GAME PREVIEW

The No. 11 ranked Blue Hens will be fighting with their backs to the wall this week at Richmond as Delaware enters the final two weeks of the season most likely needing wins in both games to earn a spot in the upcoming 16-team NCAA I-AA tournament and defend its 2003 national championship. Delaware (6-3, 5-1 Atlantic 10) enters this week's game with a two-game losing streak, including last Saturday's heart-breaking 20-13 setback to No. 7 James Madison in a matchup of the last two unbeaten teams left in league play. Richmond, annually considered one of the top defensive units in the Atlantic 10, enters with a record of 3-6 (2-4 A-10) and is coming off a 24-0 win over Towson Saturday that snapped a five-game losing streak for first-year head coach Dave Clawson.



THE SERIES

Delaware and Richmond meet for the 21st time all-time this weekend with the Blue Hens holding a commanding 16-4 advantage in the series. Delaware has won four of the last five meetings and 9 of the last 11, including a 44-14 victory last Sept. 13 at Delaware Stadium. The Blue Hens are 6-3 all-time at Richmond Stadium but the Spiders won the last meeting in 2002, posting a 15-13 victory when they blocked a short field goal attempts in the closing seconds to preserve the win. **(more series details on page 2)**

LAST WEEK FOR DELAWARE:

The No. 6 ranked Blue Hens lost a classic battle against No. 7 James Madison by a 20-13 score Saturday in Harrisonburg, VA in a game that featured the last two unbeaten league teams left in the Atlantic 10 Conference. Delaware held a 300-yard advantage in total yards and a 22-minute edge in time of possession, but it was special teams miscues by the Hens that won it for the Dukes (8-1, 6-0 A-10). James Madison's Cortez Thompson returned a punt 87 yards for a touchdown with 3:04 left to play for what proved to be the game-winner. Delaware, which lost its second straight game for the first time since early in the 2002 season, had the chance to send the game into overtime but was stopped on four downs inside the JMU three-yard line in the final minute. QB **Sonny Riccio** directed an offense that piled up 466 total yards by throwing for 292 yards and a touchdown but was intercepted three times. WR **David Boler** had his third straight 100-yard receiving effort with 10 catches for 114 yards while freshman RB **Omar Cuff** made his first career start and rushed 34 times for a UD freshman record 162 yards. K **Brad Shushman** kicked two field goals but had a 19-yard attempt blocked with 5:12 left that would have given the Hens a 16-13 lead.

LAST WEEK FOR RICHMOND

Richmond put an end to a five-game losing streak as the Spiders stopped Towson cold to post a 24-0 victory Saturday in Atlantic 10 Conference play in Richmond. The Spider defense held Towson scoreless with the Tigers gaining just 223 total yards and 2.9 yards per play. Richmond QB Stacy Tutt completed 16 of 29 passes for 202 yards and three touchdowns with WR Harry Wilson catching five passes for 122 yards and one of those scores. Tutt also found Jake Schools on a 20-yard scoring pass early in the third quarter to up the lead to 17-0 and connected with Brandon Neuman on a eight-yard touchdown pass four minutes later. Defensively, Lance Gray collected 10 tackles, had three tackles for loss, recovered a fumble, intercepted a pass, and broke up three others to earn Atlantic 10 Defensive Co-Player of the Week honors. Richmond, whose losing streak included three losses by six or less points, won for the first time since a 24-14 win over Massachusetts Sept. 18.

LAST MEETING

Delaware 44, Richmond 14

NEWARK, DE -- Andy Hall threw for three touchdown passes for the second straight week, Germaine Bennett scored on three short touchdown runs, and Delaware scored off all four Richmond turnovers on the way to a 44-14 Atlantic 10 Conference win.

The 11th ranked Blue Hens (2-0, 1-0) piled up 25 first downs and 450 total yards on the way to the win in their conference opener. Richmond (0-1, 0-1), which lost three fumbles and was intercepted once, was playing in its 2003 season opener.

Delaware posted consecutive 40-point performances for the first time since the 2000 season and defeated Richmond for the eighth straight time at Delaware Stadium. The Hens also avenged a 15-13 setback to the Spiders last season in Virginia.

Hall, who threw for three touchdowns the week before vs. The Citadel, equalled the feat as he hit on 18 of 25 passes for 196 yards and three touchdowns before giving way to backup Ryan Carly early in the

DELAWARE NOTES OF INTEREST

WITH BACKS TO THE WALL, HENS LOOK TO SNAP TWO-GAME LOSING STREAK: The defending NCAA-AA champion Blue Hens enter this week's showdown with Atlantic 10 foe Richmond with plenty at stake. After reeling off six straight wins, the No. 11 ranked Hens now find themselves needing to snap a two-game losing streak to have a chance at another Atlantic 10 and NCAA title. Delaware (6-3, 5-1 Atlantic 10) most likely needs wins over Richmond this week and over Villanova next week to be considered for a spot in the 16-team NCAA Tournament. The Hens are now 6-3 and will be trying to reach the seven-win mark for the second straight year and for the 12th time in the last 14 seasons. Delaware's two-game losing streak is its longest since falling to Richmond and The Citadel in September during K.C. Keeler's first season at the helm of the Blue Hens in 2002. Delaware has not lost three straight games since falling to Georgia Southern in the 2000 playoffs and dropping the first two games of the 2001 campaign and have not lost three straight games in the same season since falling to New Hampshire, William & Mary, and Rhode Island during the 1989 season. Keeler has lost three games in a row just once in his 12 seasons as a head coach when his Rowan team dropped consecutive games to Southern Connecticut State, Kean, and William Paterson during the 1994 season.

DELAWARE HOPING TO START ANOTHER ROAD WIN STREAK: After winning four straight road games, the Hens now hope to snap a two-game road losing streak after consecutive road setbacks at Navy (34-20) on Oct. 30 and at James Madison (20-13) last week. The Blue Hens, who are in the midst of a stretch of three straight road games for the first time since 1992 when the team travelled to Villanova, Navy, and Maine on consecutive weeks in October and won all three, are currently 2-2 on the road this year. Overall, Delaware is 8-3 in its last 11 road games since a 17-7 loss at Massachusetts back on Nov. 2, 2002. Prior to Navy, the Hens' last road loss was a 24-14 setback at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003.

