GAME PREVIEW

First place in the Atlantic 10 Conference is at stake this week as No. 6 ranked University of Delaware travels south to Virginia to take on No. 7 James Madison at Bridgeforth Stadium. The Blue Hens, coming off a 34-20 setback to I-A Navy Saturday that snapped a six-game winning streak, will look to get back on the winning track as the season heads into its final three weeks. The Hens feature one of the league's top defenses and among the nation's top return games. The Dukes, who extended their win streak to five games with a 41-10 romp over Virginia Military Institute Saturday, counter with the league's top defense that ranks No. 1 in the A-10 in total defense (268.2) and scoring defense (16.2). The Dukes are looking to capture their first conference title since 1999.



THE SERIES

After a one-year hiatus, Delaware and James Madison resume a series this weekend that began in 1983. Delaware leads the series by a 10-4 margin and has won three straight, including a 23-10 victory on Oct. 12, 2002 at Delaware Stadium. The Hens, who have won seven of the last eight games in the series, is 4-2 all-time in games played in Harrisonburg, VA. *(more series details on page 2)*

LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE:

No. 3 Delaware saw its six-game win streak come to an end Saturday in Annapolis, MD as the Hens stepped up a level and dropped a 34-20 decision to Navy. Navy (7-1), which is building towards a second straight bowl game appearance, ran its triple option rushing attack to perfection and piled up 441 total yards against the Hens, including 366 yards on the ground. QB Aaron Polanco ran for three touchdowns and threw for another and FB Kyle Eckel ran for 143 yards and one touchdown. Delaware QB **Sonny Riccio** hit on 30 of 50 passes for 255 yards and one touchdown with WR **David Boler** grabbing a school-record tying 16 passes for 153 yards. The Hens, who upset the Mids 21-17 in last season's game in Annapolis, managed just 86 yards on the ground.

LAST WEEK FOR JAMES MADISON

The No. 9 ranked Dukes also moved out of conference this past weekend but, unlike Delaware, had little trouble in posting a 41-10 win over Virginia Military Institute Saturday at Bridgeforth Stadium in Harrisonburg, VA. James Madison (7-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) ran its winning streak to five games as it jumped out to a 21-0 lead and never looked back. James Madison piled up 547 total yards and held the Keydets to just 267 total yards, in part thanks to 10 quarterback sacks. Backup halfbacks Raymond Hines and Antoine Bolton, playing in place of injured regulars Maurice Fenner and Alvin Banks, each ran for over 100 yards and QB Justin Rascati threw for 98 yards and scored two touchdowns on the ground. Kwynn Walton collected 4.5 sacks and seven tackles for loss on the day.

LAST MEETING

Delaware 23, James Madison 10
October 12, 2002 • Newark, DE

NEWARK, DE -- Scott Collins kicked three field goals, Andy Hall threw for 172 yards and rushed for 97 more, and Delaware's defense held James Madison to just 34 yards rushing as the Blue Hens won on Homecoming.

The Blue Hens (4-3, 2-2), who won their second straight, jumped out to a 9-6 halftime lead and scored two touchdowns in a span of 34 seconds late in the third quarter to put the game away and down the Dukes (3-4, 2-3) for the third straight year and for the seventh time in the last eight meetings.

Collins helped Delaware jump out to the 9-7 halftime lead as he finished off three Blue Hen drives with field goals from 38, 33, and 25 yards to tie his own school record for field goals in a game. James Madison had cut the lead to 7-6 on a six-yard scoring pass from Matt LeZotte to Alan Harrison with 13:45 left in the first half.

The Duke had a chance to take the lead at halftime when an errant punt snap by Delaware gave JMU possession at the UD11-yard line. But the Delaware defense, which allowed just 83 total yards in the first half, held the Dukes on downs and JMU kicker Burke George missed on a 31-yard field goal attempt with 33 seconds remaining.

DELAWARE NOTES OF INTEREST

BLUE HENS LOOK TO GET BACK TO WINNING WAYS: Following a season-opening loss to New Hampshire, the Blue Hens reeled off six straight wins before falling to I-A Navy by a 34-20 score in their final non-league game of the season Saturday afternoon. Delaware will try to start another win streak this week as the Hens travel to James Madison to take on the Dukes in a battle of the last two unbeaten teams in league play left in the Atlantic 10 Conference. The Hens are off to a 6-2 start and will be trying to reach the seven-win mark for the second straight year and for the 12th time in the last 14 seasons.

STARTING ANOTHER ROAD WIN STREAK: The loss at Navy Saturday also snapped a four-game road winning streak for the Blue Hens, who are in the midst of a stretch of three straight road games for the first time since 1992 when the team travelled to Villanova, Navy, and Maine on consecutive weeks in October and won all three. The Hens are now 2-1 on the road this season heading into this week's game at James Madison. Overall, Delaware is 8-2 in its last 10 road games since a 17-7 loss at Massachusetts back on Nov. 2, 2002. Prior to Navy, the Hens' last road loss was a 24-14 setback at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003.

BLUE HENS LOOK TO EXTEND WINNING STREAKS VS. NATIONALLY-RANKED TEAMS: Delaware has faced nine top 20 opponents in its last 14 games since last season and has a nine-game winning streak during that time. The streak includes a 51-45 triple overtime win over No. 3 Massachusetts and wins of 20-17 over No. 18 Villanova, 48-7 over No. 4 Southern Illinois, 37-7 over No. 7 Northern Iowa, 24-9 over No. 2 Wofford, and 40-0 over No. 6 Colgate in the NCAA I-AA championship game during the 2003 season and this year's 21-7 win over No. 16 Massachusetts Sept. 25, 41-38 triumph over No. 8 Maine Oct. 2, and the 31-28 win over No. 14 William & Mary Oct. 23. The Hens have not lost a game against a top 20 team since falling to No. 13 ranked Villanova 38-34 in the 2002 season finale. Against Top 10 teams, the Hens are an impressive 19-10 since 1991 with seven straight wins since a 39-14 loss to No. 9 Hofstra in 2001. James Madison is ranked No. 7 in both polls this week.

