GAME PREVIEW

Two of the hottest teams in the East square off this week as Delaware, the No. 3 ranked team in NCAA I-AA football, hits the road for a non-conference matchup with a I-A Navy squad that received votes in this week's national top 25 polls. The Hens are 6-1 with a six-game winning streak, including back-to-back comeback wins over Hofstra (20-19 on Oct. 16) and 31-28 over No. 14 ranked William & Mary this past Saturday. Navy is also 6-1 this season as the Mids opened 5-0 before falling to Notre Dame Oct. 16. However, they rebounded with a 14-13 win over Rice Saturday, extending their home winning streak to six games since last year's 21-17 loss to Delaware. A sold-out crowd will be on hand to celebrate Navy's Homecoming.



THE SERIES

This week's game is the 13th meeting between these regional rivals with the series all tied at 6-6. The teams first met in 1931 with Navy winning 12-7 in Annapolis, but the series did not continue until 1985 when Delaware posted a 16-13 win in Newark. Navy had won two straight meetings before Delaware posted a 21-17 comeback victory last season at Navy Marine Corps Stadium before a Homecoming crowd of 34,982. LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE:

Junior QB **Sonny Riccio** hit WR **Joe Bleymaier** on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left to play as No. 3 ranked Delaware rallied from two 14-point deficits in the first half to post a 31-28 victory over William & Mary in a battle of unbeaten Atlantic 10 Football Conference foe Saturday afternoon at Delaware Stadium. The Blue Hens (6-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) won their sixth straight game and remained tied for the Atlantic 10 lead with James Madison. The defending NCAA-AA champion Blue Hens, now off to a 5-0 record in league play for the second straight year, mounted their second big comeback win in as many weeks after rallying from a 19-7 fourth quarter deficit to down Hofstra 21-19 the previous week. Riccio hit on 24 of 40 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns while junior **Justin Long** caught 11 passes for 108 yards and caught a five-yard scoring pass from Riccio with 8:33 left in the second quarter to cut the Tribe lead to 21-14. Fullback **Niquan Lee** also added two short touchdown runs and **David Boler** caught seven passes for 155 yards, setting up two Blue Hen scores with long gains.

LAST WEEK FOR NAVY

The Mids rebounded from the previous week's loss to Notre Dame as they improved to 6-1 with a 14-13 win over Rice Saturday at Navy Marine Corps Stadium, remaining unbeaten in four home games this season. Navy jumped out to a 14-0 lead after three quarters on a one-yard scoring run by Frank Divis and a fumble recovery in the end zone by Corey Dryden and had to hold on to post the win over Rice (3-4). Rice had the chance to tie the game with 4:41 left but Brennan Landry missed an extra point and the Mids held the rest of the way. Navy QB Aaron Polanco, a first-year starter, ran 33 times for 179 yards to lead the offense while the defense held Rice, the nation's leading rushing team, to just 223 yards on 53 carries, well below its average of 345.7 yards per game.

- The series is all tied at 6-6, including a deadlock of 4-4 in games at Annapolis, MD
- The teams first met in 1931, resumed the series in 1986, and after another seven-year hiatus, began the series again last season
- Six of the 12 games have been decided by five points or less
- The teams played ever season for eight straight years between 1985-92 with Delaware winning five of those games
- Delaware rallied for its second biggest second half comeback in school history in 1991 when the Hens pulled out a 29-25 win after trailing the Mids 25-7 at halftime at Navy-Marine Corps Stadium.

LAST MEETING

Delaware 21, Navy 17

October 25, 2004 • Annapolis, MD

ANNAPOLIS, MD -- It was a monumental victory for Delaware, which fell behind 14-0 early and rallied for the upset over I-A Navy, spoiling Homecoming festivities for the Mids.

The No. 3 ranked Blue Hens (8-0), who downed their first I-A foe since a win over Navy in 1992, took advantage of three Navy turnovers and used scoring runs by Andy Hall, Antawn Jenkins, and Germaine Bennett to clinch the victory. The crowd of 34,982 was the second largest to ever view a Delaware football game.

Navy (5-3), looking for its first Bowl bid since 1996, had a three-game winning streak snapped and ended the game with quarterback Craig Candeto's pass being tipped away in the end zone by UD safety Dave Camburn.

The defense told the story for the Hens, who won despite season-low totals in points (21), first downs (15), and total yards (272), snapping a streak of eight straight games with over 400 yards of offense. But Delaware's defense recovered two fumbles, intercepted a pass, and held the Midshipmen, which entered the game as the top rushing attack in I-A with 321.9 yards per game, to just 180 yards on the ground.

DELAWARE NOTES OF INTEREST

BLUE HENS LOOKING FOR LUCKY SEVEN: After losing their season opener Sept. 2 to New Hampshire, the Hens have put together a six-game winning streak and enter this week's game vs. Navy with a 6-1 overall mark and tied for first place in the Atlantic 10 South Division standings with a 5-0 record (James Madison is also 5-0). This week the Hens will be trying to start the season 7-1 or better for the second straight year (8-0 last year on the way to a 9-0 start) and for the eighth time in the last 14 seasons since 1991. The Hens also started out 8-0 in 1995 and 2000 and started 7-1 in 1991, 1992, 1996, and 1997, advancing to post-season play each of those seasons. The Hens have opened Atlantic 10 play at 5-0 for the second straight year (6-0 last year) but for just the fifth time since joining the Atlantic 10 (Yankee Conference) in 1986. Delaware started out 5-0 in 1992, 1995, 2000, and 2003 and advanced to post-season each of those seasons.

WINNING SEASON ALREADY IN THE BAG....AGAIN: After posting a 4-6 mark in 2001 and a 6-6 record in 2002, the first consecutive non-winning seasons at Delaware since 1960-61, Delaware returned to winning ways in 2003, going 15-1 and capturing the NCAA I-AA title. The winning ways are continuing this year as the Hens already stand at 6-1, a mark that guarantees Delaware of its second straight winning season and its 15th in the last 17 seasons.

