DELAWARE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP QUICK HITS:

- Delaware will be looking to capture its seventh national championship in school history and its first since winning the 2003 NCAA I-AA championship with a 40-0 win over Colgate (the only shutout in FCS championship game history)
- The Blue Hens will be making their seventh appearance in a national championship game - their first since 2007 - and are 2-4 all-time in the finals
- A Colonial Athletic Association team has now advanced to the NCAA title game five straight years and seven times in the last eight years. Current CAA teams have won five national titles led by Massachusetts (1998), Delaware (2003), James Madison (2004), Richmond (2008), and Villanova (2009)
- Delaware head coach **K.C. Keeler** is 11-2 all-time in NCAA playoff action since coming to Delaware in 2002 and will be making his eighth national championship game appearance (5 at NCAA Division III Rowan and 3 at Delaware)
- Delaware's defense ranks No. 1 in the nation among all NCAA Division I teams (FCS and FBS) in scoring defense, allowing just 11.5 points per game
- Delaware is playing the nation's No. 1 ranked team for the 10 time in school history this week and for the first time since a 16-15 setback to top-ranked Richmond in 2009. The Hens are 3-6 all-time vs. No. 1 ranked teams and have lost two straight since a 39-27 win over Northern Iowa in the 2007 quarterfinals



• Delaware TE/Long Snapper **Zack Reed** and OT **Kevin Uhl** will each play in his 53rd career game vs. Eastern Washington Friday, breaking the UD record for games played of 52 set by TE **Rick Lavelle** in 2000-03

• All-American QB **Pat Devlin** (#17 at left) - a projected NFL draft pick - has thrown just two interceptions all season in 350 attempts and leads all FCS quarterbacks in pass completion pct. with a mark of 68.3 percent.

• Delaware is +6 in turnovers in three NCAA playoff games this season, including gaining five turnovers in the 27-10 NCAA semifinal win over Georgia Southern

DELAWARE VS. EASTERN WASHINGTON SERIES FACTS

- First meeting between the two schools in football
- Delaware is 2-0 all-time vs. teams from the Big Sky Conference, having defeated Montana 49-48 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in 2003 at Missoula, Mont. and having defeated Portland State 49-14 in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament in 2000 at Delaware Stadium
- Delaware and Eastern Washington have met on the athletic field just one other time when the Delaware men's basketball team defeated the Eagles 66-56 in the first round of the Oneida Bingo and Casino Classic at Wisconsin-Green Bay on Dec. 27, 2002.
- The campuses of Delaware and Eastern Washington are 2,537 miles part, making them the second farthest opponents in NCAA I FCS championship game history. Nevada and Georgia Southern, who played in the 1990 title game, are 2,602 miles apart.

LAST TIME OUT FOR DELAWARE

NEWARK, Del. -- (Dec. 18, 2010/AP) -- When Pat Devlin left Penn State for Delaware two years ago, this is the kind of moment he envisioned. The senior threw two touchdown passes and Delaware forced five turnovers to beat Georgia Southern 27-10 in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision semifinals at Delaware Stadium.



"It's why I came here," said Devlin, who completed 14 of 20 passes for 137 yards. "I came here to play in big games, I came here to play for championships. I'm just so excited that we're able to get there."

Delaware freshman **Andrew Pierce (at left)** ran for 186 yards on 26 carries to help the Blue Hens reach the title game for the third time since 2003.

Georgia Southern (10-5) couldn't overcome four lost fumbles, three of which came inside the Delaware 40.

"The fumbles were big," said first-year Georgia Southern coach Jeff Monken. "But turnovers are going to be big, especially when you play a good team. You can't have turnovers. Those cost us points. When you do that against a good football team, it's very difficult to win."

The Eagles, who had a six-game win streak snapped, pulled to 17-10 on Robert Brown's 6-yard touchdown run with 7:37 remaining. The

TD came on a fourth-and-goal with Brown taking a pitch around right end. It finished off a 16-play, 64-yard drive that took 8:27 off the clock.

But the Hens answered right back, going 60 yards on just three running plays to stretch the lead to 24-10. Pierce carried the ball twice for 52 yards on the drive before **David Hayes** scored on a 7-yard run up the middle with 6:05 remaining. Delaware added a 20-yard field goal by **Mike Perry** with 3:32 remaining to account for the game's final points.

"What a team effort to get a win like this," said Blue Hens coach **K.C. Keeler**.

The Hens pushed their advantage to 17-3 late in the third quarter when **Phillip Thaxton** scored on a 24-yard pass from Devlin. With Georgia Southern blitzing, Thaxton got an initial block after catching a screen pass and went the rest of the distance untouched.