DELAWARE'S SCHEDULE RANKED SECOND TOUGHEST IN NCAA I-AA: Not only has Delaware posted an impressive 6-2 record to date, the Hens have done it while playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation according to the NCAA. Based on a formula that takes into account your past and future opponent's current winning percentage, Delaware's schedule ranks as the second toughest among all NCAA I-AA programs - just behind Atlantic 10 rival Villanova. Villanova's cumulative mark stands at .643 followed by a tie between Delaware and Northeastern (.625), Texas State (.606), and Albany (.590). This week's opponent - James Madison - ranks No. 18 at .534. In all six Atlantic 10 teams rank in the top 20.

HAUGABROOK EARNS ATLANTIC 10 HONORS AGAIN: For the second time this season and third time in his career, Delaware senior **Sidney Haugabrook** has been named the Atlantic 10 Conference Special Teams Player of the Week. Haugabrook, who earned the award once last year vs. Maine and for the Towson game this season, was honored for his play vs. Navy Saturday. Haugabrook, who ranks among the league and national leaders in both punt and kickoff returns, returned a punt 65 yards for a touchdown in the final minute of Saturday's 34-20 loss at Navy. He also returned three kickoffs for 64 yards, including a game-high 33-yarder.

CONTINUING ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS: This fall the Blue Hens will look to capture consecutive league titles for the first time since sharing the league title with Villanova and New Hampshire in 1991 and winning the title outright in 1992. Delaware is looking to become the first Atlantic 10 team to share a piece of the league title in consecutive years since New Hampshire accomplished the feat in 1996-97. Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th Atlantic 10 victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Hens are now 106-44 (.706) all-time since joining the league in 1986, including this year's perfect 5-0 slate. This week vs. James Madison, Delaware will be trying to open Atlantic 10 play with a 6-0 mark for the second straight year but for just the third time since joining the league in 1986. Delaware also started out 6-0 in league play in 1995 when the Hens finished undefeated

As has been their custom all season, the Hens controlled the second half. Senior running back Keith Burnell (72 yards) capped a 52-yard drive with a seven-yard run around the left end with 5:15 left in the third quarter to give Delaware a 16-7 lead. Just 34 seconds later the Hens scored again as Hall hit freshman Justin Long (nine catches for 99 yards) on a 32-yard scoring pass for a 23-7 lead with 4:41 remaining. The touchdown was set up when UD freshman cornerback Roger Brown intercepted his first career pass at the JMU32-yard line.

Brown came up with another big defensive play minutes later. LeZotte connected with fullback Jason Mallory on a pass down the right side for what looked like an easy touchdown. But Brown raced down Mallory and stopped him at the three-yard line. The Dukes couldn't put the ball in the end zone and had to settle for a 20-yard field goal by George with 3:18 left in the third quarter to cut the lead to 23-10.

Delaware's defense put the clamps down on James Madison, allowing just 10 total first downs and just 34 yards rushing on 30 attempts for the game. James Madison rushing leader Rondell Bradley, who entered the game with 562 yards on the ground this season, was held to just 19 yards on 15 carries.

Dan Mulhern led the defense with 11 tackles, including a sack while Mondoe Davis sealed the win with a fumble recovery at the UD 25-yard line with 38 seconds left.

8-0, the only time the Hens have posted an unblemished league slate in the Atlantic 10/Yankee Conference. Every year that Delaware has opened 4-0 or better in league play (1992, 1995, 2000, 2003), the Hens have advanced to NCAA tournament play.

WINNING SEASON ALREADY IN THE BAG....AGAIN: After posting a 4-6 mark in 2001 and a 6-6 record in 2002, the first consecutive non-winning seasons at Delaware since 1960-61, Delaware returned to winning ways in 2003, going 15-1 and capturing the NCAA I-AA title. The winning ways are continuing this year as the Hens already stand at 6-2, a mark that guarantees Delaware of its second straight winning season and its 15th in the last 17 seasons.

ATLANTIC 10 RANKED TOP NCAA I-AA CONFERENCE: The Atlantic 10 Football Conference is ranked first among the 15 NCAA I-AA conference for the second straight week according to the latest Sagarin Conference rankings announced Sunday. The Atlantic 10 also remained ranked higher than both the I-A Mid-American Conference and Sun Belt Conference. Among I-AA conferences, Delaware's 65.34 ranking was higher than No. 2 ranked Great West Conference (59.42), No. 3 Southland Conference (56.95), No. 4 Big Sky Conference (56.60), and No. 5 Ivy League (55.79) in the top five nationally.

POLL TALK: Delaware, the No. 1 pick in the pre-season polls released by both TheSports Network and USA Today/ESPN, remained at No. 3 in both polls for three weeks before dropping to No. 6 in both polls this week. Delaware has now appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 poll for 25 straight weeks since the 2003 season and have appeared in the top 10 for 22 straight weeks.

WHAT'S THE CATCH?: When Delaware junior wide receiver **Justin Long** caught 16 passes in the Blue Hens 43-38 win over Maine back on Oct. 2, he broke the UD single game record of 15 set by **Eddie Conti** vs. Connecticut in 1998. Conti's record lasted 69 games before it was broken. This time, it took only three games for Long's new mark to be tied. Fellow junior wide receiver **David Boler** did just that Saturday as he hauled in 16 receptions for 153 yards vs. Navy Saturday. The 16 receptions by Long and Boler is the highest total by any NCAA I-AA player in a single game this season.

COMEBACK KIDS: Despite a 6-2 record and No. 3 national ranking, things certainly have not been easy this season for the Hens. The Hens have trailed at some point in the second half in five of the team's eight games this season but have rallied to win four of them. Consider the following comebacks.

Sept. 11 vs. Towson (W, 21-17) - Delaware trailed 7-0 midway through the third quarter before Sidney Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to spark the Hens. Delaware again trailed 17-14 before Niquan Lee's one-yard scoring run with 7:26 left but the Hens up for good.

Oct. 2 vs. #8 Maine (W, 43-38) - Delaware jumped out to a 21-0 lead but Maine rallied back and led 38-37 after a field goal with 7:12 remaining. But Delaware came back to win when Niquan Lee scored on a one-yard dive with 45 seconds left for the 43-38 victory.

Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (W, 20-19) - The Hens trailed 19-7 entering the final quarter but rallied as a one-yard touchdown run by Lee cut the lead to 19-14 with 13:23 left and the Hens won it when Sonny Riccio hit Joe Bleymaier on a six-yard scoring pass with 6:09 left.

