 10 meetings have needed overtime to decide the winner with Villanova holding a 2-1 advantage in those game. In the last 21 contests, 12 have been decided by a touchdown or less, including the last two games in which Villanova has won 19-14 in 2001 and 38-34 last season. Delaware's last win in the series was a 59-42 comeback win at Delaware Stadium in 2000. The Blue Hens had won six straight and 10 of 11 in the series before Villanova broke the string with a 27-0 victory in 1996.

**All-Time at Villanova:** Villanova leads the series in games played on the Main Line by a 10-6 margin with four straight wins. Delaware's last victory at Villanova was a 38-31 overtime triumph in 1994.

**Last Meeting:** Quarterback Brett Gordon threw for a career-high 460 yards and three touchdowns, including a seven-yard scoring pass to Brian White with 15 seconds left to play to lift No. 13 Villanova past Delaware 38-34 last Nov. 23 at Delaware Stadium in the regular season finale for both squads. Gordon completed 39 of 62 passes and went over 300 yards for fifth time during the year as the Wildcats downed Delaware for the second straight year in thrilling fashion. The two teams combined for 54 first downs and 965 yards of total offense in the see-saw affair. Delaware had taken a 34-31 lead with 13:55 left in the game when **Keith Burnell** scored on an 11-yard run and **Brian Ingram** caught the two-point conversion pass from backup **Mike Connor**, who was pressed into his only action of the season due to an injury to starter **Andy Hall** the week prior to the game. Villanova came back to clinch the win as Gordon led the Wildcats on an 11-play, 74-yard drive. *(more series details on page 2)*

## LAST TIME OUT

**Delaware** (10-1, 7-1 Atlantic 10) won an epic Atlantic 10 battle this past Saturday at Delaware Stadium, surviving with a 51-45 victory over league-leading Massachusetts in the longest game in school history. It took three overtime periods to decide it as the No. 6 ranked Blue Hens halted No. 3 Massachusetts' eight-game winning streak and put itself into a position to capture the A-10 title and an automatic I-AA playoff berth. Delaware QB **Andy Hall** hit on a school record 28 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed for 63 yards and another score to lead the effort. He hit **Justin Long** on a four-yard touchdown pass in the third overtime period to put the Hens up 51-45. The defense then sealed the deal for the Hens as UMass threw four straight incomplete passes, clinching the win. The two teams played to a 31-31 tie at intermission and both scored touchdowns on their overtime possessions until the third stanza. Hall scored on a 13-yard run in the second overtime to send the game into the third extra session.

**Villanova** (7-3, 5-3 Atlantic 10) put its post-season aspirations in jeopardy Saturday with a 14-10 loss at the University of Maine Saturday afternoon in Orono, ME. The No. 13 ranked Wildcats suffered their second straight loss of the season as Maine quarterback Ron Whitcomb hit Christian Pereira on a 15-yard scoring pass just one minute into the second half for what proved to be the game-winner. Villanova held Maine to just 11 first downs and 185 total yards but offensively could only manage a one-yard touchdown run by Joe Casamento and a 29-yard field goal by Adam James in the final four minutes of the first half. Villanova gained just 273 total yards and suffered two turnovers. Casamento hit on 18 of 33 passes for 134 yards while Moe Gibson led the ground game with 44 yards.

**THE COACHES**



**DELAWARE: K.C. Keeler** (Delaware '81)....second season at the University of Delaware (16-7, .696) and 11th season of college coaching overall (104-28-1, .786, including nine years at Rowan College, Glassboro, NJ, 1992-2001)...became 17th active I-AA coach to reach 100 wins (vs. New Hampshire Oct. 11) and did so in the second fewest games among that group...12-1 all-time at Delaware Stadium as a coach and 30-3 all-time at Delaware Stadium as a player and coach...4-5 on the road...11-6 all-time in Atlantic 10 play...0-1 all-time vs. Villanova...born July 26, 1959...Kurt Charles Keeler...native of Emmaus, PA...named Delaware's 22nd head coach March 5, 2002, replacing the legendary Tubby Raymond who retired after a 36-year career with a record of 300-119-3 and three national titles...just the fourth UD head coach since the 1940 season...built an NCAA Division III dynasty at Rowan University where his teams advanced to the NCAA tournament seven times and was national runner-up five times...three-year starting linebacker at Delaware in 1978-81, leading team to 1979 NCAA Division II national title...11-0 all-time in season openers as a head coach at Rowan (9-0) and Delaware (2-0).



**VILLANOVA Andy Talley** (Southern Connecticut '67)....132-76-1 (.634) in his 18th season overall at Villanova...160-94-2 (.629) in his 23rd season overall....78-52 (.600) all-time in Atlantic 10 play...leads all active Atlantic 10 head coaches in conference wins...6-8 all-time vs. Delaware...1997 Sports Network NCAA I-AA Coach of the Year (Eddie Robinson Award)...has led Villanova to four Atlantic 10 Conference titles in 1989, 1991, 1997, and 2001 and to six NCAA I-AA Tournament appearances in 1989, 1991, 1992, 1996, 1997, and 2002...led 2002 team to NCAA I-AA semifinals.

Gordon, who completed 39 of 62 passes and went over 300 yards for the fifth time this season, engineered an 11-play, 74-yard drive that resulted in the game-winner and kept the team's NCAA I-AA playoffs hopes alive. The Wildcats defeated the Hens for the fifth time in the last six meetings.

Delaware (6-6, 4-5 Atlantic 10), which trailed all day before Keith Burnell (107 yards rushing) scored on an 11-yard touchdown run with 13:55 remaining for a 34-31 lead, ended the first season under head coach **K.C. Keeler**.

The Blue Hens got a big effort from QB **Mike Connor**, who was seeing his first action of the season after starter **Andy Hall** was diagnosed with a torn rotator cuff earlier in the week. Connor, who was expecting to redshirt until Hall's injury, threw for 216 yards and one touchdown and rushed for 52 yards and two more scores.

For Villanova (9-3, 6-3), Martin Gibson rushed for 55 yards and two touchdowns while White caught 11 passes for 165 yards and two touchdowns and Cameron Cross caught 11 passes for 121 yards and another score. The teams combined for 965 total yards and 19 penalties for 198 yards. Villanova had 538 yards of offense while the Hens picked up 427 yards, including 211 yards on the ground against the top-ranked defense in the Atlantic 10.

Delaware appeared to have the game in hand when DT **Chris Mooney** recovered a fumble by Gordon at the Villanova 19-yard line with 3:22 left to play. But the Hens could not manage a first down and **Scott Collins** missed a 42-yard field goal.

The Wildcats got the ball back and rolled 74 yards down the field for the winning score. Gordon missed on his first two pass attempts before reeling off seven completions, the last to a diving White in the end zone for the game-winner.

Villanova took a 21-14 lead into halftime as Gibson scored on two touchdown runs and Gordon hit White on a 27-yard scoring pass. Connor kept the Hens in the game with scoring runs of 30 and 15 yards.

**LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE**

**Andy Hall** hit a falling **Justin Long** on a four-yard touchdown pass in triple overtime and Delaware's defense then stopped Massachusetts on downs as the Blue Hens survived in a classic battle of Atlantic 10 leaders Saturday with a 51-45 victory at Delaware Stadium. In the longest game in Delaware history, the No. 6 Hens (10-1, 7-1) moved into a tie for the league lead and moved one step closer to the league title. No. 3 Massachusetts (9-2, 7-1) had an eight-game win streak snapped. The Minutemen could have captured the league title and automatic NCAA Tournament berth with the victory. Hall completed a school record 28 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed for a score to lead Delaware. Massachusetts QB Jeff Krohn hit on 25 of 48 passes for 354 yards and five touchdowns. However, UMass was hurt by five turnovers, including two interceptions and a fumble by Krohn. The two teams combined for 950 yards but also had seven turnovers between them. Hall threw two touchdown passes each to Long and **David Boler** (10 catches for 109 yards) while RB **Germaine Bennett** rushed for 85 yards and went over 1,000 yards for the season, becoming the first UD back to reach the mark since 1994. Krohn threw three touchdown passes to Jason Peebler, who caught six passes for 132 yards, including a 25-yard scoring pass from Krohn to send the game into the final overtime session.