CALL THEM THE COMEBACK KIDS: Delaware might be 6-1 and working on a six-game winning streak, but things certainly have not been easy this season. The Hens have trailed at some point in the second half in four of the team's six victories this season.

Consider the following comebacks.

Sept. 11 vs. Towson (W, 21-17) - Delaware trailed 7-0 midway through the third quarter before Sidney Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to spark the Hens. Delaware again trailed 17-14 before Niquan Lee's one-yard scoring run with 7:26 left but the Hens up for good.

Oct. 2 vs. #8 Maine (W, 43-38) - Delaware jumped out to a 21-0 lead but Maine rallied back and led 38-37 after a field goal with 7:12 remaining. But Delaware came back to win when Niquan Lee scored on a one-yard dive with 45 seconds left for the 43-38 win.

Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (W, 20-19) - The Hens trailed 19-7 entering the final quarter but rallied as a one-yard touchdown run by Lee cut the lead to 19-14 with 13:23 left and the Hens won it when Sonny Riccio hit Joe Bleymaier on a six-yard scoring pass with 6:09 left.

Oct. 23 vs. #14 William & Mary (W, 31-28) - Riccio and Bleymaier once again hooked up to lead the Blue Hen comeback. Delaware trailed by 14 points twice in the first quarter and came back to take the lead early in the fourth quarter, only to lose it again on a 64-yard pass play with 12:15 left. But the Hens mounted a 77-yard drive that was capped when Riccio hit Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left.

JUST CAN'T WAIT TO GET ON THE ROAD AGAIN: The Blue Hens hit the road for the third time this week as they head to NCAA I-A Navy. Fortunately for Delaware, the road has not been too unkind. The Hens have posted a 2-0 mark on the road this season with a 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25 and a 20-19 win at Hofstra Oct. 16. Delaware has now won four straight road games dating back to last season, including the NCAA I-AA title game win over Colgate in Chattanooga, TN, and are 8-1 in their last nine road games since a 17-7 loss at Massachusetts back on Nov. 2, 2002. The Hens' last road loss was a 24-14 setback at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003.

PERFECT VS. NAVY: No one on this year's Delaware team has ever experienced a loss to Navy on the football field, and that goes for first-year transfer **Garron Bible** as well. The senior free safety is a first-year transfer from Notre Dame where he played the previous three seasons and enjoyed a 3-0 record against the Midshipmen. He was part of a 34-16 win in 2001 at Notre Dame, a 30-23 victory in 2002 in Baltimore, and last year's 27-24 win at Notre Dame. Last season, when the Hens defeated Navy, two transfers to the Blue Hens had also never lost to Navy during their college career. DE Shawn Johnson had been part of Duke team that knocked off Navy 43-17 in 2002 and QB Andy Hall was at Georgia Tech when the Jackets defeated Navy 49-14 in 1999, 40-13 in 2000, and 70-7 in 2001.

Delaware went three plays and out on its first drive and Navy wasted no time with its chances. The Mids marched 63 yards and went up 7-0 on a one-yard dive by Tony Lane with 8:40 left in the opening quarter and went up 14-0 just 68 seconds later when Candeto hit Eric Roberts on a 66-yard scoring pass down the middle.

The Hens looked like they would be halted again, but Sean Bleiler's 24-yard run for a first down off a fake punt extended a drive that resulted in a one-yard dive by Jenkins on the first play of the second quarter. The 16-play, 80-yard drive cut the lead to 14-7.

Delaware then sent the game tied into halftime at 14-14 with two big defensive plays. John Mulhern intercepted a Candeto pass at the five-yard line to halt one drive and Shawn Johnson recovered a Candeto fumble at the Navy 27-yard line with 47 seconds left in the half. Delaware capitalized with a five-yard scoring dash by Hall 16 seconds before halftime.

Navy, which earlier in the season had posted a 28-25 win over No. 22 Air Force, turned the ball over again early in the third quarter when Mulhern recovered a fumble by Frank Divis at the Mids' 27-yard line, but the Hens couldn't capitalize as Hall was intercepted inside the five-yard line by Eddie Carthan.

But Navy could not capitalize either and the Hens followed with the eventual game-winner when Bennett, on a fourth-and-one, sprinted around the left side for a 28-yard scoring run, giving UD a 21-14 lead with 9:29 left in the third stanza.

Navy could muster only a 41-yard field goal by Eric Rolfs with 10:49 left the rest of the way. The Mids were halted on their last two possessions when the Hens broke up Candeto passes on fourth down plays.

ATLANTIC 10 RANKED TOP NCAA I-AA CONFERENCE: The Atlantic 10 Football Conference is ranked first among the 15 NCAA I-AA conference according to the latest Sagarin Conference rankings announced Sunday. The Atlantic 10 was also ranked higher than the I-A Mid-American Conference and Sun Belt Conference. Among I-AA conferences, Delaware's 60.80 ranking was higher than No. 2. Great West (57.31), No. 3 Big Sky (56.48), No. 4 Southland (55.48), and No. 5 Gateway (55.17) among the top five.

CONTINUING ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS: This fall the Blue Hens will look to capture consecutive league titles for the first time since sharing the league title with Villanova and New Hampshire in 1991 and winning the title outright in 1992. Delaware is looking to become the first Atlantic 10 team to share a piece of the league title in consecutive years since New Hampshire accomplished the feat in 1996-97. Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th Atlantic 10 victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Hens are now 106-44 (.706) all-time since joining the league in 1986. Delaware is also 12-7 all-time in Atlantic 10 openers, including this year's 21-17 win over Towson Sept. 11.

POLL TALK: Delaware, the No. 1 pick in the pre-season polls released by both TheSports Network and USA Today/ESPN, remained at No. 3 in both polls again this week. Delaware has now appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 poll for 24 straight weeks since the 2003 season and have appeared in the top 10 for 21 straight weeks.