The Hens took a 10-0 lead into halftime after Perry kicked a 21-yard field with 2:06 remaining. The kick capped off a seven-play, 66-yard march. Georgia Southern (10-5) got a 40-yard field goal from Adrian Mora on the first possession of the second half. A 53-yard run by Jerick McKinnon set up the kick.

Delaware used a 16-play, 85-yard drive to score the game's first touchdown. Devlin found **Mark Schenauer** in the back of the end zone for a 6-yard touchdown pass with 13:29 left in the second quarter. The drive was aided by a personal foul penalty on Georgia Southern after a third-down incompleteness at the Eagles 24.

Georgia Southern drove 71 yards to the Delaware 1 on its first possession, but Delaware defensive end **Chris Morales** recovered a fumble to end the drive. The Eagles also fumbled at the end of the first half after reaching the Delaware 18.

"Getting turnovers was something that we really focused on," said Keeler. "We thought we would have some chances. We knew that they averaged two fumbles a game and we wanted to be ready. It was a big boost for our defense to keep them out of the end zone."

LAST TIME OUT FOR EASTERN WASHINGTON

CHENEY, Wash. (Dec. 17, 2010/AP) -- There must have been some magic in that new red turf Eastern Washington bought. Bo Levi Mitchell threw four touchdown passes as Eastern Washington beat Villanova 41-31 in the semifinals of the FCS football playoffs.

The Eagles (12-2) improved to 8-0 on the red artificial turf they installed before the season. They advanced to the national title game for the first time.

"It's awesome," said linebacker J.C. Sherritt. "Getting a win in front of our home crowd, all those people that worked so hard to get us that turf, it's great."

Villanova (9-5), the defending national champions, lost four fumbles, each leading to EWU scores.

"It was the turnovers that really killed us," said Villanova coach Andy Talley. "We obviously didn't bring our 'A' game tonight."

Mitchell, who transferred to Eastern this season after losing the starting job at SMU, completed 27 of 38 passes for 292 yards and was not intercepted. Brandon Kaufman caught eight passes for 135 yards. The Eagles were without leading rusher Taiwan Jones, who gained 1,742 yards before suffering a broken foot against North Dakota State last weekend. Freshman Mario Brown ran for 104 yards.

Villanova was held to 230 yards of offense and committed six turnovers. Quarterback Chris Whitney completed just 12 of 21 passes for 95 yards and was intercepted twice.

Another fumble cost the Wildcats dearly when Angelo Babbaro was stripped of the ball deep in Villanova territory. Tyler Washburn caught it and ran 15 yards into the end zone for a 34-24 Eastern lead with 13:56 left.

Eastern's Alante Wright fumbled a punt return, and Babbaro recovered at the Eagles' 14. Whitney ran it in from the 2 to bring Villanova within 34-31 with 7:08 left. The Eagles burned up six minutes on their subsequent drive, which ended on fourth-and-4, when Mitchell threw a 23-yard pass to Greg Herd in the end zone.

In the first half, the Wildcats had the ball for just 10 minutes. Babbaro returned the opening kickoff 86 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead. But Mitchell hit Nicholas Edwards for a 31-yard touchdown pass on EWU's ensuing possession to tie the game. Villanova then fumbled the ball away three times on its next four possessions, after losing only 11 fumbles all season, to enable Eastern to take a 20-7 lead.

Whitney fumbled on the Wildcats' first play from scrimmage, and Eastern's Paul Ena recovered. The Eagles drove to the 6 before Mike Jarrett kicked a 24-yard field goal for a 10-7 lead. Villanova fumbled on its next series, the second fumble in only five plays from scrimmage, and Ena recovered again. Jarrett's 31-yard field goal gave Eastern a 13-7 lead.

Matt Szczur fumbled the ensuing kickoff, and EWU's Matt Johnson recovered. Mitchell passed 6 yards to Edwards for a 20-7 lead with 11:14 left in the half. Szczur powered over from the 1 to cut EWU's lead to 20-14, which was the halftime score.

Villanova recovered a fumble at the EWU 33, and Mark Hamilton's 35-yard field goal cut Eastern's lead to 20-17 with 7:10 left in the third quarter. Mitchell fired a short pass to Kaufman, who outran defenders down the right sideline for a 76-yard touchdown pass and a 27-17 EWU lead. Whitney scored from the 1 to bring the Wildcats within 27-24 at the end of the third quarter.

