**GAME PREVIEW**

The defending NCAA I-AA national champion University of Delaware football team will begin defense of that title this Saturday at Delaware Stadium when the Blue Hens host first time NCAA tournament qualifier Lafayette. The Blue Hens (8-3)

captured a share of their second straight Atlantic 10 title with a 41-35 win over rival Villanova Saturday at Delaware Stadium, sharing the championship with William & Mary and James Madison. Lafayette earned an automatic berth as the Patriot League champion as the Leopards (8-3) defeated rival Lehigh 24-10 Saturday. The Blue Hens, who were ranked No. 11 in last week's The Sports Network poll and No. 10 this week, enter with one of the top defensive units in the country, ranking No. 2 in the Atlantic 10 in almost every category on that side of the ball while Lafayette counters with a potent offense that is led by outstanding running back Joe McCourt. The winner of Saturday's game will advance to the I-AA quarterfinals to play the winner of the William & Mary vs. Hampton game.

## DELAWARE vs. LAFAYETTE SERIES

- Delaware and Lafayette, long-time rivals from the 1950's to the 1970's, resume the rivalry this week and will meet in post-season for the first time
- Delaware leads the all-time series record by a 17-7 margin since the first game in 1914
- Delaware has won 10 straight meetings and 11 of the last 12, winning five of those contests by shutout
- Lafayette has not scored a point vs. Delaware in eight quarters and 130 minutes since scoring early in the fourth quarter of the 1970 game
- The average win margin during the 10-game Delaware win streak is 29.6, including a 61-0 Delaware victory in 1963
- Delaware is 7-4 all-time vs. Lafayette in Newark with four straight wins, including a 27-0 win in the most recent meeting in 1972. Delaware is 7-3 all-time in games played at Delaware Stadium, including a 13-12 victory in the first game ever played at Delaware Stadium on Nov. 15, 1952
- Lafayette's last win in the series was a 3-0 victory in 1960 at Delaware Stadium

Season ticket holders will have through Wednesday, November 24 to purchase their seats. The hours of operation will be 8:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. for these three days. The UDSeason Ticket Office will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 25 for the Thanksgiving holiday but will be open Friday, Nov. 26 from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. All seats will be available to the general public beginning Monday, Nov. 22 only at the Bob Carpenter Center Box Office. The hours of operation for Nov. 22-24 will be 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. The ticket office will be closed Thursday, Nov. 25 for Thanksgiving but will reopen Friday, Nov. 26 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. To place a phone order, call Ticketmaster at (302) 984-2000 or access [www.ticketmaster.com](http://www.ticketmaster.com) on the web. Tickets will also be sold at the Bob Carpenter Center Box Office the day of the game, Nov. 27, beginning three hours before kickoff. All Delaware Season Ticket Holders who had season reserved parking need to bring their reserved parking pass with them the day of the game in order to park in those lots for any playoff game. The cost to park in any lot, including the reserved lots, will be \$10. Tickets prices are \$24-27 for box seats, \$21 for center section seating, \$18 for reserved seats, \$13 for north end zone seats, and \$5 for students in the south end zone.

### THE SERIES

Delaware and Lafayette, former rivals in all sports except football as members of the East Coast Conference, will meet on the football field for the 25th time this week and for the first time in post-season play. Delaware leads the series 17-7 but the teams have not met since a 27-0 Delaware win Oct. 7, 1972 at Delaware Stadium. Lafayette's last win in the series was a 3-0 win Oct. 8 at Delaware Stadium. Delaware and Lafayette played in the first game in Delaware Stadium history on Nov. 15, 1952 with the Blue Hens winning 13-12 in a driving rain. *(more series details on page 3-4)*

## LAST MEETING

**Delaware 27, Lafayette 0**  
**October 7, 1972 • Delaware Stadium**

**NEWARK, DE** -- After holding Gettysburg and Boston University scoreless for three quarters in their previous two outings, the Blue Hens finally got their first elusive shutout of the season, blanking Lafayette for the second straight year.

Offensively, the Hens had problems moving the ball on a Delaware Stadium field virtually saturated by the rain. In fact, Delaware failed to register its initial first down until its fourth possession.

Vern Roberts carried the ball a school record 34 times for 205 yards, including a 40-yard scoring gallop that put Delaware on the scoreboard in the second quarter for the only score of the half.

In addition to Roberts, Blair Caviness (61 yards), Theo Gregory (36 yards), and Scotty Reihm (33 yards) were the main contributors to Delaware's ground game, which piled up 355 yards on the day.

Caviness scored on a four-yard touchdown run midway through the third quarter to give the Hens a 20-0 lead and Reihm threw an eight-yard scoring pass to Larry Rybicki to cap the scoring early in the fourth quarter.

The Blue Hens also got a 27-yard field goal from Larry Washington and scored on defense when Jerry Castafero made a tackle in the end zone for a safety.

Lafayette entered the game with the nation's top running back in Tony Giglio, who averaged 180 yards per game entering the contest, and quarterback Tim Grip. Giglio gained 126 yards but averaged just 4.8 yards per carry compared to a 7.3 average entering the game. Grip completed just 2 of 19 passing attempts for 32 yards.

Delaware held the Leopards to just eight first downs and to just 119 total yard of offense and forced Lafayette to punt 11 times.

### LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE:

Freshman running back **Omar Cuff** matched a school record by scoring four touchdowns and the University of Delaware held off a late Villanova surge to post a 41-35 football victory Saturday afternoon at sold-out Delaware Stadium and claim a share of its second straight Atlantic 10 Conference title. The 11th ranked Blue Hens (8-3, 7-1 A-10), the defending NCAA-AA national champion, built a seemingly safe 41-21 lead early in the fourth quarter but had to hold off the Wildcats (6-5, 3-5), who scored three times in the final nine minutes of the game and had the chance to tie the game before **Kyle Campbell** intercepted a desperation pass by Marvin Burroughs deep inside Delaware territory on the final play of the game. The Hens, who share the conference title with William & Mary and James Madison, have now captured eight league titles since joining the conference in 1986. The Hens took a 41-21 lead on Cuff's fourth touchdown run of the day with 14:16 left to play, but Villanova battled back to make things interesting. Villanova got a safety when Delaware quarterback **Sonny Riccio** ran out of the back of the end zone with 9:01 left to cut the lead to 41-23 and Burroughs followed with an eight-yard scoring toss to Curtis Waltman with 6:08 and scored on a two-yard run himself with 2:29 remaining to cut the lead to 41-35. Delaware failed to move the ball in its next possession, giving the Wildcats one more chance. After a 35-yard pass to J.J. Outlaw moved the ball to the Villanova 40-yard line, Burroughs launched one final pass but Campbell was there to intercept it on the eight-yard line and returned it 40 yards to end the game.

### LAST WEEK FOR LAFAYETTE

Lafayette (8-3) clinched its first ever Patriot League title and NCAA I-AA tournament appearance with a 24-7 upset over rival Lehigh Saturday at Fisher Field in the 140th edition of college football's most-played rivalry. The Leopards rallied from a 7-0 halftime deficit by scoring 17 third quarter points on the way to the victory. Lafayette used a punishing ground attack and stout defensive effort for the win over the eighth-ranked Mountain Hawks. Lafayette quarterback Brad Maurer threw for 108 yards and rushed for a game-high 124 yards and one touchdown and Joe McCourt ran for 80 yards and a score to lead an offense that piled up 279 yards on the ground and 25 first downs. Defensively, Lafayette held Lehigh to just 200 total yards and forced two turnovers.