Oct. 23 vs. #14 William & Mary (W, 31-28) - Riccio and Bleymaier once again hooked up to lead the Blue Hen comeback. Delaware trailed by 14 points twice in the first quarter and came back to take the lead early in the fourth quarter, only to lose it again on a 64-yard pass play with 12:15 left. But the Hens mounted a 77-yard drive that was capped when Riccio hit Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left.

BLUE HEN DEFENSE AMONG BEST IN ATLANTIC 10: Despite allowing 34 points and a season-high 441 yards in the 34-20 loss at Navy Saturday, Delaware's defense still ranks among the best in the Atlantic 10 Conference and in the NCAA. Entering this week's game at James Madison, Delaware ranks No. 2 in the Atlantic 10 in passing defense (178.0 - 32nd in NCAA I-AA), No. 3 in scoring defense (21.6 - 42nd in NCAA), rushing defense (120.0 - 27th in NCAA), and total defense (298.0 - 28th in NCAA), and No. 4 in passing efficiency defense (118.98 - 59th in NCAA). Prior to Navy, Delaware had held 12 straight opponents

under 400 yards of total offense since allowing 518 to Massachusetts in a 51-45 triple overtime win last Nov. 15. Below are some of the season highlights defensively.

- **Sept. 11 vs. Towson** (21-17) - Held Tigers to just nine first downs and 152 yards, the lowest total allowed by Delaware since The Citadel managed just 92 yards in a 38-0 Delaware win in 2000.
- **Sept. 18 vs. West Chester** (24-6) - Held Rams to one touchdown, 15 first downs, and 222 total yards
- **Sept. 25 vs. Massachusetts** (21-7) - Held the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards
- **Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra** (20-19) - Forced three turnovers, collected four sacks, and held A-10's team leader in scoring, passing offense, and total offense to 12 first downs, 152 passing yards, and 221 total yards. Hofstra scored its only points on four field goals and on a bobbled snap on a punt that was recovered for a touchdown.
- **Oct. 23 vs. William & Mary** (31-28) - Allowed just 30 rushing yards for the game.

DELAWARE OFFENSE CONTINUES TO ROLL: After being held without a point in the first quarter in the first four games of the season (the longest first quarter scoreless streak since 1974-75), the Hens broke out in a big way vs. Maine Oct. 2, scoring 13 points in the first quarter and 30 for the first half on the way to the 43-38 victory. The Hens are now averaging 25.1 points and 364.7 total yards per game and have extended their scoring streak to 106 straight game since a 27-0 loss to Villanova in 1996. In addition, the Hens have scored 10 or more points in 26 straight games and in 120 of their last 129 games (93.0 percent) since 1994. Currently, the Hens have also scored 20 or more points in 14 straight games since a 24-14 loss at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003 and have scored 20 or more points at Delaware Stadium 21 straight times since a 10-6 win over Richmond Nov. 10, 2001. The Blue Hens have not suffered a shutout in a span of 141 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 46 games since that 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996. The last time Delaware was held under 10 points was Nov. 2, 2002 when the Hens fell to Massachusetts 17-7 at McGuirk Stadium while the last time they were held in single digits at home was in a 10-7 season-opening loss to Rhode Island Aug. 30, 2001 - a span of 25 games.

DON'T KICK TO THESE GUYS: The Blue Hens have gotten a big lift in the punt and kickoff return departments this season from senior **Sidney Haugabrook** and sophomore **Rashaad Woodard**. Delaware leads the Atlantic 10 in both punt returns (12.8 - 15th in NCAA) and kickoff returns (24.8 - 2nd in NCAA as a team) with Haugabrook ranking second in the Atlantic 10 and 12th nationally with an average of 13.4 yards per punt return and third in the Atlantic 10 and 25th nationally with an average of 25.3 yards per kickoff return. Woodard also ranks fifth in the conference and 31st nationally in kickoff returns (24.3). Haugabrook already has returned two punts for touchdowns this season - an 80-yarder vs. Towson and a 65-yarder vs. Navy - and has a 60-yard kickoff returns (vs. Hofstra) to his credit. Haugabrook set or tied three school records vs. Navy Saturday, tying school marks for punt return touchdowns in a season (2) and career (3) and breaking **Eddie Conti's** career punt return yardage record with his current total of 870. Among Woodard's highlights is a team-high 69-yard kickoff return vs. Hofstra - a game in which the Hens had two returns of 60 or more yards for the first time in school history.

ON A ROLL: The Blue Hens opened the 2004 season riding a six-game winning streak since a 24-14 setback at Northeastern last Nov. 8 but fell to New Hampshire in the opener. The Hens put together another six-game winning streak before falling to I-A Navy Saturday in Annapolis, MD. Still, the Hens have won 27 of their last 36 games under **K.C. Keeler** and 29 of their last 39 games overall since 2001. The Hens are 43-17 (.717) this decade, including a mark of 28-12 (.700) in conference play.

GOOD TO LEAD AT HALFTIME: When Delaware took a 24-21 lead into halftime and moved on to the 31-28 win over William & Mary Oct. 23, it marked the 15th straight game that the Blue Hens have won the game when leading at intermission. The Blue Hens have posted an impressive record of 31-3 (.910) this decade when leading at the half and over the last 102 games since 1990, when the Hens have taken a lead into intermission, Delaware is 94-8 (.921). Delaware hasn't lost a game when leading at halftime since Oct. 19, 2002 when the Hens let a 14-7 halftime lead slip away in a 17-14 overtime setback to Rhode Island in Kingston, RI.

WELL-GROUNDED: With such outstanding balance in the backfield for the Hens this season, it might be tough getting one player over 100 yards rushing in a single game this season. **Sean Bleiler** did just that in the 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25, rushing 22 times for a career-high 110 yards and a touchdown. The 100-yard effort almost guarantees Delaware of a victory. Delaware has won eight straight games when having a runner rush for over 100 yards in a game (since a Nov. 16 loss at Villanova) and has won 31 of its last 32 games since 1994 when that happens.

