## Second Season of Monté Ross Era Begins Sunday at Marist

University of Delaware men's basketball head coach Monté Ross begins his second season at the helm of the Blue Hens on Sunday as UD opens its 2007-08 season at Marist. Delaware, which went 5-26 last season when the Blue Hens suffered through a season filled with injuries and suspensions, returns four starters, adds four freshmen, and welcomes four transfers. For the second straight year Delaware opens the season against Marist, as the Red Foxes posted a 78-62 win at the Bob Carpenter Center on November 14, 2006 in Ross's head coaching debut.

### Delaware vs. Marist

**November 26, 2005** • In the first ever meeting between the two schools, Marist posted a 64-48 win over Delaware at the McCann Center. Ryan Stilphen scored a game-high 14 points and added seven rebounds to lead the Red Foxes to the victory, while Jared Jordan recorded 13 points and six assists and James Smith chipped in 12 points and seven boards. The Blue Hens were led by Calvin Cannon who scored 12 points, while Herb Courtney and Zaire Taylor each added 10. Marist led just 27-21 at the half but opened the second period on an 18-6 run to pull away. Delaware shot just 29.2 percent from the field and went 5 of 19 from three-point range.

**November 14, 2006** • Marist spoiled the head coaching debut of Monté Ross by posting a 78-62 win over Delaware at the Bob Carpenter Center. Will Whittington scored a team-high 20 points, Jared Jordan dished out seven assists and added 17 points, including the 1,000th of his career, James Smith tallied 15 points and pulled a game-high 10 rebounds, and Ryan Stilphen chipped in with 15 points. Herb Courtney scored a then-career high 27 points to lead the Blue Hens, while Darrell Johnson added 18 points in his collegiate debut. The Red Foxes led 34-30 at the half and still were up just 56-52 with 7:38 left, but Marist used a decisive 9-1 run to pull away.

## Gameday Interviews

Delaware head coach Monté Ross holds a press conference outside the UD locker room approximately 10 minutes after the game following a cooling off period and his postgame show with the Blue Hen Basketball Radio Network.

Selected players will also be available outside the locker room as well, usually while Coach Ross is conducting his radio interview. The University of Delaware locker room is closed to members of the media during regular season competition.

Monté Ross will not be available immediately prior to games unless an interview is scheduled beforehand. Media wishing to conduct pregame interviews with him are encouraged to tape them prior to gameday or at a shootaround the day of the game. Pregame interview requests for players or assistant coaches should also be made prior to gameday. Approval is on a case-by-case basis.

## Non-Gameday Interviews

All requests to interview players or coaches during the week should be made through the Athletics Media Relations Office and at least one day in advance so that academic or athletic schedules are not disrupted.

## CAA Media Teleconference

The CAA hosts a media teleconference each Tuesday beginning on January 8 and running through March 4. The teleconference, which features all 12 of the conference's coaches in 10-minute slots, is held on Tuesday mornings from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. This season Monté Ross is scheduled to take calls from 11:30 a.m. to 11:40 a.m. The phone number to take part in the call is (866) 809-6768. ## Up Next

Delaware travels to long-time rival Rider on November 17 for a 3 p.m. game with the Broncs. The Blue Hens will then have a week and a half layoff before hosting Hampton in the home opener at the Carpenter Center on November 27 at 7 p.m.

## Former Hawks Face Off

Delaware head coach Monté Ross will open his second season as head coach the same way he began his first - by facing Marist and head coach Matt Brady. Ross and Brady were each on the Saint Joseph's staff for eight years from the 1996-97 season through the 2004-05 campaign. Brady served as an assistant coach for 11 seasons at Saint Joseph's before beginning his tenure at Marist in 2004-05, helping the Hawks advance to four NCAA Tournaments, make three NIT appearances, and capture three Atlantic 10 Championships.

Ross coached on Hawk Hill for 10 seasons, also leading the Hawks to four NCAA Tournaments and three appearances in the NIT. Brady and Ross were both instrumental in the success of the 2003-04 Saint Joseph's team which finished the season 30-2 and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight.

## For Openers

Delaware is an even 51-51 in its 102 season openers, including a 78-62 home loss last season to Marist in the debut of head coach Monté Ross. The Blue Hens are 3-4 in season openers this decade.

## Opening On The Road

Delaware opens its season on the road for the 10th time in 11 seasons. The Blue Hens opened on the road in nine straight years from 1997-98 through 2005-06 before hosting Marist at the Carpenter Center to open last season.