THIS DEFENSE NEVER RESTS.....: Despite allowing season-highs of 38 points and 397 total yards in the 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2, the Blue Hen defense still remains one of the top units not only in the Atlantic 10 but in all of NCAA I-AA football. Delaware's defense currently ranks second in rushing defense (87.7 - No. 7 in NCAA I-AA), second in total defense (277.6 - 10th in NCAA), second in scoring defense (19.9 ppg - 31st in NCAA), fourth in passing defense (189.8 - 49th in NCAA), and fourth in passing efficiency defense (116.1 - 49th in NCAA). Delaware has held 12 straight opponents under 400 yards of total offense since allowing 518 to Massachusetts in a 51-45 triple overtime win last Nov. 15.

The Hens have enjoyed outstanding success on defense in almost every game this season, below are some highlights.

- **Sept. 11 vs. Towson (21-17)** - Held Tigers to just nine first downs and 152 yards, the lowest total allowed by Delaware since The Citadel managed just 92 yards in a 38-0 Delaware win in 2000.
- **Sept. 18 vs. West Chester (24-6)** - Held Rams to one touchdown, 15 first downs, and 222 total yards
- **Sept. 25 vs. Massachusetts (21-7)** - Held the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards
- **Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (20-19)** - Forced three turnovers, collected four sacks, and held A-10's team leader in scoring, passing offense, and total defense to just 12 first downs, 152 passing yards, and 221 total yards. Hofstra scored its only points on four field goals and on a bobbled snap on a punt that was recovered for a touchdown.
- **Oct. 23 vs. William & Mary (31-28)** - Allowed just 30 rushing yards for the game.

....AND NEITHER DOES THE OFFENSE: After being held without a point in the first quarter in the first four games of the season (the longest first quarter scoreless streak since 1974-75), the Hens broke out in a big way vs. Maine Oct. 2, scoring 13 points in the first quarter and 30 for the first half on the way to the 43-38 victory. Following the 31-28 win over William & Mary this past Saturday, the Hens are now averaging 25.8 points and 372.0 total yards per game and have extended their scoring streak to 105 straight game since a 27-0 loss to Villanova in 1996. In addition, the Hens have scored 10 or more points in 25 straight games and in 119 of their last 128 games (93 percent) since 1994. Currently, the Hens have also scored 20 or more points in 13 straight games since a 24-14 loss at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003 and have scored 20 or more points at Delaware Stadium 21 straight times since a 10-6 win over Richmond Nov. 10, 2001. The Blue Hens have not suffered a shutout in a span of 141 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 45 games since that 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996. The last time Delaware was held under 10 points was Nov. 2, 2002 when the Hens fell to Massachusetts 17-7 at McGuirk Stadium while the last time they were held in single digits at home was in a 10-7 season-opening loss to Rhode Island Aug. 30, 2001 - a span of 25 games.

MANY HAPPY RETURNS: The Blue Hens have gotten a big lift in the punt and kickoff return departments lately from senior **Sidney Haugabrook** and sophomore **Rashaad Woodard**. Delaware currently leads all NCAA-AA schools in team kickoff returns (25.4 per return) and is second in the Atlantic 10 and 27th overall in punt returns (10.7 per return). Haugabrook ranks second in the Atlantic 10 in both kick returns (26.1 - 20th in NCAA) and punt returns (11.2 - 26th in NCAA). Woodard is also averaging 24.6 yards per kickoff return to rank fourth in the conference and 30th in the NCAA. Among Haugabrook's top returns this season are an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown vs. Towson Sept. 11 and a 60-yard kickoff return that set up a UD touchdown in the fourth quarter vs. Hofstra. Woodard also had a career-long 69-yard kickoff return vs. Hofstra. The Hofstra game marked the first time in Delaware history that the Blue Hens have returned two kickoffs for 60 or more yards in the same game.

GOOD TO LEAD AT HALFTIME: When Delaware took a 24-21 lead into halftime last week and moved on to the 31-28 win over William & Mary, it marked the 15th straight game that the Blue Hens have won the game when leading at intermission. The Blue Hens have posted an impressive record of 31-3 (.910) this decade when leading at the half and over the last 102 games since 1990, when the Hens have taken a lead into intermission, Delaware is 94-8 (.921). Delaware hasn't lost a game when leading at halftime since Oct. 19, 2002 when the Hens let a 14-7 halftime lead slip away in a 17-14 overtime setback to Rhode Island in Kingston, RI.

ON A ROLL: The Blue Hens opened the 2004 season riding a six-game winning streak since a 24-14 setback at Northeastern last Nov. 8 but fell to New Hampshire in the opener. Since then the Hens have continued their winning and have now won 27 of their last 35 games under **K.C. Keeler** and 29 of their last 38 games overall since 2001. The Hens are 43-16 (.729) this decade, including a mark of 28-12 (.700) in conference play.

QUITE A PASS-CATCHING TRIO: The Blue Hens return a talented corps at wide receiver in 2004, which has helped as Delaware breaks in new starting quarterback and Missouri transfer Sonny Riccio, who took over after the graduation of All-American Andy Hall. The explosive trio of Boler, Long, and Ingram each caught 48 or more passes last season with Boler leading the way with 60 catches for 716 yards and nine touchdowns. The trio combined to catch 158 passes for 1,890 yards and 17 touchdowns during the season. All three also went over the 1,000 career yard receiving mark, making it the first time that Delaware has had three 1,000-yard receivers on the same team in school history. Boler, who missed two games this season with a hamstring injury before returning vs. UMass, has caught at least one pass in 26 straight games entering the Navy game and has recorded career totals of 109 receptions (No. 7 all-time at UD) for 1,559 yards (No. 8). Long, who has caught at least one pass in 17 straight games, enjoyed a career game vs. Maine Oct. 2 when he caught a school-record 16 passes for 236 yards, the second highest yardage total in school history. He has now caught 139 career passes (No. 4) for 1,695 yards (No. 7) while Ingram, who missed the game vs. Hofstra and was limited vs. William & Mary with a concussion suffered during practice, has pulled in 94 receptions (No. 12) for 1,136 yards (No. 16). Ingram needs just six catches to become the ninth UD player to reach 100 career receptions. The three have combined for 30 career touchdowns. Not to be outdone, you can also add fellow junior **Joe Bleymaier** and senior **G.J. Crescione** to that trio of talented pass catchers. Crescione is fifth on the team with 12 catches for 76 yards (6.3 avg.) and Bleymaier is sixth with 10 catches for 149 yards (14.9 avg.) and three touchdowns, including game-winners the last two weeks vs. Hofstra and William & Mary. WELL-GROUNDED: With such outstanding balance in the backfield for the Hens this season, it might be tough getting one player over 100 yards rushing in a single game this season. **Sean Bleiler** did just that in the 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25, rushing 22 times for a career-high 110 yards and a touchdown. The 100-yard effort almost guarantees Delaware a victory. Delaware has won eight straight games when having a runner rush for over 100 yards in a game (since a Nov. 16 loss at Villanova) and has won 31 of its last 32 games since 1994 when that happens.