PICKING UP FOR THE FALLEN LEADER: The Blue Hens suffered a big blow in the 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2 when senior co-captain and leading rusher **Sean Bleiler** went down with torn knee ligaments on a run up the middle in the first quarter. Bleiler, who had never missed a game in his career for the Hens, playing in 43 straight, was the Hens' leading rusher with 333 yards and two touchdowns on 66 carries and had caught five passes for 37 yards. He also has been among the team's top special teams players. Bleiler will miss the rest of the season, which means more playing time for redshirt freshman **Lonnie Starks**, who has rushed for a team-high 385 yards on 78 carries, sophomore **Niquan Lee**, who tied a school record with four touchdowns in the win over Maine and has an Atlantic 10 leading 10 touchdowns and 292 yards on the season, and freshman **Omar Cuff** (C.H. Flowers/Landover, MD), a converted defensive back who made his collegiate debut vs. Hofstra on special teams, carried the ball for the first time Oct. 23 vs. William & Mary, and led Delaware in rushing vs. Navy with 37 yards on five carries.

ABUNDANT ATTENDANCE: The Blue Hens are the only school in NCAA I-AA to average over 20,000 fans per game during the regular season each of the past five seasons and that streak will be continuing in 2004. Delaware sold a school-record 10,500 season ticket packages during the pre-season and currently ranks third nationally in NCAA I-AA in home attendance with a mark of 22,327 - trailing only Southern (23,685 in five home games) and Montana (23,283 in four games). Delaware Stadium drew its school record fifth straight sellout crowd vs. William & Mary for Parents and Family Day Oct. 23 as 22,058 fans passed through the turnstiles. The Hens have now drawn 19,000 or more fans in 19 straight home games. Delaware drew 22,782 fans for the Towson game, the ninth largest crowd in UD history, and 22,727 for the New Hampshire game, the 10th largest all-time. Delaware officials expect the final regular season home game vs. Villanova set for Nov. 20 to sell-out this week.

DELAWARE STADIUM SUCCESS: Delaware was the only school in all of college football in 2003 to play 10 home games - and the Blue Hens posted a perfect 10-0 record at Tubby Raymond Field at Delaware Stadium. The Hens outscored opponents 414-154 for an average win margin of 26.0 points per game. Delaware had won 10 straight games at Delaware Stadium before the 24-21 loss to New Hampshire in the season opener Sept. 2, but after successive home wins over Towson, West Chester, Maine, and William & Mary, the Hens have now won 20 of their last 22 games in Newark and have won eight straight conference games at home (New Hampshire this year was a non-league game). The Hens have posted an all-time record of 249-74-4 (.770) in 327 games over 51 seasons since 1952 at Delaware Stadium. That mark includes an all-time NCAA playoff home record of 15-5, including a 3-0 mark in 2003 when the Hens defeated Southern Illinois, Northern Iowa, and Wofford to advance to the I-AA championship. Tubby Raymond Field is named in honor of Delaware's long-time head coach who served as the Blue Hen mentor for 36 seasons, notching 300 wins and leading the Blue Hens to three national titles. Raymond, who continues to attend UD games and works as a color analyst for WDEL Radio, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August, 2003.

SURVIVING THE BYE WEEK: Delaware played 16 straight weeks in 2003 on the way to winning the NCAA I-AA national championship, so when the Hens had a bye week Oct. 9 it was a welcome change. The Hens had just enough to get by Hofstra 20-19, giving Delaware a record of 4-5 in games following a bye week since 1991. The Hens lost four straight between 1991-2000 before winning three straight in 2000-2001. The Hens lost to Villanova 38-34 following a bye week in 2002 before returning to the win column this season.

MAKING HISTORY IN THE TRENCHES: Delaware freshman **Mike Byrne**, an offensive lineman from Lititz, PA (Manheim Central HS), made history Sept. 18 in the Hens' 21-17 victory over Towson. When starting offensive tackle **Paul Thomson** left the game in the first quarter with an elbow injury, Byrne entered the game, becoming the first true freshman offensive lineman to appear in a game since **Steve Butcher** in 1952. Byrne played the rest of the half before Thomson returned to the lineup in the second half and started again vs. West Chester last week. Byrne earned first team *Associated Press* All-State honors last fall at Manheim Central High School, leading the squad (along with

current UD freshman quarterback **Jarryd Moyer**) to the state AAA title. Another Blue Hen freshman has also made history. Redshirt freshman **Rich Beverley**, who started the first two games before being limited with a broken hand, was the first redshirt freshman to start a game at Delaware since **Brian Cook** in 1995. Sophomore **Scott Conley** took over for five games before Beverley returned to the starting lineup vs. Navy this past Saturday. Another redshirt freshman, center **Mark Ciavarella**, made his first career start vs. William & Mary Oct. 23 in place of senior **Chris Edwards**, who has mononucleosis, started against Navy last week, and will make this third start vs. JMU.

HAVEN'T LOST BY MUCH: Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** squads have posted a record of 27-9 in his three seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 27 victories is a formidable 9.7 points per game. His average losing margin is a paltry 6.0 points per game with only three setbacks over five points and just one over 10 points during his UD career - last week's 34-20 loss to Navy.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE: The University of Delaware ranked among the national leaders in 2003 in turnover margin with a mark of +19. Over the last 10 seasons, Delaware is 81-14 (.853) when having less or equal amount of turnovers than its opponents and is 55-7 (.887) with 16 straight wins when having less turnovers than its opponent. That streak continued in the win over William & Mary Oct. 23 as the Hens did not turn the ball over while William & Mary lost a first half fumble.

