Gameday Interviews

Delaware head coach Monté Ross holds a press conference outside the UD locker room approximately 10 minutes after the game following a cooling off period and his postgame show with the Blue Hen Basketball Radio Network.

Selected players will also be available outside the locker room as well, usually while Coach Ross is conducting his radio interview. The University of Delaware locker room is closed to members of the media during regular season competition.

Monté Ross will not be available immediately prior to games unless an interview is scheduled beforehand. Media wishing to conduct pregame interviews with him are encouraged to tape them prior to gameday or at a shootaround the day of the game. Pregame interview requests for players or assistant coaches should also be made prior to gameday. Approval is on a case-by-case basis.

Non-Gameday Interviews

All requests to interview players or coaches during the week should be made through the Athletics Media Relations Office and at least one day in advance so that academic or athletic schedules are not disrupted.

CAA Media Teleconference

The CAA hosts a media teleconference each Tuesday beginning on January 8 and running through March 4. The teleconference, which features all 12 of the conference's coaches in 10-minute slots, is held on Tuesday mornings from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. This season Monté Ross is scheduled to take calls from 11:30 a.m. to 11:40 a.m. The phone number to take part in the call is (866) 809-6768. Up Next

Delaware closes out its three-game road trip on Saturday with a 4 p.m. contest at Drexel. The Blue Hens return home next Wednesday to host CAA favorite George Mason at 7 p.m. in a game that will be televised by MASN.

Last Time Out

Maryland used a 23-2 run midway through the first half as the Terrapins posted a 76-46 victory over Delaware Friday night at the Comcast Center.

The Terrapins, who snapped a three-game losing streak, all at home, improved to 7-6 on the season while the Blue Hens had their two-game winning streak snapped while falling to 4-7 on the year.

Maryland, which shot 47.7 percent from the field, held a commanding 57-25 rebounding advantage and corralled 22 offensive boards. The Terrapins were led by James Gist, who recorded a double-double with game-highs of 18 points and 10 rebounds. Greivis Vasquez also scored 18 points while adding eight assists and three steals, and Bambole Osby contributed 14 points and seven rebounds. Landon Milbourne came off the bench to score 10 points and was Maryland's fourth player in double figures.

Delaware, which fell to 6-19 all-time against Atlantic Coast Conference opponents, got a season-high 17 points from Marc Egerson, while Brian Johnson and D.J. Boney each added seven points. Jim Ledsome pulled down eight rebounds and blocked seven Maryland shots, six in the first half.

However the Blue Hens shot a season-low 27.6 percent from the field, going just 16 of 58 from the floor.

Delaware stayed with the Terrapins early, as a fastbreak dunk by Egerson tied the game at 10-10 with 15:14 remaining in the first half. However Maryland responded with a 13-0 run, taking a 23-10 lead on a three-pointer by Vasquez at the 9:05 mark. Johnson answered with a jumper for the Blue Hens, but the Terrapins then scored 10 consecutive points to go up 33-12 with 5:30 left in the period.

An Alphonso Dawson layup and a Ledsome tip-in cut the Maryland lead to 33-16 at the 4:40 mark, but the Terrapins again extended their lead to 21 points at 40-19 on a three-pointer by Vasquez. A layup by Boney and a jumper by Johnson made it a 40-23 game at the break.

After Osby opened the second half with a jumper Egerson nailed a three-pointer to pull Delaware within 16, but the Terrapins, who improved to 51-4 in the Comcast Center against non-conference opponents, led by at least 20 points over the final 15 minutes of the game. The 30-point margin of victory represented Maryland's largest lead of the contest.

Terps Dominate Boards vs. Hens

Maryland posted a 57-25 rebounding advantage Friday against Delaware, as the Terrapins nearly recorded as many offensive rebounds (22) as the Blue Hens had total rebounds.

The 57 rebounds were the most allowed by Delaware since giving up 59 to Virginia Tech on December 21, 1978.