**LAST WEEK FOR VILLANOVA**

Villanova (7-3, 5-3 Atlantic 10) put its post-season aspirations in jeopardy with a 14-10 loss at the University of Maine Saturday afternoon in Orono, ME. The No. 13 ranked Wildcats suffered their second straight loss of the season as Maine quarterback Ron Whitcomb hit Christian Pereira on a 15-yard scoring pass just one minute into the second half for what proved to be the game-winner. Villanova held Maine to just 11 first downs and 185 total yards but offensively could only manage a one-yard touchdown run by Joe Casamento and a 29-yard field goal by Adam James in the final four minutes of the first half. Villanova gained just 273 total yards and suffered two turnovers. Casamento hit on 18 of 33 passes for 134 yards while Moe Gibson led the ground game with 44 yards.

The usually reliable Wildcat offense has sputtered slightly in the last four games as Villanova has lost three of its last four contests after starting the season with a 6-0 mark and moving up to as high as No. 2 in The Sports Network Top 25 poll. Villanova, which advanced to the NCAA I-AA semifinals a year ago, most likely needs to win this week vs. Delaware to make a return trip to post-season play. While the Wildcats do average 41.4 points per game and lead the Atlantic 10 in passing (315.6 yards per game) and rank No. 2 in total offense (483.3), it's been the defense that has led the way this season. The Wildcats allow a league-low 15.8 points per game and rank second in the league in passing defense (119.0) and total defense (289.1). Offensively, Casamento has thrown for 1,847 yards and 14 touchdowns with six different receivers catching 20 or more passes. The defense is led by linebacker Brian Hulea, the A-10 leader with 125 tackles, and end Darrell Adams who has 11.5 tackles for loss this fall.

**BLUE HENS EYEING FIRST A-10 TITLE SINCE 2000**

The No. 3 ranked Blue Hens control their own destiny this week as a victory over Villanova would give Delaware its first Atlantic 10 title and NCAA playoff appearance since 2000. Although the Hens have most likely already qualified for the playoffs, a win over Villanova would clinch the automatic berth by way of its 51-45 triple overtime win over Massachusetts this past Saturday. Should the Hens capture the title, it would be their seventh conference title since joining the league in 1986. If the Hens win and Massachusetts loses to Rhode Island Saturday, it would be only the second outright title by Delaware and their first since the 1992 season. The 16-team NCAA I-AA Tournament field will be announced Sunday at 1 p.m. on ESPNNews.

**HALL HAULS IN WEEKLY ALL-STAR HONORS**

Delaware quarterback **Andy Hall** continues to earn honors for his play in the Blue Hens' 51-45 win over No. 3 Massachusetts Saturday. Hall, a senior from Cheraw, SC (Cheraw HS), earned Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Week honors for the third time this season as he completed a Delaware record 28 passes in 39 attempts for 261 yards and four touchdowns without an interception and rushed for 63 yards and another score. In addition to his Atlantic 10 honor, Hall was named the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Offensive Player of the Week, was named the *Football Gazette* I-AA National Co-Offensive Player of the Week, and the I-AA.org National All-Star. Hall, a second-year transfer from Georgia Tech, directed the Blue Hens to the victory over Massachusetts to cap the longest game in school history. He scored on a 13-yard run in the second overtime period to tie the score at 45-45 and then threw the game-winning touchdown on a four-yard pass to wide receiver **Justin Long** in the third extra session. Also earning Atlantic 10 weekly honors Defensive Player of the Week Anthony Nolen (DB) of Northeastern, Co-Rookies of the Week Trevor McLaurin (RB) and Manauris Arias (DB) of Maine, and Special Teams Player of the Week Connor McCormick (K) of New Hampshire.

**ONE MORE SHOT AT REVENGE**

One of Delaware's top goals this season was to avenge all the close losses that it suffered in 2002 when the Hens went 6-6 and lost all six games by a combined total of just 27 points. So far so good. With the victory over Massachusetts Saturday, the Hens have now avenged every conference loss from 2002 except for one - Villanova. The Hens will take aim at that goal this weekend. Earlier this year, the Hens avenged 2002 losses to non-league opponent The Citadel (41-7 win this year) and league foes Richmond (44-14),

William & Mary (41-27), Rhode Island (55-10), and Massachusetts (51-45). After losing those five games by a combined total of 22 last season, the Hens have defeated those five by a cumulative total of 130 points this season.

**JOHNSON FOURTH HEN SELECTED TO I-AA ALL-STAR GAME**

University of Delaware senior defensive end **Shawn Johnson** was one of nine additional players named to the rosters of the inaugural I-AA All-Star Classic Tuesday, bringing the total to 95 of the ultimate 100. The players, all seniors, come from the 13 participating conferences for the game, to be staged and televised by TFN, The Football Network, on December 30, from Lockhart Stadium in Ft. Lauderdale. Joining Johnson were OT Marko Canka of Sacramento State, DB David Crocker of Stephen F. Austin, LB Jonathon Harrell of Northern Iowa, DE Isaac Hilton of Hampton, WR Carl Kearney of Georgia Southern, QB Robert Kent of Jackson State, WR Marlus Mays of Northern Iowa, and CB Benny Sapp of Northern Iowa. Johnson, a senior first-year transfer from Duke, is the fourth Blue Hen player selected to be selected for the game, joining offensive guard **Jason Nerys**, quarterback **Andy Hall**, and defensive back **Mike Adams**. Johnson, who earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference a year ago at Duke, has dominated action on the line this season for the Blue Hens. He has played in all 11 games with 10 starts at defensive end and ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 49, including 29 solo stops. He leads the Atlantic 10 in sacks with 10, is second in tackles for loss with 18, and has also broken up five passes, recovered two fumbles, and forced two fumbles.

**BABY GRAND**

Delaware's trio of sophomore receivers **Brian Ingram**, **Justin Long**, and **David Boler** has performed well beyond its years over the last two seasons. They are each only in their second season of college football action, but already they are reaching impressive milestones. And they could all reach the same milestone in the same game. Each owns over 900 career pass receiving yards and each could hit the 1,000 milestone this week vs. Villanova. Ingram, who has missed three games this season with injuries, leads the way with 963 yards and needs just 37 yards to hit 1,000. Boler, who has also missed three games this season

due to injuries, is coming off a career-best effort vs. UMass when he caught 10 passes for 109 yards and two touchdowns, the most receptions by a UD player since Eddie Conti's 15 vs. Connecticut in 1998. Boler enters this week's game with 937 yards, 63 shy of 1,000. Long who caught two touchdown passes last week vs. UMass, including the game-winner, has 912 yards and needs 88 to reach the mark. The three could join 16 other players in UD history who have amassed 1,000 career yards receiving but it would mark the first time in school history that three different players reached the mark in the same season, let alone in the same game.

### ***BENNETT JOINS 1,000-YARD CLUB, MORE AHEAD:***

Delaware senior running back **Germaine Bennett** rushed for 85 yards in Saturday's win over UMass, upping his season total to 1,026 yards and becoming the first UD rusher since **Daryl Brown** in 1994 to reach the 1,000-yard mark. Ironically, Brown was on hand to witness the feat as he was inducted into the UD Athletics Hall of Fame prior to the game and was the game's Honorary Captain. Bennett, who has not rushed for less than 66 yards in any game this season, ranks No. 2 in the Atlantic 10 with an average of 93.3 yards per game. He also has rushed for 12 touchdowns this season, including a 16-yard scoring scamper on fourth down in the first overtime period to keep the Blue Hens in the game. Bennett's 1,026 yards is now the 12th best single game mark in school history and if he reaches his average this week vs. Villanova, he would be only the sixth UD back in school history to reach the 1,100-yard mark. He has three 100-yard efforts this season (109 vs. The Citadel, 121 vs. Richmond, and 124 vs. Hofstra), has three other games in the 90's, and has not been held under 66 yards in a game all season. He rushed for 96 yards vs. Maine Nov. 1 to become the 51st player in Delaware history to surpass the 1,000-yard career mark. Bennett has also been an effective punt blocker, highlighted by his block vs. New Hampshire Oct. 11 which set up Delaware's first touchdown. He has four career blocked kicks, just one shy of the UD record of five by **Lamont Watson** (1997-98).