DELAWARE QUICK NOTES

**BACK TO THE POST-SEASON:** This week's game marks the Blue Hens' 18th trip to the NCAAplayoffs and its 13th trip as members of the NCAA I-AAclassification. Delaware is 22-15 all-time in NCAAplayoff action, including a 14-11 mark in I-AA. The record includes a streak of four straight wins after Delaware swept through the NCAA I-AA playoffs in 2003 to earn the school's sixth national title, its first of any kind since 1979, and its first ever at the I-AA level. No I-AA team has repeated as national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000

**GOOD TO BE HOME AT PLAYOFF TIME:** Delaware is 15-5 all-time in playoff games at Delaware Stadium and nine of the team's last 10 playoff games have been held in Newark. Delaware is 7-2 in its last nine home playoff games with three straight victories. Delaware is 250-74-4 in 328 all-time games at Delaware Stadium since 1952.

**GOOD TO BE HOME ANY TIME:** Delaware was the only school in all of college football in 2003 to play 10 home games – and the Blue Hens posted a perfect 10-0 record at Tubby Raymond Field at Delaware Stadium. The Hens posted a mark of 5-1 this season at home, winning five straight after falling to New Hampshire in the season opener. Over the last three seasons, the Hens are now 20-2 with the lone setbacks this year's 24-21 loss to New Hampshire and a 38-34 setback to Villanova Nov. 16, 2002. Delaware has posted an all-time record of 250-74-4 (.771) in 328 games all-time. Tubby Raymond Field is named in honor of Delaware's long- time head coach who served as the Blue Hen mentor for 36 season, notching 300 wins and leading the Blue Hens to three national titles. Raymond, who continues to attend UD games and works as a color analyst for WDEL Radio, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August, 2003. The first game at Delaware Stadium was 13-12 win over Lafayette Nov. 15, 1952.

**WE GOT EIGHT - LOOKING FOR NINE:** Delaware has won eight games or more for the second straight season and for the ninth time in the last 14 seasons. With a victory over Lafayette this week, the Hens would reach the nine-win mark for the second straight year and for the seventh time since 1991. The Hens have posted three straight .500 or better seasons and 15 in the last 17 campaigns.

**PACKING THEM INTO DELAWARE STADIUM:** Delaware set a single season attendance record in 2004 at Delaware Stadium where all six games were sellouts this fall, including a season-high 22,782 vs. Towson Sep. 11, the ninth largest crowd in school history. The Delaware Stadium game average was a record 22,280 - making Delaware the only school in NCAA I-AAto average 20,000 or more fans during the regular season each of the last six years. Delaware's highest NCAA playoff attendance was 16,390 vs. Lehigh in 2000. Southern University leads NCAA I-AA in average home attendance at 23,048 followed closely by Montana (22,910), and Delaware (22,280). No other Atlantic 10 Conference team averaged more than 13,000 this season. Delaware sold a school record 10,500 season ticket packages this season.

**WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE:** The University of Delaware ranked among the national leaders in 2003 in turnover margin with a mark of +19. Over the last 10 seasons, Delaware is 83-15 (.847) when having less or equal amount of turnovers than its opponents and is 57-7 (.890) with 18 straight wins when having less turnovers than its opponent. During last year's NCAA I-AA championship run, the Hens had a +5 turnover margin.

**SEVEN BLUE HENS EARN ALL-ATLANTIC 10 HONORS:** The University of Delaware football team, which earned a share of its second straight Atlantic 10 Conference title and earned a berth in this week's NCAA I-AA Tournament, placed seven players on the All-Atlantic 10 Conference all-star teams announced Tuesday. A total of 84 players were honored among three teams with selections being made by the 12 league coaches. New Hampshire and James Madison, both NCAA I-AA tournament qualifiers, each placed 10 players on the all-star teams while league tri-champion and No. 3 national seed William & Mary placed nine players on the squad. Each team had at least one player honored. Delaware senior **SidneyHaugabrook** was the first-ever triple award winner in A-10 history, being named first team kickoff returner, first team punt returner, and first team defensive back. He earned All-Atlantic 10 honors for the fourth straight year, joining former defensive end Mike Cecere (1997-2000) as the only two players in UD history to accomplish the feat. In addition to Haugabrook, defensive tackles **Chris Mooney** and junior **Tom Parks** each earned first team honors, senior middle linebacker **Mondoe Davis** earned first team honors, senior offensive tackle **Trip DelCampo** garnered first team honors, and junior wide receiver **David Boler** was a third team All-Atlantic 10 selection. Mooney, who is also on the national CoSIDA Academic All-American ballot, had earned second team honors each of the last two seasons, Davis was a second team selection in 2003, and DelCampo was a third team selection last fall. Boler and Parks were honored for the first time in their careers.

**CROSS, MOONEY, MOORE NAMED TO COSIDA DISTRICT 2 ALL-ACADEMIC TEAM:** A trio of University of Delaware defensive players have been selected to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) District 2 All-Academic first team. Defensive linemen **Ben Cross** and **Chris Mooney** and linebacker **Mark Moore** were all selected from a vote of District 2 member sports information directors. District 2 includes all NCAA I-A and I-AA schools in Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. To be eligible for the team, student-athletes must be at least a sophomore, have a 3.2 or better cumulative grade point index, and be a starter or key reserve. All three Blue Hen players were repeat selections on the All-District team. Cross, who earned second team Academic All-American honors last season when he was the Atlantic 10 Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year, earned first team All-District 2 honors for the third straight year. Mooney was a second team All-District selection each of the past two seasons and Moore earned second team honors last year as well. Delaware DT **TomParks** and WR **Joe Bleymaier**, a second team CoSIDA District 2 selection last year, were also nominated. In addition to those academic standouts, four current UD players are currently enrolled in graduate school - **Mondoe Davis**, **Sean Bleiler**, **Garron Bible**, and **Dominic Santoli**.

**HOLDING ON TO THE BALL:** Few teams in the country at any level have been as careful with the football as Delaware has been this season. Delaware has fumbled the ball just nine times and lost a fumble just five times (two vs. New Hampshire, one each vs. Hofstra, Navy, and Villanova). This year's Blue Hens could break or tie school records in both categories as the current UD marks for fewest fumbles and fewest lost stand at 13 fumbles (set in 1961 in eight games) and five fumbles lost (also in 1961). Delaware rushers had carried the ball 443 straight times without losing a fumble before Omar Cuff lost one in the first half vs. Villanova last Saturday. To show how impressive those numbers, note that the Hens have taken part in 1,021 plays (rushes, passes, punts, returns, placements) and fumbled just 9 times - or once every 113 chances.

**DELAWARE'S SCHEDULE STILL RANKED SECOND TOUGHEST IN NCAA I-AA:** Based on a formula that takes into account a team's past and future opponent's current winning percentage, Delaware's schedule ranks tied as the second toughest among all NCAA I-AA programs - just behind last week's opponent Villanova. Villanova's cumulative mark stands at .625 followed by Delaware (.604) and Northeastern (.604), Jackson State (.589), and Yale (.571). In all, eight Atlantic 10 teams rank in the top 25. This week's opponent - Lafayette - ranks 36th at .504.

**ATLANTIC 10 RANKED TOP NCAA I-AA CONFERENCE:** The Atlantic 10 Football Conference was ranked first among the 15 NCAA I-AA conference for the fourth straight week according to the latest Sagarin Conference rankings. The Atlantic 10 also remained ranked higher than both the I-A Mid-American Conference and Sun Belt Conference. Among I-AA conferences, Delaware's 64.59 ranking was higher than No. 2 ranked Great West Conference (57.06), Southland (56.10), Big Sky (54.84), and Ivy League (54.41) in the top five nationally.