Delaware Looking For Road Success

Delaware is 13-41 all-time in Colonial Athletic Association road games, including 6-30 over the last four years. However of those six wins, three have come at William & Mary. The Blue Hens have won four straight at Kaplan Arena since a 59-53 defeat in the 2001-02 season.

Delaware went 0-9 in CAA road games last season; its last conference road win was a 57-52 overtime victory at William & Mary on February 15, 2006, the Blue Hens' final CAA road game of that season.

Hens Find Shooting Stroke

Delaware shot 54.1 percent (20 of 37) from the field at Vermont, the first time this season the Blue Hens shot over 50 percent from the floor. The Blue Hens went 11 of 21 in the first half while building a 33-15 lead, and went 9 of 16 in the second period. Delaware, which went 5 of 11 (.455) from three-point range, also connected on 26 of 32 (.813) free throw attempts.

Delaware again shot better than 50 percent against Boston University, as the Blue Hens went 29 of 50 from the field to finish at a season-high 58.0 percent. Delaware shot 56.3 percent (49 of 87) in its last two wins, but was held to a season-low 27.6 percent (16 of 58) at Maryland on Friday.

Four Players Reach 14 Against Terriers

Delaware had four players score at least 14 points in the win over Boston University: Herb Courtney posted a game-high 18 points, Alphonso Dawson added 17, and Jim Ledsome and Marc Egerson each poured in 14.

The last time Delaware had four players score at least 14 points was in the 81-78 overtime win over George Mason on January 12, 2005. Harding Nana had 20 points in that contest, while Andrew Washington added 16, Mike Slattery had 15, and Rulon Washington chipped in 14.

Champions of the America East?

Delaware, which competed in the America East Conference from 1996-97 through 2000-01, defeated all three of its America East opponents this season. The Blue Hens posted a 71-60 home win over Albany, picked third in the America East Preseason Coaches Poll, on December 5. On December 19 Delaware recorded an identical 71-60 triumph at Vermont, picked second in the America East Preseason Poll. UD then defeated Boston University, which was picked to win the America East, on December 22 by a 73-55 score.

A Tale of Two (First) Halves

Delaware trailed by 31 points at the half at Central Connecticut, as the Blue Devils took a 50-19 lead into the break. The deficit was Delaware's largest halftime margin since the Blue Hens trailed 11th-ranked Purdue 53-17 at the half in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on March 13, 1998.

Delaware's 33-point defeat to Central Connecticut was its worst since an 83-48 setback at Old Dominion on January 10, 2007.

The Blue Hens completely reversed their fortunes at Vermont three days later, exploding to a 33-15 halftime lead. The 18-point advantage was the Blue Hens' largest at halftime since leading Drexel 38-19 on February 11, 2006. The 15 points allowed were the fewest in a first half since Delaware also allowed 15 to William & Mary on February 5, 2005.

UD Regaining Home Court Advantage

After opening its home season with a 51-50 loss to Hampton, Delaware has reeled off three straight home wins against Towson (70-63), Albany (71-60) and Boston University (73-55). That represents the Blue Hens' first three-game home winning streak since the first three home games of the 2004-05 season when UD defeated Mount St. Mary's, Drexel, and Rider. Following this three-game road trip, Delaware will be challenged to extend its home winning streak: the Blue Hens next host CAA favorite George Mason on January 9.

Dawson CAA Rookie of the Week Again

Alphonso Dawson earned his second Colonial Athletic Association Men's Basketball Rookie of the Week award on December 24.

Dawson averaged 14.0 points and 6.5 rebounds per game while leading the Blue Hens to a pair of victories that week.

Dawson scored 11 points while adding four rebounds, two assists, two blocks and two steals in Delaware's 71-60 victory at Vermont on December 19. He then added 17 points and led the team with a career-high nine rebounds in the 73-55 triumph over Boston University on December 22. Dawson, who went a perfect 6 of 6 from the foul line on the week, also had two assists, a block and a steal versus the Terriers.