### ***BLUE HENS SET ATTENDANCE MARK***

Delaware drew a boisterous crowd of 21,804 fans for Saturday's thrilling triple overtime victory over Massachusetts and they got their money's worth. They were also part of a school record. The Hens drew over 20,000 fans for the eighth straight game since last season and upped their season total attendance to 148,141, good for an average of 21,163 per game. That average breaks the previous UD regular season attendance record of 21,154 set in 2000.

### ***JUST SHORT OF PERFECT***

The Blue Hens' hopes for an undefeated season were dashed Nov. 8 with the 24-14 loss at Northeastern. Delaware was trying to become just the third team in school history to go 10-0 for the season, and the first since the 1972 team finished at 10-0 and captured the small college national title. The Hens were one of just four teams in the country to be undefeated and now only two exist, Ivy League champion Penn (9-0), and Patriot League champion Colgate (11-0).

### ***A WINNING SEASON...AND THEN SOME:***

After posting a 4-6 mark in 2001 and a 6-6 record last season, the first consecutive non-winning seasons at Delaware since 1960-61, Delaware got back in the winning column this fall. Delaware has long past clinched a winning season for 2003, the first for the Hens since going 12-2 and advancing to the

NCAA I-AA semifinals in 2000. If the Blue Hens knock off Villanova this week, Delaware would clinch their first ever 11-win regular season in school history. The Hens have won 11 or more games in a season seven times, most recently in 2000 when the team went 12-2 in advancing to the NCAA I-AA semifinals.

### ***ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS - HENS WIN 100TH!***

Delaware is currently playing its 18th season in the Atlantic 10 Conference (originally the Yankee Conference) this fall and will enter this week's regular season finale vs. Villanova with a 7-1 mark in league play. Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, and reached an impressive milestone last week with the win over UMass. The Hens, who have posted at least a share of six conference titles, more than any other A-10 team during that period, posted their 100th league win all-time Saturday (100-44, .694) vs. UMass. The Hens snapped a streak of two straight losing records in conference play this season after having posted a .500 or better mark for 13 straight campaigns between 1988-2000. The Hens started league play 6-0 this season, its best start since going 8-0 in 1995. Should the Hens defeat Villanova Saturday, they would finish with an 8-1 mark in conference action, tying the school record for league wins in a season set in 1995 when the Hens were a perfect 8-0 in conference action.

### ***TUBBY RAYMOND FIELD AT DELAWARE STADIUM***

Home to the Blue Hen football team since 1952, the University of Delaware is playing its 51st season at Delaware Stadium this fall. The 22,000-seat natural grass stadium, which was dedicated as Tubby Raymond Field last Aug. 29 vs. Georgia Southern, opened Nov. 15, 1952 with Delaware defeating Lafayette 13-12 in the rain. Since then, Delaware has posted an overall record of 241-74-4, good for a winning percentage of .766. Since 1992, Delaware has posted a record of 65-15-1 (.808) at Delaware Stadium, including a 5-1 mark last season, giving the Hens one of the top home-field advantages in I-AA football. The Hens have won seven straight at home and 12 of their 13 home games the last two seasons under head coach **K.C. Keeler**. Delaware has ranked fourth among all NCAA I-AA teams in average attendance each of the previous three seasons, averaging a then-record 21,154 fans during the regular season in 2000. The

Hens averaged 20,504 fans for each home game during the 2001 season and ranked second among all NCAA I-AA programs last season with an average attendance of 20,257. This season, the Hens have broken the single season attendance record with an average of 21,163 fans per game, currently third best in I-AA this season behind Montana and Florida A&M. **Delaware is the only NCAA I-AA program to average over 20,000 fans per regular season home game each of the past five seasons. Delaware sold a total of 8,601 season tickets this year, the third highest count in school history.**

**TOP 25 TALES**

Delaware appeared in the pre-season The Sports Network NCAA I-AA Top 25 poll for the 12th straight season this year when the list was announced in early August with the Hens debuting at the No. 17 spot. The Hens were the only team listed in the top 25 that did not have a winning record (6-6) the previous year. Since the No. 17 ranking, the Hens have moved up each week and were ranked as high as No. 2 two straight weeks before losing to Northeastern in the Nov. 3 poll. That loss dropped the Hens to No. 6, but Delaware moved back up to No. 3 in both polls thanks to the 51-45 triple overtime win over No. 3 Massachusetts this past Saturday.

**THE COMEBACK KIDS**

The road to 10-1 has not been an easy one for the Blue Hens, especially over the last month. Three times in the last six weeks of action Delaware has faced a major first quarter deficit, and each time the Hens have rallied to post the victory. The cardiac moments began Oct. 11 at New Hampshire when Delaware fell behind 21-3 in the first quarter and clawed back to finally take the lead at 22-21 on a **Germaine Bennett** touchdown run with 1:58 left. The Hens then held on for the 22-21 when the Wildcats missed a 34-yard field goal at the final gun. The nervousness continues two weeks later in Annapolis, MD when Delaware got down 14-0 in the first eight minutes of the game vs. I-ANavy. The Hens took advantage of turnovers and finally evened the score at 14-14 at the half and eventually went on to the 21-17 win, clinching the victory when **Dave Camburn** knocked down a pass in the end zone on the final play. Most recently, the Hens won 24-21 in overtime over Maine Nov. 1, rallying from a 21-0 deficit that lasted until the final minute of the third quarter. But Delaware fought back and sent the game into overtime when **AndyHall** hit **David Boler** on a 39-yard scoring strike with 1:39 remaining in regulation. **Brad Shushman's** 36-yard field goal won it and capped off the second biggest comeback from a halftime deficit in school history. Delaware's 51-45 win over Youngstown State in 1979 after trailing 31-7 at the half remains the biggest comeback in UD annals.

**BLUE HENS IN THE BCS?**

Don't laugh. It's fun to compare scores of other college football games, and after Delaware's 21-17 win over I-A Navy Oct. 25, it got even more enjoyable. You could even make a case for the Blue Hens being eligible for a Bowl Championship Game (BCS) appearance. Consider the following (thanks to the Navy Sports Information Office and Blue Hen fan David Bent). Delaware beat Navy, who beat Air Force, who beat UNLV, who beat Wisconsin, who beat Ohio State and West Virginia. West Virginia then beat Virginia Tech, who beat Miami. Ohio State now ranks No. 2 in the BCS standings.

**TOUGH STRETCH RUN**

The Blue Hens' record currently stands at 10-1 overall and 7-1 and in first place in Atlantic 10 play, but the road has only gotten tougher as the Hens have moved towards the end of the season. The Hens' last four opponents - Maine (7-4, 5-3 A-10), Northeastern (7-4, 5-3), Massachusetts (9-2, 7-1), and Villanova (7-3, 5-3) - are all ranked or have been ranked in the national top 20 this season and have a combined record of 30-13 overall and 22-10 in league play. Conversely, Delaware's first six Atlantic 10 opponents this season are a combined 17-36 overall and 12-29 in league play.

## ***SICK BAY IN THE SECONDARY***

Injuries are certainly a part of football, but the Hens' luck in the health department this season has been mostly bad. Especially hit hard has been the Blue Hen defensive secondary where no less than five players have missed a combined 18 games of action. Senior co-captain and free safety **Mike Adams**, who missed all but one game with a hip injury in 2002, suffered a broken right fibula vs. Rhode Island and has missed the last four games. However, he did return to practice last week and could possibly return to action this week vs. Villanova; sophomore cornerback **Roger Brown** suffered a knee sprain vs. New Hampshire Oct. 11, missed two games, and has returned for the last three games; part-time starting cornerback, senior **Leon Clarke**, underwent hernia surgery Oct. 6 and missed four games before returning to action vs. Northeastern; freshman cornerback **Rashaad Woodard** had missed four games with a hamstring pull but finally returned vs. Navy; and freshman cornerback **Nicos Chavis** missed six games with mononucleosis earlier in the season.