PICKING UP FOR THE FALLEN LEADER: The Blue Hens suffered a big blow in the 43-38 win over Maine Oct. 2 when senior co-captain and leading rusher **Sean Bleiler** went down with torn knee ligaments on a run up the middle in the first quarter. Bleiler, who had never missed a game in his career for the Hens, playing in 43 straight, was the Hens' leading rusher with 333 yards and two touchdowns on 66 carries and had caught five passes for 37 yards. He also has been among the team's top special teams players. Bleiler will miss the rest of the season, which means more playing time for redshirt freshman **Lonnie Starks**, who has rushed for a team-high 385 yards on 78 carries, sophomore **Niquan Lee**, who tied a school record with four touchdowns in the win over Maine and has nine touchdowns and 261 yards on the season, and freshman **Omar Cuff** (C.H. Flowers/Landover, MD), a converted defensive back who made his collegiate debut vs. Hofstra on special teams and carried the ball for the first time last week vs. William & Mary gained eight yards on three carries.

The Hens outscored opponents 414-154 for an average win margin of 26.0 points per game. Delaware had won 10 straight games at Delaware Stadium before the 24-21 loss to New Hampshire in the season opener Sept. 2, but after successive home wins over Towson, West Chester, Maine, and William & Mary, the Hens have now won 20 of their last 22 games in Newark and have won eight straight conference games at home (New Hampshire this year was a non-league game). The Hens have posted an all-time record of 249-74-4 (.770) in 327 games over 51 seasons since 1952 at Delaware Stadium. That mark includes an all-time NCAA playoff home record of 15-5, including a 3-0 mark in 2003 when the Hens defeated Southern Illinois, Northern Iowa, and Wofford to advance to the I-AA championship. Tubby Raymond Field is named in honor of Delaware's long-time head coach who served as the Blue Hen mentor for 36 seasons, notching 300 wins and leading the Blue Hens to three national titles. Raymond, who continues to attend UD games and works as a color analyst for WDEL Radio, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August, 2003.

ABUNDANT ATTENDANCE: The Blue Hens are the only school in NCAA I-AA to average over 20,000 fans per game during the regular season each of the past five seasons and that streak will be continuing in 2004. Delaware sold a school-record 10,500 season ticket packages during the pre-season and currently ranks third nationally in NCAA I-AA in home attendance with a mark of 22,327 - trailing only Montana (23,283 in four games), and Southern (22,687 in four games). Delaware Stadium drew its school record fifth straight sellout crowd vs. William & Mary for Parents and Family Day this past Saturday as 22,058 fans passed through the turnstiles. The Hens have now drawn 19,000 or more fans in 19 straight games. Delaware drew 22,782 fans for the Towson game, the ninth largest crowd in UD history, and 22,727 for the New Hampshire game, the 10th largest all-time.

BLUE HENS VS. RANKED TEAMS: Delaware has faced nine top 20 opponents in its last 13 games and has a nine-game winning streak during that time, including a 51-45 triple overtime win over No. 3 Massachusetts, and wins of 20-17 over No. 18 Villanova, 48-7 over No. 4 Southern Illinois, 37-7 over No. 7 Northern Iowa, 24-9 over No. 2 Wofford, and 40-0 over No. 6 Colgate in the NCAA I-AA championship game during the 2003 season and this year's 21-7 win over No. 16 Massachusetts Sept. 25, 41-38 triumph over No. 8 Maine Oct. 2, and the 31-28 win over No. 14 William & Mary this past Saturday. The Hens have not lost a game against a top 20 team since falling to No. 13 ranked Villanova 38-34 in the 2002 season finale. Against Top 10 teams, the Hens are an impressive 19-10 since 1991.

SURVIVING THE BYE WEEK: Delaware played 16 straight weeks in 2003 on the way to winning the NCAA I-AA national championship, so when the Hens had a bye week Oct. 9 it was a welcome change. The Hens had just enough to get by Hofstra 20-19, giving Delaware a record of 4-5 in games following a bye week since 1991. The Hens lost four straight between 1991-2000 before winning three straight in 2000-2001. The Hens lost to Villanova 38-34 following a bye week in 2002 before returning to the win column this season.

MAKING HISTORY IN THE TRENCHES: Delaware freshman **Mike Byrne**, an offensive lineman from Lititz, PA (Manheim Central HS), made history Sept. 18 in the Hens' 21-17 victory over Towson. When starting offensive tackle **Paul Thomson** left the game in the first quarter with an elbow injury, Byrne entered the game, becoming the first true freshman offensive lineman to appear in a game since **Steve Butcher** in 1952. Byrne played the rest of the half before Thomson returned to the lineup in the second half and started again vs. West Chester last week. Byrne earned first team *Associated Press* All-State honors last fall at Manheim Central High School, leading the squad (along with current UD freshman quarterback **Jarryd Moyer**) to the state AAA title. Another Blue Hen freshman has also made history. Redshirt freshman **Rich Beverley**, who started the first two games before being limited with a broken hand, was the first redshirt freshman to start a game at Delaware since **Brian Cook** in 1995. Sophomore **Scott Conley** has since taken over the starting spot for Beverley. Another redshirt freshman, center **Mark Ciavarella**, made his first career start in last week's win over William & Mary in place of senior **Chris Edwards**, who has mononucleosis, and will start again this week vs. Navy.