IMPRESSIVE STREAKS END IN LOSS AT JAMES MADISON: Not only did the Blue Hens suffer their first conference loss of the season last week vs. James Madison, several other impressive streaks fell by the wayside as well, including:

- 7 straight Atlantic 10 Conference wins (last loss Nov. 8, 2003 vs. Northeastern)
- 7 straight wins over Top 10 ranked teams (last loss Oct. 13, 2001 vs. #9 Hofstra)
- 8 straight wins when having a 100-yard rusher (last loss Nov. 16, 2002 vs. Villanova)
- 9 straight wins over Top 20 ranked teams (last loss Nov. 16, 2002 vs. #13 Villanova)
- 14 straight games scoring 20 or more points (last under 20 Nov. 8, 2003 vs. Northeastern)
- 15 straight wins when leading at halftime (last loss Oct. 19, 2002 vs. Rhode Island)

DELAWARE'S SCHEDULE STILL RANKED SECOND TOUGHEST IN NCAA-AA: Not only has Delaware posted an impressive 6-3 record to date, the Hens have done it while playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation according to the NCAA. Based on a formula that takes into account a team's past and future opponent's current winning percentage, Delaware's schedule ranks as the second toughest among all NCAA-AA programs - just behind Atlantic 10 rival Villanova. Villanova's cumulative mark stands at .631 followed by Delaware (.609), Northeastern (.597), Albany (.593), and Yale (.586). This week's opponent - Richmond - ranks No. 36 at .500. In all, six Atlantic 10 teams rank in the top 20.

LOOKING TO CONTINUE ATLANTIC 10 SUCCESS: This fall the Blue Hens are looking to capture consecutive league titles for the first time since sharing the league title with Villanova and New Hampshire in 1991 and winning the title outright in 1992. Delaware is looking to become the first Atlantic 10 team to share a piece of the league title in consecutive years since New Hampshire accomplished the feat in 1996-97.

fourth quarter. Hall threw touchdown strikes of 38 yards to Justin Long, 11 yards to Brian Ingram, and three yards to Sean Bleiler.

Richmond senior QB Bryson Spinner, making his debut for the Spiders after transferring from Virginia two years ago, threw for 196 yards and one touchdown. Stacy Tutt caught seven passes for 101 yards but UR gained just 108 yards on the ground.

Bennett, making his first career start in place of Antawn Jenkins who was resting a sore ankle, carried 26 times for 121 yards and touchdown runs of three, two, and one yards. Bennett, who rushed for 109 yards vs. The Citadel, became the first running back at Delaware with consecutive 100-yard games since Pat Williams in 1995.

The Hens scored their first four touchdowns off turnovers. Bennett scored his first touchdown with 4:10 left in the first quarter following a botched punt return by the Spiders; Hall hit Long on a 38-yard scoring strike with 12:16 left in the first half for a 17-7 lead after Mark Moore sacked Spinner and Mondoe Davis recovered the fumble; Ingram caught his 11-yard scoring pass with 1:52 left before the half for a 24-14 lead following a Mike Adams 26-yard interception return to the UR 15-yard line; and Bennett made it 31-14 when he scored from one-yard out just five plays after Richmond fumbled the second half kickoff and Delaware's Ben Cross made the recovery.

Delaware has been the pride of the Atlantic 10 since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th Atlantic 10 victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Hens are now 106-45 (.705) all-time since joining the league in 1986, including this year's 5-1 slate. Before last week's 20-13 setback to James Madison, the Hens were looking to open league play 6-0 for the second straight year but for just the third time since becoming members of the league. Delaware also started out 6-0 in league play in 1995 when the Hens finished undefeated at 8-0, the only time the Hens have posted an unblemished league slate in the Atlantic 10/Yankee Conference. Every previous year that Delaware has opened 4-0 or better in league play (1992, 1995, 2000, 2003), the Hens have advanced to NCAA tournament play.

A STAR IS BORN: Just one month ago, few outside the Delaware football program knew much about running back **Omar Cuff**. Following Saturday's 20-13 win over James Madison, the converted defensive back could be considered a household name among Blue Hen football fans. When co-captain and running back **Sean Bleiler** went down with a season-ending knee injury in the Oct. 2 win over Maine, the Blue Hen staff needed to add another running back into the mix to add some depth. Cuff was a member of Delaware's 2003 recruiting class but did not attend school last fall - giving him true freshman eligibility this season. The Landover, MD native (Flowers HS) had not seen action in any games as a backup defensive back before making his collegiate debut on special teams vs. Hofstra Oct. 19. He carried the ball three times for eight yards vs. William & Mary Oct. 23 and five times for 37 yards vs. Navy Oct. 30. It all came together this past week vs. James Madison as he carried the ball 34 times for 162 yards - setting UD freshman records in both categories. The 34 carries was the second highest total among any UD runner in school history while the 162 yards broke the UD freshman mark of 151 by all-time leading rusher Daryl Brown vs. Maine in 1991.

WINNING SEASON ALREADY IN THE BAG....AGAIN: After posting a 4-6 mark in 2001 and a 6-6 record in 2002, the first consecutive non-winning seasons at Delaware since 1960-61, Delaware returned to winning ways in 2003, going 15-1 and capturing the NCAA I-AA title. The winning ways are continuing this year as the Hens already stand at 6-3, a mark that guarantees Delaware of its second straight winning season and its 15th in the last 17 seasons.

ATLANTIC 10 RANKED TOP NCAA I-AA CONFERENCE: The Atlantic 10 Football Conference was ranked first among the 15 NCAA I-AA conference for the second straight week according to the latest Sagarin Conference rankings announced Sunday. The newest rankings will be released Monday. The Atlantic 10 also remained ranked higher than both the I-A Mid-American Conference and Sun Belt Conference. Among I-AA conferences, Delaware's 65.34 ranking was higher than No. 2 ranked Great West Conference (59.42), Southland (56.95), Big Sky (56.60), and Ivy League (55.79) in the top five nationally.

POLL TALK: Delaware, the No. 1 pick in the pre-season polls released by both The Sports Network and USA Today/ESPN, was at No. 3 in both polls for three weeks before dropping to No. 6 in both polls last week and to No. 11 this week. Delaware has now appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 poll for 26 straight weeks since the 2003 season but had a streak of 22 straight weeks picked in the top 10 snapped this week.

WHAT'S THE CATCH?: When Delaware junior wide receiver **Justin Long** caught 16 passes in the Blue Hens 43-38 win over Maine back on Oct. 2, he broke the UD single game record of 15 set by **Eddie Conti** vs. Connecticut in 1998. Conti's record lasted 69 games before it was broken. This time, it took only three games for Long's new mark to be tied. Fellow junior wide receiver **David Boler** did just that vs. Navy Oct. 30 as he hauled in 16 receptions for 153 yards. The 16 receptions by Long and Boler is the highest total by any NCAA I-AA player in a single game this season.