The Rookie of the Week award was the second in three weeks for Dawson, who also earned the honor on December 10.

Johnson Perfect From The Foul Line

Brian Johnson went a perfect 10 of 10 from the free throw line at Vermont, the most free throw attempts without a miss since Mike Ames also went 10 for 10 from the charity stripe against Hofstra on January 3, 2004.

Johnson currently ranks fifth in the CAA with a 79.5 free throw percentage.

Transfers Contribute Immediately

Junior transfers Marc Egerson and Jim Ledsome each made an impact at Central Connecticut in their Blue Hen debuts. Egerson led the team with 14 points and also pulled down two rebounds in a team-high 34 minutes of action, while Ledsome scored nine points, grabbed three rebounds and dished out a team-high three assists.

Egerson scored eight points and tied for the team lead with eight rebounds at Vermont, while Ledsome contributed four points, two rebounds and a block.

Egerson had 14 points and eight rebounds in the victory over Boston University, while Ledsome also scored 14 points while adding four rebounds and three blocks.

Egerson led the Blue Hens with a season-high 17 points Friday at Maryland, while Ledsome led the team with eight rebounds and blocked seven shots, two shy of the school record.

Dawson Sets Season-High vs. Albany

Alphonso Dawson scored 13 points and pulled down seven rebounds against Towson, setting season highs in both categories. Dawson established his second season high scoring effort in three days by scoring 18 points in the victory over Albany.

Protecting the Basketball

Delaware committed just six turnovers in the win over Albany, the fewest since the Blue Hens committed five versus James Madison on February 13, 2003. UD forced the Great Danes into 16 turnovers, leading to a 22-4 advantage in points off turnovers.

Accepting Charity

Delaware went 30 of 47 from the free throw line against Albany, its most free throw attempts since the Blue Hens went to the line a school-record 56 times against UMBC on January 6, 1993.

Rafferty Coaches Hens Over Towson

Blue Hen head coach Monté Ross was suspended by CAA Commissioner Tom Yeager for the game against Towson for a confrontation with an official immediately following Delaware's loss at Iona on November 30.

UD assistant coach Jeff Rafferty served as interim head coach since he had done the scouting report for Towson. The 70-63 victory over the Tigers is officially credited to Ross.

Johnson Has All-Around Game vs. Tigers

Sophomore point guard Brian Johnson produced a solid all-around game in the win over Towson, scoring 11 points while grabbing six rebounds in 39 minutes of action. Johnson also dished out a season-high nine assists, just one shy of his career-high, and recorded his second career blocked shot.

Opening CAA Play on Postive Note

Delaware's 70-63 win over Towson was the Blue Hens' first in a Colonial Athletic Association opener since a 67-65 victory over Drexel during the 2004-05 season. UD is now 4-3 all-time in CAA openers.

Hens Snap Losing Streak vs. Towson

Delaware, which lost the final six games of last season, had dropped 10 straight games after losing the first four games of this year. However the Blue Hens snapped their 10-game losing streak by defeating Towson, 70-63, in their CAA opener. The losing streak was the longest since an 11-game losing streak from January 5 through February 7, 1979.

Courtney Bounces Back From Iona Game

Senior forward Herb Courtney finished with just one point at Iona, his fewest since going scoreless vs. Drexel in the 2006 CAA Tournament First Round. Courtney had scored in double figures in 18 straight games and in 26 of the last 27 contests.

Courtney bounced back in the six games after the Iona contest, reaching double figures in each game while averaging 14.2 points in that span.

Balanced Scoring Effort At Iona

Alphonso Dawson scored 11 points while Brian Johnson, D.J. Boney, Sam McMahon and Edwin Santiago each added 10 as the Blue Hens put five players in double figures at Iona. The last time Delaware put five players in double figures was during an 89-77 victory over UNC Greensboro on December 19, 2005. In that game Harding Nana scored 24 points, while Andrew Washington had 18, Sam McMahon scored 16, Herb Courtney added 13, and Calvin Cannon chipped in 10.