**CONTINUED ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS:** The Blue Hens, who shared the Atlantic 10 title with William & Mary and James Madison this fall, captured consecutive league titles for the first time since sharing the league title with Villanova and New Hampshire in 1991 and winning the title outright in 1992. Delaware has become the first Atlantic 10 team to share a piece of the league title in consecutive years since New Hampshire accomplished the feat in 1996-97. Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th Atlantic 10 victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Hens are now 108-45 (.706) all-time since joining the league in 1986, including this year's 7-1 slate. Before a 20-13 setback to James Madison Nov. 6, the Hens were looking to open league play 6-0 for the second straight year but for just the third time since becoming members of the league. Delaware also started out 6-0 in league play in 1995 when the Hens finished undefeated at 8-0, the only time the Hens have posted an unblemished league slate in the Atlantic 10/Yankee Conference. Every previous year that Delaware has opened 4-0 or better in league play (1992, 1995, 2000, 2003), the Hens have advanced to NCAA tournament play.

**POLL TALK:** Delaware, the No. 1 pick in the pre-season polls released by both The Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN, was at No. 3 in both polls for three weeks before dropping to No. 6 in both polls and eventually to No. 11 and now currently No. 10 this week. Delaware has now appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 poll for 28 straight weeks since the 2003 season but had a streak of 22 straight weeks picked in the top 10 snapped several weeks ago.

**SUCCESS AGAINST THE BEST:** Delaware had a win streak of nine straight victories over Top 25 opponents snapped in a 20-13 setback to No. 7 James Madison back on Nov. 6 - falling for the first time since a 38-34 setback to No. 13 Villanova in the 2002 season finale. This week the Hens will look to start another win streak vs. ranked teams against No. 25 Lafayette. Against Top 10 teams, the Blue Hens are 19-11 since 1991.

**BLUE HENS VS. THE PATRIOT LEAGUE:** Delaware has posted an all-time record of 72-42 vs. current members of the Patriot League, including marks of 27-17 vs. Lehigh, 22-11 vs. Bucknell, 17-7 vs. Lafayette, 5-0 vs. Colgate, 1-3 vs. Fordham, 0-2 vs. Georgetown, and 0-2 vs. Holy Cross. The Hens have won two straight over Patriot League teams, including a 40-0 win over Colgate in the 2003 NCAA I-AA championship game and a 49-22 win over Lehigh in the 2000 NCAA quarterfinals. The last loss to a Patriot League foe was as 42-35 setback to Lehigh Oct. 16, 1999.

**TOUGH CUFF:** If anyone was wondering whether true freshman **Omar Cuff's** outstanding performance Nov. 6 at James Madison was a fluke, think again. Cuff, who was a backup defensive back who had not even played in a game this season prior to the Oct. 16 game vs. Hofstra, has become quite a workhorse, and a star, in the last three games. Cuff, who moved over to offense when starting running back **Sean Bleiler** suffered a season-ending knee injury Oct. 2 vs. Maine, set UD freshman records with 34 carries (No. 2 all-time among all players) for 162 yards (old mark 151 by **Daryl Brown** vs. Maine in 1991) in the 20-13 loss at James Madison Nov. 6 and followed that effort up with 115 yards on 34 carries and his first career touchdown in the Hens' 24-13 win at Richmond. Cuff led a Blue Hen offense that rolled up 214 yards on the ground and had 11 carries for 42 yards on the Hens' final drive of the day that burned 6:29 off the block and clinched the win. Last week vs. Villanova, he carried 28 times for a game-high 72 yards and tied a school record with four touchdowns rushing. Cuff now leads the team with 104 carries and ranks second in yards with 394 (3.8 avg.) and second in touchdowns with five.

**COMEBACK KIDS:** Despite a 7-3 record and a top 10 national rankings, things certainly have not been easy this season for the Hens. The Hens have trailed at some point in the second half in six of the team's 10 games this season but have rallied to win four of them. Consider the following comebacks.

**Sept. 11 vs. Towson (W, 21-17)** - Delaware trailed 7-0 midway through the third quarter before Sidney Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to spark the Hens. Delaware again trailed 17-14 before Niquan Lee's one-yard scoring run with 7:26 left but the Hens up for good.

**Oct. 2 vs. #8 Maine (W, 43-38)** - Delaware jumped out to a 21-0 lead but Maine rallied back and led 38-37 after a field goal with 7:12 remaining. But Delaware came back to win when Niquan Lee scored on a one-yard dive with 45 seconds left for the 43-38 victory.

**Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (W, 20-19)** - The Hens trailed 19-7 entering the final quarter but rallied as a one-yard touchdown run by Lee cut the lead to 19-14 with 13:23 left and the Hens won it when Sonny Riccio hit Joe Bleymaier on a six-yard scoring pass with 6:09 left.

**Oct. 23 vs. #14 William & Mary (W, 31-28)** - Riccio and Bleymaier once again hooked up to lead the Blue Hen comeback. Delaware trailed by 14 points twice in the first quarter and came back to take the lead early in the fourth quarter, only to lose it again on a 64-yard pass play with 12:15 left. But the Hens mounted a 77-yard drive that was capped when Riccio hit Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left.

**IMPRESSIVE STREAKS END IN LOSS AT JAMES MADISON:** Not only did the Blue Hens suffer their first conference loss of the season Nov. 6 vs. James Madison, several other impressive streaks fell by the wayside as well, including:

- 7 straight Atlantic 10 Conference wins (last loss Nov. 8, 2003 vs. Northeastern)
- 7 straight wins over Top 10 ranked teams (last loss Oct. 13, 2001 vs. #9 Hofstra)
- 8 straight wins when having a 100-yard rusher (last loss Nov. 16, 2002 vs. Villanova)
- 9 straight wins over Top 20 ranked teams (last loss Nov. 16, 2002 vs. #13 Villanova)
- 14 straight games scoring 20 or more points (last under 20 Nov. 8, 2003 vs. Northeastern)
- 15 straight wins when leading at halftime (last loss Oct. 19, 2002 vs. Rhode Island)

**BLUE HEN DEFENSE AMONG BEST IN ATLANTIC 10:** Delaware's defense ranks among the best both in the Atlantic 10 Conference and in the NCAA. Entering the NCAA I-AA playoffs, Delaware ranks No. 2 in the Atlantic 10 in total defense (300.0 yards allowed per game - No. 14 in NCAA I-AA), No. 2 in pass defense (186.5 yards allowed per game - No. 19 in NCAA), No. 2 in scoring defense (22.0 - No. 44 in NCAA), No. 2 in passing efficiency defense (118.1), and No. 3 in rushing defense (113.4 - 17th in NCAA).

Below are some of the season highlights defensively.

• **Sept. 11 vs. Towson (21-17 win)** - Held Tigers to just nine first downs and 152 yards, the lowest total allowed by Delaware since The Citadel managed just 92 yards in a 38-0 Delaware win in 2000.

• **Sept. 18 vs. West Chester (24-6 win)** - Held Rams to one touchdown, 15 first downs, and 222 total yards

• **Sept. 25 vs. Massachusetts (21-7 win)** - Held the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards

• **Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (20-19 win)** - Forced three turnovers, collected four sacks, and held A-10's team leader in scoring, passing offense, and total offense to 12 first downs, 152 passing yards, and 221 total yards. Hofstra scored its only points on four field goals and on a bobbled snap on a punt that was recovered for a touchdown.