COMEBACK KIDS: Despite a 6-3 record and a top 10 national rankings, things certainly have not been easy this season for the Hens. The Hens have trailed at some point in the second half in six of the team's nine games this season but have rallied to win four of them. Consider the following comebacks.

Sept. 11 vs. Towson (W, 21-17) - Delaware trailed 7-0 midway through the third quarter before Sidney Haugabrook returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown to spark the Hens. Delaware again trailed 17-14 before Niquan Lee's one-yard scoring run with 7:26 left but the Hens up for good.

Oct. 2 vs. #8 Maine (W, 43-38) - Delaware jumped out to a 21-0 lead but Maine rallied back and led 38-37 after a field goal with 7:12 remaining. But Delaware came back to win when Niquan Lee scored on a one-yard dive with 45 seconds left for the 43-38 victory.

Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra (W, 20-19) - The Hens trailed 19-7 entering the final quarter but rallied as a one-yard touchdown run by Lee cut the lead to 19-14 with 13:23 left and the Hens won it when Sonny Riccio hit Joe Bleymaier on a six-yard scoring pass with 6:09 left.

Oct. 23 vs. #14 William & Mary (W, 31-28) - Riccio and Bleymaier once again hooked up to lead the Blue Hen comeback. Delaware trailed by 14 points twice in the first quarter and came back to take the lead early in the fourth quarter, only to lose it again on a 64-yard pass play with 12:15 left. But the Hens mounted a 77-yard drive that was capped when Riccio hit Bleymaier on a 25-yard scoring pass with 4:41 left.

BLUE HEN DEFENSE AMONG BEST IN ATLANTIC 10: Delaware's defense ranks among the best both in the Atlantic 10 Conference and in the NCAA. Entering this week's game at Richmond, Delaware ranks No. 1 in the Atlantic 10 in total defense (283.3 yards allowed per game - No. 7 in NCAA I-AA), No. 2 in pass defense (169.7 yards allowed per game - No. 24 in NCAA), No. 3 in rushing defense (113.7 - 16th in NCAA), No. 3 in scoring defense (21.4 ppg - 38th in NCAA), and No. 4 in passing efficiency defense (115.6 - 52nd in NCAA). Prior to Navy, Delaware had held 12 straight opponents under 400 yards of total offense since allowing 518 to Massachusetts in a 51-45 triple overtime win last Nov. 15. Below are some of the season highlights defensively.

- **Sept. 11 vs. Towson** (21-17 win) - Held Tigers to just nine first downs and 152 yards, the lowest total allowed by Delaware since The Citadel managed just 92 yards in a 38-0 Delaware win in 2000.

- **Sept. 18 vs. West Chester** (24-6 win) - Held Rams to one touchdown, 15 first downs, and 222 total yards

- **Sept. 25 vs. Massachusetts** (21-7 win) - Held the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards

- **Oct. 16 vs. Hofstra** (20-19 win) - Forced three turnovers, collected four sacks, and held A-10's team leader in scoring, passing offense, and total offense to 12 first downs, 152 passing yards, and 221 total yards. Hofstra scored its only points on four field goals and on a bobbled snap on a punt that was recovered for a touchdown.

- **Oct. 23 vs. William & Mary** (31-28 win) - Allowed just 30 rushing yards for the game.

- **Nov. 6 vs. James Madison** (20-13 loss) - Despite the loss, the Hens held the Dukes to just 12 first downs and 166 total yards, including 63 yards on the ground. JMU completed just 9 of 23 passes and held possession for just 22:15.

COHEN MEETS CLAWSON: After struggling for many years, Fordham University is now one of the top programs in the Patriot League. Two coaches who helped build the Rams back to prominence will square off on opposite sides of the field this week. Delaware defensive coordinator **Dave Cohen** and Richmond first-year head coach Dave Clawson go way back to when both were on the staff at the University of Albany, where each earned his master's degree. They coached together on the same staff at Albany in 1989 where Cohen led the linebackers and Clawson directed the running backs. After going separate ways in the coaching profession, they reunited at Fordham where after an 0-11 season in 1999, the Rams improved to 3-8 in 2000 and to 7-4 in 2001. Cohen, who served as Clawson's defensive coordinator and assistant head coach, moved on to Delaware following the 2001 season and Fordham went on to earn a spot in the NCAA I-AA playoffs under Clawson in 2002.

DELAWARE OFFENSE CONTINUES TO ROLL: After being held without a point in the first quarter in the first four games of the season (the longest first quarter scoreless streak since 1974-75), the Hens broke out in a big way vs. Maine Oct. 2, scoring 13 points in the first quarter and 30 for the first half on the way to the 43-38 victory. The Hens are now averaging 23.8 points and 376.0 total yards per game and have extended their scoring streak to 107 straight game since a 27-0 loss to Villanova in 1996. In addition, the Hens have scored 10 or more points in 27 straight games and in 121 of their last 130 games (93.1 percent) since 1994. The Hens had scored 20 or more points in 14 straight games since a 24-14 loss at Northeastern Nov. 8, 2003 before snapping that streak with 13 points last week vs. James Madison. The Hens have scored 20 or more points at Delaware Stadium 21 straight times since a 10-6 win over Richmond Nov. 10, 2001. The

Blue Hens have not suffered a shutout in a span of 141 home games at Delaware Stadium since Holy Cross blanked them 24-0 in 1983 and have not been shutout on the road in their last 47 games since that 27-0 setback to Villanova in 1996. The last time Delaware was held under 10 points was Nov. 2, 2002 when the Hens fell to Massachusetts 17-7 at McGuirk Stadium while the last time they were held in single digits at home was in a 10-7 season-opening loss to Rhode Island Aug. 30, 2001 - a span of 25 games.

DON'T KICK TO THESE GUYS: The Blue Hens have gotten a big lift in the punt and kickoff return departments this season from senior **Sidney Haugabrook** and sophomore **Rashaad Woodard**. Delaware leads the Atlantic 10 in both punt returns (12.3 - 21st in NCAA) and kickoff returns (24.3 - third in NCAA as a team) with Haugabrook ranking second in the Atlantic 10 and 15th nationally with an average of 12.9 yards per punt return and second in the Atlantic 10 and 25th nationally with an average of 25.4 yards per kickoff return. Woodard averages 24.3 yards per kickoff return but does not have enough attempts to qualify for the Atlantic 10 rankings. Haugabrook already has returned two punts for touchdowns this season - an 80-yarder vs. Towson and a 65-yarder vs. Navy - and has a 60-yard kickoff returns (vs. Hofstra) to his credit. Haugabrook set or tied three school records vs. Navy Oct. 23, tying school marks for punt return touchdowns in a season (2) and career (3) and breaking **Eddie Conti's** career punt return yardage record (now 874). Among Woodard's highlights is a team-high 69-yard kickoff return vs. Hofstra - a game in which the Hens had two returns of 60 or more yards for the first time in school history.