Eastern Washington made it to the semifinals before losing to Youngstown State in 1997. They have won 10 straight games after early losses at Nevada and Montana State.

Delaware, which has won 16 of its last 17 games when getting on the board first, has not lost a game when scoring first since a 20-8 setback to James Madison last Oct. 31, 2009 at Delaware Stadium. Delaware teams are 58-13 (.817) when they score first in head coach **K.C. Keeler's** nine seasons at the helm.

Keeler, who is also a candidate for the Eddie Robinson Award as the top coach in the FCS division as selected by The Sports Network, is joined by Villanova's Andy Talley, Danny Rocco of Liberty, Rob Ash of Montana State, and Beau Baldwin of Eastern Washington as the top five finalists.

The finalists were determined as a result of online fan voting and through an objective scoring model endorsed by the College Football Hall of Fame. Keeler qualified for the model by finishing among the top 15 in fan votes in the FCS division. The model considers, among other criteria: wins, team penalties, on-field sportsmanship, academic achievement by the student-athletes and civic and philanthropic endeavors.

To ensure candidates are evaluated fairly and measured against the specific values of responsibility and integrity, selection committees of College Football Hall of Fame players and coaches – including Archie Manning, Lou Holtz, Vince Dooley, Ronnie Lott, Archie Griffin as well as additional historic football coaches and players – and the national college football media, such as famed sports analysts, Kirk Herbstreit, Stewart Mandel and Tim Brando, will also cast votes for the winners.

Fan votes constitute 20 percent of a coach's final score, with College Football Hall of Fame comprising 55 percent and media, 25 percent.

Liberty Mutual will announce the four winners, one from each division, January 10 in Scottsdale, Ariz., prior to the BCS National Championship Game. The event will be televised live nationally on CBS College Sports Television.

If Keeler wins, he will receive \$50,000 to donate to the charities of his choice - he has selected the Boys and Girls Clubs, A.I. duPont Children's Hospital, and Autism Delaware - and a \$20,000 grant to his school's alumni association, providing further positive impact for Delaware and the local community.

Keeler and his wife, Janice, have been active in the community in various charitable endeavors. In addition, Keeler has organized his Blue Hen team members in several community service activities.

Among his charitable works are contributions to the Boys and Girls Club, A.I. duPont Children's Hospital, Autism Delaware, the Colonial Athletic Association Blood Challenge, the National Marrow Donor Program, the Food Bank of Delaware, Delaware Special Olympics, and the Turkey Roundup.

DELAWARE RECEIVING CORPS GETS IT DONE WITH BALANCE

University of Delaware head coach **K.C. Keeler** has said all season that he thinks his wide receiver corps is the best in the Colonial Athletic Association. Despite the fact that the Blue Hens did not have a single receiver earn All-CAA honors and that **QB Pat Devlin** was the league's most efficient passer on the way to earning CAA Offensive Player of the Year honors, it is hard to disagree.

The Blue Hens have done it with balance all season long. Devlin has had six reliable wideouts to throw to all season and each has made a strong contribution to the success of the Blue Hen offensive attack. None of the six - seniors **Mark Mackey, Tommy Crosby, and Phillip Thaxton**, junior **Mark Schenauer**, and sophomores **Nihja White** and **Rob Jones** have caught more than 55 passes, gained more than 679 yards, averaged better than 15.0 yards per catch, or scored more than six touchdowns, but they have combined to catch 200 passes for 2,526 yards, a 12.6-yard average, and 18 touchdowns.

BLUE HENS EARN SHARE OF CAA TITLE

Delaware earned a share of the Colonial Athletic Association title thanks to the Hens' 45-27 win over Massachusetts and William & Mary's 30-24 setback to James Madison back on Nov. 13. The Hens were looking to win their first outright conference title since 1995 and needed only a win over Villanova and/or a loss by William & Mary to Richmond on Nov. 20 but got neither.

Delaware has won 15 conference championships in school history, most recently in 2004, and have captured three league titles under head coach **K.C. Keeler** in nine seasons.

HENS FACE YET ANOTHER TOP 20 FOE THIS WEEK:

Delaware has three wins over Top 10 team this season and is 7-2 overall against Top 25 opponents.

The Hens are 3-1 in those games against Top 10 teams, defeating then No. 9 South Dakota 26-3 back on Sept. 11, posting a decisive 34-13 victory over then No. 5 Richmond on Sept. 25, knocking off then No. 3 James Madison 13-10 back on Oct. 2 with a last second field goal, and falling to No. 4 William & Mary by a 17-16 score back on Oct. 23 in Williamsburg, Va.

