**GAME PREVIEW**

As we reach the mid-point of the 2004 season, the No. 3 ranked University of Delaware Blue Hens take to the road for just the second time to take on a high-powered Hofstra University offense this week in Hempstead, NY. The Blue Hens (5-1, 3-0 Atlantic 10), one of just three teams that remain unbeaten in the Atlantic 10 Conference, are coming off a bye week but put their four-game win streak on the line following a thrilling 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2 at Delaware Stadium. Hofstra (3-2, 1-1 A-10) has won two of its last three games and is coming off its second 60-point output of the season in a 61-21 road win at Stony Brook Saturday. The Pride, who lead the Atlantic 10 in scoring (42.4), passing offense (35.2), and total offense (450.0), have scored at least 21 points in every game this season and put up a season-high 62 points in a 62-43 league win over Rhode Island Sept. 25. Delaware counters with one of the league's top defenses, currently ranking second in the Atlantic 10 and among the top 20 nationally in scoring defense (18.4) and total defense (267.40).



**THE SERIES**

Delaware and Hofstra meet for just the 14th time this week but the rivalry has become a fierce one. The Blue Hens hold a 9-4-1 advantage and are 6-1-1 in the last eight meetings vs. the Pride, including a hard-fought 24-14 win here in Hempstead, NY early last season. Hofstra's last victory in the series was a 39-14 win in 2001 at Delaware Stadium. *(more series details on page 2)*

## LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE:

The No. 4 ranked Blue Hens enjoyed a rare bye week last Saturday but are coming off a 43-38 Atlantic 10 win over then No. 8 Maine in their last outing Oct. 2 at Delaware Stadium. The Blue Hens put forth an offensive explosion led by record-setting performances by QB **Sonny Riccio** and WR **Justin Long**, but needed a touchdown in the final minute to clinch the win. The Hens jumped out to a quick 20-0 lead but Maine rallied to cut the lead to 30-21 at halftime and took its first lead of the game at 38-37 on a 21-yard field goal by Mike Mellow with 7:12 left. But the Hens came back to win as **Niquan Lee's** school-record tying fourth touchdown on a one-yard touchdown run capped a 10-play, 47-yard drive with 45 seconds left to play. Lee scored all four of his touchdowns on one-yard dives. The Hens then knocked down Ron Whitcomb's pass in the end zone on the final play. Riccio connected on 33 of 51 passes (both school records) for 415 yards and a touchdown and Long caught a school-record 16 passes for 236 yards and one score for the Blue Hens, who piled up 560 total yards.

## LAST WEEK FOR HOFSTRA:

Hofstra (3-2, 1-1 Atlantic 10) moved out of conference play and travelled a short distance to down Stony Brook 61-21 Saturday afternoon on Long Island. Running back Terry Crenshaw rushed for 135 yards and four touchdowns and scored a fifth on a pass receptions to lead the Pride to their second win in the last three games. Hofstra piled up 399 yards of total offense as backup quarterback Anton Clarkson hit on 20 of 22 passes for 225 yards and three touchdowns. Hofstra's defense held Stony Brook to just 275 total yards, including just 67 on the ground.

### LAST MEETING

Delaware 24, Hofstra 14

September 27, 2003 - Shuart Stadium (3,228)

**HEMPSTEAD, NY** -- Delaware piled up 302 yards rushing, including a pair of touchdown runs by QB Andy Hall, as the No. 7 Blue Hens overcame three turnovers for the win.

Delaware's 4-0 start (2-0 in A-10) is its first since the 2000 season and just the fifth since 1986. Hofstra's 0-5 start is its worst since 1969.

Hall's second scoring run, an 85-yard scamper down the left side, came with 1:29 left in the third quarter and gave Delaware a comfortable 10-point lead. Hall rushed 14 times for a career-high 159 yards, the second highest total ever by a Delaware quarterback, and became just the fourth UD signal caller to reach 1,000 career rushing yards. The 85-yard run was the fifth longest in UD history and the most every by a Delaware quarterback.

Germaine Bennett also went over the 100-yard mark for the third time in four games, running for 124 yards, including a 27-yard touchdown scamper to open the scoring with 10:37 left in the first quarter. Bennett picked up 55 yards on that drive to lead the Hens.

Hofstra lost starting quarterback Anton Clarkson early in the game with a concussion, but Andrew English came in and was outstanding, hitting 22 of 37 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns, including a 75-yarder down the middle to running back Trevor

## DELAWARE NOTES OF INTEREST

**BLUE HENS LOOK TO COME BACK STRONG AFTER BYE WEEK:** The University of Delaware football team, which played games 16 straight weeks a year ago on the way to winning the NCAA I-AA national title, enjoyed a rare bye last weekend after seeing action each of the first five weeks of the 2004 campaign. The Hens will hope to return rejuvenated from the off-week as they start the second half of the season. Prior to the 2000 season, Delaware returned from a Saturday off with a great deal of apprehension. After all, the Blue Hens had lost their next game following an off-week four straight times since 1991. But the Hens rebounded by winning three straight games coming off bye weeks, including a 33-14 win over James Madison in 2000, a 35-7 victory over Massachusetts Sept. 22, 2001 (Sept. 15 game vs. West Chester cancelled due to Sept. 11 tragedies), and a 28-3 win over James Madison on Nov. 3, 2001. That streak ended in 2002 when the Blue Hens dropped their season finale to Villanova 38-34 following a bye week.