## ***K.C. JOINS THE 100-WIN CLUB***

University of Delaware head coach **K.C. Keeler** joined an exclusive club Oct. 11 as the Blue Hens defeated New Hampshire 22-21. Keeler, who now owns 104 victories, has picked up 16 wins in two seasons at UD and 88 wins at NCAA Division III Rowan University in 1993-2001. Keeler became the 17th active coach in I-AA to reach the 100-win milestone and became the second fastest of the group to make it there, reaching the mark in 128 games. Only Penn's Al Bagnoli (122 games) got there faster with Keeler tying Dayton's Mike Kelly, who also needed 128 games to reach 100. Among the 17 active I-AA coaches are four other current Atlantic 10 mentors in Andy Talley at Villanova (6th at 160), Jimmie Laycock at William & Mary (7th at 159), Mark Whipple at Massachusetts (12th at 120), and Hofstra's Joe Gardi (14th at 107). For the record, Keeler's predecessor, Tubby Raymond, needed 132 games to reach 100 wins. He went on to a Hall of Fame career that included 300 victories, ninth on all-time college coaching win list.

## ***NAIL BITERS***

Delaware's tough luck in close games was evident last season when the Blue Hens suffered their six losses by a grand total of 26 points, including five losses by four points or less. Among those setbacks was a 15-13 loss at Richmond Sept. 7 when the Hens had an 18-yard field goal attempt blocked with 17 seconds remaining. The Hens' last nine losses since 2001 have come by a combined total of just 45 points, including seven by five points or less. In addition, 14 of the team's last 19 setbacks since 1999 have been by 10 points or fewer.

## ***BLUE HEN OFFENSE***

The Delaware spread offense is among the best not only in the Atlantic 10 Conference but in all of NCAA I-AA football. The Blue Hens rank first in the Atlantic 10 in scoring offense (35.1 - 9th in NCAA I-AA), first in third down conversions (45.2), second in passing efficiency (146.21 - 11th in I-AA), third in rushing offense (207.3 - 21st in I-AA), and fourth in total offense (483.3 - 22nd in I-AA). The Hens scored 40 or more points in the first three games of the season for only the second time in school history (1973) and had a streak of eight straight games with 400 or more total yards snapped vs. Navy Oct. 25. The Hens were held under 400 for the first time since a 357-yard effort in the 37-13 win over Maine last November. The streak of 400+ yardage games was the longest for Delaware since a 10-game streak in 1994-95. The Hens have been

efficient in the red zone (inside the 20-yard line), scoring 43 times in 55 trips to the zone, a success rate of 78.2 percent. The Hens have outscored opponents 204-108 during the first half this season, an 8.7point margin average heading into halftime each week.

## ***DEFENSE DOESN'T REST***

While the Delaware offense and its high-scoring assault has received most of the attention, the Blue Hen defense is making a name for itself as well this fall. The Hens had not allowed more than 27 points or 400 yards to any opponent this season before Saturday's 51-45 triple overtime win over UMass when the Minutemen piled up 518 yards of total offense. The Hens currently rank third in the Atlantic 10 in rushing defense (114.8 - 20th in I-AA), scoring defense (18.8 - 21st in I-AA), and sacks (29 for 195 yards) and fourth in total defense (338.0 - 46th in I-AA). Delaware allowed just 282 total yards to New Hampshire Oct. 11, including just 153 yards over the final three quarters. The Wildcats jumped out to a 21-3 lead but that included a 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown and a UNH scoring drive that started at the Blue Hen 28-yard line after a fumble. Against Rhode Island, the Hens held the Rams' vaunted triple option attack to just 179 yards on the ground, 174 less than its average of 353.0 rushing yards per game that ranked No. 2 nationally entering the game. The Hens did another outstanding job vs. Navy, holding the Midshipmen to 180 yards rushing, far short of their total of 321.9 that led all I-A schools entering the game. In addition, Delaware held Maine scoreless for the final 38 minutes of the game and held the Black Bears to just 154 yards in the second half in a 24-21 overtime win Nov. 1. The scoreless streak extended to 65 minutes before Northeastern scored against the Hens late in the second quarter in the Huskies 24-14 win over Delaware on Nov. 8.

## ***"HALL" MARKS: A PAYTON AWARD CANDIDATE***

In just two seasons at the University of Delaware after transferring from Georgia Tech, senior **Andy Hall** has put up some impressive numbers, including a 16-6 record as a starter in his 22 games. In his first season at Delaware in 2001, he threw for 1,832 yards and nine touchdowns while rushing for 863 yards and seven touchdowns. This season, he has thrown for 2,068 yards and 21 touchdowns with just six interceptions and has rushed for 595 yards and seven scores. He ranks 11th in NCAA I-AA in passing rating (147.99) and 22nd in total offense (242.9). **Those numbers have played a big part in Hall being officially added to the Walter Payton Award Watch list by the The Sports Network. The award annually honors the top offensive player in NCAA I-AA football and is selected by a vote of member sports information directors.** He also is a three-time Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Week award recipient this fall. The Cheraw, SC native has enjoyed some outstanding performances this season, highlighted by this past week's 51-45 win over No. 3 Massachusetts when he completed a school-record 28 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns and ran for 63 yards and a touchdown. It was his seventh career 200-yard passing game. Hall threw for a career-high 283 yards and three touchdowns in the season opener vs. The Citadel and rushed for a career-high 159 yards and two touchdowns, including a UD quarterback record 85-yarder, in the win over Hofstra. He also threw three touchdown passes in earlier wins over Richmond and West Chester and threw for 236 yards vs. William & Mary. He accounted for five touchdowns in a 55-10 win over Rhode Island, throwing for 153 yards and a career-high four touchdowns and rushing for 71 yards and another score. Hall, a pre-season All-Atlantic 10 second team pick, proved he is back at 100 percent after undergoing off-season rotator cuff surgery on his throwing (right) shoulder. Consider the following numbers:

- He currently has 173 pass completions this season (No. 5 all-time at UD) and 332 career completions to rank No. 5, 27 shy of No. 4
- He has passed for 3,900 career yards for No. 7 all-time at Delaware, 64 shy of No. 6 all-time
- He has 5,300 yards of total offense to rank No. 6 all-time at Delaware and he needs just 121 yards for fifth place.
- His career pass completion percentage stands at .583, well on the way to surpassing the UDcareer mark of .561 by Matt Nagy (1997-2000).
- He has rushed for 1,458 career yards to rank third all-time among Delaware quarterbacks and 28th all-time among all UD runners. He owns the second and third longest single-game rushing totals in school history and his 85-yard run vs. Hofstra was the fifth longest in school history and the longest ever by a Blue Hen quarterback. The two other UD quarterbacks who have rushed for over 1,000 career yards are **Bill Vergantino** (2,564 in 1989-92) and current NFL standout **Rich Gannon** (1,509 in 1984-86).

### **BLUE AND GOLD RUSH**

Having a runner reach the coveted 100-yard rushing mark for a game has often meant good things in the win column for the Blue Hens. Delaware won 23 straight games between 1994 and last season when having a runner rush for over 100 yards, snapping the streak when **Andy Hall** rushed for 126 yards in a 17-14 overtime loss to Rhode Island last Oct. 19. The Hens have since started another streak that currently stands at three after Hall and **Germaine Bennett** each surpassed the 100-yard mark vs. Hofstra Sept. 27.