Delaware is 27-18 (.600) against Top 25 ranked opponents since **K.C. Keeler** took over the reigns in 2002, including an impressive mark of 17-7 (.708) at Delaware Stadium and a 10-11 (.476) mark on the road.

Against Top 10 opponents, Keeler is 16-11 (.592), including a mark of 9-5 (.643) at home and 7-6 (.538) on the road.

DELAWARE WILL BATTLE NATION'S TOP RANKED TEAM FOR FIFTH STRAIGHT YEAR:

When the Hens take on No. 1 ranked Eastern Washington this week in the national championship game, it will mark the 10th time in school history - and the fifth straight season - that Delaware has taken on the nation's top-ranked team.

The Hens are 3-6 all-time vs. No. 1 ranked teams and will be trying to improve upon last season's 16-15 setback to No. 1 Richmond.

The Hens had lost four straight games to top-ranked opponents before defeating Northern Iowa 39-27 in the 2007 NCAA quarterfinals at Cedar Falls, Iowa.

YET ANOTHER WINNING RECORD; HENS REACH 12-WIN MARK...AGAIN

A victory over Maine on Oct. 2 assured the Blue Hens of a .500 or better record for the second straight year and for the seventh time in nine seasons under **K.C. Keeler**. Delaware has not suffered back-to-back losing seasons since 1938-39, a milestone that few college teams in the nation at any level - and none in the CAA - can match. The Hens have reached 12 wins seven times in school history, most recently with a 15-1 record during the 2003 national championship season.

A win this week over Eastern Washington would give Delaware 13 wins for just the third time in school history - matching the 13-1 mark by the 1979 NCAA Division II national title team and the 15-1 FCS national championship squad in 2003.

Delaware posted a 7-0 start for the ninth time in school history this season and for just the second time under Keeler. The Hens started out 9-0 on the way to the 2003 national championship campaign.

EARLY AND LATE DOMINATION

Delaware has dominated most of the action this season, but it is particularly true during the start and finish of games. The Hens had not allowed a point in either the first or fourth quarters before the William & Mary game on Oct. 23 when the Tribe kicked a field goal in the opening quarter and scored the game-winning touchdown in the final stanza.

Still, the Hens have outscored opponents 88-34 in the first quarter, 230-80 in the first half, and 68-34 in the fourth quarter this season. Massachusetts became the first team to score a touchdown in the first quarter against the Hens this season when the Minutemen scored with 1:21 left in the first quarter on Nov. 13. Villanova also added two first quarter touchdowns in the regular season finale Nov. 20, handing Delaware its first largest deficit of the season at 14-0. Lehigh also scored a touchdown in the first quarter of the NCAA second round playoff game on Dec. 4 and New Hampshire converted a first quarter field goal in the NCAA quarterfinal game.

Another sign of the Blue Hens' late-game domination is in time of possession where UD owns an average advantage in possession time of 9:56 to 5:04 in the stanza.

DELAWARE HOLDING THE LEAD 86 PERCENT OF THE TIME

The Blue Hens have been impressive this season, gaining a share of the CAA title with a 12-2 record (6-2 in league play) with impressive wins over No. 9 South Dakota State, No. 5 Richmond, and No. 3 James Madison plus NCAA playoff wins over nationally-ranked Lehigh, New Hampshire, and Georgia Southern.

Delaware has either held the lead or have been tied after 51 of the 57 quarters played this season and have tied or held the lead for 728 minutes of the 840 minutes played this season (86.7 percent of the time).

The Hens had not trailed the entire season until Oct. 2 when James Madison took a 10-7 lead into halftime on a field goal with 59 seconds left in the half. Delaware regained a share of the lead early in the fourth quarter and went to win the game on a last second field goal. Delaware then held the lead the entire season until Nov. 20 when Villanova returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown.

DELAWARE SALUTES 21 SENIORS

Senior Day is always a special event at Delaware Stadium and on Nov. 20 vs. Villanova, Delaware saluted the 21 UD seniors who were playing their final regular season home game. Each player was recognized with his parents and family members in a pre-game ceremony at midfield.

Daino, Void, Horton, Cipalla, and Burrows did not play this season due to injuries.

HOME SWEET HOME

Delaware boasts one of the top home-field advantages in all of college football. Not only do Blue Hen fans pack Delaware Stadium each week - helping UD become the only NCAA FCS team in the nation to average 20,000 or more fans per regular season home game each of the last 12 seasons - they see consistently winning football.