**DELAWARE WORKING ON FOUR-GAME WINNING STREAK:** After losing their season opener Sept. 2 to New Hampshire, the Hens have put together a four-game winning streak and enter this week's game vs. Hofstra with a 4-1 overall mark and tied for first place in the Atlantic 10 South Division standings with a 3-0 record (James Madison is also 3-0 and William & Mary is 2-0). This week the Hens will be trying to start the season 5-1 or better for the second straight year (6-0 last year on the way to a 9-0 start) and for the eighth time in the last 14 seasons since 1991. The Hens also started out 6-0 in 1995 and 2000 and started 5-1 in 1991, 1992, 1993, 1996, and 1997, advancing to post-season play each of those seasons. The Hens will also be looking to open Atlantic 10 play at 4-0 for the second straight year (6-0 last year) but for just the fifth time since joining the Atlantic 10 (Yankee Conference) in 1986. Delaware started out 4-0 in 1992, 1995, 2000, and 2003 and advanced to post-season each of those seasons.

**CONTINUING ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS:** This fall the Blue Hens will look to capture consecutive league titles for the first time since sharing the league title with Villanova and New Hampshire in 1991 and winning the title outright in 1992. Delaware is looking to become the first Atlantic 10 team to share a piece of the league title in consecutive years since New Hampshire accomplished the feat in 1996-97. Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th Atlantic 10 victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Hens are now 104-44 (.703) all-time since joining the league in 1986. Delaware is also 12-7 all-time in Atlantic 10 openers, including this year's 21-17 win over Towson Sept. 11.

**HITTING THE ROAD:** This week the Blue Hens hit the road for just the second time this season as they head to Hempstead, NY for an Atlantic 10 Conference meeting with Hofstra. The Hens are just 7-6 on the road in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler but are coming off a 28-7 win at Massachusetts in their first venture away from Delaware back on Sept. 25. The Hens have won three straight road games dating back to last season, including the NCAA I-AA title game win over Colgate in Chattanooga, TN, and are 7-1 in their last eight road games since a 17-7 loss at UMass Nov. 2, 2002.

**STELLAR "D":** Despite allowing season-highs of 38 points and 397 total yards in the 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2, the Blue Hen defense still remains one of the top units not only in the Atlantic 10 but in all of NCAA I-AA football. Delaware will need to be up to the task this week as the Hens take on a Hofstra offense that leads the Atlantic 10 in scoring offense (42.4), passing offense (355.2), and total offense (450.0), ranking in the top seven nationally in all three categories. Delaware's defense presently ranks second in the Atlantic 10 in scoring defense (18.4 - 20th in NCAA), total defense (267.4 - 7th in NCAA), and passing defense (164.4 - 24th in NCAA) and ranks third in rushing defense (103.0 - 18th in NCAA). In addition, the Hens rank fourth in the Atlantic 10 and 40th nationally in passing efficiency defense (109.5). In consecutive wins over West Chester (24-6 on Sept. 18) and Massachusetts (28-7 on Sept. 25), the Hens allowed just 13 points and 448 total yards combined. Prior to West Chester, the Hens held Towson to just nine first downs and 152 total yards in a 21-17 win Sept. 11, the lowest total allowed by the Blue Hens since The Citadel managed just 92 yards in a 38-0 win back on Sept. 9, 2000.

Dimmie that put the Pride up 7-6 with 10:41 left in the first half. It marked the first time the Hens have trailed this season.

But the lead was short-lived. Delaware came back to score with just 1:11 left in the first half as the Hens marched 79 yards on nine plays capped by Hall's one-yard dive followed by Hall's run for the two-point conversion. Mike Adams and Sidney Haugabrook each blocked field goal attempts by Chris Onorato in the first half to keep the Hens ahead.

Delaware, which gained over 400 yards for the fifth straight game (433), took advantage of a wind-hindered punt for its first possession of the third quarter. Gaining the ball at the Hofstra 37 after a 22-yard punt into a stiff wind, the Hens marched inside the Pride 10 and went up 17-7 on a Brad Shushman 25-yard field goal.

Hofstra took advantage of a Delaware miscue to close the gap to 17-14 less than three minutes later. After another punt was knocked down by the wind, giving Delaware the ball at the Hofstra 49, Hall was intercepted by Prentice James, who returned the ball to the 42-yard line. Two plays later, English hit Marques Colston for a 35-yard scoring pass.

However, Hall's 85-yard burst gave Delaware a 10-point lead and the defense held on from there, holding back Hofstra twice after Haugabrook fumbled the ball away on punt returns. The Delaware defense recorded four sacks on the afternoon, including two by Brian Jennings, to hold the Pride to just 43 yards rushing on 23 attempts.