HAVEN'T LOST BY MUCH: Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** squads have posted a record of 27-8 in his three seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 27 victories is a formidable 9.7 points per game. His average losing margin is a paltry 4.9 points per game with only two setbacks over five points and none over 10 during his Blue Hen career.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE: The University of Delaware ranked among the national leaders in 2003 in turnover margin with a mark of +19. Over the last 10 seasons, Delaware is 81-14 (.853) when having less or equal amount of turnovers than its opponents and is 55-7 (.887) with 16 straight wins when having less turnovers than its opponent. That streak continued in the win over William & Mary Saturday as the Hens did not turn the ball over while William & Mary lost a first half fumble.

TIGHT ENDS GETTING INVOLVED IN PASSING GAME: Junior tight end **Justin LaForgia**, a second-year transfer from the University of Cincinnati, is among the Blue Hen receiving leaders with 16 catches for 89 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high five catches for 29 yards vs. UMass Sept. 25, following up a four-reception performance the week before vs. West Chester when he scored his first career touchdown. While it's not unusual for a tight end to catch passes, it has been at Delaware. A tight end has not led Delaware in receiving for an entire season since **Mark Steimer** had 22 catches for 369 yards in 1981. When last year's starting tight end **Rick Lavelle** caught 17 passes for 197 yards, it was the most receptions by a UD tight end since **Rob Higbee** had 20 catches for 306 yards in 1994.

DELAWARE JOINS THE 600-WIN CLUB: The Delaware football program reached a significant milestone with the 24-6 win over West Chester Sept. 18 and accomplished what just seven other schools in I-AA have managed. The Blue Hens now own an all-time overall record of 604-381-44 over 113 seasons, moving them into the 600-win club. Only seven other current NCAA-AA programs have reached 600 wins all-time - Yale (824), Pennsylvania (773), Harvard (763), Princeton (755), Fordham (718), Dartmouth (635), and Lafayette (611). Other schools that could reach the 600-win mark this season are Lehigh (598) and Cornell (593).

A SEASON TO REMEMBER: The University of Delaware is coming off the finest season in school history as the Blue Hens won their sixth national title in school history, their first ever in NCAA I-AA, and their first since winning the 1979 NCAA II title in 2003. The Hens set a school record with 15 wins in a 15-1 season and were named Lambert Cup Eastern champions for the 18th time and the ECAC Team of the Year for the 10th time. Delaware was also named State Team of the Year by the Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and Local Team of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters. The Hens captured their 14th conference title all-time, including their seventh as a member of the Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 Conference. This season, Delaware and head coach **K.C. Keeler** will be looking to become the first team to repeat as NCAA-AA national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000.

THE SEASON AHEAD: The Blue Hens, who welcomed back 15 starters and 40 letterwinners from last year's national championship team, were the overwhelming No. 1 pre-season pick in both The Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN polls selected from I-AA head coaches, sports information directors, and media members. This year marks the first time that Delaware (or any team from the Atlantic 10) was the pre-season No. 1 pick but the Hens appeared in the pre-season poll for the 13th straight season. Delaware received 57 of the 71 first place picks in The Sports Network poll and 26 of the 35 first place votes in the USAToday/ESPN poll. In addition, the Blue Hens were the No. 1 pre-season pick by Street & Smith's Magazine and Lindy's Magazine and picked No. 3 in Athlon Magazine. Ironically, Delaware was not picked to finish first in its own Atlantic 10 Conference based on a poll conducted by league coaches and media members. Delaware was picked No. 2 behind Villanova in the Atlantic 10 South Division and ahead of William & Mary, James Madison, Richmond, and league newcomer Towson. In the North Division, Maine was the pre-season No. 1 pick followed by Northeastern, defending league co-champion Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Hofstra.

NEW UNIFORMS: The Blue Hens are sporting new Nike uniforms and helmets with new colors this fall. Delaware will go back to its official school color of royal blue for its uniforms and its distinctive helmet. The helmet, which will not change design, had previously consisted of gold and navy or dark blue for its colors. The helmet will now be a royal metallic blue which better matches the royal blue colors in Delaware's new uniforms.

OH BROTHER! The Hens have two sets of brother on the team this season - linebackers **Marquez and Mondoe Davis** from Newport News, VA, and freshman defensive backs **Rafiq and Jahiri Gunthorpe** from Brandywine, MD. In addition, redshirt freshman linebacker **Erik Johnson** is the younger brother of Delaware's 2004 All-American defensive end Shawn Johnson, junior linebacker **John Mulhern** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen standout linebackers and captains Pat and Dan, senior running back **Sean Bleiler** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen punter Ryan Bleiler; No. 3 quarterback **T.J. DiMuzio** is the son of former Delaware All-American quarterback Tom DiMuzio, and sophomore DB **Zach Thomas** is the younger brother of New Hampshire senior DB Aaron Thomas.

THESE HENS HAVE BRAINS.....: Not only have the Blue Hens got the job done on the field, they are seeing outstanding results in the classroom. No less than seven Delaware players are potential Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American candidates. To be eligible for the award, student-athletes must have at least sophomore standing, be a starter or key reserve, and hold a 3.2 or better grade point index. Leading the way is senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** who holds a 3.9 grade point index as a civil engineering major. Cross, who is also a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award candidate, earned the inaugural Atlantic 10 Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award last season when he also was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American second team. In addition to Cross, other Blue Hens nominated for the Academic All-American team are junior wide receiver **Joe Bleymaier**, senior defensive lineman **Chris Mooney**, senior linebacker **Mark Moore**, and defensive lineman **Tom Parks**. Cross, Bleymaier, and Mooney were also named to the CoSIDA District 2 team a year ago. The Hens would have had an eighth candidate but senior pre-season All-Atlantic 10 offensive guard **Jared Wray** suffered a career-ending back injury in pre-season and will not play this fall. Four current UD players are currently enrolled in graduate school - Davis, **Sean Bleiler**, **Garron Bible**, and **Dominic Santoli**.