Delaware Basketball on Television

The Blue Hens will have eight games televised this season. Delaware's game at Maryland on December 28 will be broadcast by Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic, while the home game against Georgia State on January 26 will be televised by Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic, Philadelphia, and Southeast. UD's game at Northeastern on January 19 and home games against Virginia Commonwealth on February 9 and Drexel on February 16 will be televised by CN8. The Blue Hens' home game against George Mason on January 9 will be broadcast by ESPN Regional and MASN, while the home game versus UNC Wilmington on February 6 will also be televised by MASN.

The Blue Hens' home game against Old Dominion on January 12 will be broadcast by WSKY4 in Hampton Roads, VA.

Additionally, CN8 will televise all four CAA Tournament quarterfinal games and both semifinal games, while ESPN will broadcast the conference championship game.

Newcomers Contribute Early in Season

Delaware is getting solid contributions from its freshmen early in the season. Alphonso Dawson is averaging 9.3 points and ranks second on the team with 52 rebounds in 30.0 minutes per contest. D.J. Boney is averaging 27.2 minutes per game and scoring 6.0 points per contest. Edwin Santiago is averaging 6.1 points in 18.2 minutes per game and ranks second on the team lead with 12 steals, while Marco Cooper has posted 11 points and 13 rebounds in 46 minutes off the bench.

The four UD freshmen are contributing 35.7 percent of Delaware's points and 33.4 percent of the Blue Hens' rebounds.

McMahon Has Double-Figure Streak Snapped

Heading into the Blue Hens' game at George Mason last January 31, Sam McMahon had scored in double figures in just eight of his first 77 career games. However McMahon reached double digits in the final nine games of 2006-07 and extended his streak to 16 games this season. McMahon scored 10 points at Marist, 16 points against Rider and Hampton, and 10 at Iona. He scored 11 points the win over Towson. McMahon's streak was in serious jeopardy against Albany, but he was fouled after grabbing a defensive rebound with 0.8 seconds remaining, and he hit two free throws to finish with 11 points. He then scored 12 points at Ohio University.

McMahon had his streak stopped at Central Connecticut as he scored just two points against the Blue Devils.

Johnson Takes Care of the Rock

Brian Johnson currently ranks second in the CAA with a 2.15 assist/turnover ratio. Johnson has handed out 58 assists this season (he ranks second in the CAA with 5.27 assists per game), and has committed just 27 turnovers in 400 minutes on the floor so far this season.

Johnson would lead the CAA with a 55.6 three-point field goal percentage if he had one more three-pointer made, ranks second in the league with 36.36 minutes played per game, and is sixth with a 79.5 free throw percentage.

Johnson is tied for 46th in Division I in assists per game, and is a big reason why Delaware is 47th in the country with just 13.3 turnovers per game.

Johnson Runs The Show For Hens

Sophomore Brian Johnson played all but two minutes in the Blue Hens' opener at Marist, scoring 23 points while dishing out five assists. Johnson reached the 20-point mark just twice last season but hit 7 of 14 shots against the Red Foxes including 2 of 3 from behind the arc, and nailed all seven of his free throw attempts.

Johnson scored 13 points and handed out a team-high seven assists at Rider, playing all but three minutes. He played 36 minutes against Hampton, dishing out six assists while pulling down a career-high seven rebounds. Johnson played a season-high 39 minutes at Iona, scoring 10 points while handing out four assists. He had his best game of the season in the win over Towson, posting 11 points, nine assists and six rebounds against the Tigers.

He scored nine points, tied for the team lead with six rebounds, and dished out five assists against Albany, and posted a game-high six assists at Ohio University. Johnson scored a team-high 17 points in the win at Vermont, going 10-of-10 from the free throw line while adding a game-high eight assists.