## UD Freshmen Wearing Different Numbers

Because Delaware's new uniforms have yet to arrive, the four Blue Hen freshmen will wear different numbers for today's game. Edwin Santiago will wear number 5, Marco Cooper will wear number 13, D.J. Boney will wear number 31, and Alphonso Dawson will wear number 45. UD's uniforms are expected to arrive before the Rider game, when the freshmen will wear their correct jersey numbers (Cooper #10, Dawson #11, Boney #21, Santiago #24).

## Blue Hens Face Challenging Schedule

Delaware faces a challenging schedule this season, as Delaware will face six NCAA Tournament teams and three NIT participants from last year. The Blue Hens open the season today by facing Marist, which advanced to the second round of the NIT last season. On December 5 Delaware hosts Albany, which appeared in the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

The Hens travel to NCAA Tournament participant Central Connecticut on December 16, and three days later travel to Vermont, which played in the 2007 NIT. Delaware travels to Maryland, which advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament a year ago, on December 28.

UD will then face another tough CAA conference schedule, playing two games against Virginia Commonwealth, which defeated Duke and took Pittsburgh to overtime in last year's NCAA Tournament. Two games against rivals Hofstra and Drexel, which each appeared in the 2007 NIT, and a pair of contests with league favorite George Mason also await the Blue Hens.

## Fresh Faces in Starting Lineup

Blue Hen freshmen Edwin Santiago and D.J. Boney are expected to be in today's starting lineup, which would mark the second consecutive season that a pair of UD freshman started their first collegiate games.

Last season Brian Johnson and Darrell Johnson each started the season opener against Marist, the first time in 22 years that two freshmen started the first game of the season. Freshmen guards Jay Harris and Taurence Chisholm each started in Delaware's season opening loss to Washington College on November 27, 1984. Only two UD true freshmen started a season opener between that game and last season - Brian Pearl against Washington College on November 23, 1991 and Raphael Madera against Mount St. Mary's on November 21, 2003.

## Blue Hens Feature Home-Grown Talent

The Blue Hens have four players on its roster that played high school basketball in the state of Delaware: Marc Egerson (Glasgow), Jawan Carter (Tatnall), D.J. Boney (Tatnall), and Edwin Santiago (Sanford). In fact, Carter is the leading scorer in Delaware history with 2,464 career points.

The last time a UD team featured four players who played high school basketball in Delaware was in 1985-86. Three of those players were Donald Dutton, a junior from Wilmington, DE (Howard Career HS), Steve Jennings, a sophomore from Claymont, DE (Claymont HS), and Oscar Jones, a senior from Wilmington, DE (A.I. duPont HS). The fourth, freshman Stan Waterman from Wilmington, DE (Howard Career HS), is currently the head coach at Sanford School where Edwin Santiago played.

## Young Out Indefinitely After Preseason Surgery

Delaware junior Brian Young will be out indefinitely after undergoing emergency surgery for acute compartment syndrome in his upper left arm during the preseason.

Young, who sat out the 2006-07 season after transferring from Lafayette, had surgery on October 13 after participating in the Blue Hens' practice earlier in the day. No timetable has been set for his return.

Young enrolled at Lafayette in the fall of 2005 but missed the entire season after undergoing open heart surgery prior to his freshman year. He then transferred to Delaware during the summer of 2006.

Young's injury is the same one suffered by then Blue Hen assistant coach Ryan Iversen, who suffered acute compartment syndrome in his leg during a practice last December. Ironically, Young was the player that bumped into Iversen during that practice.

## A Rough Year

Delaware head coach Monté Ross and the Blue Hens suffered through a tumultuous season in 2006-07 when Delaware set the school record for losses in a season:

November 6 • Senior guard Calvin Cannon is suspended for the Blue Hens' first two regular season games for a violation of team policy

November 30 • Sophomore center Matt Hewson withdraws from basketball team; Raphael Madera is suspended indefinitely (he would not return to the team)

December 27 • Assistant coach Ryan Iversen undergoes emergency surgery for compartment syndrome in his right leg after getting bumped by Brian Young in the Blue Hens' practice. Iversen undergoes

a few additional surgeries and misses the rest of the season

January 8 • Sophomore DeSean White, who was sitting out the season as a transfer, was dismissed from the University after being declared academically ineligible; sophomore guard Zaire Taylor takes a leave of absence from the team (he would not return)

January 9 • Ross announces that sophomore forward Pau Geli will miss the remainder of the season with a lung ailment

February 7 • Calvin Cannon is suspended for academic reasons and misses the remainder of the season. Cannon's departure leaves the Blue Hens with just seven players for the final seven games of the year

### **Courtney Returns To Lead Hens**

Senior forward Herb Courtney will look to pick up where he left off last season when he had a stellar junior year. A second team All-CAA selection, Courtney led the Blue Hens with 18.1 points, 8.0 rebounds, 5.4 blocks and 4.5 steals. Courtney led the CAA with 10 double-doubles, scored in double figures in 28 of the 31 games, and reached the 20-point mark 13 times. He ranked second in a single season at Delaware with 1,139 minutes played, fifth with 54 blocks, and seventh with 562 points. He finished the season ranked 61st in Division I with 18.1 points per game, 66th with 1.7 blocked shots per game, and 67th with 8.0 rebounds per game.