**FALLEN LEADER:** The Blue Hens suffered a big blow in the 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2 when senior co-captain and leading rusher **Sean Bleiler** went down with torn knee ligaments on a run up the middle in the first quarter. Bleiler, who had never missed a game in his career for the Hens, playing in 43 straight, was the Hens' leading rusher with 333 yards and two touchdowns on 66 carries and had caught five passes for 37 yards. He also has been among the team's top special teams players. Bleiler will not play this week and most likely will miss the remainder of the season. Bleiler's injury will mean more playing time for redshirt freshman **Lonnie Starks**, who has rushed for 300 yards on 57 carries, sophomore **Niquan Lee**, who tied a school record with four touchdowns in the win over Maine, and freshman **Omar Cuff** (C.H. Flowers/Landover, MD) a converted defensive back who has shown great promise in drills this fall.

**RECAPPING THE RECORDS:** Several University of Delaware records fell by the wayside in the Hens' last outing, a 43-38 Atlantic 10 win over No. 8 Maine Oct. 2 at Delaware Stadium. Below is a recap of what was broken during that game.

#### QB Sonny Riccio

- 13 consecutive completions thrown in the first half broke the mark of 12 set by Bill Vergantino (vs. Navy in 1991, vs. Towson and Samford in 1992) and by Matt Nagy (vs. West Chester and New Hampshire in 1998)
- 33 completions broke record of 28 set by Andy Hall last season vs. Massachusetts
- 51 pass attempts broke record of 45 by B.J. Webster vs. Bucknell in 1983
- 415 yards passing was third highest in school history and the most since Matt Nagy threw for 456 vs. Villanova in 2000
- 62 total plays was the second highest single game mark in UD history (64 by Bill Vergantino vs. New Hampshire in 1989)
- 450 total offensive yards was the second highest single game mark in UD history (537 by Matt Nagy vs. Connecticut in 1998)

#### WR Justin Long

- 16 receptions broke record of 15 set by Eddie Conti vs. Connecticut in 1998
- 236 yards receiving was the second highest in school history, trailing only 354 by Eddie Conti vs. Connecticut in 1998

#### RB Niquan Lee

- Four rushing touchdowns tied record accomplished eight other times - most recently by Daryl Brown vs. Northeastern in 1984

**POLL TALK:** Delaware, the No. 1 pick in the pre-season polls released by both The Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN, moved up to No. 3 in both polls this week following the Oct. 2 win over Maine and the bye week. Delaware has now appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 poll for 22 straight weeks since the 2003 season and have appeared in the top 10 for 19 straight weeks.

**SCORING STREAK STANDS AT 103 FOR HENS:** After being held without a point in the first quarter in the first four games of the season (the longest first quarter scoreless streak since 1974-75), the Hens broke out in a big way vs. Maine Oct. 2, scoring 13 points in the first quarter and 30 for the first half on the way to the 43-38 victory. The Hens are now averaging 26.0 points and 381.8 total yards per game and have extended their scoring streak to 103 straight game since a 27-0 loss to Villanova in 1996. In addition, the Hens have scored 10 or more points in 23 straight games and in 117 of their last 126 games (92.8 percent) since 1994. The Blue Hens have not suffered a shutout in a span of 140 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 44 games since that 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996. The last time Delaware was held under 10 points was Nov. 2, 2002 when the Hens fell to Massachusetts 17-7 at McGuirk Stadium while the last time they were held in single digits at home was in a 10-7 season-opening loss to Rhode Island Aug. 30, 2001 - a span of 24 games.

**DELAWARE STADIUM SUCCESS:** Delaware was the only school in all of college football in 2003 to play 10 home games – and the Blue Hens posted a perfect 10-0 record at Tubby Raymond Field at Delaware Stadium. The Hens outscored opponents 414-154 for an average win margin of 26.0 points per game. Delaware had won 10 straight games at Delaware Stadium before the 24-21 loss to New Hampshire in the season opener Sept. 2, but after successive home wins over Towson and West Chester, the Hens have now won 19 of their last 21 games in Newark and have won seven straight conference games at home (New Hampshire this year was a non-league game). The Hens have posted an all-time record of 247-74-4 (.768) in 325 games over 51 seasons since 1952 at Delaware Stadium. That mark includes an all-time NCAA playoff home record of 15-5, including a 3-0 mark in 2003 when the Hens defeated Southern Illinois, Northern Iowa, and Wofford to advance to the I-AA championship. Tubby Raymond Field is named in honor of Delaware's long-time head coach who served as the Blue Hen mentor for 36 seasons, notching 300 wins and leading the Blue Hens to three national titles. Raymond, who continues to attend UD games and works as a color analyst for WDEL Radio, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August, 2003.