Hens Win Rebounding Battle vs. Vermont, BU

Marist posted a commanding 44-30 rebounding edge in the Blue Hens' opener. Senior forward Spongy Benjamin posted his career-high with 17 rebounds against the Blue Hens, including six offensive boards. Delaware was again out-rebounded, 47-37, at Rider as forward Jason Thompson pulled down a school-record 21 rebounds.

Hampton posted a 39-23 rebounding advantage over the Blue Hens, as the Pirates corralled 13 offensive rebounds. Iona recorded a

41-24 edge on the boards, as the Gaels grabbed 16 offensive rebounds. However the Blue Hens improved their rebounding against Towson, as the Tigers held a slim 35-34 edge on the boards. UD lost the rebounding battle to Albany, 39-31, and to Ohio University, 36-19.

Delaware won the rebounding battle for the first time this season at Vermont, posting a 33-30 edge on the boards. The Blue Hens posted more rebounds than their opponents for the second straight game by recording a 35-33 edge on the boards versus Boston University. However the Blue Hens were out-rebounded by 32 boards, 57-25, at Maryland on Friday. Delaware is currently last in the league with 28.5 rebounds per game, 40.4 rebounds allowed per game, and a -11.8 rebounding margin.

Not Shy From Deep

Delaware is currently averaging 18.6 three-point field goal attempts per game this season, as six players have taken at least 27 three-pointers so far this season.

The Blue Hens currently rank sixth in the CAA with a 34.1 three-point percentage and rank third by holding their opponents to just 29.8 percent shooting from behind the arc.

A High-Scoring Affair

The 78 points scored by Delaware against Marist tied for the most under head coach Monté Ross, matching a 78-69 win over UNC Wilmington on February 7. Conversely, the Blue Hens' 89 points allowed to the Red Foxes also tied for the most under Ross, matching George Mason's 89 versus UD on January 31.

Delaware again scored over 70 points against Rider, marking the second straight game the Blue Hens reached the 70-point mark. After scoring 70 points in the wins over Towson and Albany, Delaware posted 71 points against Vermont and 73 versus Boston University and has reached the 70-point mark in six of the first 11 games of the year. UD scored over 70 points just four times in 31 games a year ago.

Blue Hens Facing Challenging Schedule

Delaware is facing a challenging schedule this season, as Delaware will face six NCAA Tournament teams and three NIT participants from last year. The Blue Hens opened the season by facing Marist, which advanced to the second round of the NIT last season and hosted Albany on December 5, which appeared in the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

The Hens travelled to NCAA Tournament participant Central Connecticut on December 16, and three days later visited Vermont, which played in the 2007 NIT. Delaware travelled to Maryland, which advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament a year ago, on Friday.

UD will now face another tough CAA conference schedule, playing two games against Virginia Commonwealth, which defeated Duke and took Pittsburgh to overtime in last year's NCAA Tournament. Two games against rivals Hofstra and Drexel, which each appeared in the 2007 NIT, and a pair of contests with league favorite George Mason also await the Blue Hens.

Fresh Faces in Starting Lineup

Blue Hen freshmen D.J. Boney and Alphonso Dawson started Delaware's opener at Marist, marking the second consecutive season that a pair of UD freshmen started their first collegiate games.

Last season Brian Johnson and Darrell Johnson each started the season opener against Marist, the first time in 22 years that two freshmen started the first game of the season. Freshmen guards Jay Harris and Taurence Chisholm each started in Delaware's season opening loss to Washington College on November 27, 1984. Only two UD true freshmen started a season opener between that game and last season - Brian Pearl against Washington College on November 23, 1991 and Raphael Madera against Mount St. Mary's on November 21, 2003.

Blue Hens Feature Home-Grown Talent

The Blue Hens have four players on their roster that played high school basketball in the state of Delaware: Marc Egerson (Glasgow), Jawan Carter (Tatnall), D.J. Boney (Tatnall), and Edwin Santiago (Sanford). In fact, Carter is the leading scorer in Delaware history with 2,464 career points.