### **McMahon Looks To Build On Junior Season**

Senior Sam McMahon had a breakthrough year in 2006-07, ranking second on the team with 10.4 points and third with 4.5 rebounds per game. He led Delaware with 50 three-pointers, while his 43.9 three-point field goal percentage ranked third in the CAA and sixth in a UD single season. He was also third in the CAA with an 84.0 free throw percentage and 13th with 3.68 defensive rebounds per game.

McMahon scored 26 points, hitting 9 of 12 shots from the field, in a win over UNC Wilmington on February 7 and added a career-high 27 points on 8 of 12 shooting three days later at Drexel.

### **The Iron Man**

Sophomore point guard Brian Johnson is coming off an outstanding freshman season in which he was named to the CAA All-Rookie Team. Johnson started all 31 games, tying the Delaware freshman record for games played in a season, and led the team with 130 assists and a UD single season record 1,192 minutes played.

He ranked second in the CAA with 38.10 minutes played per game, fourth with 4.19 assists per game, eighth with a 1.53 assist/turnover ratio, and 11th with a 73.7 free throw percentage.

Johnson, who played the entire game 10 times, scored a career-high 26 points at UNC Wilmington while hitting 5 of 6 shots from the three-point line, tied for the second most points by a UD freshman in a game in school history. Additionally he scored 25 points in the Blue Hens' upset win over Hofstra on January 29.

### **Courtney, Johnson Among CAA Returning Stat Leaders**

Herb Courtney is the Colonial Athletic Association's leading returning rebounder with 8.0 rebounds per game, ahead of Vladimir Kuljanin of UNC Wilmington with 7.1 rebounds per game. Courtney ranks second among CAA returners with 18.1 points per game (behind only Antoine Agudio of Hofstra - 20.2), 1.5 steals per game (behind only Brandon Johnson of Old Dominion - 2.1), and 1.7 blocked shots per game (behind only Tommy Breaux of Towson - 2.1).

Brian Johnson ranks second among CAA returners with 4.2 assists per game, behind only Virginia Commonwealth's Eric Maynor, the CAA Preseason Player of the Year, at 6.4 assists per game.

### **Delaware Names Captains**

Seniors Herb Courtney, Sam McMahon, and Henry Olawoye will serve as team captains for the University of Delaware basketball team this season. Courtney and Olawoye also served as captains last year.

### **Blue Hens Look To Increase Scoring**

Delaware averaged just 60.5 points per game last season, last in the Colonial Athletic Association. That average was the lowest in a season since the 1982-83 Blue Hens averaged 58.4 points per game.

After Delaware dropped a 49-47 decision to Holy Cross on December 30, the Blue Hens fell at James Madison 62-47 on January 3 and at Hofstra 75-50 January 6. Those three games marked the first time Delaware had failed to score more than 50 points in three consecutive games since January 7 through January 12, 1950.

### **Hens Look To Improve Non-Conference Mark**

Delaware had dropped 11 consecutive non-conference road games before the 58-56 win at La Salle on December 29, 2006. The Blue Hens also went 0-5 at home against non-conference opponents last year, the most home defeats to non-league teams in a season since 1970-71.

### **Long Distance Plan**

Delaware has made at least one three-point field goal in each of the last 501 games dating back to November 28, 1990. In all, the Blue Hens have made one three-pointer in all but five games (611 of 616) since the implementation of the three-point line throughout the NCAA in 1986-87.

### **UD Picked 10th in CAA Preseason Poll**

Delaware was picked 10th in the Colonial Athletic Association Preseason Poll announced October 17 at the league's Media Day at the ESPN Zone in Washington, DC

## Blue Hens Look To Avoid 20 Losses

Delaware went 5-26 last season to set a school record for most losses in a season, while its 15 conference losses were also a school record. Delaware had just one 20-loss season (5-22 in 1978-79) in its first 99 years, but has lost at least 20 games in three consecutive years: 11-20 in 2004-05, 9-21 in 2005-06 and 5-26 last season. The Blue Hens are one of just 10 Division I teams to lose at least 20 games in each of the last three seasons along with Centenary, Howard, Maryland Eastern Shore, Northern Colorado, James Madison, Prairie View A&M, Longwood, San Jose State, and Idaho.