Delaware has posted an impressive record of 50-16 (.757) in nine seasons under **K.C. Keeler** at Delaware Stadium - among the top marks at any division of college football. Delaware had won seven straight at home - its longest home win skein since

winning nine straight between 2004-05 - before falling to Villanova 28-21 in overtime in the regular season finale on Nov. 20.

Of the 16 losses, seven have come by six points or less or in overtime. The Hens have scored more than 20 points in all but nine of those 65 games. Delaware has won 21 of its last 28 home games and is 278-87-4 (.763) in 59 seasons all-time at Delaware Stadium, including a mark of 20-5 with eighth straight wins in the post-season.

BLUE HEN DEFENSE CONTINUES TO DOMINATE

Delaware Still Leads All NCAA Division I FCS Teams in Scoring Defense

The University of Delaware defense has been dominant all year, becoming the last team in NCAA college football to allow a touchdown this season when the Hens gave up a score late in the first half to Richmond game Sept. 25, ending a streak of 14 quarters and 233 minutes of total game time that dated back to the third quarter of the 2009 season finale vs. Villanova.

Delaware and NCAA Division III Maine Maritime each had entered the day having not allowed a touchdown, but MMA allowed a score early in a loss at Fitchburg State, snapping both streaks.

The Hens are the nation's No. 1 ranked scoring defense in all of NCAA Division I (FCS and FBS) football for the 14th straight week as they enter the national championship gam having allowed an average of just 11.5 points per game - even better than NCAA FBS leader TCU (12.0).

Delaware ranks No. 1 in the CAA in scoring defense (11.5), total defense (277.4/5th in NCAA), passing efficiency defense (98.64/4th in NCAA), and ranks No. 2 in rushing defense (111.0/5th in NCAA) and pass defense (166.4/19th).

In opening the season with wins of 31-0 over West Chester, 26-3 over South Dakota State, and 30-6 over Duquesne, Delaware held three straight opponents without a touchdown for the first time since 1977-78.

Against Maine on Oct. 2, the Hens allowed their first home touchdown of the season when the Black Bears scored midway through the third quarter. Until that score, Delaware had held opponents out of the end zone at Delaware Stadium for a span of 240 minutes over five games dating back to last season. The next week, Rhode Island scored a season-high 17 points against the Hen defense (although one of the touchdowns came on a kickoff return).

Delaware held its first nine opponents to 17 points or less this season, the longest streak since the 1972 season when the Blue Hens, on the way to the wire service national championship, held each of its last nine opponents under 17 points..

The Delaware defense held four opponents to under 300 total yards of offense - 234 vs. Richmond, 283 vs. JMU, 237 vs. Maine, and 278 vs. Rhode Island - before William & Mary gained 350 total yards vs. the Hens in the last outing. The last time a Blue Hen defense had held four straight opponents under 300 yards came in 2007.

The Hens put it all together in a 48-0 win over Towson Nov. 6, posting its first shutout since the 2009 opener and holding the Tigers to just eight first downs and 158 total yards. Towson had no player go for more than 10 yards and the Tigers went 0 for 14 on third down conversions.

Delaware stopped 16 straight third down tries before UMass converted in the first quarter on Nov. 13. However, the Minutemen went just 2 of 12 on third down for the game.

Blue Hen opponents have converted just 16 of their last 76 third down attempts (21.0 percent) over the last seven games. Delaware's season success mark of 70.9 percent (55 of 189) on third down ranks No. 6 nationally.

SCORING STREAK REACHES 185...AND COUNTING

Delaware extended its streak of scoring a point to 185 straight games in the 27-10 NCAA semifinal win over Georgia Southern on Dec. 18. Delaware has not been shutout in any game since falling at Villanova 27-0 back on Sept. 14, 1996 and have not been held off the scoreboard at home a Delaware Stadium since suffering a 24-0 setback to Holy Cross way back on Nov. 12, 1983 (a streak of 184 straight games).

The current scoring streak breaks the previous UD record of consecutive game scoring a point of 154 set in 1983-98. **Delaware's streak of consecutive road games scoring a point now stands at 83 games.**

During the streak, the Hens have scored 30 or more points 81 times (42 percent of the time). The current streak ranks No. 3 among Colonial Athletic Association teams, trailing only Massachusetts (188) and New Hampshire (186).

IMPRESSIVE ATTENDANCE STREAK CONTINUES

The Hens' impressive streak of averaging over 20,000 fans per regular season home game has continued after a sellout crowd of 22,891 attended Delaware's regular season finale Nov. 20 vs. Villanova.

The crowd of 22,891 was the seventh largest in Delaware Stadium history, the biggest ever in the Villanova series, and the largest since the 1992 season.