### **GETTING THEIR KICKS**

Lose both your veteran placekicker and punter in the same season and you enter the following campaign a little anxious. But that hasn't been the case for the Blue Hens in 2003. After losing record-setting kicker **Scott Collins** and All-Atlantic 10 punter **Ryan Bleiler** to graduation following the 2002 season, Delaware head coach **K.C. Keeler** and special teams coordinator **Rick Brown** had some holes to fill. Consider them filled. Enter junior **Brad Shushman**, a second-year transfer from Louisville, and sophomore walk-on punter **Mike Weber**. Shushman has converted 45 of 46 extra points and is 11 of 16 on field goals, including a school-record tying three vs. New Hampshire when he attempted a school record five field goals. No kick was bigger than his 36-yarder in overtime Nov. 1 vs. Maine that clinched the 24-21 victory. The kick marked the first time a Delaware player has won a game with a field goal in the final seconds since **Don O'Brien** nailed a 28-yarder with seven seconds left in regulation to defeat Massachusetts 37-34 Oct. 10, 1987. Shushman kicked a season and career-long 42-yarder to open the scoring this past week in the win over UMass and added six extra points. Shushman currently ranks second in the Atlantic 10 in scoring (7.1 per game) and is third in field goals. His 11 field goals are just three shy of the Delaware single season mark of 14 by Collins in 2001. The athletic Shushman has also made three touchdown saving tackles on kickoff returns this season, and four for his career. Weber has been outstanding as a punter, ranking fifth in the Atlantic 10 and 45th nationally with a 39.1 yard average. His 45.6-yard average on five punts vs. West Chester was the sixth best single game mark in school history. His performance has played a big part in the Blue Hens ranking 19th in NCAA I-AA in net punting (36.5).

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** has posted a record of 16-7 in his two seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 16 victories is a formidable 17.4 points per game. The Hens had won each of their previous 10 victories by at least 10 points before a 22-21 win over New Hampshire Oct. 11. Keeler's average losing margin in his seven career losses with the Hens is a paltry 5.1 points per game with only two setbacks over five points.
- Four Delaware true freshmen have seen action for the Blue Hens so far this season. **Bubba Jespersen** has seen action as a backup at defensive tackle and has been joined on the defensive side of the ball by linebacker **KeiAndre Hepburn** and defensive backs **Nicos Chavis** and **Rashaad Woodard**. Chavis played in the first two games before suffering a bout of mononucleosis. He returned to action Oct. 11 vs. New Hampshire and started the next three games. Woodard took over and saw his first action vs. West Chester but suffered a pull hamstring and missed four games before returning vs. Navy.
- Delaware has scored at least one touchdown in 93 straight games since a 27-0 loss at Villanova in 1996 and have tallied 10 or more points in 107 of its last 116 games (92.2 percent of their games) since 1994. The Blue Hens have also not been shutout in a span of 133 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 41 games since a 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996.
- Senior running back **Antawn Jenkins**, who missed two games earlier this season with a sore ankle, enjoyed his best performance of the season vs. William & Mary Oct. 4 as he carried 18 times for a season-high 71 yards and two touchdowns. He now has career totals of 1,754 yards and 19 touchdowns and ranks 19th on the all-time UDcareer rushing list. He needs 40 yards to move into 15th place on the all-time list at Delaware and 313 yards to crack the all-time top 10.
- Delaware's vaunted defensive secondary, which returns co-captain **Mike Adams** and two-time All-Atlantic 10 Conference pick **SidneyHaugabrook**, may be among the best not only in the Atlantic 10 but in NCAA I-AA. The group has gathered in 25 career interceptions among Haugabrook (10), Adams (10), **Dave Camburn** (2 - both vs. Rhode Island), **Leon Clarke** (2), and **Roger Brown** (1). Adams, a co-captain, returned at full strength after missing all but one game last season with a hip injury and leads the team with three interceptions. However, he has missed the last four games with a broken fibula and is expected to return to action this Saturday vs. Villanova. Haugabrook scored his second career touchdown when he returned an interception 39 yards vs. West Chester.
- Delaware junior DT **Chris Mooney** came up with two blocked field goals in the Hens' 24-21 overtime win over Maine Nov. 1, including one in overtime. Mooney, who had never blocked a kick in his UD career, became only the second player in school history to block two kicks in a game, joining **Cy Kaplowitz** who had two blocks vs. Muhlenberg in 1949.
- Delaware's defense has posted an incredible 83 tackles for loss this season, resulting in 340 total yards. That total includes 29 sacks for losses of 195 yards. Against Rhode Island Oct. 18, the Hens posted a season-high 11 tackles for loss, including three sacks. The 83 tackles for loss represents 10.9 percent of the 758 plays run against the Blue Hens this year. Leading the way is senior defensive end **Shawn Johnson**. The first-year Duke transfer, who led the ACC with 12 sacks and 19.5 tackles for loss a year ago when he earned first team

All-ACC honors, is at it again this year and currently leads the Atlantic 10 in sacks (10 for 66 yards) and ranks No. 2 in tackles for loss (18 for 86). Navy head coach Paul Johnson called Johnson "the best defensive player we've seen in my two years here at Navy."

- Two Delaware players will continue long "iron-man" streaks this week vs. Villanova. Junior CB **Sidney Haugabrook** will make his 34th consecutive career start while senior OG and All-American candidate **Jason Nerys** will make his 33rd straight appearance in the starting lineup
- When Delaware sophomore LB **John Mulhern** missed the Nov. 1 game vs. Maine due to a hamstring pull, it snapped an amazing streak. The third of three brothers who have played football at UD, John became the first of the brothers to miss a game, snapping a streak of 117 straight games played by the Mulhern clan. **Pat Mulhern** played in 50 straight games in 1991-94, **Dan Mulhern** played in 47 straight in 1999-2002, and John had played in 20 straight before missing the game. He returned to play the next week vs. Northeastern.

**HAIL TO TUBBY:** Former Delaware head coach **Tubby Raymond** was honored Aug. 9 with his induction into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Indiana. The University of Delaware recognized Raymond once again this season when he was honored in a ceremony at halftime of the Delaware vs. William & Mary game Oct. 4. The ceremony included the unveiling of a bust of Raymond which now stands next to those of former UD coaches and College Hall of Fame members **Bill Murray** and **Dave Nelson** in the southwest corner of the Delaware Stadium.

**SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER:** The Blue Hens clinched a perfect month of September with a 24-14 win over Hofstra Saturday. Since 1990, the Hens are 41-12 during the month of September, good for a winning mark of .773. At home, the Hens are an amazing 28-2 (.933) in September since 1990 with the lone losses a 21-20 setback to West Chester in 1992 and a 35-25 setback to Villanova in 1997. Since then the Hens have won 14 straight at home in the month of September. On the road, the Hens are 13-10 during the month of September over that time period.

**BLUE HENS THRIVE AFTER DARK:** Delaware, which hosted four night games this season at Delaware Stadium, has enjoyed great success after sundown. Delaware Stadium has hosted 13 night game all-time and the Hens have posted a record of 12-1 with six straight victories. The lone loss in the streak was a 10-7 setback to Rhode Island in the 2001 season opener. In those 13 home games, Delaware has outscored opponents 487-158 for an average winning margin of 25.3 points per game.

**"CROSS" TRAINER:** For the second time in three years, Delaware junior defensive end **Ben Cross** has earned the title of "Best Conditioned Athlete" for the Blue Hen football team. Cross, who has also played fullback and linebacker during his career, earned the title based on his overall score in a battery of conditioning, strength, speed, and agility tests conducted by UD Strength & Conditioning coach Russ Barbarino during the summer. Cross, who despite his 5-10, 213 lb. size started The Citadel game at defensive end, earned 4,664 total points to edge senior defensive back **Mike Adams** (4,469) and junior linebacker and 2002 champion **Mondoe Davis** (4,272). **SMART BLUE HENS:** A total of Delaware football players are official candidates for Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American honors this season. To be eligible, student-athletes must carry a 3.2 or better grade point index, be a starter or key reserve, and have at least sophomore eligibility. The candidates are senior OG **Jason Nerys**, junior DL **Chris Mooney**, junior DE **Ben Cross**, sophomore WR **Joe Bleymaier**, and junior LB **Mark Moore**. Senior defensive lineman **Shawn Johnson**, a transfer from Duke, earned CoSIDA Academic All-American honors last year but is not eligible this season because he is enrolled as a graduate student at a new school. Mooney and Cross earned CoSIDA All-District honors last season while Nerys was an All-District selection in 2001.