• **Oct. 23 vs. William & Mary (31-28 win)** - Allowed just 30 rushing yards for the game.

• **Nov. 6 vs. James Madison (20-13 loss)** - Despite the loss, the Hens held the Dukes to just 12 first downs and 166 total yards, including 63 yards on the ground. JMU completed just 9 of 23 passes and held possession for just 22:15.

• **Nov. 13 vs. Richmond (24-13 win)** - Hens forced four fumbles, allowed just 288 total yards (100 on ground), and held a 22-minute advantage in possession time.

**DELAWARE OFFENSE CONTINUES TO ROLL:** After being held without a point in the first quarter in the first four games of the season (the longest first quarter scoreless streak since 1974-75), the Hens broke out in a big way vs. Maine Oct. 2, scoring 13 points in the first quarter and 30 for the first half on the way to the 43-38 victory. The Hens are now averaging 25.2 points and 369.5 total yards per game and have extended their scoring streak to 109 straight game since a 27-0 loss to Villanova in 1996. In addition, the Hens have scored 10 or more points in 29 straight games and in 123 of their last 132 games (93.2 percent) since 1994.

The Hens had scored 20 or more points in 15 straight games since a 24-14 loss at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003 before snapping that streak with 13 points Nov. 6 vs. James Madison. The Hens have scored 20 or more points at Delaware Stadium 22 straight times since a 10-6 win over Richmond Nov. 10, 2001. The Blue Hens have not suffered a shutout in a span of 142 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 48 games since that 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996. The last time Delaware was held under 10 points was Nov. 2, 2002 when the Hens fell to Massachusetts 17-7 at McGuirk Stadium while the last time they were held in single digits at home was in a 10-7 season-opening loss to Rhode Island Aug. 30, 2001 - a span of 26 games.

**WHAT'S THE CATCH?:** When Delaware junior wide receiver **Justin Long** caught 16 passes in the Blue Hens 43-38 win over Maine back on Oct. 2, he broke the UD single game record of 15 set by **Eddie Conti** vs. Connecticut in 1998. Conti's record lasted 69 games before it was broken. This time, it took only three games for Long's new mark to be tied. Fellow junior wide receiver **David Boler** did just that vs. Navy Oct. 30 as he hauled in 16 receptions for 153 yards. The 16 receptions by Long and Boler is the highest total by any NCAA-AAplayer in a single game this season.

**DON'T KICK TO THESE GUYS:** The Blue Hens have gotten a big lift in the punt and kickoff return departments this season from senior **Sidney Haugabrook** and sophomore **Rashaad Woodard**. Delaware leads the Atlantic 10 in both punt returns (11.7 - 25th in NCAA) and kickoff returns (25.4 - No. 2 in NCAA as a team) with Haugabrook leading the Atlantic 10 in both categories. He averages 12.1 yards per punt return to rank No. 16 in NCAA I-AA and 28.1 yards per kickoff returns to rank No. 7 nationally. Woodard averages 24.0 yards per kickoff return but does not have enough attempts to qualify for the Atlantic 10 rankings. Haugabrook already has returned two punts for touchdowns this season - an 80-yarder vs. Towson and a 65-yarder vs. Navy - and has one touchdown on kickoffs (87 yards touchdown vs. Villanova) as well as a 60-yard kickoff returns (vs. Hofstra) to his credit. Haugabrook set or tied three school records vs. Navy Oct. 23, tying school marks for punt return touchdowns in a season (2) and career (3) and breaking **Eddie Conti's** career punt return yardage record (now 907). Among Woodard's highlights is a team-high 69-yard kickoff return vs. Hofstra - a game in which the Hens had two returns of 60 or more yards for the first time in school history.

**ON A ROLL:** The Blue Hens opened the 2004 season riding a six-game winning streak since a 24-14 setback at Northeastern last Nov. 8 but fell to New Hampshire in the opener. The Hens put together another six-game winning streak before falling to I-A Navy and league foe James Madison in consecutive games. Still, the Hens have won 29 of their last 39 games under **K.C. Keeler** and 31 of their last 42 games overall since 2001. The Hens are 45-18 (.714) this decade, including a mark of 30-13 (.698) in conference play.

**GOOD TO LEAD AT HALFTIME:** When Delaware took a 24-21 lead into halftime and moved on to the 31-28 win over William & Mary Oct. 23, it marked the 15th straight game that the Blue Hens had won the game when leading at intermission. That streak was snapped Nov. 6 when the Hens took a 7-6 lead into halftime at James Madison before falling to the Dukes 20-13. The Hens have started another streak of two straight wins in victories over Richmond and Villanova the past two weeks after leading at the break. The Blue Hens have posted an impressive record of 33-4 (.892) this decade when leading at the half and over the last 105 games since 1990, when the Hens have taken a lead into intermission, Delaware is 96-9 (.914). Prior to James Madison, Delaware had not lost a game when leading at halftime since Oct. 19, 2002 when the Hens let a 14-7 halftime lead slip away in a 17-14 overtime setback to Rhode Island in Kingston, RI.

**WELL-GROUNDED:** When **Sean Bleiler** rushed 22 times for a career-high 110 yards and a touchdown in a 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25, it marked the eighth straight game in which the Hens posted a victory when having a runner surpass that 100-yard plateau. That streak was snapped Nov. 6 vs. James Madison when the Hens suffered a 20-13 loss despite **Omar Cuff's** UD freshman record 162 yards rushing. Cuff was at it again vs. Richmond Nov. 13 as he rushed 34 times for 115 yards and one touchdown in a 24-13 win. Having a 100-yard rushing effort almost guarantees Delaware of a victory as the Hens have won 32 of their last 34 games since 1994 when having a runner go for 100 or more yards.

**WONDERFUL WIDEOUTS:** Delaware often deploys three or four and sometimes five wide receivers in its spread offense - leaving plenty of opportunities for the Blue Hen receivers to put up some big numbers. They have taken advantage. And for even better news, Delaware's top four wide receivers are all juniors who will be back next season. Leading the way are **Justin Long** and **David Boler** - who each have posted a school record 16-reception day this season - a high among NCAA I-AAreceivers this season. Long has caught 57 passes for 690 yards and five touchdowns this season and ranks eighth in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (5.2 per game - 43rd in NCAA) while Boler, who missed two games earlier this season with a hamstring pull, has caught 53 passes for 729 yards and one touchdown. He ranks sixth in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (5.9 - 23rd in NCAA) and seventh in receiving yards (81.0 - 29th in NCAA). **Joe Bleymaier** has also come on lately and has caught 28 passes for 317 yards and in successive games caught game-winning touchdowns vs. Hofstra (Oct. 16) and William & Mary (Oct. 23) and snared a career-high six receptions vs. James Madison and Richmond and had a career-high 77 receiving yards vs. Richmond. Another junior - **Brian Ingram** - had struggled of late but came up big vs. James Madison as he caught five passes for 65 yards, all in the Hens' final drive that came up just short. He had not caught a pass since the West Chester game Sept. 18. Boler had caught at least one pass in 28 straight games (No. 2 all-time behind record 38 by Eddie Conti in 1996-98) before having that streak snapped vs. Richmond. Long is working on a streak of 21 straight games and Bleymaier on a nine-game streak. Boler, Long, and Ingram all went over 1,000 career yards receiving last season - marking the first time in school history that the Hens have had three 1,000-yard receivers on the same team. In addition, Ingram caught his 100th career reception vs. Richmond to become just the ninth player in UD history to reach that milestone. **TIGHT ENDS GETTING INVOLVED IN PASSING GAME, TOO!** Junior tight end **Justin LaForgia**, a second-year transfer from the University of Cincinnati, is among the Blue Hen receiving leaders with 22 catches for 149 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high five catches for 29 yards vs. UMass Sept. 25, following up a four-reception performance the week before vs. West Chester when he scored his first career touchdown. Despite nursing a sore shoulder, he caught three passes for 33 yards in the Nov. 13 win over Richmond. While it's not unusual for a tight end to catch passes, it has been at Delaware. Atight end has not led Delaware in receiving for an entire season since **Mark Steimer** had 22 catches for 369 yards in 1981 and no UD tight end has caught over 20 passes in a single season since **Rob Higbee** had 20 catches for 306 yards in 1994 and no tight end has had more than LaForgia's 22 grabs since **John Yergey** hauled in 25 receptions in 1989.