Delaware ranked No. 4 in the FCS in average regular attendance with a mark of Appalachian State (29,449), Montana (25,448), and Jackson State (24,140).

Delaware has extended its streak to 12 straight seasons of 20,000 or more fans, a streak longer than any other school at the NCAA Division I FCS level.

Delaware drew a crowd of 13,649 for the NCAA second round playoff game vs. Lehigh on Dec. 4 and drew an enthusiastic 8,770 for the NCAA quarterfinal win over New Hampshire last week at chilly Delaware Stadium. The Blue Hens' NCAA semifinal win over Georgia Southern back on Dec. 18 drew a crowd of 10,317.

Delaware's largest playoff crowds in Delaware history were 19,765 vs. Delaware State in the first round in 2007 and 16,390 vs. Lehigh in the 2000 quarterfinals.

NO. 1 RANKED BLUE HENS HAD A NICE RING TO IT

Delaware has been ranked in the Top 20 the entire season in both The Sports Network and in the FCS Coaches poll and moved up as high as No. 1 in the TSN poll on Nov. 15 and in the FCS Coaches poll on Nov. 8 and Nov. 15.

The No. 1 ranking marked the first time since Sept. 29, 1981 that the Hens were ranked No. 1 in a regular season poll. Delaware was also picked No. 1 in the final 2003 poll and in the 2004 pre-season poll.

Delaware opened the season No. 16 in the TSN poll and moved into the top 10 on Sept. 20 and has stayed in the Top 10 ever since.

A total of four Colonial Athletic Association teams appeared in the TSN final regular season Top 25 - No. 4 William & Mary, No. 5 Delaware, No. 10 Villanova, and No. 11 New Hampshire.

In the FCS Coaches poll, William & Mary is No. 4, Delaware is No. 5, New Hampshire is No. 10, and Villanova is No. 11.

The Hens are currently ranked No. 2 in the ECAC Lambert Meadowlands poll behind William & Mary and ahead of Villanova, Penn, New Hampshire, Lehigh, James Madison, Harvard, Richmond, and Robert Morris.

The final polls for each will be announced following the FCS National Championship Game on Jan. 7.

HENS' DEVLIN, REED, MACKEY HONORED BY COSIDA FOR ACADEMICS:

The nationally-ranked University of Delaware football team is not only getting the job done on the field this season, the Blue Hens are also excelling in the classroom as well. Delaware placed a team-high three student-athletes on the ESPN/College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) District 2 All-Academic first team announced last week as a trio of seniors in quarterback **Pat Devlin**, wide receiver **Mark Mackey**, and tight end **Zack Reed** were honored. Mackey and Devlin were both honored for the second time in their careers.

The three UD scholar-athletes were among 24 players named to the team, which is comprised of NCAA Division I players at both the Football Championship Subdivision and Football Bowl Subdivision.

Student-athletes must carry a 3.3 or better grade point index, be a starter or key reserve, and be a sophomore or older. District 2 includes all schools in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and West Virginia.

This year marks the second straight season that the Hens have placed more than one player on the District 2 first team as last year Mackey and tight end **Trevor Mooney** were selected. A total of 16 players have been honored on the CoSIDA District team in nine seasons under head coach **K.C. Keeler**. Delaware's total of three selections was matched only by three each from Penn State and Robert Morris while Navy, Pennsylvania, and Bucknell each had two selections. In all, athletes from 15 schools were represented on the team.

The Hens, who had 13 players named to the CAA All-Academic team a year ago, had three other ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-American nominees this year in junior OL **Rob McDowell**, DE **Ethan Clark**, and special teams player **Chris Campbell**.

Devlin is also a nominee for the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame National Scholar-Athlete Postgraduate Scholarship.

FORMER BLUE HEN STANDOUT GRIDDETS TOTO, VERGANTINO GET HALL OF FAME NOD

The University of Delaware announced its 2010 UD Athletics Hall of Fame Class last week and the group included two former Blue Hen football standouts in running back **Tony Toto** and quarterback **Bill Vergantino**.

The two were among eight former greats honored in a ceremony Nov. 19 in the Bob Carpenter Center and recognized on the field prior to the Nov. 20 home football game vs. Villanova at Delaware Stadium.

A star fullback for the Blue Hens during the mid-1950's for Hall of Fame head coach Dave Nelson, Toto led Delaware to a three-year mark of 17-7-1 and established several school records.