WONDERFUL WIDEOUTS: Delaware often deploys three or four and sometimes five wide receivers in its spread offense - leaving plenty of opportunities for the Blue Hen receivers to put up some big numbers. They have taken advantage. And for even better news, Delaware's top four wide receivers are all juniors who will be back next season. Leading the way are **Justin Long** and **David Boler** - who each have posted a school record 16-reception day this season - a high among NCAA I-AA receivers this season. Long has caught 45 passes for 586 yards and four touchdowns this season and ranks fifth in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (5.6 - 26th in NCAA) and 10th in receiving yards (73.2 - 47th in NCAA) while Boler, who missed two games earlier this season with a hamstring pull, has caught 38 passes for 507 yards and one touchdowns. He ranks fourth in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (6.3 - 15th in NCAA) and fifth in receiving yards (84.5 - 23rd in NCAA). **Joe Bleymaier** has also come on lately and has caught 15 passes for 183 yards and in successive games caught game-winning touchdowns vs. Hofstra (Oct. 16) and William & Mary (Oct. 23) and snared a career-high five receptions vs. Navy (Oct. 30). Boler has caught at least one pass in 27 straight games (No. 2 all-time behind record 38 by **Eddie Conti** in 1996-98) while Long is working on a streak of 18 straight games and Bleymaier on a six-game streak. Boler, Long, and fellow junior **Brian Ingram** all went over 1,000 career yards receiving last season - marking the first time in school history that the Hens have had three 1,000-yard receivers on the same team. TIGHT ENDS GETTING INVOLVED IN PASSING GAME, TOO!: Junior tight end **Justin LaForgia**, a second-year transfer from the University of Cincinnati, is among the Blue Hen receiving leaders with 18 catches for 113 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high five catches for 29 yards vs. UMass Sept. 25, following up a four-reception performance the week before vs. West Chester when he scored his first career touchdown. While it's not unusual for a tight end to catch passes, it has been at Delaware. A tight end has not led Delaware in receiving for an entire season since **Mark Steimer** had 22 catches for 369 yards in 1981. When last year's starting tight end **Rick Lavelle** caught 17 passes for 197 yards, it was the most receptions by a UD tight end since **Rob Higbee** had 20 catches for 306 yards in 1994.

DELAWARE JOINS THE 600-WIN CLUB: The Delaware football program reached a significant milestone with the 24-6 win over West Chester Sept. 18 and accomplished what just seven other schools in I-AA have managed. The Blue Hens now own an all-time overall record of 604-382-44 over 113 seasons, moving them into the 600-win club. Only seven other current NCAA-AA programs have reached 600 wins all-time - Yale (825), Pennsylvania (774), Harvard (764), Princeton (755), Fordham (719), Dartmouth (635), and Lafayette (611). Other schools that could reach the 600-win mark this season are Lehigh (599) and Cornell (594).

A SEASON TO REMEMBER: The University of Delaware is coming off the finest season in school history as the Blue Hens won their sixth national title in school history, their first ever in NCAA I-AA, and their first since winning the 1979 NCAA II title in 2003. The Hens set a school record with 15 wins in a 15-1 season and were named Lambert Cup Eastern champions for the 18th time and the ECAC Team of the Year for the 10th time. Delaware was also named State Team of the Year by the Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and Local Team of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters. The Hens captured their 14th conference title all-time, including their seventh as a member of the Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 Conference. This season, Delaware and head coach **K.C. Keeler** will be looking to become the first team to repeat as NCAA-AA national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000.

THE SEASON AHEAD: The Blue Hens, who welcomed back 15 starters and 40 letterwinners from last year's national championship team, were the overwhelming No. 1 pre-season pick in both The Sports Network and *USAToday*/ESPN polls selected from I-AA head coaches, sports information directors, and media members. This year marks the first time that Delaware (or any team from the Atlantic 10) was the pre-season No. 1 pick but the Hens appeared in the pre-season poll for the 13th straight season. Delaware received 57 of the 71 first place picks in The Sports Network poll and 26 of the 35 first place votes in the *USAToday*/ESPN poll. In addition, the Blue Hens were the No. 1 pre-season pick by *Street & Smith's Magazine* and *Lindy's Magazine* and picked No. 3 in *Athlon Magazine*. Ironically, Delaware was not picked to finish first in its own Atlantic 10 Conference based on a poll conducted by league coaches and media members. Delaware was picked No. 2 behind Villanova in the Atlantic 10 South Division and ahead of William & Mary, James Madison, Richmond, and league newcomer Towson. In the North Division, Maine was the pre-season No. 1 pick followed by Northeastern, defending league co-champion Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Hofstra.

NEW UNIFORMS: The Blue Hens are sporting new Nike uniforms and helmets with new colors this fall. Delaware will go back to its official school color of royal blue for its uniforms and its distinctive helmet. The helmet, which will not change design, had previously consisted of gold and navy or dark blue for its colors. The helmet will now be a royal metallic blue which better matches the royal blue colors in Delaware's new uniforms.

younger brother of former Blue Hen standout linebackers and captains Pat and Dan, senior running back **Sean Bleiler** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen punter Ryan Bleiler; No. 3 quarterback **T.J. DiMuzio** is the son of former Delaware All-American quarterback Tom DiMuzio, and sophomore DB **Zach Thomas** is the younger brother of New Hampshire senior DB Aaron Thomas.

THESE HENS HAVE BRAINS.....: Not only have the Blue Hens got the job done on the field, they are seeing outstanding results in the classroom. Five Delaware players are CoSIDA Academic All-American nominees. To be eligible for the award, student-athletes must have at least sophomore standing, be a starter or key reserve, and hold a 3.2 or better grade point index. Leading the way is senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** who holds a 3.9 grade point index as a civil engineering major. Cross, who is also a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award candidate, earned the inaugural Atlantic 10 Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award last season when he also was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American second team. In addition to Cross, other Blue Hens nominated for the Academic All-American team are junior wide receiver **Joe Bleymaier**, senior defensive lineman **Chris Mooney**, senior linebacker **Mark Moore**, and defensive lineman **Tom Parks**. Cross, Bleymaier, and Mooney were also named to the CoSIDA District 2 team a year ago. The Hens would have had a sixth candidate but senior pre-season All-Atlantic 10 offensive guard **Jared Wray** suffered a career-ending back injury in pre-season and will not play this fall. Four current UD players are currently enrolled in graduate school - **Mondoe Davis**, **Sean Bleiler**, **Garron Bible**, and **Dominic Santoli**.

.....AND BRAWN: According to University of Delaware strength and conditioning coach **Russell Barbarino**, the current Blue Hen roster is stronger and more fit than any other in school history. Broken records in spring and summer testing - including strength, speed, and agility drills - have become commonplace. Each summer Barbarino conducts a Best Conditioned Athlete contest with the overall winner having the most points from a battery of tests. And this year, for the second time in three seasons, senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** was named the winner. Cross earned first place with 3,239 points followed by LB **Mondoe Davis** (3,082), and RB **Sean Bleiler** (2,961). Individual position leaders were Cross (defensive line), Davis (big skill), Bleiler (offensive sk), **SidneyHaugabrook** (defensive backs), and **Mark Ciavirella** (offensive line). Individual event leaders were Ciavirella (bench press - 455 lbs.), Davis (squat lift - 675 lbs.), LB **Ryan McDermond** (agility - 3.97); DL **Bubba Jespersen** (225 lb. lift - 27 times); Cross (vertical jump - 40 inches; power clean lift - 355 lbs.), and DB **Jeff Robinson** (broad jump - 11-2).