**ABUNDANT ATTENDANCE:** The Blue Hens are the only school in NCAA I-AA to average over 20,000 fans per game during the regular season each of the past five seasons and there's a good chance that streak will be continuing in 2004. Delaware sold a school-record 10,500 season ticket packages during the pre-season and currently ranks third nationally in NCAA I-AA in home attendance with a mark of 22,394 - trailing only Tennessee State (25,117 in one game) and Montana (23,283 in four games). Delaware Stadium drew its fourth straight sellout crowd vs. Maine for Homecoming Oct. 2 as 22,030 fans passed through the turnstiles and now, for the first time in school history, the Hens have drawn over 22,000 fans for four straight home games. Delaware drew 22,782 fans for the Towson game, the ninth largest crowd in UD history, and 22,727 for the New Hampshire game, the 10th largest all-time. The Maine game marked the 18th straight game that Delaware has drawn over 19,000 fans.

**SENSATIONAL SIDNEY:** University of Delaware senior cornerback and co-captain **SidneyHaugabrook**, a three-time All-Atlantic 10 selection and the 2001 Atlantic 10 and ECAC Rookie of the Year, earned his share of pre-season notice this summer. Haugabrook was a popular guy, being named to virtually every pre-season All-American team. He was named pre-season All-American by *Athlon Magazine*, *Street & Smith's Magazine*, *Lindy's Magazine*, and the The Sports Network. Locally, he was named pre-season first team All-Atlantic 10 at defensive back and second team at kick returner by the league head coaches. In addition, Haugabrook was rated the top cornerback in NCAA I-AA by The Sports Network. In late August, he was recognized as one of official candidates for the Buck Buchanan Award - which recognized the top defensive player in I-AA each season - and remained on the list when the first updated in-season list was announced last week. Haugabrook was one of just four defensive backs on the "watch" list (Antoine Bethea of Howard, Tad Kornegay of Fordham, and Mario Williams of Gardner-Webb are the others) and one of two Atlantic 10 players, joining Northeastern LBLiam Ezekiel. Haugabrook has enjoyed a solid start in 2004 and will start his 44th straight game this week vs. Hofstra. In the 21-17 win over Towson Sept. 11, for which he was named the Atlantic 10 Special Teams Player of the Week, Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to tie the score at 7-7 midway through the third quarter, returned two kickoffs for 54 yards, and posted four tackles. For the season, he has collected 23 tackles, intercepted two passes (ninth in Atlantic 10), and averaged 17.0 yards on punt returns (No. 1 in Atlantic 10, seventh in NCAA I-AA) and 22.7 on kickoff returns (sixth in Atlantic 10, 48th in NCAA). His career totals include 259 tackles (No. 1 all-time at Delaware among cornerbacks, No. 16 among all players), 12 interceptions (10th at Delaware, second among active players in I-AA), and 21 pass breakups (10th).

**GOOD TO LEAD AT HALFTIME:** When Delaware took a 30-21 lead into halftime and moved on to the 43-38 victory Oct. 2 vs. Maine, it marked the 14th straight game that the Blue Hens have won the game when leading at intermission. The Blue Hens have posted an impressive record of 30-3 (.909) this decade when leading at the half and over the last 101 games since 1990, when the Hens have taken a lead into intermission, Delaware is 93-8 (.921). Delaware hasn't lost a game when leading at halftime since Oct. 19, 2002 when the Hens let a 14-7 halftime lead slip away in a 17-14 overtime setback to Rhode Island in Kingston, RI.

**ENTERING ON A ROLL:** The Blue Hens opened the 2004 season riding a six-game winning streak since a 24-14 setback at Northeastern last Nov. 8 but fell to New Hampshire in the opener. Since then the Hens have continued their winning and have now won 25 of their last 33 games under **K.C. Keeler** and 27 of their last 36 games overall since 2001. The Hens are 41-16 (.719) this decade, including a mark of 26-12 (.684) in conference play.

**WELL-GROUNDED:** With such outstanding balance in the backfield for the Hens this season, it might be tough getting one player over 100 yards rushing in a single game this season. But **Sean Bleiler** did just that in the 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25, rushing 22 times for a career-high 110 yards and a touchdown. The 100-yard effort almost guarantees Delaware of a victory. Delaware has won eight straight games when having a runner rush for over 100 yards in a game (since a Nov. 16 loss at Villanova) and has won 31 of its last 32 games since 1994 when that happens.

**QUITE A PASS-CATCHING TRIO:** The Blue Hens return a talented corps at wide receiver in 2004, which has helped as Delaware breaks in new starting quarterback and Missouri transfer **Sonny Riccio**, who took over after the graduation of All-American **Andy Hall**. The explosive trio of **Boler**, **Long**, and **Ingram** each caught 48 or more passes last season with Boler leading the way with 60 catches for 716 yards and nine touchdowns. The trio combined to catch 158 passes for 1,890 yards and 17 touchdowns during the season. All three also went over the 1,000 career yard receiving mark, making it the first time that Delaware has had three 1,000-yard receivers on the same team in school history. Boler, who missed two games this season with a hamstring injury before returning vs. UMass, has caught at least one pass in 24 straight games entering the Hofstra game and has recorded career totals of 99 receptions (eighth all-time at UD) for 1,362 yards (11th). He needs one catch to become just the seventh player in UD history to reach the milestone. Long, who has caught at least one pass in 15 straight games, is coming off a career game in which he caught a school-record 16 passes for 236 yards, the second highest yardage total in school history. He has now caught 123 career passes (No. 4) for 1,517 yards (seventh) while Ingram has pulled in 94 receptions (10th) for 1,136 yards (16th). The three have combined for 29 career touchdowns. **WR Brian Ingram**....needs 6 receptions to become seventh player in UD history with 100 career catches.