## Help Is On The Way

The Blue Hens will receive a major boost in mid-December when junior transfers Marc Egerson and Jim Ledson become eligible. Both players, who have been practicing with the team, transferred to Delaware following the end of the 2006 fall semester and will become eligible on December 16 for UD's game at Central Connecticut.

Egerson, a 6-6 guard/forward, appeared in the first 13 games while starting three for the Hoyas last season. He averaged 7.5 points and 4.0 rebounds per game while ranking fifth on the team with 24.1 minutes played. Egerson, a native of Wilmington, DE, who played at nearby Glasgow High School, led Georgetown in rebounds twice. He recorded his first career double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds against Old Dominion, and scored a career-high 13 points while posting seven rebounds against eventual Elite Eight participant Oregon.

Egerson averaged 1.6 points and 1.7 rebounds in 21 games as a freshman for a Hoyas squad that finished 23-10 and reached the NCAA Tournament Sweet Sixteen.

Egerson was a two-time first team all-state selection at Glasgow, led Glasgow to the state championship as a junior, and was twice named the Delaware State Player of the Year.

Ledson, a 6-9 forward, appeared in the first 14 games while starting four for the Cornhuskers last season. He averaged 2.4 points and 2.5 rebounds while playing 10.6 minutes per game. Ledson also shot 13 of 22 (59.1 percent) from the field for the Huskers and tied for second on the team with five blocked shots.

Ledson appeared in 17 games last season as a freshman, recording 20 rebounds, nine points and four blocked shots on the year. He redshirted the 2004-05 season for the Cornhuskers.

## St. Joseph's Transfer Jawan Carter Redshirts

Sophomore guard Jawan Carter transferred to Delaware from Saint Joseph's during the offseason and will sit out this season due to NCAA transfer regulations. Carter will redshirt this season and will have three years of eligibility remaining beginning in the 2008-09 season.

Carter appeared in 32 games while starting 26 for the Hawks last season and was named to Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team. He ranked fourth on the team with 7.6 points per game, was second with 74 assists, and ranked third on the team with 38 three-pointers made and a 35.8 three-point field goal percentage. Carter, who averaged 25.7 minutes per game for Saint Joseph's, scored a career-high 20 points in a win over Xavier on January 21 and added 18 in a victory over Lafayette on November 17. He scored in double figures in three consecutive games in late December and hit a career-high five three-pointers against Ohio University.

Carter was named the 2006 Delaware State Player of the Year while playing at the Tatnall School, and is the state's all-time leading scorer with 2,464 career points. An all-state selection in 2005 and 2006, Carter averaged 29.4 points, 5.0 rebounds and 7.0 assists as a senior. Carter, an EA Sports Second Team All-American as a senior, led Tatnall to the 2006 state championship, scoring 31 points in the title game. He was named high honorable mention on Street & Smith's All-America Team four times.

## Newark's Foreign Connection

Junior forward Pau Geli, a native of Girona, Spain, continues a trend of foreign-born players on the Delaware basketball team. The Blue Hens have had at least one foreign player on the roster in all but two years since the 1987-88 season. Delaware had four foreign players on the 1998-99 team that advanced to the NCAA Tournament while Spencer Dunkley, Delaware's career rebounding leader and an NBA second round draft pick in 1992, is a native of Wolverhampton, England.

## HEAD COACH MONTÉ ROSS

Winston-Salem State '92  
Second Season at Delaware  
5-26 Overall and at Delaware

Monté Ross was formally introduced as the University of Delaware men's basketball program's new head coach on April 4, 2006 in a press conference held at the Bob Carpenter Center.

Ross, who pronounces his first name "mon-tay", is the 23rd head coach in University of Delaware men's basketball history and begins his second season at the helm of the Blue Hens in 2007-08. He guided Delaware to a 5-26 record in 2006-07 and led the Blue Hens to a 72-68 win over preseason league favorite Hofstra on January 29.

Prior to coming to Delaware Ross, 37, had served as an assistant coach under Phil Martelli at Saint Joseph's University the previous 10 seasons, helping to lead the Hawks to a record of 262-141, six NCAA Tournament appearances, and three National Invitation Tournament appearances. The 2003-04 team went 30-2 and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight.