IN THE PROS: The National Football League career of former University of Delaware standout quarterback **Rich Gannon** has been well-documented. The former All-American still rates among the top signal callers in the NFL and he was the league Most Valuable Player in 2002 when he led the Oakland Raiders to a berth in the Super Bowl. But Gannon isn't the only former Blue Hen chasing professional glory. He is one of five former Delaware players currently on NFL rosters. Quarterback **Andy Hall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson**, both 2003 All-Americans who led Delaware to the NCAA I-AA title last fall, are on the practice squads of the Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans respectively. Johnson was picked up after being released by Oakland in the pre-season. Also on an NFL practice squad this fall is 2003 co-captain, DB **Mike Adams** (San Francisco 49ers) and 2002 leading rusher **Keith Burnell** (New York Jets). Burnell was signed to the practice squad in early October after earlier being released. Adams' co-captain last season, OG **Jason Nerys** (New York Jets), had been a member of the New York Jets practice squad for three weeks before being released in October. In addition to those five, former Delaware wide receiver **Jamin Elliott** was released by the Chicago Bears during the pre-season.

NEWARK, DE -- Redshirt freshman QB Ricky Santos took over for injured starter Mike Granieri in the first half and hit on 10 of 11 passes for 146 yards and threw a game-clinching 44-yard touchdown pass to David Ball early in the fourth quarter as New Hampshire upset top-ranked and defending NCAA I-AA national champion Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

The Wildcats, who defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time in school history, held the lead for the entire game before Delaware went up 21-17 on a seven-yard touchdown run by Sean Bleiler with 13:56 left to play. But New Hampshire came right back on its next possession and moved 67 yards on eight plays for the what proved to be the winning score when Santos hit Ball across the middle for a 44-yard pass play.

Delaware, which won its final six games on the way to capturing the 2003 NCAA I-AA title with a 15-1 mark, had a 10-game home win streak as the sellout crowd of 22,727 went home disappointed. The Hens lost just their second season opener in the last 10 years.

Granieri, a third-year starter and widely considered one of the best quarterbacks in the Atlantic 10, went down with a season-ending knee injury midway through the second half. But Santos was up to the task in relief in leading UNH to the win.

New Hampshire running back R.J. Harvey rushed 32 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns, including a one-yard scoring dive to open the scoring with 6:32 left in the first quarter and on an eight-yard run with 2:10 left in the third quarter that gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the night at 17-8. Ball caught five passes for 118 yards to aid the UNH attack. New Hampshire, although outgained 351-340 by the Blue Hens, held a 12-minute advantage in time of possession.

Delaware junior quarterback Sonny Riccio, a transfer from Missouri who was making his first start at Delaware, completed 13 of 17 passes for 101 yards and one touchdown, a 29-yard screen pass to redshirt freshman running back Lonnie Starks with 1:34 left in the third quarter that cut the UNH lead to 17-15. Starks rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries and caught four passes for 40 yards. Brad Shushman added field goals of 27 and 22 yards for the Blue Hens.

NEWARK, DE -- SidneyHaugabrook ignited Delaware with an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter and Niquan Lee scored the game-winner with a one-yard dive with 7:26 left to play as No. 7 Delaware rallied to defeat Towson 21-17 in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens (1-1, 1-0) overcame a sluggish offensive effort and three interceptions by Towson's Allante Harrison to take the early Atlantic 10 lead. Towson (1-1, 0-1), a first-year member of the Atlantic 10 after seven years in the Patriot League, almost pulled the big upset.

It was a defensive struggle for most of the evening as Delaware managed just 213 total yards and Towson tallied just 152. The game also featured 17 punts and four turnovers before the Hens pulled out the win. The 213 total yards by theBlue Hens was the lowest total in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler.

Towson took the early lead when Corle scored from four yards out to cap a 43-yard drive that consumed over five minutes. The sluggish Delaware offensive was finally ignited with 7:16 left in the third quarter when Haugabrook took a punt at his own 20-yard line, dodged a trio of tacklers, and romped 80 yards for his second career punt return for a touchdown.

The tie was short-lived though as Will Marcus returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to set up a career-long 41-yard field goal by Towson's Stephan Toth, giving the Tigers a 10-7 edge with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The rest of the scoring took place in the final quarter as the Hens took the lead on a six-yard pass from Sonny Riccio to Justin Long to cap a 14-play, 74-yard drive and give Delaware a 14-10 lead with 13:15 remaining. But back came Towson again as Harrison picked off his third pass of the game, and his fifth in two games this season, and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 17-14 lead with 12:39 remaining.

With Towson facing a second and three at its own 27-yard line midway through the final stanza, Goldbeck made an errant pitch to Miles and Chris Mooney recovered for the Hens. After Sean Bleiler gained 12 yards on two carries, Lee leaped over from the one-yard line for what proved to be the winning score.

Towson put one last drive together and got down to the Delaware 23-yard line but the Hens threw Miles for a one-yard loss and Goldbeck's four-yard pass to Jim Alexander on fourth down was short of the first down. Delaware closed out the win by getting two first downs, including runs of 14 and 20 yards by Lee.

NEWARK, DE -- Sonny Riccio threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score and the Delaware defense forced three turnovers as the No. 6 Blue Hens handled local rival West Chester.

Riccio, a first-year transfer from Missouri, had by far his best game in three starts as he hit on 20 of 31 passes for a career-high 217 yards and threw touchdown passes to tight end JustinLaForgia and wide receiver Justin Long. He also ran for a one-yard score to spark the Blue Hens (2-1) to their second straight win and their 18th win in their last 20 home games before a third straight sellout crowd.

The Hens have now defeated NCAAADivision II West Chester (2-2)11 straight times and 14 times in the last 15 meetings. The win also gave the Delaware football program its 600th win all-time as the Hens became just the eighth current NCAAI-AA program to reach that victory total.