**MAKING HISTORY IN THE TRENCHES:** Delaware freshman **Mike Byrne**, an offensive lineman from Lititz, PA (Manheim Central HS), made history Sept. 18 in the Hens' 21-17 victory over Towson. When starting offensive tackle **Paul Thomson** left the game in the first quarter with an elbow injury, Byrne entered the game, becoming the first true freshman offensive lineman to appear in a game since **Steve Butcher** in 1952. Byrne played the rest of the half before Thomson returned to the lineup in the second half and started again vs. West Chester last week. Byrne earned first team *Associated Press* All-State honors last fall at Manheim Central High School, leading the squad (along with current UD freshman quarterback **Jarryd Moyer**) to the state AAA title. Another Blue Hen freshman has also made history. Redshirt freshman **Rich Beverley**, who started the first two games before being limited with a broken hand, was the first redshirt freshman to start a game at Delaware since **Brian Cook** in 1995. Sophomore **Scott Conley** has since taken over the starting spot. Another redshirt freshman, center **Mark Ciavirella**, made his first career start vs. William & Mary Oct. 23 in place of senior **Chris Edwards** (mononucleosis) and started four straight games before Edwards returned vs. Villanova.

**SURVIVING THE BYE WEEK:** Delaware played 16 straight weeks in 2003 on the way to winning the NCAA I-AA national championship, so when the Hens had a bye week Oct. 9 it was a welcome change. The Hens had just enough to get by Hofstra 20-19, giving Delaware a record of 4-5 in games following a bye week since 1991. The Hens lost four straight between 1991-2000 before winning three straight in 2000-2001. The Hens lost to Villanova 38-34 following a bye week in 2002 before returning to the win column this season.

**HAVEN'T LOST BY MUCH:** Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** squads have posted a record of 29-10 in his three seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 29 victories is a formidable 9.6 points per game. His average losing margin is a paltry 6.1 points per game with only four setbacks over five points and just one over 10 points during his UD career - the 34-20 loss to Navy Oct. 23.

**DELAWARE JOINS THE 600-WIN CLUB:** The Delaware football program reached a significant milestone with the 24-6 win over West Chester Sept. 18 and accomplished what just eighth other schools in I-AA have managed. The Blue Hens now own an all-time overall record of 606-383-44 over 113 seasons, moving them into the 600-win club. Only eight other current NCAA I-AA programs have reached 600 wins all-time - Yale (826), Pennsylvania (776), Harvard (767), Princeton (755), Fordham (720), Dartmouth (637), Lafayette (613), and Lehigh (601).

**A SEASON TO REMEMBER:** The University of Delaware is coming off the finest season in school history as the Blue Hens won their sixth national title in school history, their first ever in NCAA I-AA, and their first since winning the 1979 NCAA II title in 2003. The Hens set a school record with 15 wins in a 15-1 season and were named Lambert Cup Eastern champions for the 18th time and the ECAC Team of the Year for the 10th time. Delaware was also named State Team of the Year by the Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and Local Team of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters. The Hens captured their 14th conference title all-time, including their seventh as a member of the Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 Conference. This season, Delaware and head coach **K.C. Keeler** will be looking to become the first team to repeat as NCAA I-AA national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000.

**A SEASON PREVIEW:** The Blue Hens, who welcomed back 15 starters and 40 letterwinners from last year's national championship team, were the overwhelming No. 1 pre-season pick in both The Sports Network and *USA Today*/ESPN polls selected from I-AA head coaches, sports information directors, and media members. This year marks the first time that Delaware (or any team from the Atlantic 10) was the pre-season No. 1 pick but the Hens appeared in the pre-season poll for the 13th straight season. Delaware received 57 of the 71 first place picks in The Sports Network poll and 26 of the 35 first place votes in the *USA Today*/ESPN poll. In addition, the Blue Hens were the No. 1 pre-season pick by *Street & Smith's Magazine* and *Lindy's Magazine* and picked No. 3 in *Athlon Magazine*. Ironically, Delaware was not picked to finish first in its own Atlantic 10 Conference based on a poll conducted by league coaches and media members. Delaware was picked No. 2 behind Villanova in the Atlantic 10 South Division and ahead of William & Mary, James Madison, Richmond, and league newcomer Towson. In the North Division, Maine was the pre-season No. 1 pick followed by Northeastern, defending league co-champion Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Hofstra.

**NEW UNIFORMS:** The Blue Hens are sporting new Nike uniforms and helmets with new colors this fall. Delaware will go back to its official school color of royal blue for its uniforms and its distinctive helmet. The helmet, which will not change design, had previously consisted of gold and navy or dark blue for its colors. The helmet will now be a royal metallic blue which better matches the royal blue colors in Delaware's new uniforms.

**OH BROTHER!** The Hens have two sets of brother on the team this season - linebackers **Marquez and Mondoe Davis** from Newport News, VA, and freshman defensive backs **Rafiq and Jahiri Gunthorpe** from Brandywine, MD. In addition, redshirt freshman linebacker **Erik Johnson** is the younger brother of Delaware's 2004 All-American defensive end Shawn Johnson, junior linebacker **John Mulhern** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen standout linebackers and captains Pat and Dan, senior running back **Sean Bleiler** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen punter Ryan Bleiler; No. 3 quarterback **T.J. DiMuzio** is the son of former Delaware All-American quarterback Tom DiMuzio, and sophomore DB **Zach Thomas** is the younger brother of New Hampshire senior DB Aaron Thomas.

**GETTING PHYSICAL:** According to University of Delaware strength and conditioning coach **Russell Barbarino**, the current Blue Hen roster is stronger and more fit than any other in school history. Broken records in spring and summer testing - including strength, speed, and agility drills - have become commonplace. Each summer Barbarino conducts a Best Conditioned Athlete contest with the overall winner having the most points from a battery of tests. And this year, for the second time in three seasons, senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** was named the winner. Cross earned first place with 3,239 points followed by LB **Mondoe Davis** (3,082), and RB **Sean Bleiler** (2,961). Individual position leaders were Cross (defensive line), Davis (big skill), Bleiler (offensive sk), **SidneyHaugabrook** (defensive backs), and **Mark Ciavirella** (offensive line). Individual event leaders were Ciavirella (bench press - 455 lbs.), Davis (squat lift - 675 lbs.), LB **RyanMcDermond** (agility - 3.97); DL **Bubba Jespersen** (225 lb. lift - 27 times); Cross (vertical jump - 40 inches; power clean lift - 355 lbs.), and DB **Jeff Robinson** (broad jump - 11-2).