ON A ROLL: The Blue Hens opened the 2004 season riding a six-game winning streak since a 24-14 setback at Northeastern last Nov. 8 but fell to New Hampshire in the opener. The Hens put together another six-game winning streak before falling to I-A Navy and league foe James Madison in consecutive games. Still, the Hens have won 27 of their last 37 games under **K.C. Keeler** and 29 of their last 40 games overall since 2001. The Hens are 43-18 (.705) this decade, including a mark of 28-13 (.683) in conference play.

GOOD TO LEAD AT HALFTIME: When Delaware took a 24-21 lead into halftime and moved on to the 31-28 win over William & Mary Oct. 23, it marked the 15th straight game that the Blue Hens have won the game when leading at intermission. That streak was snapped this past week when the Hens took a 7-6 lead into halftime at James Madison before falling to the Dukes 20-13. Still, the Blue Hens have posted an impressive record of 31-4 (.886) this decade when leading at the half and over the last 103 games since 1990, when the Hens have taken a lead into intermission, Delaware is 94-9 (.913). Prior to James Madison, Delaware had not lost a game when leading at halftime since Oct. 19, 2002 when the Hens let a 14-7 halftime lead slip away in a 17-14 overtime setback to Rhode Island in Kingston, RI.

WELL-GROUNDED: When **Sean Bleiler** rushed 22 times for a career-high 110 yards and a touchdown in a 21-7 win over Massachusetts Sept. 25, it marked the eighth straight game in which the Hens posted a victory when having a runner surpass that 100-yard plateau. That streak was snapped this past week vs. James Madison when the Hens suffered a 20-13 loss despite Omar Cuff's UD freshman record 162 yards rushing. Still, the 100-yard effort almost guarantees Delaware of a victory as the Hens have won 31 of their last 33 games since 1994 when having a runner go for 100 or more yards. Prior to Saturday, Delaware had won eight straight games when having a runner rush for over 100 yards in a game since a Nov. 16, 2002 loss at Villanova.

ABUNDANT ATTENDANCE: The Blue Hens are the only school in NCAA I-AA to average over 20,000 fans per game during the regular season each of the past five seasons and that streak will be continuing in 2004. Delaware sold a school-record 10,500 season ticket packages during the pre-season and currently ranks third nationally in NCAA I-AA in home attendance with a mark of 22,327 - trailing only Southern (23,685 in five home games) and Montana (23,081 in five games). Delaware Stadium drew its school record fifth straight sellout crowd vs. William & Mary for Parents and Family Day Oct. 23 as 22,058 fans passed through the turnstiles. The Hens have now drawn 19,000 or more fans in 19 straight home games. Delaware drew 22,782 fans for the Towson game, the ninth largest crowd in UD history, and 22,727 for the New Hampshire game, the 10th largest all-time. **The streak of sellouts will reach six when the Hens host the regular season finale Nov. 20 vs. rival Villanova as Delaware officials announced early last week that the game is already a sellout.**

DELAWARE STADIUM SUCCESS: Delaware was the only school in all of college football in 2003 to play 10 home games – and the Blue Hens posted a perfect 10-0 record at Tubby Raymond Field at Delaware Stadium. The Hens outscored opponents 414-154 for an average win margin of 26.0 points per game. Delaware had won 10 straight games at Delaware Stadium before the 24-21 loss to New Hampshire in the season opener Sept. 2, but after successive home wins over Towson, West Chester, Maine, and William & Mary, the Hens have now won 20 of their last 22 games in Newark and have won eight straight conference games at home (New Hampshire this year was a non-league game). The Hens have posted an all-time record of 249-74-4 (.770) in 327 games over 51 seasons since 1952 at Delaware Stadium. That mark includes an all-time NCAA playoff home record of 15-5, including a 3-0 mark in 2003 when the Hens defeated Southern Illinois, Northern Iowa, and Wofford to advance to the I-AA championship. Tubby Raymond Field is named in honor of Delaware's long-time head coach who served as the Blue Hen mentor for 36 seasons, notching 300 wins and leading the Blue Hens to three national titles. Raymond, who continues to attend UD games and works as a color analyst for WDEL Radio, was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August, 2003.

SURVIVING THE BYE WEEK: Delaware played 16 straight weeks in 2003 on the way to winning the NCAA I-AA national championship, so when the Hens had a bye week Oct. 9 it was a welcome change. The Hens had just enough to get by Hofstra 20-19, giving Delaware a record of 4-5 in games following a bye week since 1991. The Hens lost four straight between 1991-2000 before winning three straight in 2000-2001. The Hens lost to Villanova 38-34 following a bye week in 2002 before returning to the win column this season.

MAKING HISTORY IN THE TRENCHES: Delaware freshman **Mike Byrne**, an offensive lineman from Lititz, PA (Manheim Central HS), made history Sept. 18 in the Hens' 21-17 victory over Towson. When starting offensive tackle **Paul Thomson** left the game in the first quarter with an elbow injury, Byrne entered the game, becoming the first true freshman offensive lineman to appear in a game since **Steve Butcher** in 1952. Byrne played the rest of the half before Thomson returned to the lineup in the second half and started again vs. West Chester last week. Byrne earned first team *Associated Press* All-State honors last fall at Manheim Central High School, leading the squad (along with current UD freshman quarterback **Jarryd Moyer**) to the state AAA title. Another Blue Hen freshman has also made history. Redshirt freshman **Rich Beverley**, who started the first two games before being limited with a broken hand, was the first redshirt freshman to start a game at Delaware since **Brian Cook** in 1995. Sophomore **Scott Conley** took over for five games before Beverley returned to the starting lineup vs. Navy. Another redshirt freshman, center **Mark Ciavarella**, made his first career start vs. William & Mary Oct. 23 in place of senior **Chris Edwards** (mononucleosis) and is expected to start his fourth straight game this week vs. Richmond.

HAVEN'T LOST BY MUCH: Head coach **K.C. Keeler's** squads have posted a record of 27-10 in his three seasons at Delaware. His team's average winning margin in the 27 victories is a formidable 9.7 points per game. His average losing margin is a paltry 6.1 points per game with only four setbacks over five points and just one over 10 points during his UD career - the 34-20 loss to Navy Oct. 23.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE: The University of Delaware ranked among the national leaders in 2003 in turnover margin with a mark of +19. Over the last 10 seasons, Delaware is 81-15 (.844) when having less or equal amount of turnovers than its opponents and is 55-7 (.887) with 16 straight wins when having less turnovers than its opponent. That streak continued in the win over William & Mary Oct. 23 as the Hens did not turn the ball over while William & Mary lost a first half fumble.