West Chester played tough defensively but could not overcome three turnovers and just 222 total yards of offense. Quarterback Bob Findora hit on 16 of 29 passes for 153 yards but was intercepted twice. Brent Steinmetz, who transferred to West Chester from Delaware last spring, led theRam running attack with 43 yards.

Delaware enjoyed a balanced effort as the Hens managed 431 total yards, including 214 on the ground and 217 through the air. Delaware's running back trio of redshirt freshmanLonnie Starks (81 yards), sophomore Niquan Lee (68 yards), and senior Sean Bleiler (52 yards) led the way. Long caught six passes for 81 yards and notched his 100th career reception.

The Blue Hen defense, led by Mondoe Davis' four tackles, one interception, two pass breakups, and once forced fumble, came up with another big defensive effort, holding West Chester to 222 yards and holding a 13-minute advantage in possession time.

Neither team could get anything going offensively until midway through the second half when the Hens got on the board first, driving 75 yards on 10 plays and capping the drive when Riccio hit a diving LaForgia in the end zone for a 7-0 lead. Delaware took a 10-0 advantage into halftime when senior kicker Brad Shushman nailed a career-long 48-yard field goal with 3:30 left before intermission.

The Hens went up 17-0 with 9:40 left in the third quarter when Riccio dove in from one-yard out to cap an 80-yard drive. West Chester scored its lone points midway through the fourth quarter when Findora scored on a one-yard leap to cap a 74-yard drive. Riccio capped the night's scoring when he hit Long on a four-yard scoring toss with 4:59 left.

AMHERST, MA -- Sean Bleiler rushed for a career-high 110 yards, Sonny Riccio fired two touchdown passes, and the Delaware defensive came up with another dominating effort as the No. 4 ranked Blue Hens knocked off No. 16 Massachusetts in a battle of last year's Atlantic 10 Conference co-champions.

The Blue Hens (3-1, 2-0 Atlantic 10), who downed UMass 51-45 in three overtimes in a classic battle the previous year, used defense this time to pick up their third straight win and hand the Minutemen (2-2, 0-2 A-10) their second straight setback.

Bleiler rushed 22 times for 110 yards and one score, an eight-yard burst with 1:41 left to play, that gave the Hens some breathing room. The bruising senior, a first-year regular in the UD backfield, registered his first career 100-yard rushing game and consistently came up big on several third down plays throughout the game.

Delaware, which has now defeated UMass three times in the last four meetings, had taken the lead for good when Riccio, who completed 11 of 18 passes for 115 yards and also rushed for 70 yards, hit David Boler on a 10-yard fade pattern in the back of the end zone. Boler, who missed the previous two games with a hamstring injury, went high to haul in Riccio's lob pass and pulled it down just inside the end line. That score gave the Hens a 14-7 lead with 12:21 remaining.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Hens opened the scoring with 9:27 left before halftime as they drove 81 yards in six plays and capped the drive with Riccio hitting Joe Bleymaier across the middle for a 26-yard scoring pass.

Massachusetts came right back to the tie the game with 5:18 left in the second quarter behind a 12-play, 76-yard drive that was finished off when Tim Day hit Brandon London with a nine-yard scoring pass. Day, the national leader in passing efficiency entering the game, hit on 12 of 23 passes for 114 yards on the day.

Delaware's defensive stifled Massachusetts all day, holding the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards and sacking Day twice. The Blue Hens held All-American wide receiver Jason Peebler to just one reception for seven yards - on UMass' first offensive play of the day. He had entered the game with 13 receptions for 435 yards and five touchdowns. UMass running back Steve Baylark gained 94 yards on 17 carries but never got into the end zone.

Middle linebacker Mondoe Davis led the Hens with 13 tackles while brother Marquez Davis got his first career start in place of injured John Mulhern and had seven tackles and forced a fumble. SidneyHaugabrook added his second interception of the season and returned it 38 yards to stop a Massachusetts drive in the second half.

Charles Walker recorded a school record 23 tackles for UMass,including two sacks.

NEWARK, DE -- Niquan Lee scored his fourth touchdown of the game with 45 seconds remaining to give the Blue Hens the lead and Kyle Campbell batted down a hairy in the end zone as time expired as the fourth-ranked Blue Hens defeated eighth-ranked Maine on Homecoming.

Delaware quarterback Sonny Riccio, who threw for 415 yards and led a Blue Hen attack that amassed 560 yards of total offense and scored six touchdowns, set school records with 33 completions, 51 pass attempts and 13 consecutive completions during the first half. Justin Long also set a school record with 16 receptions while his 236 yards were second all-time behind Eddie Conti's 354 yards receiving against Connecticut in 1998. The Blue Hens (4-1, 3-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fourth straight game, led 37-28 with 14:44 remaining after a one-yard run by Lee, but Maine quarterback Rob Whitcomb found Christian Pereira for a 10-yard touchdown pass just 58 seconds later to pull the Black Bears (2-2, 0-1 A-10) to within 37-35.

After Delaware punted on its next possession, Maine, which fell to 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the conference, drove to the Blue Hen three yardline before settling for a 21-yard field goal by Mike Mellow to take its first lead of the game at 38-37 with 7:12 remaining.

The Blue Hens were forced to punt on their next possession but held the Black Bears to a three-and-out to get the ball back at the Maine 47 with 3:34 left. Delaware had a third and five at the Maine seven-yard line when Lee rushed for a first down to the one, and the following play he plowed into the end zone to put the Blue Hens up for good. Maine drove to the Delaware 28, but on the last play of the game, Whitcomb's pass into the end zone was batted down by Campbell.

Whitcomb was 22-of-40 with three touchdowns for the Black Bears, while Christian Pereira had nine catches for 143 yards and two touchdowns

HEMPSTEAD, NY -- Sonny Riccio connected with wide receiver Joe Bleymaier for a six-yard touchdown pass on fourth down with 6:09 left to play to cap a 12-point fourth quarter comeback as No. 3 Delaware remained unbeaten in Atlantic 10 play.

It was a defensive struggle for both teams all day as both turned the ball over three times and neither sustained a drive longer than 40 yards all day. Delaware managed just 244 total yards while Hofstra had 221.

The Blue Hens (5-1, 4-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fifth straight game, trailed 19-7 with two minutes remaining in the third quarter after Hofstra kicker Chris Onorato nailed a 30-yard field goal, his school-record tying fourth of the day. Hofstra (3-3, 1-2 Atlantic 10) lost for the fifth time in the last six meetings with the Blue Hens.