**IN THE PROS:** The National Football League career of former University of Delaware standout quarterback **Rich Gannon** has been well-documented. The former All-American still rates among the top signal callers in the NFL and he was the league Most Valuable Player in 2002 when he led the Oakland Raiders to a berth in the Super Bowl. But Gannon isn't the only former Blue Hen chasing professional glory. He is one of five former Delaware players currently on NFL rosters. Quarterback **AndyHall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson**, both 2003 All-Americans who led Delaware to the NCAA I-AA title last fall, are on the practice squads of the Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans respectively. Johnson was picked up after being released by Oakland in the pre-season. Also for the Hens, 2003 co-captain, DB **Mike Adams**, has been activated for several games and has played for San Francisco 49ers this season; 2002 leading rusher **Keith Burnell** signed to the New York Jets practice squad in early October after earlier being released; Adams' fellow co-captain last season, OG **Jason Nerys** (New York Jets), had been a member of the New York Jets practice squad for three weeks before being released in October but has been picked up by the Seattle Seahawks practice squad. In addition to those five, former Delaware wide receiver **Jamin Elliott** was released by the Chicago Bears during the pre-season.

**LB Mondoe Davis** (Graduate Student, Newport News, VA)...All-American candidate as a middle linebacker...two-time All-Atlantic 10 selection, including first team honors in 2004...has played 47 career games with 44 starts...leads team with 98 tackles (12th in Atlantic 10 - 8.9 per game), two interceptions, four pass breakups, two forced fumbles, 5.5 tackles for loss, and two sacks...has posted 10 or more tackles four times this season with season-high 13 each vs. Towson and Massachusetts...surpassed the 300 career tackle mark vs. Navy and ranks No. 8 all-time at Delaware with 317...seven career forced fumbles is one shy of school record eight by Kenny Bailey in 1993-96...younger brother, Marquez, is a key backup redshirt freshman linebacker for Blue Hens this season.

**DL Chris Mooney** (Sr., Huntington, NY)...All-American candidate...three-time All-Atlantic 10 selection, including first team honors this year...has played all 49 career games with 36 starts...versatile player who has performed well at both end and tackle throughout his career at Delaware...three-time member of CoSIDA District 2 All-Academic team, including being a first team selection this year after second team selections in 2002 and 2003...accounting major...has 10 tackles for loss (No. 2 on team) and 6.5 sacks (No. 2 on team; No. 5 in Atlantic 10) for 56 yards in 2004...had at least one sack in three straight games prior to William & Mary...team's active career leader with 30.5 tackles for loss and 16 sacks.

**DL Tom Parks** (Jr., Pittsburgh, PA)...All-American candidate...tackle who has been a dominating force in Delaware defensive line interior this season...first team All-Atlantic 10 selection this fall...leads Atlantic 10 with 10 sacks (for 56 yards) and ranks fifth with 15 tackles for loss (65 yards)...ranks eighth on the team with 42 total tackles...had career-high 10 tackles in opener vs. New Hampshire and has recorded two sacks each three times...CoSIDA Academic All-American nominee.

**QB Sonny Riccio** (Jr., Franklin, PA)...first-year transfer from the University of Missouri...has completed 221 of 371 passes for 2,288 yards, 13 touchdowns, and 11 interceptions...has surpassed the 2,000-yard mark this season - a total reached by just eight players in UD history...his 221 completions are 13 shy of the UD single season mark of 234 set by Andy Hall (in 16 games) last season and his 371 attempts are 8 shy of Hall's record 379 last year...had thrown a touchdown pass in all 10 games this season - the longest streak by a UD player since Matt Nagy's school record 14 straight in 2000 - before being held without one vs. Villanova...has thrown for over 200 yards five times and over 300 yards twice...one of just four players in UD history to have multiple 300+ yard passing games in a career, joining Matt Nagy (six in 1997-00), Rich Gannon (two in 1985-87), and Tom DiMuzio (two in 1967-69)...had record-breaking day in 41-38 win over Maine Oct. 2, setting school records with 33 completions (old mark 28 by Andy Hall vs. UMass, 2003), 55 pass attempts (old mark 45 by B.J. **WR David Boler** (Jr., Covina, CA)...third-year starter at wide receiver...third team All-Atlantic 10 selection in 2004...team's second leading receiver this season with 53 catches for 729 yards (team-high 13.8 avg.) and one touchdown...had caught 10 or more passes in two straight games and gained 100 or more yards in three straight (two shy of UD record) entering the Richmond game but was held without a catch, snapping a 28-game pass catching streak (No. 2 all-time at Delaware - record is 38)...came back to catch five passes for 108 yards vs. Villanova, including two long acrobatic catches that set up Delaware touchdowns...has seven career 100-yard receiving efforts...sixth in the Atlantic 10 and 23rd in NCAA with 5.9 receptions per game and seventh in Atlantic 10 and 29th in the NCAA with 81.0 yards receiving per game...tied UD single game record for pass receptions (with teammate Justin Long) with 16 catches for 153 yards vs. Navy...had 10 receptions vs. James Madison, nine receptions vs. Maine, and a career-high 155 yards receiving vs. William & Mary...became eighth player in UD history to reach 100 career receptions vs. Hofstra...for his career has 140 receptions (No. 5 all-time at UD) for 1,834 yards (No. 5) and 13 touchdowns (No. 8)...has two receptions over 60 yards this season.

# 2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

New Hampshire .....24

#1 DELAWARE .....21

**NEWARK, DE --** Redshirt freshman QB Ricky Santos took over for injured starter Mike Granieri in the first half and hit on 10 of 11 passes for 146 yards and threw a game-clinching 44-yard touchdown pass to David Ball early in the fourth quarter as New Hampshire upset top-ranked and defending NCAA I-AA national champion Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

The Wildcats, who defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time in school history, held the lead for the entire game before Delaware went up 21-17 on a seven-yard touchdown run by Sean Bleiler with 13:56 left to play. But New Hampshire came right back on its next possession and moved 67 yards on eight plays for the what proved to be the winning score when Santos hit Ball across the middle for a 44-yard pass play.

Delaware, which won its final six games on the way to capturing the 2003 NCAA I-AA title with a 15-1 mark, had a 10-game home win streak as the sellout crowd of 22,727 went home disappointed. The Hens lost just their second season opener in the last 10 years.

Granieri, a third-year starter and widely considered one of the best quarterbacks in the Atlantic 10, went down with a season-ending knee injury midway through the second half. But Santos was up to the task in relief in leading UNH to the win.

New Hampshire running back R.J. **NEWARK, DE --** SidneyHaugabrook ignited Delaware with an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter and Niquan Lee scored the game-winner with a one-yard dive with 7:26 left to play as No. 7 Delaware rallied to defeat Towson 21-17 in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens (1-1, 1-0) overcame a sluggish offensive effort and three interceptions by Towson's Allante Harrison to take the early Atlantic 10 lead. Towson (1-1, 0-1), a first-year member of the Atlantic 10 after seven years in the Patriot League, almost pulled the big upset.

It was a defensive struggle for most of the evening as Delaware managed just 213 total yards and Towson tallied just 152. The game also featured 17 punts and four turnovers before the Hens pulled out the win. The 213 total yards by theBlue Hens was the lowest total in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler.

Towson took the early lead when Corle scored from four yards out to cap a 43-yard drive that consumed over five minutes. The sluggish Delaware offensive was finally ignited with 7:16 left in the third quarter when Haugabrook took a punt at his own 20-yard line, dodged a trio of tacklers, and romped 80 yards for his second career punt return for a touchdown.