**MAKING HISTORY IN THE TRENCHES:** Delaware freshman **Mike Byrne**, an offensive lineman from Littitz, PA (Manheim Central HS), made history Sept. 18 in the Hens' 21-17 victory over Towson. When starting offensive tackle **Paul Thomson** left the game in the first quarter with an elbow injury, Byrne entered the game, becoming the first true freshman offensive lineman to appear in a game since **Steve Butcher** in 1952. Byrne played the rest of the half before Thomson returned to the lineup in the second half and started again vs. West Chester last week. Byrne earned first team *Associated Press* All-State honors last fall at Manheim Central High School, leading the squad (along with current UD freshman quarterback **Jarryd Moyer**) to the state AAA title. Another Blue Hen freshman has also made history. Redshirt freshman **Rich Beverley**, who started the first two games before being limited with a broken hand, was the first redshirt freshman to start a game at Delaware since **Brian Cook** in 1995 and is believed to be the first redshirt freshman ever to be a regular starter. Sophomore **Scott Conley** is expected to start at guard for the fourth straight week for Beverley, but the freshman will continue to see action.

**HAVEN'T LOST BY MUCH:** Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** squads have posted a record of 25-8 in his three seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 25 victories is a formidable 10.4 points per game. His average losing margin is a paltry 4.9 points per game with only two setbacks over five points and none over 10 during his Blue Hen career.

**WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE:** The University of Delaware ranked among the national leaders in 2003 in turnover margin with a mark of +19. Over the last 10 seasons, Delaware is 79-14 (.849) when having less or equal amount of turnovers than its opponents and is 54-7 (.885) with 15 straight wins when having less turnovers than its opponent. That streak continued in the win over UMass Saturday as the Hens turned the ball over just once while taking advantage of two Minuteman mishaps.

**TIGHT ENDS GETTING INVOLVED IN PASSING GAME:** Junior tight end **Justin LaForgia**, a second-year transfer from the University of Cincinnati, is among the Blue Hen receiving leaders with 13 catches for 78 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high five catches for 29 yards vs. UMass Sept. 25, following up a four-reception performance the week before vs. West Chester when he scored his first career touchdown. While it's not unusual for a tight end to catch passes, it has been at Delaware. A tight end has not led Delaware in receiving for an entire season since **Mark Steimer** had 22 catches for 369 yards in 1981. When last year's starting tight end **Rick Lavelle** caught 17 passes for 197 yards, it was the most receptions by a UD tight end since **Rob Higbee** had 20 catches for 306 yards in 1994.

**DELAWARE JOINS THE 600-WIN CLUB:** The Delaware football program reached a significant milestone with the 24-6 win over West Chester Sept. 18 and accomplished what just seven other schools in I-AA have managed. The Blue Hens now own an all-time overall record of 602-381-44 over 113 seasons, moving them into the 600-win club. Only seven other current NCAA I-AA programs have reached 600 wins all-time - Yale (824), Pennsylvania (771), Harvard (761), Princeton (754), Fordham (718), Dartmouth (635), and Lafayette (609). Other schools that could reach the 600-win mark this season are Lehigh (596) and Cornell (593).

**A SEASON TO REMEMBER:** The University of Delaware is coming off the finest season in school history as the Blue Hens won their sixth national title in school history, their first ever in NCAA I-AA, and their first since winning the 1979 NCAA II title in 2003. The Hens set a school record with 15 wins in a 15-1 season and were named Lambert Cup Eastern champions for the 18th time and the ECAC Team of the Year for the 10th time. Delaware was also named State Team of the Year by the Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and Local Team of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters. The Hens captured their 14th conference title all-time, including their seventh as a member of the Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 Conference. This season, Delaware and head coach **K.C. Keeler** will be looking to become the first team to repeat as NCAA I-AA national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000.

**THE SEASON AHEAD:** The Blue Hens, who welcomed back 15 starters and 40 letterwinners from last year's national championship team, were the overwhelming No. 1 pre-season pick in both The Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN polls selected from I-AA head coaches, sports information directors, and media members. This year marks the first time that Delaware (or any team from the Atlantic 10) was the pre-season No. 1 pick but the Hens appeared in the pre-season poll for the 13th straight season. Delaware received 57 of the 71 first place picks in The Sports Network poll and 26 of the 35 first place votes in the USA Today/ESPN poll. In addition, the Blue Hens were the No. 1 pre-season pick by Street & Smith's Magazine and Lindy's Magazine and picked No. 3 in Athlon Magazine. Ironically, Delaware was not picked to finish first in its own Atlantic 10 Conference based on a poll conducted by league coaches and media members. Delaware was picked No. 2 behind Villanova in the Atlantic 10 South Division and ahead of William & Mary, James Madison, Richmond, and league newcomer Towson. In the North Division, Maine was the pre-season No. 1 pick followed by Northeastern, defending league co-champion Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Hofstra.