Delaware senior Sidney Haugabrook ignited the comeback by returning the ensuing kickoff 60 yards before stepping out of bounds at the Hofstra 33 yard line. Delaware had a third and 18 at the Hofstra 41 when Riccio found David Boler for a 28-yard gain to the Hofstra 13 on the final play of the quarter, and four plays later Niquan Lee scored from one yard out to cut the Pride lead to 19-14 with 13:23 remaining in the game.

The Blue Hens were stopped on their next drive, and on their following possession Riccio was intercepted by Prentice James at the Hofstra seven yard-line. However, the Delaware defense held the Pride to a three-and-out and on the punt Haugabrook was interfered with, giving the Blue Hens the ball on the Hofstra 37 with 8:59 to play.

An 11-yard completion from Riccio to Justin Long on a third down gave Delaware a first and goal at the seven, and three plays later Riccio hit Bleymaier in the end zone to give the Blue Hens their first lead of the game at the 6:09 mark. The Blue Hens then held the Pride on the next two possessions and clinched the win when Mark Moore stopped Devale Ellis one-yard shy of a first down on a fourth down play with 1:01 left.

Onorato kicked field goals of 42, 37, and 18 yards to give Hofstra a 9-0 lead midway through the second quarter before the Hens finally got on the board with a three-yard run by Lee with 4:56 left before halftime to cut the lead to 9-7. Lee's touchdown was set up by a 69-yard kickoff return by Rashaad Woodard to the HU 14-yard line.

Hofstra went up 16-7 midway through the third quarter when Delaware punter Mike Weber fumbled a snap in the end zone and the Pride's Justyn Davis fell on the ball with 7:33 left to go in the third. The lead was extended to 19-7 on Onorato's 30-yard field goal, setting the stage for the Blue Hen comeback.

NEWARK, DE -- Sonny Riccio hit wide receiver Joe Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left to play as No. 3 Delaware rallied from two 14-point deficits for the win.

The Blue Hens (6-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) won their fifth straight game while William & Mary (5-2, 3-1) had a five-game winning streak snapped despite an outstanding effort from QB Lang Campbell and WR Dominique Thompson.

Campbell hit on 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and four touchdowns while Thompson caught six passes for a school-record 244 yards, including scoring catches of 10, 62, and 87 yards in the first quarter as the Tribe took a 21-7 lead. Campbell and Thompson hooked up again on a 64-yard scoring toss with 12:15 left in the game to give William & Mary its last lead at 28-24.

Riccio hit on 24 of 40 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns while Justin Long caught 11 passes for 108 yards and caught a five-yard scoring pass from Riccio with 8:33 left in the second quarter to cut the lead to 21-14. FB Niquan Lee also added two short touchdown runs and David Boler caught seven passes for 155 yards.

The two teams combined for 42 first downs and 836 total yards but Delaware took advantage of a William & Mary turnover and a blocked punt to gain the edge.

William & Mary stormed out to the 14-0 lead in the first four minutes of the game as Campbell hit Thompson on a 10-yard scoring pass to cap the Tribe's first drive of the day and the two hooked up again moments later as Thompson caught a short pass in the flat, broke a tackle, and scampered 62 yards for a touchdown to for the 14-0 lead.

Delaware answered on Riccio's five-yard scoring toss to Long but Campbell and Thompson hooked up again, this time with Campbell firing a pass over the Delaware defense and Thompson speeding 87 yards to the touchdown.

But the Blue Hens buckled down and held William & Mary scoreless the entire second quarter to take a 24-21 lead into halftime. Mark Moore recovered a fumble to set up a two-yard scoring run by Lee, Craig Browne blocked a punt to set up Brad Shushman's 43-yard field goal that just bounced over the cross bar, and Lee followed with another short scoring run. Long receptions by Boler set up two of the scores.

After a scoreless third quarter, William & Mary regained the lead on the 64-yard pass play from Campbell to Thompson but the Hens answered one more time as Bleymaier's lone catch of the day was the game-winner, the second straight game he was the hero.

ANNAPOLIS, MD-- Delaware saw its six-game win streak come to an end as Navy quarterback Aaron Polanco and fullback Kyle Eckel led a dominating running attack and paced the Mids to the Homecoming victory.

No. 3 ranked Delaware (6-2) held a 10-7 lead late in the first half but Navy took advantage of Sidney Haugabrook's fumble on a punt return to take a 14-10 halftime lead and scored twice in the third quarter to take control. The Mids (7-1), who received votes in both national polls this week, avenged a 21-17 setback to the Blue Hens a year earlier.

Polanco rushed for 64 yards and three touchdowns and also threw for another score and Eckel carried 23 times for 143 yards and one score as Navy rolled up 441 total yards, including 366 on the ground. The 441 yards were the most allowed by Delaware this season and the 366 rushing yards was the 11th highest total ever allowed by a UD squad.

Blue Hen quarterback Sonny Riccio and wide receiver David Boler combined for an outstanding effort through the air. Riccio hit on 30 of 50 passes for 255 yards and one touchdown and Boler caught a school-record tying 16 passes for 153 yards. Boler tied the UD record set just four weeks earlier by teammate Justin Long. The Hens managed just 59 yards rushing.

Navy opened the scoring on a 22-yard run by Polanco but the Hens responded to take a 10-7 lead as Riccio hit Niquan Lee on a five-yard scoring toss across the middle and Brad Shushman added a 35-yard field goal with 6:20 left before halftime.

The Mids took advantage of a UD miscue to take the lead late in the half when Haugabrook fumbled a punt return and Mick Yokitis recovered on the Blue Hen 11-yard line. Three plays later Polanco found Eric Roberts on a six-yard pass play as Navy took a 14-10 lead into intermission.

Navy put the game away in the third quarter as Polanco scored on two short touchdown runs, the first with 6:28 left in the third quarter that capped a 12-play, 99-yard drive. The second score gave Navy an insurmountable 27-10 lead.

Shushman kicked a 23-yard field early in the final quarter but Eckel came back with a short touchdown run to put Navy back up 24-13. Haugabrook capped the scoring with a 65-yard punt return for a touchdown with just 46 seconds left to play, his second touchdown of the season and third of his career.