The last time a UD team featured four players who played high school basketball in Delaware was in 1985-86. Three of those players were Donald Dutton, a junior from Wilmington, DE (Howard Career HS), Steve Jennings, a sophomore from Claymont, DE (Claymont HS), and Oscar Jones, a senior from Wilmington, DE (A.I. duPont HS). The fourth, freshman Stan Waterman from Wilmington, DE (Howard Career HS), is currently the head coach at Sanford School where Edwin Santiago played.

Young Out Indefinitely After Preseason Surgery

Delaware junior Brian Young will be out indefinitely after undergoing emergency surgery for acute compartment syndrome in his upper left arm during the preseason.

Young, who sat out the 2006-07 season after transferring from Lafayette, had surgery on October 13 after participating in the Blue Hens' practice earlier in the day. No timetable has been set for his return.

Young enrolled at Lafayette in the fall of 2005 but missed the entire season after undergoing open heart surgery prior to his freshman year. He then transferred to Delaware during the summer of 2006.

Young's injury is the same one suffered by then Blue Hen assistant coach Ryan Iversen, who suffered acute compartment syndrome in his leg during a practice last December. Ironically, Young was the player that bumped into Iversen during that practice.

A Rough Year

Delaware head coach Monté Ross and the Blue Hens suffered through a tumultuous season in 2006-07 when Delaware set the school record for losses in a season:

November 6 • Senior guard Calvin Cannon is suspended for the Blue Hens' first two regular season games for a violation of team policy

November 30 • Sophomore center Matt Hewson withdraws from basketball team; Raphael Madera is suspended indefinitely (he would not return to the team)

December 27 • Assistant coach Ryan Iversen undergoes emergency surgery for compartment syndrome in his right leg after getting bumped by Brian Young in the Blue Hens' practice. Iversen undergoes a few additional surgeries and misses the rest of the season

January 8 • Sophomore DeSean White, who was sitting out the season as a transfer, was dismissed from the University after being declared academically ineligible; sophomore guard Zaire Taylor takes a leave of absence from the team (he would not return)

January 9 • Ross announces that sophomore forward Pau Geli will miss the remainder of the season with a lung ailment

February 7 • Calvin Cannon is suspended for academic reasons and misses the remainder of the season. Cannon's departure leaves the Blue Hens with just seven players for the final seven games of the year

Courtney, Johnson Among CAA Returning Stat Leaders

Herb Courtney is the Colonial Athletic Association's leading returning rebounder with 8.0 rebounds per game, ahead of Vladimir Kuljanin of UNC Wilmington with 7.1 rebounds per game. Courtney ranks second among CAA returners with 18.1 points per game (behind only Antoine Agudio of Hofstra - 20.2), 1.5 steals per game (behind only Brandon Johnson of Old Dominion - 2.1), and 1.7 blocked shots

per game (behind only Tommy Breaux of Towson - 2.1).

Brian Johnson ranks second among CAA returners with 4.2 assists per game, behind only Virginia Commonwealth's Eric Maynor, the CAA Preseason Player of the Year, at 6.4 assists per game.

Delaware Names Captains

Seniors Herb Courtney, Sam McMahon, and Henry Olawoye are serving as team captains for the University of Delaware basketball team this season. Courtney and Olawoye also served as captains last year.

Long Distance Plan

Delaware has made at least one three-point field goal in each of the last 511 games dating back to November 28, 1990. In all, the Blue Hens have made one three-pointer in all but five games (621 of 626) since the implementation of the three-point line throughout the NCAA in 1986-87.