A native of Old Bridge, N.J., he earned All-American honors by both the Associated Press (2nd team) and the United Press International (honorable mention) as a senior in 1957 when he ran 84 times for a then school-record 715 yards. His 143.0 yards per game that season, which included back-to-back efforts of 183 yards vs. Temple and 169 yards vs. Bucknell, still stands as a school record with his 8.5 yards per carry the third best mark in school history. He finished his career with 1,195 yards and 11 touchdowns rushing and his 6.39 yards per carry ranked No. 2 all-time.

Known for his heart and determination and his ability to direct the Wing-T offense to near perfection, Vergantino was a rare four-year starting quarterback for the Blue Hens and led Delaware to some of its greatest triumphs for Hall of Fame head coach Tubby Raymond.

A native of Levittown, Pa., Vergantino established 24 school records during his career in 1989-92 and led the Hens to a combined record of 34-14 with NCAA I-AA Tournament appearances in 1991 and 1992 and two Lambert Cup Trophies.

He served as co-captain for the 1992 squad that advanced all the way to the national semifinals. He established school career standards for most wins by a quarterback (34), total offensive yards (9,051), yards passing (9,051), touchdown passes (47), and yards rushing by a quarterback (2,564) and was named the 1993 UD Outstanding Senior Male Athlete of the Year.

A 1993 Delaware graduate, he passed for 1,536 yards as a freshman in 1989 when he was named the ECAC Eastern and Yankee Conference Rookie of the Year.

SUCCESS FOR THE COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The claim that the Blue Hens play in the most competitive conference in the nation - the Colonial Athletic Association - continues to ring true. CAA teams have combined for a non-league record of 25-15 this season, including James Madison's 21-16 major upset over Virginia Tech back on Sept. 11. Of those 15 losses, eight have been to NCAA FBS opponents, including William & Mary's tough 21-17 setback at North Carolina.

In addition to Delaware, CAA foes Villanova, New Hampshire, and William & Mary all advanced to the NCAA Tournament this season. Villanova, the defending national champion, fell to Eastern Washington in the national semifinals on Dec. 17.

NEW LOOK TO THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

The NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff system has a new look this season. This year 20 teams were selected to participate, up four spots from the previous total of 16 that had existed since the 1980's. The top 12 teams earned byes in the first round with the other eight teams playing four first round games on Nov. 28. The date and site of the championship game will also be new this season as Frisco, Texas will host the title game on Jan. 7 at Pizza Hut Park. The title game had been held in Chattanooga, Tenn. since 1997.

VERY PRESIDENTIAL...

No less than seven members of the University of Delaware football team have the same surnames as former U.S. Presidents, including the Hens' top three running backs - **Andrew Pierce, Dave Hayes, and Leon Jackson.**

Other Blue Hens with presidential surnames are **Andrew Harrison, Tyrone Grant, Bobby Kennedy, and Justin Johnson.**

TURF WARS

Tubby Raymond Field at Delaware Stadium has a new look this season with the addition of artificial turf. For the first time since the venue was built in 1952, the on-field action will not be played on natural grass but on FieldTurf. The carpet was installed over the winter by Clark Companies of New Delhi, N.Y., one of the nation's leaders in turf installation. The quality of the surface received rave reviews by players and coaches alike following spring drills in which the venue was used extensively, including the Blue-White Spring Game in April.

NICE DECADE

No team in the Colonial Athletic Association won more games than Delaware's 78 victories (Villanova also won 78) during the last decade and no team captured more NCAA Tournament victories than the Hens' total of 10 between 2000 and 2009 either. Delaware was also the only CAA squad to make two NCAA championship game appearances during that 10-year span, winning it all in 2003 and dropping a title game decision in 2007. The Hens started a new decade in 2010 looking to snap a streak of two straight seasons without a post-season appearance. In fact, Delaware still has not gone three straight years without an NCAA playoff showing since 1983-85.

TV EXPOSURE

The lights and cameras once again have shined on the Blue Hens in 2010 as Delaware appeared on regional television five times and will be making its third national appearance this week vs. Eastern Washington (ESPN2).

Delaware games at Richmond on Sept. 25, at James Madison on Oct. 2, at William & Mary on Oct. 23, and at home for the season finale vs. defending national champion Villanova were all part of the CAA TV package and were shown to millions of homes throughout the East on The Comcast Network and Comcast SportsNet New England.

Delaware second round NCAA playoff win over Lehigh Dec. was televised live on WFMZ Channel 69 throughout the Lehigh Valley (Pa.), Philadelphia, and parts of New Jersey and Delaware.