**NEW UNIFORMS:** The Blue Hens are sporting new Nike uniforms and helmets with new colors this fall. Delaware will go back to its official school color of royal blue for its uniforms and its distinctive helmet. The helmet, which will not change design, had previously consisted of gold and navy or dark blue for its colors. The helmet will now be a royal metallic blue which better matches the royal blue colors in Delaware's new uniforms.

**THESE HENS HAVE BRAINS.....:** Not only have the Blue Hens got the job done on the field, they are seeing outstanding results in the classroom. No less than seven Delaware players are potential Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American candidates. To be eligible for the award, student-athletes must have at least sophomore standing, be a starter or key reserve, and hold a 3.2 or better grade point index. Leading the way is senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** who holds a 3.9 grade point index as a civil engineering major. Cross, who is also a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award candidate, earned the inaugural Atlantic 10 Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award last season when he also was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American second team. senior linebacker **Mark Moore**, and defensive lineman **Tom Parks**. Cross, Bleymaier, and Mooney were also named to the CoSIDA District 2 team a year ago. The Hens would have had an eighth candidate but senior pre-season All-Atlantic 10 offensive guard **Jared Wray** suffered a career-ending back injury in pre-season and will not play this fall. Four current UD players are currently enrolled in graduate school - Davis, **Sean Bleiler**, **Garron Bible**, and **Dominic Santoli**.

.....**AND BRAWN:** According to University of Delaware strength and conditioning coach **Russell Barbarino**, the current Blue Hen roster is stronger and more fit than any other in school history. Broken records in spring and summer testing - including strength, speed, and agility drills - have become commonplace. Each summer Barbarino conducts a Best Conditioned Athlete contest with the overall winner having the most points from a battery of tests. And this year, for the second time in three seasons, senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** was named the winner. Cross earned first place with 3,239 points followed by LB **Mondoe Davis** (3,082), and RB **Sean Bleiler** (2,961). Individual position leaders were Cross (defensive line), Davis (big skill), Bleiler (offensive sk), **SidneyHaugabrook** (defensive backs), and **Mark Ciavarella** (offensive line). Individual event leaders were Ciavarella (bench press - 455 lbs.), Davis (squat lift - 675 lbs.), LB **Ryan McDermond** (agility - 3.97); DL **Bubba Jespersen** (225 lb. lift - 27 times); Cross (vertical jump - 40 inches; power clean lift - 355 lbs.), and DB **Jeff Robinson** (broad jump - 11-2).

**IN THE PROS:** The National Football League career of former University of Delaware standout quarterback **Rich Gannon** has been well-documented. The former All-American still rates among the top signal callers in the NFL and he was the league Most Valuable Player in 2002 when he led the Oakland Raiders to a berth in the Super Bowl. But Gannon isn't the only former Blue Hen chasing professional glory. He is one of four former Delaware players currently on NFL rosters. Quarterback **Andy Hall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson**, both 2003 All-Americans who led Delaware to the NCAA I-AA title last fall, are on the practice squads of the Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans respectively. Johnson was picked up after being released by Oakland in the pre-season. Also on an NFL practice squad this fall is 2003 co-captain, DB **Mike Adams** (San Francisco 49ers). Adams' co-captain last season, OG **Jason Nerys** (New York Jets), had been a member of the New York Jets practice squad for three weeks before being released last week. In addition to those five, former Delaware wide receiver **Jamin Elliott** was released by the Chicago Bears and 2002 leading rusher **Keith Burnell** were released by the New York Jets, both in pre-season.

**TRACK STARS TOO!** The fifth place finishing 4 x 100 meter relay team at the 2004 Colonial Athletic Association Outdoor Track and Field meet held in Richmond last April had a distinctive Blue Hen football flavor. The foursome of Blue Hen junior defensive back **Roger Brown**, senior defensive back **Sidney Haugabrook**, sophomore defensive back **Rashaad Woodard**, and **Charlie Williams**, who does not play football, placed fifth overall with a time of 42.49. All four are expected to return this spring to help improve upon that time and finish.

# 2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

September 2, 2004 • Delaware Stadium (22,727)

**NEWARK, DE --** Redshirt freshman QB Ricky Santos took over for injured starter Mike Granieri in the first half and hit on 10 of 11 passes for 146 yards and threw a game-clinching 44-yard touchdown pass to David Ball early in the fourth quarter as New Hampshire upset top-ranked and defending NCAA I-AA national champion Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

The Wildcats, who defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time in school history, held the lead for the entire game before Delaware went up 21-17 on a seven-yard touchdown run by Sean Bleiler with 13:56 left to play. But New Hampshire came right back on its next possession and moved 67 yards on eight plays for the what proved to be the winning score when Santos hit Ball across the middle for a 44-yard pass play.