**A NEW VOICE:** Yes, that is a different voice that fans are hearing this season at Delaware Stadium. Following 49 seasons at the microphone high atop Delaware Stadium, **Elbert Chance** retired following the 2002 season. Chance, a member of the University of Delaware Athletics Hall of Fame, has handed his public address duties over to **Kevin Linton**. Linton, a former UD sports information intern and currently a public relations assistant with the Wilmington Blue Rocks minor league baseball team, also serves as public address announcer for the UD men's and women's basketball teams.

**BLUE HENS' NFL NEWS:** Oakland Raiders QB **Rich Gannon**, New England Patriots practice squad WR **Jamin Elliott**, and Oakland Raiders practice squad RB **Keith Burnell** are Delaware's lone representatives in the National Football League this season. Gannon, now in his 17th season in the league, enjoyed the best season of his career in 2002 when he was named NFL Most Valuable Player in leading the Raiders to the AFC title and a berth in the Super Bowl. Elliott was a member of the Chicago Bears and appeared in two games in 2002 but was released prior to the start of the 2003 season. He was then signed to the New England Patriots practice squad and last week was promoted to the active roster. Burnell was released by the Green Bay Packers in pre-season camp and just signed with the Raiders this past week. Two other former UD stars failed in their bid to land with NFL teams as DE **Mike Cecere** (Redskins) and DT **Joe Minucci** (Jets) were released. Cecere played with Amsterdam in NFL Europe this past spring.

**NEWARK, DE --** AndyHall threw for a career-high 283 yards and three touchdowns and Germaine Bennett scampered for 109 yards and one touchdown as No. 14 ranked Delaware posted the season-opening victory.

Hall, who returned after off-season rotator cuff surgery, threw for touchdown passes of 23 yards to David Boler, 45 yards to tight end Rick Lavelle, and 16 yards to Justin Long, as the Blue Hens won on opening day for the 13th time in the last 14 seasons. Hall, a second-year transfer from Georgia Tech, posted his fourth career 200-yard effort and went over 2,000 yards for his brief career for the Hens. Sophomore Brian Ingram was Hall's favorite target, setting career highs with nine receptions for 113 yards.

Delaware (1-0) piled up 476 total yards and held The Citadel (1-1) to just 266 yards in posting its biggest opening day victory since a 49-7 win over Lehigh in 1996. The Hens also remained unbeaten in four games vs. The Citadel in Newark.

Delaware was penalized for an illegal block on the opening kickoff and Hall was intercepted on the first play from scrimmage by T.J. Rose who returned it 20 yards to the UD 20-yard line. But the Blue Hen defense set the tone for the rest of the night. Citadel lost one yard on three plays and Travis Zobel missed a 39-yard field goal.

The Hens came back two possessions later to open the scoring when Hall capped an 81-yard drive with a 23-yard scoring strike to Boler. The Hens made it 14-0 on their next possession when Bennett moved through the Citadel defense for a 31-yard scamper that was highlighted by a complete flip into the end zone. BradShushman helped UD up the lead to 17-0 with his first of two field goals, this one from 25 yards out, just 10 seconds before the break.

A 45-yard pass from Hall to Lavelle and a Shushman 28-yard field goal upped the Delaware lead to 27-0 before The Citadel, which opened the 2003 season last week with a 64-10 win over Charleston Southern, finally got on the board on the first play of the fourth quarter when Nehemiah Broughton scored from three yards out to cap an 87-yard drive.

But Delaware came back on Long's diving 16-yard touchdown pass with 12:37 left and backup QB Ryan Carty capped the scoring with a two-yard run with 2:10 remaining.

**NEWARK, DE --** Andy Hall threw for three touchdown passes for the second straight week, Germaine Bennett scored on three short touchdown runs, and Delaware scored off all four Richmond turnovers on the way to a 44-14 Atlantic 10 Conference win.

The 11th ranked Blue Hens (2-0, 1-0) piled up 25 first downs and 450 total yards on the way to the win in their conference opener. Richmond (0-1, 0-1), which lost three fumbles and was intercepted once, was playing in its 2003 season opener.

Delaware posted consecutive 40-point performances for the first time since the 2000 season and defeated Richmond for the eighth straight time at Delaware Stadium. The Hens also avenged a 15-13 setback to the Spiders last season in Virginia.

Hall, who threw for three touchdowns the week before vs. The Citadel, equalled the feat as he hit on 18 of 25 passes for 196 yards and three touchdowns before giving way to backup Ryan Carty early in the fourth quarter. Hall threw touchdown strikes of 38 yards to Justin Long, 11 yards to Brian Ingram, and three yards to Sean Bleiler.

Richmond senior QB Bryson Spinner, making his debut for the Spiders after transferring from Virginia two years ago, threw for 196 yards and one touchdown. Stacy Tutt caught seven passes for 101 yards but URgained just 108 yards on the ground.

Bennett, making his first career start in place of AntawnJenkins who was resting a sore ankle, carried 26 times for 121 yards and touchdown runs of three, two, and one yards. Bennett, who rushed for 109 yards vs. TheCitadel, became the first running back at Delaware with consecutive 100-yard games since Pat Williams in 1995.

The Hens scored their first four touchdowns off turnovers. Bennett scored his first touchdown with 4:10left in the first quarter following a botched punt return by the Spiders; Hall hit Long on a 38-yard scoring strike with 12:16 left in the first half for a 17-7 lead after Mark Moore sacked Spinner and Mondoe Davis recovered the fumble; Ingram caught his 11-yard scoring pass with 1:52 left before the half for a 24-14 lead following a Mike Adams 26-yard interception returnto the UR 15-yard line; and Bennett made it 31-14 when he scored from one-yard out just five plays after Richmond fumbled the second half kickoff and Delaware's Ben Cross made the recovery.

**NEWARK, DE** -- No. 8 Delaware scored twice in the first three minutes of the game and rolled out to a 42-0 halftime lead on the way to a 49-7 romp over West Chester.

The Blue Hens (3-0) pounded out 356 first half yards and never looked back in downing the Division II Rams (2-1) for the 10th straight time and for the 13th time in the last 14 meetings. Delaware is now off to a 3-0 start for the first time since 2000 and the 42-0 halftime lead was the team's second largest halftime winning margin in school history, second only to a 43-0 intermission lead over West Chester in an 84-0 win in 2000. The Hens have scored 40 or more points in their first three games for the first time since 1973.

Andy Hall, who entered the game as the highest rated passer in I-AA football, enjoyed another superb game as he hit on 9 of 13 passes for 176 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for 54 yards on four carries before sitting down for the entire second half.

Hall threw for three touchdowns for the third straight game, connecting with Joe Bleymaier for a 12-yard score just two minutes into the game and hitting Brian Ingram on scoring tosses of 71 yards late in the first quarter and five yards late in the second quarter.

The Hens struck early, driving 48 yards after the opening kickoff capped by Hall's scoring pass to Bleymaier. Just 76 seconds later, the score was 14-0 when Sidney Haugabrook intercepted a pass by Bob Findora and raced 39 yards for the touchdown.

Delaware extended the lead to 21-0 when wide receiver Justin Long took a reverse and fired a 64-yard scoring strike to G.J. Crescione who outran the defense for his first career touchdown. Hall followed three three minutes later with a 71-yard bomb to Ingram and the Hens took a 28-0 lead into the second stanza. A one-yard Germaine Bennett dive and Ingram's second touchdown pass gave the Hens the 42-0 lead at intermission.

West Chester, which has not won in this neighborhood series since 1992, scored its only touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter when Osagie Osunde capped an 18-play, 79-yard drive that consumed 9:04 with a two-yard run.

The Rams, who entered the game averaging 489.5 total yards, 296.5 yards rushing, and 42 points per game, were held to just 242 total yards and rushed 35 times for 55 yards. Mike Eckmeyer, who ran for 170 yards in last year's 31-10 loss to Delaware, was held to just 66 yards. Findora threw for 181 yards and was intercepted twice.

**HEMPSTEAD, NY** -- Delaware piled up 302 yards rushing, including a pair of touchdown runs by QB Andy Hall, as the No. 7 Blue Hens overcame three turnovers for the win.