.....**AND BRAWN:** According to University of Delaware strength and conditioning coach **Russell Barbarino**, the current Blue Hen roster is stronger and more fit than any other in school history. Broken records in spring and summer testing - including strength, speed, and agility drills - have become commonplace. Each summer Barbarino conducts a Best Conditioned Athlete contest with the overall winner having the most points from a battery of tests. And this year, for the second time in three seasons, senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** was named the winner. Cross earned first place with 3,239 points followed by LB **Mondoe Davis** (3,082), and RB **Sean Bleiler** (2,961). Individual position leaders were Cross (defensive line), Davis (big skill), Bleiler (offensive sk), **SidneyHaugabrook** (defensive backs), and **Mark Ciavarella** (offensive line). Individual event leaders were Ciavarella (bench press - 455 lbs.), Davis (squat lift - 675 lbs.), LB **Ryan McDermond** (agility - 3.97); DL **Bubba Jespersen** (225 lb. lift - 27 times); Cross (vertical jump - 40 inches; power clean lift - 355 lbs.), and DB **Jeff Robinson** (broad jump - 11-2).

IN THE PROS: The National Football League career of former University of Delaware standout quarterback **Rich Gannon** has been well-documented. The former All-American still rates among the top signal callers in the NFL and he was the league Most Valuable Player in 2002 when he led the Oakland Raiders to a berth in the Super Bowl. But Gannon isn't the only former Blue Hen chasing professional glory. He is one of five former Delaware players currently on NFL rosters. Quarterback **Andy Hall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson**, both 2003 All-Americans who led Delaware to the NCAA I-AA title last fall, are on the practice squads of the Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans respectively. Johnson was picked up after being released by Oakland in the pre-season. Also on an NFL practice squad this fall is 2003 co-captain, DB **Mike Adams** (San Francisco 49ers) and 2002 leading rusher **Keith Burnell** (New York Jets). Burnell was signed to the practice squad just last week after earlier being released. Adams' co-captain last season, OG **Jason Nerys** (New York Jets), had been a member of the New York Jets practice squad for three weeks before being released recently. In addition to those five, former Delaware wide receiver **Jamin Elliott** was released by the Chicago Bears during the pre-season.

September 2, 2004 • Delaware Stadium (22,727)

NEWARK, DE -- Redshirt freshman QB Ricky Santos took over for injured starter Mike Granieri in the first half and hit on 10 of 11 passes for 146 yards and threw a game-clinching 44-yard touchdown pass to David Ball early in the fourth quarter as New Hampshire upset top-ranked and defending NCAA I-AA national champion Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

The Wildcats, who defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time in school history, held the lead for the entire game before Delaware went up 21-17 on a seven-yard touchdown run by Sean Bleiler with 13:56 left to play. But New Hampshire came right back on its next possession and moved 67 yards on eight plays for the what proved to be the winning score when Santos hit Ball across the middle for a 44-yard pass play.

Delaware, which won its final six games on the way to capturing the 2003 NCAA I-AA title with a 15-1 mark, had a 10-game home win streak as the sellout crowd of 22,727 went home disappointed. The Hens lost just their second season opener in the last 10 years.

Granieri, a third-year starter and widely considered one of the best quarterbacks in the Atlantic 10, went down with a season-ending knee injury midway through the second half. But Santos was up to the task in relief in leading UNH to the win.

New Hampshire running back R.J. Harvey rushed 32 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns, including a one-yard scoring dive to open the scoring with 6:32 left in the first quarter and on an eight-yard run with 2:10 left in the third quarter that gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the night at 17-8. Ball caught five passes for 118 yards to aid the UNH attack. New Hampshire, although outgained 351-340 by the Blue Hens, held a 12-minute advantage in time of possession.

Delaware junior quarterback Sonny Riccio, a transfer from Missouri who was making his first start at Delaware, completed 13 of 17 passes for 101 yards and one touchdown, a 29-yard screen pass to redshirt freshman running back Lonnie Starks with 1:34 left in the third quarter that cut the UNH lead to 17-15. Starks rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries and caught four passes for 40 yards. Brad Shushman added field goals of 27 and 22 yards for the Blue Hens.

NEWARK, DE -- SidneyHaugabrook ignited Delaware with an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter and Niquan Lee scored the game-winner with a one-yard dive with 7:26 left to play as No. 7 Delaware rallied to defeat Towson 21-17 in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens (1-1, 1-0) overcame a sluggish offensive effort and three interceptions by Towson's Allante Harrison to take the early Atlantic 10 lead. Towson (1-1, 0-1), a first-year member of the Atlantic 10 after seven years in the Patriot League, almost pulled the big upset.

It was a defensive struggle for most of the evening as Delaware managed just 213 total yards and Towson tallied just 152. The game also featured 17 punts and four turnovers before the Hens pulled out the win. The 213 total yards by theBlue Hens was the lowest total in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler.

Towson took the early lead when Corle scored from four yards out to cap a 43-yard drive that consumed over five minutes. The sluggish Delaware offensive was finally ignited with 7:16 left in the third quarter when Haugabrook took a punt at his own 20-yard line, dodged a trio of tacklers, and romped 80 yards for his second career punt return for a touchdown.

The tie was short-lived though as Will Marcus returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to set up a career-long 41-yard field goal by Towson's Stephan Toth, giving the Tigers a 10-7 edge with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The rest of the scoring took place in the final quarter as the Hens took the lead on a six-yard pass from Sonny Riccio to Justin Long to cap a 14-play, 74-yard drive and give Delaware a 14-10 lead with 13:15 remaining. But back came Towson again as Harrison picked off his third pass of the game, and his fifth in two games this season, and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 17-14 lead with 12:39 remaining.