Blue Hens Look To Avoid 20 Losses

Delaware went 5-26 last season to set a school record for most losses in a season, while its 15 conference losses were also a school record. Delaware had just one 20-loss season (5-22 in 1978-79) in its first 99 years, but has lost at least 20 games in three consecutive years: 11-20 in 2004-05, 9-21 in 2005-06 and 5-26 last season. The Blue Hens are one of just 10 Division I teams to lose at least 20 games in each of the last three seasons along with Centenary, Howard, Maryland Eastern Shore, Northern Colorado, James Madison, Prairie View A&M, Longwood, San Jose State, and Idaho.

Courtney Reaches Milestones

Herb Courtney pulled down eight rebounds against Vermont to become the 27th player in UD history to reach the 500-rebound plateau. On December 22 Courtney scored 18 points against Boston University, as he became the 25th player in UD history to reach the 1,000-point plateau.

Courtney is now one of 12 players in Delaware history to record at least 1,000 points and 500 rebounds.

St. Joseph's Transfer Jawan Carter Redshirts

Sophomore guard Jawan Carter transferred to Delaware from Saint Joseph's during the offseason and will sit out this season due to NCAA transfer regulations. Carter will redshirt this season and will have three years of eligibility remaining beginning in the 2008-09 season.

Carter appeared in 32 games while starting 26 for the Hawks last season and was named to Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team. He ranked fourth on the team with 7.6 points per game, was second with 74 assists, and ranked third on the team with 38 three-pointers made and a 35.8 three-point field goal percentage. Carter, who averaged 25.7 minutes per game for Saint Joseph's, scored a career-high 20 points in a win over Xavier on January 21 and added 18 in a victory over Lafayette on November 17. He scored in double figures in three consecutive games in late December and hit a career-high five three-pointers against Ohio University.

Carter was named the 2006 Delaware State Player of the Year while playing at the Tatnall School, and is the state's all-time leading scorer with 2,464 career points. An all-state selection in 2005 and 2006, Carter averaged 29.4 points, 5.0 rebounds and 7.0 assists as a senior. Carter, an EA Sports Second Team All-American as a senior, led Tatnall to the 2006 state championship, scoring 31 points in the title game. He was named high honorable mention on Street & Smith's All-America Team four times.

Newark's Foreign Connection

Junior forward Pau Geli, a native of Girona, Spain, continues a trend of foreign-born players on the Delaware basketball team. The Blue Hens have had at least one foreign player on the roster in all but two years since the 1987-88 season. Delaware had four foreign players on the 1998-99 team that advanced to the NCAA Tournament while Spencer Dunkley, Delaware's career rebounding leader and an NBA second round draft pick in 1992, is a native of Wolverhampton, England.

Second Season at Delaware
9-33 Overall and at Delaware

Monté Ross was formally introduced as the University of Delaware men's basketball program's new head coach on April 4, 2006 in a press conference held at the Bob Carpenter Center.

Ross, who pronounces his first name "mon-tay", is the 23rd head coach in University of Delaware men's basketball history and begins his second season at the helm of the Blue Hens in 2007-08. He guided Delaware to a 5-26 record in 2006-07 and led the Blue Hens to a 72-68 win over preseason league favorite Hofstra on January 29.

Prior to coming to Delaware Ross, 37, had served as an assistant coach under Phil Martelli at Saint Joseph's University the previous 10 seasons, helping to lead the Hawks to a record of 262-141, six NCAA Tournament appearances, and three National Invitation Tournament appearances. The 2003-04 team went 30-2 and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight.

"This means a lot to me and my family," said Ross, who spoke to a full room that included family members, friends, Saint Joseph's University staff and supporters, and media members. "This is such a great opportunity and I'm going to cherish it. I can promise that I will work hard and make all of you proud. I've been preparing for this opportunity for a very long time. Things are going pretty fast now, but I am prepared to handle it. Working with someone like Phil Martelli has prepared me well for this. My first priority will be to the players we have coming back. They all came here to the University of Delaware with a dream and they all have goals. I want to make sure that their experience here is memorable and that they get what they signed on for. We want to create a love affair with the community and the campus and have a positive impact in everything we do. We will play hard every night and bring a winning attitude and create a winning culture."