The tie was short-lived though as Will Marcus returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to set up a career-long 41-yard field goal by Towson's Stephan Toth, giving the Tigers a 10-7 edge with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The rest of the scoring took place in the final quarter as the Hens took the lead on a six-yard pass from Sonny Riccio to Justin Long to cap a 14-play, 74-yard drive and give Delaware a 14-10 lead with 13:15 remaining. But back came Towson again as Harrison picked off his third pass of the game, and his fifth in two games this season, and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 17-14 lead with 12:39 remaining.

With Towson facing a second and three at its own 27-yard line midway through the final stanza, Goldbeck made an errant pitch to Miles and Chris Mooney recovered for the Hens. After Sean Bleiler gained 12 yards on two carries, Lee leaped over from the one-yard line for what proved to be the winning score.

Towson put one last drive together and got down to the Delaware 23-yard line but the Hens threw Miles for a one-yard loss and Goldbeck's four-yard pass to Jim Alexander on fourth down was short of the first down. Delaware closed out the win by getting two first downs, including runs of 14 and 20 yards by Lee.

**NEWARK, DE --** Sonny Riccio threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score and the Delaware defense forced three turnovers as the No. 6 Blue Hens handled local rival West Chester.

Riccio, a first-year transfer from Missouri, had by far his best game in three starts as he hit on 20 of 31 passes for a career-high 217 yards and threw touchdown passes to tight end JustinLaForgia and wide receiver Justin Long. He also ran for a one-yard score to spark the Blue Hens (2-1) to their second straight win and their 18th win in their last 20 home games before a third straight sellout crowd.

The Hens have now defeated NCAAADivision II West Chester (2-2)11 straight times and 14 times in the last 15 meetings. The win also gave the Delaware football program its 600th win all-time as the Hens became just the eighth current NCAAI-AA program to reach that victory total.

West Chester played tough defensively but could not overcome three turnovers and just 222 total yards of offense. Quarterback Bob Findora hit on 16 of 29 passes for 153 yards but was intercepted twice. Brent Steinmetz, who transferred to West Chester from Delaware last spring, led theRam running attack with 43 yards.

Delaware enjoyed a balanced effort as the Hens managed 431 total yards, including 214 on the ground and 217 through the air. Delaware's running back trio of redshirt freshmanLonnie Starks (81 yards), sophomore Niquan Lee (68 yards), and senior Sean Bleiler (52 yards) led the way. Long caught six passes for 81 yards and notched his 100th career reception.

The Blue Hen defense, led by Mondoe Davis' four tackles, one interception, two pass breakups, and once forced fumble, came up with another big defensive effort, holding West Chester to 222 yards and holding a 13-minute advantage in possession time.

Neither team could get anything going offensively until midway through the second half when the Hens got on the board first, driving 75 yards on 10 plays and capping the drive when Riccio hit a diving LaForgia in the end zone for a 7-0 lead. **AMHERST, MA --** Sean Bleiler rushed for a career-high 110 yards, Sonny Riccio fired two touchdown passes, and the Delaware defensive came up with another dominating effort as the No. 4 ranked Blue Hens knocked off No. 16 Massachusetts in a battle of last year's Atlantic 10 Conference co-champions.

The Blue Hens (3-1, 2-0 Atlantic 10), who downed UMass 51-45 in three overtimes in a classic battle the previous year, used defense this time to pick up their third straight win and hand the Minutemen (2-2, 0-2 A-10) their second straight setback.

Bleiler rushed 22 times for 110 yards and one score, an eight-yard burst with 1:41 left to play, that gave the Hens some breathing room. The bruising senior, a first-year regular in the UD backfield, registered his first career 100-yard rushing game and consistently came up big on several third down plays throughout the game.

Delaware, which has now defeated UMass three times in the last four meetings, had taken the lead for good when Riccio, who completed 11 of 18 passes for 115 yards and also rushed for 70 yards, hit David Boler on a 10-yard fade pattern in the back of the end zone. Boler, who missed the previous two games with a hamstring injury, went high to haul in Riccio's lob pass and pulled it down just inside the end line. That score gave the Hens a 14-7 lead with 12:21 remaining.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Hens opened the scoring with 9:27 left before halftime as they drove 81 yards in six plays and capped the drive with Riccio hitting Joe Bleymaier across the middle for a 26-yard scoring pass.

Massachusetts came right back to the tie the game with 5:18 left in the second quarter behind a 12-play, 76-yard drive that was finished off when Tim Day hit Brandon London with a nine-yard scoring pass. Day, the national leader in passing efficiency entering the game, hit on 12 of 23 passes for 114 yards on the day.

Delaware's defensive stifled Massachusetts all day, holding the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards and sacking Day twice. The Blue Hens held All-American wide receiver Jason Peebler to just one reception for seven yards - on UMass' first offensive play of the day. He had entered the game with 13 receptions for 435 yards and five touchdowns. UMass running back Steve Baylark gained 94 yards on 17 carries but never got into the end zone.

Middle linebacker Mondoe Davis led the Hens with 13 tackles while brother Marquez Davis got his first career start in place of injured John Mulhern and had seven tackles and forced a fumble. SidneyHaugabrook added his second interception of the season and returned it 38 yards to stop a Massachusetts drive in the second half.

Charles Walker recorded a school record 23 tackles for UMass,including two sacks.

**NEWARK, DE --** Sonny Riccio hit wide receiver Joe Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left to play as No. 3 Delaware rallied from two 14-point deficits for the win.

The Blue Hens (6-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) won their fifth straight game while William & Mary (5-2, 3-1) had a five-game winning streak snapped despite an outstanding effort from QB Lang Campbell and WR Dominique Thompson.

Campbell hit on 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and four touchdowns while Thompson caught six passes for a school-record 244 yards, including scoring catches of 10, 62, and 87 yards in the first quarter as the Tribe took a 21-7 lead. Campbell and Thompson hooked up again on a 64-yard scoring toss with 12:15 left in the game to give William & Mary its last lead at 28-24.

Riccio hit on 24 of 40 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns while Justin Long caught 11 passes for 108 yards and caught a five-yard scoring pass from Riccio with 8:33 left in the second quarter to cut the lead to 21-14. FB Niquan Lee also added two short touchdown runs and David Boler caught seven passes for 155 yards.

The two teams combined for 42 first downs and 836 total yards but Delaware took advantage of a William & Mary turnover and a blocked punt to gain the edge.

William & Mary stormed out to the 14-0 lead in the first four minutes of the game as Campbell hit Thompson on a 10-yard scoring pass to cap the Tribe's first drive of the day and the two hooked up again moments later as Thompson caught a short pass in the flat, broke a tackle, and scampered 62 yards for a touchdown to for the 14-0 lead.

Delaware answered on Riccio's five-yard scoring toss to Long but Campbell and Thompson hooked up again, this time with Campbell firing a pass over the Delaware defense and Thompson speeding 87 yards to the touchdown.

But the Blue Hens buckled down and held William & Mary scoreless the entire second quarter to take a 24-21 lead into halftime. Mark Moore recovered a fumble to set up a two-yard scoring run by Lee, Craig Browne blocked a punt to set up Brad Shushman's 43-yard field goal that just bounced over the cross bar, and Lee followed with another short scoring run. Long receptions by Boler set up two of the scores.

After a scoreless third quarter, William & Mary regained the lead on the 64-yard pass play from Campbell to Thompson but the Hens answered one more time as Bleymaier's lone catch of the day was the game-winner, the second straight game he was the hero.

**ANNAPOLIS, MD--** Delaware saw its six-game win streak come to an end as Navy quarterback Aaron Polanco and fullback Kyle Eckel led a dominating running attack and paced the Mids to the Homecoming victory.