With Towson facing a second and three at its own 27-yard line midway through the final stanza, Goldbeck made an errant pitch to Miles and Chris Mooney recovered for the Hens. After Sean Bleiler gained 12 yards on two carries, Lee leaped over from the one-yard line for what proved to be the winning score.

Towson put one last drive together and got down to the Delaware 23-yard line but the Hens threw Miles for a one-yard loss and Goldbeck's four-yard pass to Jim Alexander on fourth down was short of the first down. Delaware closed out the win by getting two first downs, including runs of 14 and 20 yards by Lee.

NEWARK, DE -- Sonny Riccio threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score and the Delaware defense forced three turnovers as the No. 6 Blue Hens handled local rival West Chester.

Riccio, a first-year transfer from Missouri, had by far his best game in three starts as he hit on 20 of 31 passes for a career-high 217 yards and threw touchdown passes to tight end JustinLaForgia and wide receiver Justin Long. He also ran for a one-yard score to spark the Blue Hens (2-1) to their second straight win and their 18th win in their last 20 home games before a third straight sellout crowd.

The Hens have now defeated NCAAADivision II West Chester (2-2)11 straight times and 14 times in the last 15 meetings. The win also gave the Delaware football program its 600th win all-time as the Hens became just the eighth current NCAAI-AA program to reach that victory total.

West Chester played tough defensively but could not overcome three turnovers and just 222 total yards of offense. Quarterback Bob Findora hit on 16 of 29 passes for 153 yards but was intercepted twice. Brent Steinmetz, who transferred to West Chester from Delaware last spring, led theRam running attack with 43 yards.

Delaware enjoyed a balanced effort as the Hens managed 431 total yards, including 214 on the ground and 217 through the air. Delaware's running back trio of redshirt freshmanLonnie Starks (81 yards), sophomore Niquan Lee (68 yards), and senior Sean Bleiler (52 yards) led the way. Long caught six passes for 81 yards and notched his 100th career reception.

The Blue Hen defense, led by Mondoe Davis' four tackles, one interception, two pass breakups, and once forced fumble, came up with another big defensive effort, holding West Chester to 222 yards and holding a 13-minute advantage in possession time.

Neither team could get anything going offensively until midway through the second half when the Hens got on the board first, driving 75 yards on 10 plays and capping the drive when Riccio hit a diving LaForgia in the end zone for a 7-0 lead. Delaware took a 10-0 advantage into halftime when senior kicker Brad Shushman nailed a career-long 48-yard field goal with 3:30 left before intermission.

The Hens went up 17-0 with 9:40 left in the third quarter when Riccio dove in from one-yard out to cap an 80-yard drive. West Chester scored its lone points midway through the fourth quarter when Findora scored on a one-yard leap to cap a 74-yard drive. Riccio capped the night's scoring when he hit Long on a four-yard scoring toss with 4:59 left.

AMHERST, MA -- Sean Bleiler rushed for a career-high 110 yards, Sonny Riccio fired two touchdown passes, and the Delaware defensive came up with another dominating effort as the No. 4 ranked Blue Hens knocked off No. 16 Massachusetts in a battle of last year's Atlantic 10 Conference co-champions.

The Blue Hens (3-1, 2-0 Atlantic 10), who downed UMass 51-45 in three overtimes in a classic battle the previous year, used defense this time to pick up their third straight win and hand the Minutemen (2-2, 0-2 A-10) their second straight setback.

Bleiler rushed 22 times for 110 yards and one score, an eight-yard burst with 1:41 left to play, that gave the Hens some breathing room. The bruising senior, a first-year regular in the UD backfield, registered his first career 100-yard rushing game and consistently came up big on several third down plays throughout the game.

Delaware, which has now defeated UMass three times in the last four meetings, had taken the lead for good when Riccio, who completed 11 of 18 passes for 115 yards and also rushed for 70 yards, hit David Boler on a 10-yard fade pattern in the back of the end zone. Boler, who missed the previous two games with a hamstring injury, went high to haul in Riccio's lob pass and pulled it down just inside the end line. That score gave the Hens a 14-7 lead with 12:21 remaining.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Hens opened the scoring with 9:27 left before halftime as they drove 81 yards in six plays and capped the drive with Riccio hitting Joe Bleymaier across the middle for a 26-yard scoring pass.

Massachusetts came right back to the tie the game with 5:18 left in the second quarter behind a 12-play, 76-yard drive that was finished off when Tim Day hit Brandon London with a nine-yard scoring pass. Day, the national leader in passing efficiency entering the game, hit on 12 of 23 passes for 114 yards on the day.

Delaware's defensive stifled Massachusetts all day, holding the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards and sacking Day twice. The Blue Hens held All-American wide receiver Jason Peebler to just one reception for seven yards - on UMass' first offensive play of the day. He had entered the game with 13 receptions for 435 yards and five touchdowns. UMass running back Steve Baylark gained 94 yards on 17 carries but never got into the end zone.

Middle linebacker Mondoe Davis led the Hens with 13 tackles while brother Marquez Davis got his first career start in place of injured John Mulhern and had seven tackles and forced a fumble. SidneyHaugabrook added his second interception of the season and returned it 38 yards to stop a Massachusetts drive in the second half.

Charles Walker recorded a school record 23 tackles for UMass,including two sacks.

NEWARK, DE -- Niquan Lee scored his fourth touchdown of the game with 45 seconds remaining to give the Blue Hens the lead and Kyle Campbell batted down a hairy in the end zone as time expired as the fourth-ranked Blue Hens defeated eighth-ranked Maine on Homecoming.