"We are excited to have Monté join the University of Delaware men's basketball program," said UD Director of Athletics Edgar N. Johnson. "During the interview process, we learned that Monté's contacts and success in recruiting young men from the Mid-Atlantic Region are truly superior. He knows the region and its players and coaches, our University, and the Colonial Athletic Association. Most important of all, Monté is a talented, personable, hard-working young man who has great rapport with his players. We are confident that he will bring the University of Delaware men's basketball program to prominence in the CAA."

A 1992 sport management graduate of NCAA Division II Winston-Salem State where he played for legendary head coach and Basketball Hall of Fame member Clarence "Big House" Gaines (828-447 record in 47 seasons from 1946-1993), Ross has been surrounded by championship basketball throughout his coaching career.

During his 13 seasons as an NCAA Division I assistant, Ross helped lead teams to nine winning seasons, seven campaigns with 20 or more victories, and a winning percentage of .650. His teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament six times and to the NIT Tournament three times while

capturing five conference championships.

After beginning his career as an assistant at Lehigh in 1993-94, he spent two seasons as an assistant at Delaware's top rival Drexel, leading the Dragons to consecutive North Atlantic Conference titles and NCAA Tournament berths in 1995 and 1996 under head coach Bill Herrion. The 1995-96 squad, led by current NBA veteran Malik Rose, posted a record of 27-4 and upset Memphis in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament.

Ross joined the Saint Joseph's staff in 1996-97 during Phil Martelli's second season as head coach. The Hawks rose to national prominence under Martelli, participating in post-season action seven times, including each of the Ross' final six seasons on Hawk Hill. During Ross' tenure, the Hawks won four Atlantic 10 regular season titles, one conference tournament title, posted five seasons with 20 or more wins, and averaged 23 wins over his final six seasons.

The Hawks advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times during his tenure, including a memorable 2003-04 season when Saint Joseph's posted a 30-2 record and advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight. The Hawks were a national story, going through the regular season undefeated and earning a No. 1 national ranking late in the season. Ross also helped Saint Joseph's advance to the NCAA Sweet 16 in 1997, to the NCAA second round in 2001, and to the NCAA first round in 2003. In 2005-06 Saint Joseph's went 19-14, advanced to the Atlantic 10 Tournament championship game, and advanced to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament. Saint Joseph's also made a run to the NIT title in 2004-05, going 24-12 and falling in the championship game. The Hawks won the Atlantic 10 title and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 during Ross' first season on Hawk Hill in 1996-97.

Ross, who served as the Hawks' recruiting coordinator and worked with the team's point guards, was instrumental in bringing three current NBA players to Saint Joseph's, including two first round draft picks in 2004 consensus National Player of the Year Jameer Nelson and Delonte West. Nelson currently plays for the Orlando Magic while West and Dwayne Jones are members of the Boston Celtics. Ross' tenure at Saint Joseph's was the third longest in school history for an assistant coach and he was honored in 2005 with the William J. Bennett Award, recognizing dedication and loyalty to the Saint Joseph's men's basketball program. He shared the award with fellow Saint Joseph's assistant Mark Bass.

In addition to his duties as an assistant at Saint Joseph's, Ross was active with the prestigious Sonny Hill League, serving as a head coach in the summer college league and as an assistant in the high school league.

In September, 2006, Ross and assistant coach Stephen Stewart visited Dakar, Senegal to conduct youth basketball clinics and a coaching seminar as part of a United States Department of State-funded International Basketball Initiative. They worked in conjunction with Basketball Without Borders Africa, a community relations outreach program of the NBA and also with the Senegalese Basketball Federation and the nonprofit organization Sports for Education and Economic Development in Senegal.

Ross and his wife, Michelle, reside in Media, PA with their son Justin, 8, and daughter Lauren, 6.