No. 3 ranked Delaware (6-2) held a 10-7 lead late in the first half but Navy took advantage of Sidney Haugabrook's fumble on a punt return to take a 14-10 halftime lead and scored twice in the third quarter to take control. The Mids (7-1), who received votes in both national polls this week, avenged a 21-17 setback to the Blue Hens a year earlier.

Polanco rushed for 64 yards and three touchdowns and also threw for another score and Eckel carried 23 times for 143 yards and one score as Navy rolled up 441 total yards, including 366 on the ground. The 441 yards were the most allowed by Delaware this season and the 366 rushing yards was the 11th highest total ever allowed by a UD squad.

Blue Hen quarterback Sonny Riccio and wide receiver David Boler combined for an outstanding effort through the air. Riccio hit on 30 of 50 passes for 255 yards and one touchdown and Boler caught a school-record tying 16 passes for 153 yards. Boler tied the UD record set just four weeks earlier by teammate Justin Long. The Hens managed just 59 yards rushing.

Navy opened the scoring on a 22-yard run by Polanco but the Hens responded to take a 10-7 lead as Riccio hit Niquan Lee on a five-yard scoring toss across the middle and Brad Shushman added a 35-yard field goal with 6:20 left before halftime.

The Mids took advantage of a UD miscue to take the lead late in the half when Haugabrook fumbled a punt return and Mick Yokitis recovered on the Blue Hen 11-yard line. Three plays later Polanco found Eric Roberts on a six-yard pass play as Navy took a 14-10 lead into intermission.

Navy put the game away in the third quarter as Polanco scored on two short touchdown runs, the first with 6:28 left in the third quarter that capped a 12-play, 99-yard drive. The second score gave Navy an insurmountable 27-10 lead.

Shushman kicked a 23-yard field early in the final quarter but Eckel came back with a short touchdown run to put Navy back up 24-13. Haugabrook capped the scoring with a 65-yard punt return for a touchdown with just 46 seconds left to play, his second touchdown of the season and third of his career.

**HARRISONBURG, VA --** Delaware piled up yards virtually at will most of the day against the James Madison defense, but two late special teams mistakes and the inability to get the ball into the end zone when it counted resulted in the loss to the Dukes in a battle for first place in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

Delaware piled up 466 total yards - 300 more than JMU - and held a 15-minute advantage in time of possession but an 87-yard punt return for a touchdown by Cortez Thompson with 3:04 left to play was the difference as the No. 6 ranked Blue Hens (6-3, 5-1 Atlantic 10) suffered their first conference setback of the season.

No. 7 ranked James Madison (8-1, 6-0), seeking its first A-10 title since 1999, won its sixth straight game as it took advantage of three interceptions and 299 total returns yards on the afternoon. The Dukes downed the Hens for the first time since 1999 and took sole possession of first place in the Atlantic 10.

The Blue Hens, who had defeated seven straight Top 10 opponents since last season, had the chance to win the game late as they drove 70 yards on 11 plays down to the James Madison three-yard line in the final minute of play. But Sonny Riccio threw three straight incomplete passes into the end zone and the Dukes held on for the win. The Hens converted two third downs and one fourth down during the drive, including a six-yard pass from Riccio to David Boler to the three yard line on a fourth down and four.

Delaware had the chance to take the lead with 5:12 left in the game and the score tied at 13-13 but Brad Shushman's 19-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Rodney McCarter - the senior's school-record eighth career kick block.

Riccio threw for over 200 yards for the third straight game as he hit on 27 of 48 passes for 292 yards and a touchdown but the junior was intercepted three times. Boler had his third straight 100-yard receiving effort with 10 receptions for 114 yards while freshman halfback Omar Cuff carried the ball 34 times for 162 yards in his first career start. The 162 yards broke the UD freshman record of 151 by Daryl Brown in 1991 vs. Maine while his attempts were the second highest total in school history. Delaware lost for just the second time in the last 33 games when having a player rush for over 100 yards.

James Madison quarterback Justin Rascati hit on 9 of 21 passes for 103 yards and one touchdown, an 18-yarder to Ardon Bransford four minutes into the game that gave the Dukes a 7-0 lead. The Dukes gained just 166 total yards, including just 63 on the ground, but made up for it with big gains on interceptions and on special teams.

**RICHMOND, VA --** Delaware jumped out to a 20-0 halftime lead and took advantage of four Richmond turnovers and three field goals from Brad Shushman to hold on for the crucial Atlantic 10 victory.

The No. 11 Blue Hens (7-3, 6-1), stinging from back-to-back losses to Navy and James Madison, recovered four fumbles, held Richmond to 288 total yards, and held a 21-minute advantage in possession to stay in contention for a share of the Atlantic 10 title and an NCAA playoff berth. Richmond (3-7, 2-5 A-10) lost for the fifth time in its last six games.

The turnovers were the story as the Spiders coughed the ball up three times in the first half, leading to 10 Delaware points as the Blue Hens took a 20-0 lead into intermission. Richmond took advantage of a sluggish Delaware offense and favorable wind conditions in the second half to close the gap to 20-14, but Shushman connected on his third field goal of the day with 10:07 left to up the Hens' lead to 23-14 and Tom Parks blocked a 39-yard field goal attempt by Richmond's Carter Ball with 6:29 left to preserve the win.

As they did most of the day, the Hens then ran out the clock with a strong running game, burning the final 6:29 as Omar Cuff carried 11 times for 42 yards to finish off the Spiders. Cuff, a true freshman who began the year as a defensive back, continued his impressive ascent as he carried 34 times for 115 yards. As a team, Delaware picked up 214 yards on the ground, converted 13 of 23 third downs, and held to the ball for 41:02 to the Spiders' 18:58. Delaware has now won 17 straight games and when committing less turnovers than its opponents.

The Blue Hens opened the scoring on their first possession of the day as they got the ball at the 10-yard line and proceeded to drive 90 yards on 19 plays in nine minutes and 20 seconds, going up 7-0 on a one-yard burst by Cuff. Delaware ran the ball 16 times during the drive with Cuff carried 10 times for 37 yards during that span.

The Hens extended the lead to 14-0 when Kyle Campbell recovered a fumble by Tim Hightower which led to a 12-yard scoring toss from Sonny Riccio to Joe Bleymaier. Shushman pushed the lead to 20-0 with field goals from 25 yards with 1:46 left in the half and a 42-yarder on the final play of the half. The first field goal was set up when Sidney Haugbrook recovered a fumble by David Freeman and the second when Chris Radford's punt travelled just 11 yards, giving the Hens the ball at the 39-yard line.

Richmond rallied in the second half as Ryan Mace's 40-yard punt return set up an 11-yard scoring run by Freeman (97 yards) and Stacy Tutt hit Freeman for a 25-yard screen pass for another score, cutting the lead to 20-14 with 14:15 remaining.

NEWARK, DE -- Omar Cuff matched a school record by scoring four touchdowns and Delaware held off a late Villanova surge to post the victory and claim a share of its second straight Atlantic 10 Conference title.

The 11th ranked Blue Hens built a seemingly safe 41-21 lead early in the fourth quarter but had to hold off the Wildcats (6-5, 3-5), who scored three times in the final nine minutes and had the chance to tie it before Kyle Campbell intercepted a desperation pass by Marvin Burroughs deep inside Delaware territory on the final play of the game.

The Hens took a 24-7 lead into halftime as Cuff scored twice on short runs, the second with just 28 seconds left in the stanza. Brad Shushman added a 26-yard field goal while SidneyHaugabrook gave the Hens the lead for good at 14-7 with an 87-yard kickoff returns for a touchdown midway through the first quarter.