Delaware quarterback Sonny Riccio, who threw for 415 yards and led a Blue Hen attack that amassed 560 yards of total offense and scored six touchdowns, set school records with 33 completions, 51 pass attempts and 13 consecutive completions during the first half. The Blue Hens (4-1, 3-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fourth straight game, led 37-28 with 14:44 remaining after a one-yard run by Lee, but Maine quarterback Rob Whitcomb found Christian Pereira for a 10-yard touchdown pass just 58 seconds later to pull the Black Bears (2-2, 0-1 A-10) to within 37-35.

After Delaware punted on its next possession, Maine, which fell to 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the conference, drove to the Blue Hen three yardline before settling for a 21-yard field goal by Mike Mellow to take its first lead of the game at 38-37 with 7:12 remaining.

The Blue Hens were forced to punt on their next possession but held the Black Bears to a three-and-out to get the ball back at the Maine 47 with 3:34 left. Delaware had a third and five at the Maine seven-yard line when Lee rushed for a first down to the one, and the following play he plowed into the end zone to put the Blue Hens up for good. Maine drove to the Delaware 28, but on the last play of the game, Whitcomb's pass into the end zone was batted down by Campbell.

Whitcomb was 22-of-40 with three touchdowns for the Black Bears, while Christian Pereira had nine catches for 143 yards and two touchdowns

HEMPSTEAD, NY -- Sonny Riccio connected with wide receiver Joe Bleymaier for a six-yard touchdown pass on fourth down with 6:09 left to play to cap a 12-point fourth quarter comeback as No. 3 Delaware remained unbeaten in Atlantic 10 play.

It was a defensive struggle for both teams all day as both turned the ball over three times and neither sustained a drive longer than 40 yards all day. Delaware managed just 244 total yards while Hofstra had 221.

The Blue Hens (5-1, 4-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fifth straight game, trailed 19-7 with two minutes remaining in the third quarter after Hofstra kicker Chris Onorato nailed a 30-yard field goal, his school-record tying fourth of the day. Hofstra (3-3, 1-2 Atlantic 10) lost for the fifth time in the last six meetings with the Blue Hens.

Delaware senior Sidney Haugabrook ignited the comeback by returning the ensuing kickoff 60 yards before stepping out of bounds at the Hofstra 33 yard line. Delaware had a third and 18 at the Hofstra 41 when Riccio found David Boler for a 28-yard gain to the Hofstra 13 on the final play of the quarter, and four plays later Niquan Lee scored from one yard out to cut the Pride lead to 19-14 with 13:23 remaining in the game.

The Blue Hens were stopped on their next drive, and on their following possession Riccio was intercepted by Prentice James at the Hofstra seven yard-line. However, the Delaware defense held the Pride to a three-and-out and on the punt Haugabrook was interfered with, giving the Blue Hens the ball on the Hofstra 37 with 8:59 to play.

An 11-yard completion from Riccio to Justin Long on a third down gave Delaware a first and goal at the seven, and three plays later Riccio hit Bleymaier in the end zone to give the Blue Hens their first lead of the game at the 6:09 mark. The Blue Hens then held the Pride on the next two possessions and clinched the win when Mark Moore stopped Devale Ellis one-yard shy of a first down on a fourth down play with 1:01 left.

Onorato kicked field goals of 42, 37, and 18 yards to give Hofstra a 9-0 lead midway through the second quarter before the Hens finally got on the board with a three-yard run by Lee with 4:56 left before halftime to cut the lead to 9-7. Lee's touchdown was set up by a 69-yard kickoff return by Rashaad Woodard to the HU 14-yard line.

Hofstra went up 16-7 midway through the third quarter when Delaware punter Mike Weber fumbled a snap in the end zone and the Pride's Justyn Davis fell on the ball with 7:33 left to go in the third. The lead was extended to 19-7 on Onorato's 30-yard field goal, setting the stage for the Blue Hen comeback.

NEWARK, DE -- Sonny Riccio hit wide receiver Joe Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left to play as No. 3 Delaware rallied from two 14-point deficits for the win.

The Blue Hens (6-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) won their fifth straight game while William & Mary (5-2, 3-1) had a five-game winning streak snapped despite an outstanding effort from QB Lang Campbell and WR Dominique Thompson.

Campbell hit on 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and four touchdowns while Thompson caught six passes for a school-record 244 yards, including scoring catches of 10, 62, and 87 yards in the first quarter as the Tribe took a 21-7 lead. Campbell and Thompson hooked up again on a 64-yard scoring toss with 12:15 left in the game to give William & Mary its last lead at 28-24.

Riccio hit on 24 of 40 passes for 302 yards and two touchdowns while Justin Long caught 11 passes for 108 yards and caught a five-yard scoring pass from Riccio with 8:33 left in the second quarter to cut the lead to 21-14. FB Niquan Lee also added two short touchdown runs and David Boler caught seven passes for 155 yards.

The two teams combined for 42 first downs and 836 total yards but Delaware took advantage of a William & Mary turnover and a blocked punt to gain the edge.

William & Mary stormed out to the 14-0 lead in the first four minutes of the game as Campbell hit Thompson on a 10-yard scoring pass to cap the Tribe's first drive of the day and the two hooked up again moments later as Thompson caught a short pass in the flat, broke a tackle, and scampered 62 yards for a touchdown to for the 14-0 lead.

Delaware answered on Riccio's five-yard scoring toss to Long but Campbell and Thompson hooked up again, this time with Campbell firing a pass over the Delaware defense and Thompson speeding 87 yards to the touchdown.

But the Blue Hens buckled down and held William & Mary scoreless the entire second quarter to take a 24-21 lead into halftime. Mark Moore recovered a fumble to set up a two-yard scoring run by Lee, Craig Browne blocked a punt to set up Brad Shushman's 43-yard field goal that just bounced over the cross bar, and Lee followed with another short scoring run. Long receptions by Boler set up two of the scores.

After a scoreless third quarter, William & Mary regained the lead on the 64-yard pass play from Campbell to Thompson but the Hens answered one more time as Bleymaier's lone catch of the day was the game-winner, the second straight game he was the hero.