WONDERFUL WIDEOUTS: Delaware often deploys three or four and sometimes five wide receivers in its spread offense - leaving plenty of opportunities for the Blue Hen receivers to put up some big numbers. They have taken advantage. And for even better news, Delaware's top four wide receivers are all juniors who will be back next season. Leading the way are **Justin Long** and **David Boler** - who each have posted a school record 16-reception day this season - a high among NCAA I-AA receivers this season. Long has caught 50 passes for 640 yards and five touchdowns this season and ranks sixth in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (5.6 - 30th in NCAA) and 10th in receiving yards (71.1 - 54th in NCAA) while Boler, who missed two games earlier this season with a hamstring pull, has caught 48 passes for 621 yards and one touchdown. He ranks third in the Atlantic 10 in receptions (6.9 - 10th in NCAA) and fifth in receiving yards (88.1 - 25th in NCAA). **Joe Bleymaier** has also come on lately and has caught 21

passes for 232 yards and in successive games caught game-winning touchdowns vs. Hofstra (Oct. 16) and William & Mary (Oct. 23) and snared a career-high six receptions vs. James Madison. Another junior - **Brian Ingram** - had struggled of late but came up big vs. James Madison last week as he caught five passes for 65 yards, all in the Hens' final drive that came up just short. He had not caught a pass since the West Chester game Sept. 18. Boler has caught at least one pass in 28 straight games (No. 2 all-time behind record 38 by Eddie Conti in 1996-98) while Long is working on a streak of 19 straight games and Bleymaier on a seven-game streak. Boler, Long, and Ingram all went over 1,000 career yards receiving last season - marking the first time in school history that the Hens have had three 1,000-yard receivers on the same team. In addition, Ingram needs just one catch this week to join Boler and Long in the 100-career reception club. Below are 2004 season and career numbers on Delaware's top five receivers.

TIGHT ENDS GETTING INVOLVED IN PASSING GAME, TOO!: Junior tight end **Justin LaForgia**, a second-year transfer from the University of Cincinnati, is among the Blue Hen receiving leaders with 18 catches for 113 yards and one touchdown. He had a career-high five catches for 29 yards vs. UMass Sept. 25, following up a four-reception performance the week before vs. West Chester when he scored his first career touchdown. While it's not unusual for a tight end to catch passes, it has been at Delaware. A tight end has not led Delaware in receiving for an entire season since **Mark Steimer** had 22 catches for 369 yards in 1981. When last year's starting tight end **Rick Lavelle** caught 17 passes for 197 yards, it was the most receptions by a UD tight end since **Rob Higbee** had 20 catches for 306 yards in 1994.

DELAWARE JOINS THE 600-WIN CLUB: The Delaware football program reached a significant milestone with the 24-6 win over West Chester Sept. 18 and accomplished what just eighth other schools in I-AA have managed. The Blue Hens now own an all-time overall record of 604-383-44 over 113 seasons, moving them into the 600-win club. Only eight other current NCAA I-AA programs have reached 600 wins all-time - Yale (825), Pennsylvania (775), Harvard (765), Princeton (755), Fordham (719), Dartmouth (635), Lafayette (611), and Lehigh (600).

A SEASON TO REMEMBER: The University of Delaware is coming off the finest season in school history as the Blue Hens won their sixth national title in school history, their first ever in NCAA I-AA, and their first since winning the 1979 NCAA II title in 2003. The Hens set a school record with 15 wins in a 15-1 season and were named Lambert Cup Eastern champions for the 18th time and the ECAC Team of the Year for the 10th time. Delaware was also named State Team of the Year by the Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and Local Team of the Year by the Philadelphia Sportswriters. The Hens captured their 14th conference title all-time, including their seventh as a member of the Yankee Conference/Atlantic 10 Conference. This season, Delaware and head coach **K.C. Keeler** will be looking to become the first team to repeat as NCAA I-AA national champions since Georgia Southern in 1999-2000.

THE SEASON AHEAD: The Blue Hens, who welcomed back 15 starters and 40 letterwinners from last year's national championship team, were the overwhelming No. 1 pre-season pick in both The Sports Network and *USAToday*/ESPN polls selected from I-AA head coaches, sports information directors, and media members. This year marks the first time that Delaware (or any team from the Atlantic 10) was the pre-season No. 1 pick but the Hens appeared in the pre-season poll for the 13th straight season. Delaware received 57 of the 71 first place picks in The Sports Network poll and 26 of the 35 first place votes in the *USAToday*/ESPN poll. In addition, the Blue Hens were the No. 1 pre-season pick by *Street & Smith's* Magazine and *Lindy's Magazine* and picked No. 3 in *Athlon Magazine*. Ironically, Delaware was not picked to finish first in its own Atlantic 10 Conference based on a poll conducted by league coaches and media

In the North Division, Maine was the pre-season No. 1 pick followed by Northeastern, defending league co-champion Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Hofstra.

NEW UNIFORMS: The Blue Hens are sporting new Nike uniforms and helmets with new colors this fall. Delaware will go back to its official school color of royal blue for its uniforms and its distinctive helmet. The helmet, which will not change design, had previously consisted of gold and navy or dark blue for its colors. The helmet will now be a royal metallic blue which better matches the royal blue colors in Delaware's new uniforms.

OH BROTHER! The Hens have two sets of brother on the team this season - linebackers **Marquez and Mondoe Davis** from Newport News, VA, and freshman defensive backs **Rafiq and Jahiri Gunthorpe** from Brandywine, MD. In addition, redshirt freshman linebacker **Erik Johnson** is the younger brother of Delaware's 2004 All-American defensive end Shawn Johnson, junior linebacker **John Mulhern** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen standout linebackers and captains Pat and Dan, senior running back **Sean Bleiler** is the younger brother of former Blue Hen punter Ryan Bleiler; No. 3 quarterback **T.J. DiMuzio** is the son of former Delaware All-American quarterback Tom DiMuzio, and sophomore DB **Zach Thomas** is the younger brother of New Hampshire senior DB Aaron Thomas.