"This means a lot to me and my family," said Ross, who spoke to a full room that included family members, friends, Saint Joseph's University staff and supporters, and media members. "This is such a great opportunity and I'm going to cherish it. I can promise that I will work hard and make all of you proud. I've been preparing for this opportunity for a very long time. Things are going pretty fast now, but I am prepared to handle it. Working with someone like Phil Martelli has prepared me well for this. My first priority will be to the players we have coming back. They all came here to the University of Delaware with a dream and they all have goals. I want to make sure that their experience here is memorable and that they get what they signed on for. We want to create a love affair with the community and the campus and have a positive impact in everything we do. We will play hard every night and bring a winning attitude and create a winning culture."

"We are excited to have Monté join the University of Delaware men's basketball program," said UD Director of Athletics Edgar N. Johnson. "During the interview process, we learned that Monté's contacts and success in recruiting young men from the Mid-Atlantic Region are truly superior. He knows the region and its players and coaches, our University, and the Colonial Athletic Association. Most important of all, Monté is a talented, personable, hard-working young man who has great rapport with his players. We are confident that he will bring the University of Delaware men's basketball program to prominence in the CAA."

A 1992 sport management graduate of NCAA Division II Winston-Salem State where he played for legendary head coach and Basketball Hall of Fame member Clarence "Big House" Gaines (828-447 record in 47 seasons from 1946-1993), Ross has been surrounded by championship basketball throughout his coaching career.

During his 13 seasons as an NCAA Division I assistant, Ross helped lead teams to nine winning seasons, seven campaigns with 20 or more victories, and a winning percentage of .650. His teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament six times and to the NIT Tournament three times while

capturing five conference championships.

After beginning his career as an assistant at Lehigh in 1993-94, he spent two seasons as an assistant at Delaware's top rival Drexel, leading the Dragons to consecutive North Atlantic Conference titles and NCAA Tournament berths in 1995 and 1996 under head coach Bill Herrion. The 1995-96 squad, led by current NBA veteran Malik Rose, posted a record of 27-4 and upset Memphis in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament.

Ross joined the Saint Joseph's staff in 1996-97 during Phil Martelli's second season as head coach. The Hawks rose to national prominence under Martelli, participating in post-season action seven times, including each of the Ross' final six seasons on Hawk Hill. During Ross' tenure, the Hawks won four Atlantic 10 regular season titles, one conference tournament title, posted five seasons with 20 or more wins, and averaged 23 wins over his final six seasons.

The Hawks advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times during his tenure, including a memorable 2003-04 season when Saint Joseph's posted a 30-2 record and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight. The Hawks were a national story, going through the regular season undefeated and earning a No. 1 national ranking late in the season. Ross also helped Saint Joseph's advance to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1997, to the NCAA second round in 2001, and to the NCAA first round in 2003. In 2005-06 Saint Joseph's went 19-14, advanced to the Atlantic 10 Tournament championship game, and advanced to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Saint Joseph's also made a run to the NIT title in 2004-05, going 24-12 and falling in the championship game. The Hawks won the Atlantic 10 title and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 during Ross' first season on Hawk Hill in 1996-97.

Ross, who served as the Hawks' recruiting coordinator and worked with the team's point guards, was instrumental in bringing three current NBA players to Saint Joseph's, including two first round draft picks in 2004 consensus National Player of the Year Jameer Nelson and Delonte West. Nelson currently plays for the Orlando Magic while West and Dwayne Jones are members of the Boston Celtics. Ross' tenure at Saint Joseph's was the third longest in school history for an assistant coach and he was honored in 2005 with the William J. Bennett Award, recognizing dedication and loyalty to the Saint Joseph's men's basketball program. He shared the award with fellow Saint Joseph's assistant Mark Bass.

In addition to his duties as an assistant at Saint Joseph's, Ross was active with the prestigious Sonny Hill League, serving as a head coach in the summer college league and as an assistant in the high school league.

In September, 2006, Ross and assistant coach Stephen Stewart visited Dakar, Senegal to conduct youth basketball clinics and a coaching seminar as part of a United States Department of State-funded International Basketball Initiative. They worked in conjunction with Basketball Without Borders Africa, a community relations outreach program of the NBA and also with the Senegalese Basketball Federation and the nonprofit organization Sports for Education and Economic Development in Senegal.

Ross and his wife, Michelle, reside in Media, PA with their son Justin, 8, and daughter Lauren, 6.

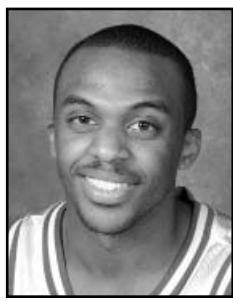