Delaware, which won its final six games on the way to capturing the 2003 NCAA I-AA title with a 15-1 mark, had a 10-game home win streak as the sellout crowd of 22,727 went home disappointed. The Hens lost just their second season opener in the last 10 years.

Granieri, a third-year starter and widely considered one of the best quarterbacks in the Atlantic 10, went down with a season-ending knee injury midway through the second half. But Santos was up to the task in relief in leading UNH to the win.

New Hampshire running back R.J. Harvey rushed 32 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns, including a one-yard scoring dive to open the scoring with 6:32 left in the first quarter and on an eight-yard run with 2:10 left in the third quarter that gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the night at 17-8. Ball caught five passes for 118 yards to aid the UNH attack. New Hampshire, although outgained 351-340 by the Blue Hens, held a 12-minute advantage in time of possession.

Delaware junior quarterback Sonny Riccio, a transfer from Missouri who was making his first start at Delaware, completed 13 of 17 passes for 101 yards and one touchdown, a 29-yard screen pass to redshirt freshman running back Lonnie Starks with 1:34 left in the third quarter that cut the UNH lead to 17-15. Starks rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries and caught four passes for 40 yards. Brad Shushman added field goals of 27 and 22 yards for the Blue Hens.

**NEWARK, DE --** SidneyHaugabrook ignited Delaware with an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter and Niquan Lee scored the game-winner with a one-yard dive with 7:26 left to play as No. 7 Delaware rallied to defeat Towson 21-17 in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens (1-1, 1-0) overcame a sluggish offensive effort and three interceptions by Towson's Allante Harrison to take the early Atlantic 10 lead. Towson (1-1, 0-1), a first-year member of the Atlantic 10 after seven years in the Patriot League, almost pulled the big upset.

It was a defensive struggle for most of the evening as Delaware managed just 213 total yards and Towson tallied just 152. The game also featured 17 punts and four turnovers before the Hens pulled out the win. The 213 total yards by theBlue Hens was the lowest total in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler.

Towson took the early lead when Corle scored from four yards out to cap a 43-yard drive that consumed over five minutes. The sluggish Delaware offensive was finally ignited with 7:16 left in the third quarter when Haugabrook took a punt at his own 20-yard line, dodged a trio of tacklers, and romped 80 yards for his second career punt return for a touchdown.

The tie was short-lived though as Will Marcus returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to set up a career-long 41-yard field goal by Towson's Stephan Toth, giving the Tigers a 10-7 edge with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The rest of the scoring took place in the final quarter as the Hens took the lead on a six-yard pass from Sonny Riccio to Justin Long to cap a 14-play, 74-yard drive and give Delaware a 14-10 lead with 13:15 remaining. But back came Towson again as Harrison picked off his third pass of the game, and his fifth in two games this season, and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 17-14 lead with 12:39 remaining.

With Towson facing a second and three at its own 27-yard line midway through the final stanza, Goldbeck made an errant pitch to Miles and Chris Mooney recovered for the Hens. After Sean Bleiler gained 12 yards on two carries, Lee leaped over from the one-yard line for what proved to be the winning score.

Towson put one last drive together and got down to the Delaware 23-yard line but the Hens threw Miles for a one-yard loss and Goldbeck's four-yard pass to Jim Alexander on fourth down was short of the first down. Delaware closed out the win by getting two first downs, including runs of 14 and 20 yards by Lee.

**NEWARK, DE --** Sonny Riccio threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score and the Delaware defense forced three turnovers as the No. 6 Blue Hens handled local rival West Chester.

Riccio, a first-year transfer from Missouri, had by far his best game in three starts as he hit on 20 of 31 passes for a career-high 217 yards and threw touchdown passes to tight end JustinLaForgia and wide receiver Justin Long. He also ran for a one-yard score to spark the Blue Hens (2-1) to their second straight win and their 18th win in their last 20 home games before a third straight sellout crowd.

The Hens have now defeated NCAAADivision II West Chester (2-2)11 straight times and 14 times in the last 15 meetings. The win also gave the Delaware football program its 600th win all-time as the Hens became just the eighth current NCAAI-AA program to reach that victory total.

West Chester played tough defensively but could not overcome three turnovers and just 222 total yards of offense. Quarterback Bob Findora hit on 16 of 29 passes for 153 yards but was intercepted twice. Brent Steinmetz, who transferred to West Chester from Delaware last spring, led theRam running attack with 43 yards.

Delaware enjoyed a balanced effort as the Hens managed 431 total yards, including 214 on the ground and 217 through the air. Delaware's running back trio of redshirt freshmanLonnie Starks (81 yards), sophomore Niquan Lee (68 yards), and senior Sean Bleiler (52 yards) led the way. Long caught six passes for 81 yards and notched his 100th career reception.

The Blue Hen defense, led by Mondoe Davis' four tackles, one interception, two pass breakups, and once forced fumble, came up with another big defensive effort, holding West Chester to 222 yards and holding a 13-minute advantage in possession time.