THESE HENS HAVE BRAINS.....: Not only have the Blue Hens got the job done on the field, they are seeing outstanding results in the classroom. Five Delaware players are CoSIDA Academic All-American nominees. To be eligible for the award, student-athletes must have at least sophomore standing, be a starter or key reserve, and hold a 3.2 or better grade point index. Leading the way is senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** who holds a 3.9 grade point index as a civil engineering major. Cross, who is also a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award candidate, earned the inaugural Atlantic 10 Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award last season when he also was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American second team. In addition to Cross, other Blue Hens nominated for the Academic All-American team are junior wide receiver **Joe Bleymaier**, senior defensive lineman **Chris Mooney**, senior linebacker **Mark Moore**, and defensive lineman **Tom Parks**. Cross, Bleymaier, and Mooney were also named to the CoSIDA District 2 team a year ago. The Hens would have had a sixth candidate but senior pre-season All-Atlantic 10 offensive guard **Jared Wray** suffered a career-ending back injury in pre-season and will not play this fall. Four current UD players are currently enrolled in graduate school - **Mondoe Davis**, **Sean Bleiler**, **Garron Bible**, and **Dominic Santoli**.

.....AND BRAWN: According to University of Delaware strength and conditioning coach **Russell Barbarino**, the current Blue Hen roster is stronger and more fit than any other in school history. Broken records in spring and summer testing - including strength, speed, and agility drills - have become commonplace. Each summer Barbarino conducts a Best Conditioned Athlete contest with the overall winner having the most points from a battery of tests. And this year, for the second time in three seasons, senior defensive lineman **Ben Cross** was named the winner. Cross earned first place with 3,239 points followed by

IN THE PROS: The National Football League career of former University of Delaware standout quarterback **Rich Gannon** has been well-documented. The former All-American still rates among the top signal callers in the NFL and he was the league Most Valuable Player in 2002 when he led the Oakland Raiders to a berth in the Super Bowl. But Gannon isn't the only former Blue Hen chasing professional glory. He is one of five former Delaware players currently on NFL rosters. Quarterback **Andy Hall** and defensive end **Shawn Johnson**, both 2003 All-Americans who led Delaware to the NCAA I-AA title last fall, are on the practice squads of the Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans respectively. Johnson was picked up after being released by Oakland in the pre-season. Also on an NFL practice squad this fall is 2003 co-captain, DB **Mike Adams** (San Francisco 49ers) and 2002 leading rusher **Keith Burnell** (New York Jets). Burnell was signed to the practice squad in early October after earlier being released. Adams' co-captain last season, OG **Jason Nerys** (New York Jets), had been a member of the New York Jets practice squad for three weeks before being released in October. In addition to those five, former Delaware wide receiver **Jamin Elliott** was released by the Chicago Bears during the pre-season.

NEWARK, DE -- Redshirt freshman QB Ricky Santos took over for injured starter Mike Granieri in the first half and hit on 10 of 11 passes for 146 yards and threw a game-clinching 44-yard touchdown pass to David Ball early in the fourth quarter as New Hampshire upset top-ranked and defending NCAA I-AA national champion Delaware in the season opener for both teams.

The Wildcats, who defeated a No. 1 ranked team for the first time in school history, held the lead for the entire game before Delaware went up 21-17 on a seven-yard touchdown run by Sean Bleiler with 13:56 left to play. But New Hampshire came right back on its next possession and moved 67 yards on eight plays for the what proved to be the winning score when Santos hit Ball across the middle for a 44-yard pass play.

Delaware, which won its final six games on the way to capturing the 2003 NCAA I-AA title with a 15-1 mark, had a 10-game home win streak as the sellout crowd of 22,727 went home disappointed. The Hens lost just their second season opener in the last 10 years.

Granieri, a third-year starter and widely considered one of the best quarterbacks in the Atlantic 10, went down with a season-ending knee injury midway through the second half. But Santos was up to the task in relief in leading UNH to the win.

New Hampshire running back R.J. Harvey rushed 32 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns, including a one-yard scoring dive to open the scoring with 6:32 left in the first quarter and on an eight-yard run with 2:10 left in the third quarter that gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the night at 17-8. Ball caught five passes for 118 yards to aid the UNH attack. New Hampshire, although outgained 351-340 by the Blue Hens, held a 12-minute advantage in time of possession.

Delaware junior quarterback Sonny Riccio, a transfer from Missouri who was making his first start at Delaware, completed 13 of 17 passes for 101 yards and one touchdown, a 29-yard screen pass to redshirt freshman running back Lonnie Starks with 1:34 left in the third quarter that cut the UNH lead to 17-15. Starks rushed for 74 yards on 11 carries and caught four passes for 40 yards. Brad Shushman added field goals of 27 and 22 yards for the Blue Hens.

NEWARK, DE -- SidneyHaugabrook ignited Delaware with an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter and Niquan Lee scored the game-winner with a one-yard dive with 7:26 left to play as No. 7 Delaware rallied to defeat Towson 21-17 in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens (1-1, 1-0) overcame a sluggish offensive effort and three interceptions by Towson's Allante Harrison to take the early Atlantic 10 lead. Towson (1-1, 0-1), a first-year member of the Atlantic 10 after seven years in the Patriot League, almost pulled the big upset.

It was a defensive struggle for most of the evening as Delaware managed just 213 total yards and Towson tallied just 152. The game also featured 17 punts and four turnovers before the Hens pulled out the win. The 213 total yards by theBlue Hens was the lowest total in three seasons under head coach K.C. Keeler.

Towson took the early lead when Corle scored from four yards out to cap a 43-yard drive that consumed over five minutes. The sluggish Delaware offensive was finally ignited with 7:16 left in the third quarter when Haugabrook took a punt at his own 20-yard line, dodged a trio of tacklers, and romped 80 yards for his second career punt return for a touchdown.

The tie was short-lived though as Will Marcus returned the ensuing kickoff 69 yards to set up a career-long 41-yard field goal by Towson's Stephan Toth, giving the Tigers a 10-7 edge with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

The rest of the scoring took place in the final quarter as the Hens took the lead on a six-yard pass from Sonny Riccio to Justin Long to cap a 14-play, 74-yard drive and give Delaware a 14-10 lead with 13:15 remaining. But back came Towson again as Harrison picked off his third pass of the game, and his fifth in two games this season, and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 17-14 lead with 12:39 remaining.

With Towson facing a second and three at its own 27-yard line midway through the final stanza, Goldbeck made an errant pitch to Miles and Chris Mooney recovered for the Hens. After Sean Bleiler gained 12 yards on two carries, Lee leaped over from the one-yard line for what proved to be the winning score.

Towson put one last drive together and got down to the Delaware 23-yard line but the Hens threw Miles for a one-yard loss and Goldbeck's four-yard pass to Jim Alexander on fourth down was short of the first down. Delaware closed out the win by getting two first downs, including runs of 14 and 20 yards by Lee.