Delaware's 4-0 start (2-0 in A-10) is its first since the 2000 season and just the fifth since 1986. Hofstra's 0-5 start is its worst since 1969.

Hall's second scoring run, an 85-yard scamper down the left side, came with 1:29 left in the third quarter and gave Delaware a comfortable 10-point lead. Hall rushed 14 times for a career-high 159 yards, the second highest total ever by a Delaware quarterback, and became just the fourth UD signal caller to reach 1,000 career rushing yards. The 85-yard run was the fifth longest in UD history and the most every by a Delaware quarterback.

Germaine Bennett also went over the 100-yard mark for the third time in four games, running for 124 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown scamper to open the scoring with 10:37 left in the first quarter. Bennett picked up 55 yards on that drive to lead the Hens.

Hofstra lost starting quarterback Anton Clarkson early in the game with a concussion, but Andrew English came in and was outstanding, hitting 22 of 37 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns, including a 75-yarder down the middle to running back Trevor Dimmie that put the Pride up 7-6 with 10:41 left in the first half. It marked the first time the Hens have trailed this season.

But the lead was short-lived. Delaware came back to score with just 1:11 left in the first half as the Hens marched 79 yards on nine plays capped by Hall's one-yard dive followed by Hall's run for the two-point conversion. Mike Adams and Sidney Haugabrook each blocked field goal attempts by Chris Onorato in the first half to keep the Hens ahead.

Delaware, which gained over 400 yards for the fifth straight game (433), took advantage of a wind-hindered punt for its first possession of the third quarter. Gaining the ball at the Hofstra 37 after a 22-yard punt into a stiff wind, the Hens marched inside the Pride 10 and went up 17-7 on a Brad Shushman 25-yard field goal.

Hofstra took advantage of a Delaware miscue to close the gap to 17-14 less than three minutes later. After another punt was knocked down by the wind, giving Delaware the ball at the Hofstra 49, Hall was intercepted by Prentice James, who returned the ball to the 42-yard line. Two plays later, English hit Marques Colston for a 35-yard scoring pass.

However, Hall's 85-yard burst gave Delaware a 10-point lead and the defense held on from there, holding back Hofstra twice after Haugabrook fumbled the ball away on punt returns. The Delaware defense recorded four sacks on the afternoon, including two by Brian Jennings, to hold the Pride to just 43 yards rushing on 23 attempts.

The Hens (6-0, 4-0 Atlantic 10) trailed 21-3 after the first quarter but slowly climbed back into the game. The win wasn't complete until New Hampshire's Connor McCormick was just inches wide right on a 34-yard field goal attempt with four seconds left to play.

Delaware won for the fifth straight time at Cowell Stadium. New Hampshire (2-5, 0-4), which led 21-3 after a Paul McKinney one-yard run with 2:10 left in the first quarter but would not score again, dropped its second straight game.

Blue Hen QB Andy Hall threw for 186 yards and one touchdown and rushed for another 95 yards, including a 38-yard scamper that set up Bennett's game-winner. Bennett finished with 96 yards on 25 carries while David Boler reached career-highs with eight receptions for 121 yards and a touchdown. Kicker Brad Shushman converted a school-record tying three field goals in a school-record five attempts.

New Hampshire got a gutsy performance from QB Mike Granieri, who completed 13 of 17 passes for 70 yards and rushed for 120 yards, including a 44-yard scoring scamper up the middle that gave UNH a 14-3 lead with 5:14 left in the opening stanza.

The Wildcats picked up 117 yards of offense in the opening quarter, not including a 98-yard kickoff return for a score by David Bailey, but could manage just 153 the rest of the way, finishing with just 282 yards and 16 first downs.

The Hens took advantage of two big UNH miscues to score. The Hens rallied from the 21-3 deficit, cutting the lead to 21-6 on a 37-yard field goal by Shushman with 1:20 left in the first half and scoring just 1:06 later when Hall hit Boler on a four-yard fade pattern in the end zone. The score was set up when Bennett blocked a Josh Polgar punt and Justin LaForgia advanced it to the UNH four-yard line.

Sidney Haugabrook's interception in the fourth quarter set up a 37-yard Shushman field goal that cut the lead to 21-16 and the Hens went up for good, driving 65 yards in seven plays capped by Bennett's winning dive.

UNH had one more chance to score, driving all the way to the Delaware 18-yard line, but McCormick's kick just sailed wide.

**NEWARK, DE** -- The Delaware defense forced six turnovers and held Rhode Island's triple-option attack to just 277 total yards on the way to the 55-10 Homecoming victory.

The No. 4 Blue Hens, who got four touchdown passes from QB AndyHall and 268 total yards on the ground, remained undefeated at 7-0 (5-0 Atlantic 10) and won for the 10th time in its last 11 home games. The Hens led 35-0 at halftime and were up 45-0 before the Rams finally got on the board with 1:49 left in the third quarter.

Rhode Island, which had a three-game win streak snapped in last week's last minute 21-17 loss to No. 3 ranked Villanova, lost three fumbles, threw three interceptions, two by Dave Camburn, and gave Delaware the ball at their own 19-yard line after a bad snap on a punt to set up another Blue Hen score. Rhode Island managed just 179 total yards rushing, well under their average of 353.3 yards per game that ranked No. 2 nationally in NCAA I-AAentering the game.

Delaware posted 11 tackles for loss, including three sacks, led by DE Shawn Johnson's three tackles for loss, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery. Junior linebacker Mark Moore posted a game-high 10 tackles, including 1.5 for loss.

Hall completed 16 of 22 passes for 153 yards and four touchdowns, the most touchdown passes by a Blue Hen since 1998, in just over a half of action. G.J. Crescione hauled in two touchdowns, a 19-yarder with 3:20 left in the first half that gave the Hens a 28-0 lead and a 57-yarder from Hall on the Hens' first drive of the second half. Hall also fired a two-yard touchdown pass to fullback Sean Bleiler and a five-yarder to David Boler just 19 seconds left before halftime.

Germaine Bennett led a Delaware ground game that piled up 268 yards with 91 of his own while Hall added another 71 yards and freshman Niqan Lee added 58, including a 37-yard scoring jaunt up the middle with 12:18 left for his first career touchdown.

Delaware reached a season-high for points, its fourth highest ever in an Atlantic 10 game, and its 463 yards was the second highest total this season. Delaware has now surpassed 400 total yards in eight straight games since last season. Rhode Island suffered its biggest loss vs. a I-AAopponent since a 51-0 setback toldaho State in 1981.

**ANNAPOLIS, MD** -- It was a monumental victory for Delaware, which fell behind 14-0 early and rallied for the upset over I-A Navy, spoiling Homecoming festivities for the Mids.

The No. 3 ranked Blue Hens (8-0), who downed their first I-A foe since a win over Navy in 1992, took advantage of three Navy turnovers and used scoring runs by Andy Hall, Antawn Jenkins, and Germaine Bennett to clinch the victory. The crowd of 34,982 was the second largest to ever view a Delaware football game.

Navy (5-3), looking for its first Bowl bid since 1996, had a three-game winning streak snapped and ended the game with quarterback Craig Candeto's pass being tipped away in the end zone by UD safety Dave Camburn.

The defense told the story for the Hens, who won despite season-low totals in points (21), first downs (15), and total yards (272), snapping a streak of eight straight games with over 400 yards of offense. But Delaware's defense recovered two fumbles, intercepted a pass, and held the Midshipmen, which entered the game as the top rushing attack in I-A with 321.9 yards per game, to just 180 yards on the ground.

Delaware went three plays and out on its first drive and Navy wasted no time with its chances. The Mids marched 63 yards and went up 7-0 on a one-yard dive by Tony Lane with 8:40 left in the opening quarter and went up 14-0 just 68 seconds later when Candeto hit Eric Roberts on a 66-yard scoring pass down the middle.

The Hens looked like they would be halted again, but Sean Bleiler's 24-yard run for a first down off a fake punt extended a drive that resulted in a one-yard dive by Jenkins on the first play of the second quarter. The 16-play, 80-yard drive cut the lead to 14-7.