Neither team could get anything going offensively until midway through the second half when the Hens got on the board first, driving 75 yards on 10 plays and capping the drive when Riccio hit a diving LaForgia in the end zone for a 7-0 lead. Delaware took a 10-0 advantage into halftime when senior kicker Brad Shushman nailed a career-long 48-yard field goal with 3:30 left before intermission.

The Hens went up 17-0 with 9:40 left in the third quarter when Riccio dove in from one-yard out to cap an 80-yard drive. West Chester scored its lone points midway through the fourth quarter when Findora scored on a one-yard leap to cap a 74-yard drive. Riccio capped the night's scoring when he hit Long on a four-yard scoring toss with 4:59 left.

**AMHERST, MA --** Sean Bleiler rushed for a career-high 110 yards, Sonny Riccio fired two touchdown passes, and the Delaware defensive came up with another dominating effort as the No. 4 ranked Blue Hens knocked off No. 16 Massachusetts in a battle of last year's Atlantic 10 Conference co-champions.

The Blue Hens (3-1, 2-0 Atlantic 10), who downed UMass 51-45 in three overtimes in a classic battle the previous year, used defense this time to pick up their third straight win and hand the Minutemen (2-2, 0-2 A-10) their second straight setback.

Bleiler rushed 22 times for 110 yards and one score, an eight-yard burst with 1:41 left to play, that gave the Hens some breathing room. The bruising senior, a first-year regular in the UD backfield, registered his first career 100-yard rushing game and consistently came up big on several third down plays throughout the game.

Delaware, which has now defeated UMass three times in the last four meetings, had taken the lead for good when Riccio, who completed 11 of 18 passes for 115 yards and also rushed for 70 yards, hit David Boler on a 10-yard fade pattern in the back of the end zone. Boler, who missed the previous two games with a hamstring injury, went high to haul in Riccio's lob pass and pulled it down just inside the end line. That score gave the Hens a 14-7 lead with 12:21 remaining.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Hens opened the scoring with 9:27 left before halftime as they drove 81 yards in six plays and capped the drive with Riccio hitting Joe Bleymaier across the middle for a 26-yard scoring pass.

Massachusetts came right back to the tie the game with 5:18 left in the second quarter behind a 12-play, 76-yard drive that was finished off when Tim Day hit Brandon London with a nine-yard scoring pass. Day, the national leader in passing efficiency entering the game, hit on 12 of 23 passes for 114 yards on the day.

Delaware's defensive stifled Massachusetts all day, holding the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards and sacking Day twice. The Blue Hens held All-American wide receiver Jason Peebler to just one reception for seven yards - on UMass' first offensive play of the day. He had entered the game with 13 receptions for 435 yards and five touchdowns. UMass running back Steve Baylark gained 94 yards on 17 carries but never got into the end zone.

Middle linebacker Mondoe Davis led the Hens with 13 tackles while brother Marquez Davis got his first career start in place of injured John Mulhern and had seven tackles and forced a fumble. SidneyHaugabrook added his second interception of the season and returned it 38 yards to stop a Massachusetts drive in the second half.

Charles Walker recorded a school record 23 tackles for UMass,including two sacks.

NEWARK, DE -- Niquan Lee scored his fourth touchdown of the game with 45 seconds remaining to give the Blue Hens the lead and Kyle Campbell batted down a hail mary in the end zone as time expired as the fourth-ranked Blue Hens defeated eighth-ranked Maine on Homecoming.

Delaware quarterback Sonny Riccio, who threw for 415 yards and led a Blue Hen attack that amassed 560 yards of total offense and scored six touchdowns, set school records with 33 completions, 51 pass attempts and 13 consecutive completions during the first half. Justin Long also set a school record with 16 receptions while his 236 yards were second all-time behind Eddie Conti's 354 yards receiving against Connecticut in 1998. Lee also tied a school record with four rushing touchdowns, becoming the ninth Blue Hen to rush for four scores and the first since Daryl Brown in the 1994 season.

The Blue Hens (4-1, 3-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fourth straight game, led 37-28 with 14:44 remaining after a one-yard run by Lee, but Maine quarterback Rob Whitcomb found Christian Pereira for a 10-yard touchdown pass just 58 seconds later to pull the Black Bears (2-2, 0-1 A-10) to within 37-35.

After Delaware punted on its next possession, Maine, which fell to 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the conference, drove to the Blue Hen three yardline before settling for a 21-yard field goal by Mike Mellow to take its first lead of the game at 38-37 with 7:12 remaining.

The Blue Hens were forced to punt on their next possession but held the Black Bears to a three-and-out to get the ball back at the Maine 47 with 3:34 left. Delaware had a third and five at the Maine seven yardline when Lee rushed for a first down to the one, and the following play he plowed into the endzone to put the Blue Hens up for good. Maine drove to the Delaware 28, but on the last play of the game, Whitcomb's pass into the end zone was batted down by Campbell.

Whitcomb was 22-of-40 with three touchdowns for the Black Bears, while Christian Pereira had nine catches for 143 yards and two touchdowns