NEWARK, DE -- Sonny Riccio threw for 217 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score and the Delaware defense forced three turnovers as the No. 6 Blue Hens handled local rival West Chester.

Riccio, a first-year transfer from Missouri, had by far his best game in three starts as he hit on 20 of 31 passes for a career-high 217 yards and threw touchdown passes to tight end JustinLaForgia and wide receiver Justin Long. He also ran for a one-yard score to spark the Blue Hens (2-1) to their second straight win and their 18th win in their last 20 home games before a third straight sellout crowd.

The Hens have now defeated NCAAADivision II West Chester (2-2)11 straight times and 14 times in the last 15 meetings. The win also gave the Delaware football program its 600th win all-time as the Hens became just the eighth current NCAAI-AA program to reach that victory total.

West Chester played tough defensively but could not overcome three turnovers and just 222 total yards of offense. Quarterback Bob Findora hit on 16 of 29 passes for 153 yards but was intercepted twice. Brent Steinmetz, who transferred to West Chester from Delaware last spring, led theRam running attack with 43 yards.

Delaware enjoyed a balanced effort as the Hens managed 431 total yards, including 214 on the ground and 217 through the air. Delaware's running back trio of redshirt freshmanLonnie Starks (81 yards), sophomore Niquan Lee (68 yards), and senior Sean Bleiler (52 yards) led the way. Long caught six passes for 81 yards and notched his 100th career reception.

The Blue Hen defense, led by Mondoe Davis' four tackles, one interception, two pass breakups, and once forced fumble, came up with another big defensive effort, holding West Chester to 222 yards and holding a 13-minute advantage in possession time.

Neither team could get anything going offensively until midway through the second half when the Hens got on the board first, driving 75 yards on 10 plays and capping the drive when Riccio hit a diving LaForgia in the end zone for a 7-0 lead. Delaware took a 10-0 advantage into halftime when senior kicker Brad Shushman nailed a career-long 48-yard field goal with 3:30 left before intermission.

The Hens went up 17-0 with 9:40 left in the third quarter when Riccio dove in from one-yard out to cap an 80-yard drive. West Chester scored its lone points midway through the fourth quarter when Findora scored on a one-yard leap to cap a 74-yard drive. Riccio capped the night's scoring when he hit Long on a four-yard scoring toss with 4:59 left.

AMHERST, MA -- Sean Bleiler rushed for a career-high 110 yards, Sonny Riccio fired two touchdown passes, and the Delaware defensive came up with another dominating effort as the No. 4 ranked Blue Hens knocked off No. 16 Massachusetts in a battle of last year's Atlantic 10 Conference co-champions.

The Blue Hens (3-1, 2-0 Atlantic 10), who downed UMass 51-45 in three overtimes in a classic battle the previous year, used defense this time to pick up their third straight win and hand the Minutemen (2-2, 0-2 A-10) their second straight setback.

Bleiler rushed 22 times for 110 yards and one score, an eight-yard burst with 1:41 left to play, that gave the Hens some breathing room. The bruising senior, a first-year regular in the UD backfield, registered his first career 100-yard rushing game and consistently came up big on several third down plays throughout the game.

Delaware, which has now defeated UMass three times in the last four meetings, had taken the lead for good when Riccio, who completed 11 of 18 passes for 115 yards and also rushed for 70 yards, hit David Boler on a 10-yard fade pattern in the back of the end zone. Boler, who missed the previous two games with a hamstring injury, went high to haul in Riccio's lob pass and pulled it down just inside the end line. That score gave the Hens a 14-7 lead with 12:21 remaining.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Hens opened the scoring with 9:27 left before halftime as they drove 81 yards in six plays and capped the drive with Riccio hitting Joe Bleymaier across the middle for a 26-yard scoring pass.

Massachusetts came right back to the tie the game with 5:18 left in the second quarter behind a 12-play, 76-yard drive that was finished off when Tim Day hit Brandon London with a nine-yard scoring pass. Day, the national leader in passing efficiency entering the game, hit on 12 of 23 passes for 114 yards on the day.

Delaware's defensive stifled Massachusetts all day, holding the Minutemen to just 10 first downs and 226 total yards and sacking Day twice. The Blue Hens held All-American wide receiver Jason Peebler to just one reception for seven yards - on UMass' first offensive play of the day. NEWARK, DE -- Niquan Lee scored his fourth touchdown of the game with 45 seconds remaining to give the Blue Hens the lead and Kyle Campbell batted down a hail mary in the end zone as time expired as the fourth-ranked Blue Hens defeated eighth-ranked Maine on Homecoming.

Delaware quarterback Sonny Riccio, who threw for 415 yards and led a Blue Hen attack that amassed 560 yards of total offense and scored six touchdowns, set school records with 33 completions, 51 pass attempts and 13 consecutive completions during the first half. Justin Long also set a school record with 16 receptions while his 236 yards were second all-time behind Eddie Conti's 354 yards receiving against Connecticut in 1998. Lee also tied a school record with four rushing touchdowns, becoming the ninth Blue Hen to rush for four scores and the first since Daryl Brown in the 1994 season.

The Blue Hens (4-1, 3-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fourth straight game, led 37-28 with 14:44 remaining after a one-yard run by Lee, but Maine quarterback Rob Whitcomb found Christian Pereira for a 10-yard touchdown pass just 58 seconds later to pull the Black Bears (2-2, 0-1 A-10) to within 37-35.

After Delaware punted on its next possession, Maine, which fell to 2-2 overall and 0-1 in the conference, drove to the Blue Hen three yardline before settling for a 21-yard field goal by Mike Mellow to take its first lead of the game at 38-37 with 7:12 remaining.

The Blue Hens were forced to punt on their next possession but held the Black Bears to a three-and-out to get the ball back at the Maine 47 with 3:34 left. Delaware had a third and five at the Maine seven-yard line when Lee rushed for a first down to the one, and the following play he plowed into the end zone to put the Blue Hens up for good. Maine drove to the Delaware 28, but on the last play of the game, Whitcomb's pass into the end zone was batted down by Campbell.

Whitcomb was 22-of-40 with three touchdowns for the Black Bears, while Christian Pereira had nine catches for 143 yards and two touchdowns

HEMPSTEAD, NY -- Sonny Riccio connected with wide receiver Joe Bleymaier for a six-yard touchdown pass on fourth down with 6:09 left to play to cap a 12-point fourth quarter comeback as No. 3 Delaware remained unbeaten in Atlantic 10 play.

It was a defensive struggle for both teams all day as both turned the ball over three times and neither sustained a drive longer than 40 yards all day. Delaware managed just 244 total yards while Hofstra had 221.