Delaware then sent the game tied into halftime at 14-14 with two big defensive plays. John Mulhern intercepted a Candeto pass at the five-yard line to halt one drive and Shawn Johnson recovered a Candeto fumble at theNavy 27-yard line with 47 seconds left in the half. Delaware capitalized with a five-yard scoring dash by Hall 16 seconds before halftime.

Navy, which earlier in the season had posted a 28-25 win over No. 22 Air Force, turned the ball over again early in the third quarter when Mulhern recovered a fumble by Frank Divis at the Mids' 27-yard line, but the Hens couldn't capitalize as Hall was intercepted inside the five-yard line by Eddie Carthan.

But Navy could not capitalize either and the Hens followed with the eventual game-winner when Bennett, on a fourth-and-one, sprinted around the left side for a 28-yard scoring run, giving UD a 21-14 lead with 9:29 left in the third stanza.

Navy could muster only a 41-yard field goal by Eric Rolfs with 10:49 left the rest of the way. The Mids were halted on their last two possessions when the Hens broke up Candeto passes on fourth down plays.

**NEWARK, DE** -- Brad Shushman, who missed two field goals earlier in the day, redeemed himself with a 36-yarder in overtime to complete Delaware's 21-point comeback.

Shushman slid the game-winning kick just inside the right side of the crossbar to set off a wild celebration and finish a game that had several twists and turns in the final quarter. The No. 2 Blue Hens, who trailed 21-0 until the final seconds of the third quarter, remained perfect on the season at 9-0 (6-0 A-10) for the team's best start since 1995.

The win marked the second biggest comeback win from a halftime deficit in school history, second only to the famous 51-45 "shootout" win over Youngstown State in 1979 when the Hens trailed 31-7 at halftime.

Maine (5-4, 4-3 A-10), which advanced to the NCAA I-AA playoffs each of the last two seasons and had won three of its last four games, was most likely knocked out of playoff contention. All four of the Black Bear losses have been by 10 points or less.

Maine dominated the first three quarters of the contest, jumping out to a 21-0 halftime lead. Atlantic 10 rushing leader Marcus Williams, who finished with 111 yards on the ground for his fifth 100-yard game of the season, scored on one-yard dives with 11:09 left in the opening quarter and with 6:46 left before halftime. Redshirt freshman Ron Whitcomb, who hit on 21 of 34 passes for 246 yards, hit Christian Pereira on an 11-yard scoring pass with 2:17 left in the first quarter.

Delaware finally showed some life in the second half and got on the board on a two-yard dive into the end zone by Andy Hall with just 12 seconds left in the third stanza. The score was set up on a fumble recovery by UD safety Dave Camburn at the Maine 10-yard line. The Hens came right back again just under two minutes later when Sidney Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to pull Delaware back to within 21-14 with 13:21. The return was the third longest in school history.

The rest of the quarter was filled with missed opportunities. Maine's Mike Mellow missed a 36-yard field goal with 9:23 left and Hall was intercepted by Mike DeVito inside the Maine 20-yard line with 7:10 left. Maine appeared to have clinched the win minutes later when Joan Quezada returned an interception 97 yards for a score, but the play was negated due to a roughing the passer penalty on the play. The Hens continued the drive, but were thwarted when Germaine Bennett (96 yards rushing) fumbled at the UM one-yard line and Clinton Brown recovered with 3:35 left.

Maine got the ball back but was forced to punt from its own end zone. Haugabrook returned the punt to the Maine 39-yard line and on the first play from scrimmage, Hall fired a 39-yard scoring strike to David Boler down the right sideline and Shushman hit the extra point for the 21-21 tie with 1:34 remaining.

The Black Bears went first in the extra session but Mellow's 35-yard attempt was blocked by DT Chris Mooney, his second block of the game. Delaware took over and drove the ball to the 19-yard line, setting up Shushman's heroics.

**BROOKLINE, MA** -- No. 2 ranked Delaware saw its dreams of an undefeated season come to an end as Northeastern, fighting for a post-season playoff berth itself, got two second half touchdown passes from Shawn Brady to Cory Parks and took advantage of the penalty-plagued Blue Hens for the Atlantic 10 win.

Miro Kesic's 23-yard field goal with 2:56 remaining was the final nail in Delaware's coffin. The Blue Hens, who were trying to start out 10-0 for the first time in 31 years, were also hampered by a pair of turnovers and converted just 6 of 16 third downs.

Northeastern took a 7-0 lead late in the first half after a 19-yard punt by Delaware's Mike Weber into a stiff wind. Tim Gale, who finished with 119 yards rushing on 21 carries, capped a five-play, 30-yard drive when he dove across from the one-yard line with 2:39 left in the half. It was the first points Delaware had allowed in more than 65 minutes of action.

The Blue Hens had a chance to score just before halftime on the ensuing possession, but Brad Shushman's 25-yard field goal attempt with 37 seconds left in the half sailed wide.

Delaware (9-1, 6-1 Atlantic 10) tied the score on its first possession of the second half. Quarterback Andy Hall found Joe Bleymaier for a 37-yard touchdown pass across the middle to cap an eight-play, 74-yard drive.

However, Northeastern (6-4, 4-3) responded on the ensuing possession to regain the lead. A nine-play, 70-yard drive that was capped off by Brady's four-yard pass to Parks to give the Huskies a 14-7 lead. Brady finished the day connecting on 13 of 27 passes for 198 yards and two touchdowns. The drive was helped by four penalties on the Delaware defense, including three for offsides and one personal foul.

Delaware fought back to tie the score 14-14 early in the fourth quarter. On third-and-two from the Northeastern 10, Germaine Bennett broke through the line and scampered in for a 10-yard touchdown run. Bennett carried the final six plays of the drive.

But Northeastern, which had lost four of its last five games following a 4-0 start, answered the bell again, scoring on its next two possessions to put the game out of reach. The Huskies drove 81 yards in 10 plays, culminating in a 14-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Parks, who made a great diving catch in the back of the end zone.

After Delaware failed to get a first down on its next possession, the Huskies drove the field again. Gale keyed the 64-yard drive with runs of 15 and 28 yards on consecutive plays to move the ball down to the Delaware five. The drive stalled there, but Kesic's 23-yard field goal gave Northeastern a comfortable 10-point lead with 2:39 to play.

Delaware drove back down the field as time ticked away and got as close as the one-yard line but a fourth down pass from Hall sailed out of the end zone.

NEWARK, DE -- AndyHall hit a falling Justin Long on a four-yard touchdown pass in triple overtime and Delaware's defense then stopped Massachusetts on downs as the Blue Hens survived in a classic battle of Atlantic 10 leaders.

In the longest game in Delaware history, the No. 6 Hens (10-1, 7-1) moved into a tie for the league lead and moved one step closer to the league title. No. 3 Massachusetts (9-2, 7-1) had an eight-game win streak snapped. The Minutemen could have captured the league title and automatic NCAA Tournament berth with the victory.

Hall completed a school record 28 passes for 261 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed for a score to lead Delaware. Massachusetts QB Jeff Krohn hit on 25 of 48 passes for 354 yards and five touchdowns. However, UMass was hurt by five turnovers, including two interceptions and a fumble by Krohn. The two teams combined for 950 yards but also had seven turnovers between them.

Hall threw two touchdown passes each to Long and David Boler (10 catches for 109 yards) while RB Germaine Bennett rushed for 85 yards and went over 1,000 yards for the season, becoming the first UD back to reach the mark since 1994. Krohn threw three touchdown passes to Jason Peebler, who caught six passes for 132 yards, including a 25-yard scoring pass from Krohn to send the game into the final overtime session. UMass RB Steve Baylark rushed for 126 yards and a touchdown and reached the 1,000-yard mark.

After Delaware took a 17-14 halftime lead into intermission, the second half was a see-saw battle the entire way. Krohn hit Johnson Owumi on a six-yard scoring pass with 2:26 left in regulation to send the game into overtime tied 31-31. Delaware had gone up 31-24 just four minutes earlier when Jamie Rotonda recovered a fumbled punt return by Dominique Stewart at the two-yard line and theHens followed with a three-yard scoring toss from Hall to Long.