The Blue Hens (5-1, 4-0 Atlantic 10), who won their fifth straight game, trailed 19-7 with two minutes remaining in the third quarter after Hofstra kicker Chris Onorato nailed a 30-yard field goal, his school-record tying fourth of the day. The Blue Hens were stopped on their next drive, and on their following possession Riccio was intercepted by Prentice James at the Hofstra seven yard-line. However, the Delaware defense held the Pride to a three-and-out and on the punt Haugabrook was interfered with, giving the Blue Hens the ball on the Hofstra 37 with 8:59 to play.

An 11-yard completion from Riccio to Justin Long on a third down gave Delaware a first and goal at the seven, and three plays later Riccio hit Bleymaier in the end zone to give the Blue Hens their first lead of the game at the 6:09 mark. The Blue Hens then held the Pride on the next two possessions and clinched the win when Mark Moore stopped Devale Ellis one-yard shy of a first down on a fourth down play with 1:01 left.

Onorato kicked field goals of 42, 37, and 18 yards to give Hofstra a 9-0 lead midway through the second quarter before the Hens finally got on the board with a three-yard run by Lee with 4:56 left before halftime to cut the lead to 9-7. Lee's touchdown was set up by a 69-yard kickoff return by Rashaad Woodard to the HU 14-yard line.

Hofstra went up 16-7 midway through the third quarter when Delaware punter Mike Weber fumbled a snap in the end zone and the Pride's Justyn Davis fell on the ball with 7:33 left to go in the third. The Blue Hens (6-1, 5-0 Atlantic 10) won their fifth straight game while William & Mary (5-2, 3-1) had a five-game winning streak snapped despite an outstanding effort from QB Lang Campbell and WR Dominique Thompson.

Campbell hit on 20 of 30 passes for 355 yards and four touchdowns while Thompson caught six passes for a school-record 244 yards, including scoring catches of 10, 62, and 87 yards in the first quarter as the Tribe took a 21-7 lead. Campbell and Thompson hooked up again on a 64-yard scoring toss with 12:15 left in the game to give William & Mary its last lead at 28-24.

ANNAPOLIS, MD-- Delaware saw its six-game win streak come to an end as Navy quarterback Aaron Polanco and fullback Kyle Eckel led a dominating running attack and paced the Mids to the Homecoming victory.

No. 3 ranked Delaware (6-2) held a 10-7 lead late in the first half but Navy took advantage of Sidney Haugabrook's fumble on a punt return to take a 14-10 halftime lead and scored twice in the third quarter to take control. The Mids (7-1), who received votes in both national polls this week, avenged a 21-17 setback to the Blue Hens a year earlier.

Polanco rushed for 64 yards and three touchdowns and also threw for another score and Eckel carried 23 times for 143 yards and one score as Navy rolled up 441 total yards, including 366 on the ground. The 441 yards were the most allowed by Delaware this season and the 366 rushing yards was the 11th highest total ever allowed by a UD squad.

Blue Hen quarterback Sonny Riccio and wide receiver David Boler combined for an outstanding effort through the air. Riccio hit on 30 of 50 passes for 255 yards and one touchdown and Boler caught a school-record tying 16 passes for 153 yards. Boler tied the UD record set just four weeks earlier by teammate Justin Long. The Hens managed just 59 yards rushing.

Navy opened the scoring on a 22-yard run by Polanco but the Hens responded to take a 10-7 lead as Riccio hit Niquan Lee on a five-yard scoring toss across the middle and Brad Shushman added a 35-yard field goal with 6:20 left before halftime.

The Mids took advantage of a UD miscue to take the lead late in the half when Haugabrook fumbled a punt return and Mick Yokitis recovered on the Blue Hen 11-yard line. Three plays later Polanco found Eric Roberts on a six-yard pass play as Navy took a 14-10 lead into intermission.

Navy put the game away in the third quarter as Polanco scored on two short touchdown runs, the first with 6:28 left in the third quarter that capped a 12-play, 99-yard drive. The second score gave Navy an insurmountable 27-10 lead.

Shushman kicked a 23-yard field early in the final quarter but Eckel came back with a short touchdown run to put Navy back up 24-13. Haugabrook capped the scoring with a 65-yard punt return for a touchdown with just 46 seconds left to play, his second touchdown of the season and third of his career.

HARRISONBURG, VA -- Delaware piled up yards virtually at will most of the day against the James Madison defense, but two late special teams mistakes and the inability to get the ball into the end zone when it counted resulted in the loss to the Dukes in a battle for first place in the Atlantic 10 Football Conference.

Delaware piled up 466 total yards - 300 more than JMU - and held a 15-minute advantage in time of possession but an 87-yard punt return for a touchdown by Cortez Thompson with 3:04 left to play was the difference as the No. 6 ranked Blue Hens (6-3, 5-1 Atlantic 10) suffered their first conference setback of the season.

No. 7 ranked James Madison (8-1, 6-0), seeking its first A-10 title since 1999, won its sixth straight game as it took advantage of three interceptions and 299 total returns yards on the afternoon. The Dukes downed the Hens for the first time since 1999 and took sole possession of first place in the Atlantic 10.

The Blue Hens, who had defeated seven straight Top 10 opponents since last season, had the chance to win the game late as they drove 70 yards on 11 plays down to the James Madison three-yard line in the final minute of play. But Sonny Riccio threw three straight incomplete passes into the end zone and the Dukes held on for the win. The Hens converted two third downs and one fourth down during the drive, including a six-yard pass from Riccio to David Boler to the three yard line on a fourth down and four.

Delaware had the chance to take the lead with 5:12 left in the game and the score tied at 13-13 but Brad Shushman's 19-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Rodney McCarter - the senior's school-record eighth career kick block.

Riccio threw for over 200 yards for the third straight game as he hit on 27 of 48 passes for 292 yards and a touchdown but the junior was intercepted three times. Boler had his third straight 100-yard receiving effort with 10 receptions for 114 yards while freshman halfback Omar Cuff carried the ball 34 times for 162 yards in his first career start. The 162 yards broke the UD freshman record of 151 by Daryl Brown in 1991 vs. Maine while his attempts were the second highest total in school history. Delaware lost for just the second time in the last 33 games when having a player rush for over 100 yards.

James Madison quarterback Justin Rascati hit on 9 of 21 passes for 103 yards and one touchdown, an 18-yarder to Ardon Bransford four minutes into the game that gave the Dukes a 7-0 lead. The Dukes gained just 166 total yards, including just 63 on the ground, but made up for it with big gains on interceptions and on special teams.