The New Hampshire quarterfinal game on Dec. 10 was televised live nationally on ESPN2 and the Georgia Southern semifinal game on Dec. 18 was televised live nationally on ESPNU. The Hens will be making their 13th appearance on an ESPN channel since 2003 this week.

BEEN AROUND THE BLOCK A FEW TIMES

Few college teams in the country can boast the vast coaching experience of Delaware's offensive and defensive coordinators. Blue Hen defensive leader **Nick Rapone** and second-year offensive head man **Jim Hoffer** have combined for an incredible 58 years of college coaching experience - each with 29 campaigns under their belts - including 22 years as coordinators. Hoffer served as head coach at his alma mater, Cornell, in 1990-97 and at Buffalo in 2001-05. Together they have coached over 620 games on the college level.

CONFERENCE SUCCESS

The name of the Blue Hens' conference affiliation changed to the Colonial Athletic Association from the Atlantic 10 prior to the 2007 season, but the 10 teams stayed the same. Delaware is maintaining its outstanding success in league play just the same. Delaware is currently playing its 25th season in the CAA (originally the Yankee Conference before becoming the Atlantic 10 in 1997) this fall.

Delaware has been the pride of the CAA since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th conference victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass. The Blue Hens, who are now 130-69 (.653) overall in league play since joining the conference in 1986, have won eight CAA/A-10 titles (1986-88-91-92-95-2000-2003-2004).

The .653 winning percentage is tops among the 10 league schools with Massachusetts (.634) the only other team that has won more than 60 percent of its league games all-time.

A BLUE HEN IN THE WHITE HOUSE...AND AT DELAWARE STADIUM

When U.S. President **Barack Obama** and running mate, former Delaware Senator **Joe Biden**, won the 2008 presidential election, it was big news. And even bigger news for the citizens of Delaware and those affiliated with the University of Delaware.

A 1965 graduate of the University of Delaware with degrees in history and political science, Biden played on the Blue Hen freshman football team in 1961 under head coach **Scotty Duncan**. Biden, a member of the UD Wall of Fame and an ardent Delaware football fan, considered himself "a half-baked halfback" during his brief UD football career.

Biden made his first visit to Delaware Stadium as Vice-President on Saturday, Oct. 9, as he attended the Maine game and sat with UD President Patrick Harker and current New Jersey Governor Chris Christie (also a UD graduate) throughout the entire contest.

He made another visit to Delaware Stadium this fall when he attended Delaware's 16-3 NCAA quarterfinal win over New Hampshire on Dec. 10. He may also attend this week's national title game along with Christie and Delaware Gov. Jack Markell.

Biden met with head coach **K.C. Keeler** and members of the team on Sept. 19, 2008 when Biden's plane was parked on the same tarmac as the Delaware charter at New Castle County (Del.) prior to its trip to Furman. Biden later made an appearance at the Blue Hens' game vs. Maine at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 11, 2008 and received a rousing applause while being mobbed by well-wishers.

YES VIRGINIA, IT IS A TOUGH PLACE TO PLAY

Any coach in the Colonial Athletic Association will tell you that playing games vs. James Madison, Richmond, and William & Mary are about as difficult as they come. Try playing all three on the road in the same year and the thought of sweeping all three seems almost impossible. Well, in fact, it has never been done.

Since 1993, the year that all three first became members of the CAA (then the Yankee Conference and later the Atlantic 10 Conference), no team has had to face a schedule that included playing all three games in Virginia.

Until this year that is. This season Delaware became the first CAA team to face a schedule that consists of road games vs. each of the three Virginia schools in the same season.

And the Hens almost handled it flawless, defeating then #5 Richmond (34-13 on Sept. 25) and #3 James Madison (13-10 on Oct. 2) before dropping a tough 17-16 verdict to then #4 William & Mary on Oct. 23 in Williamsburg.

KILLER SCHEDULE: HENS MOVE TO NO. 3 IN TOUGHEST SCHEDULE LIST

Delaware faces one of the nation's toughest schedules this fall, thanks in part to the grind that is the Colonial Athletic Association. Delaware has finished with one of the nation's most difficult schedules in NCAA FCS each of the last three seasons, ranking No. 2 in 2007, No. 3 in 2008, and No. 2 in 2009 based on cumulative winning percentages of all opponents.

Delaware foes have combined to win at least 60 percent of their games in 2007, 2008, and 2009. The 11 opponents on this year's regular season schedule, which featured four teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2009 (South Dakota State, Richmond, William & Mary, and Villanova), posted a combined record of 73-58 (.557) a year ago.

Delaware's schedule currently ranks No. 3 in the nation with an opponent winning pct. of .606 through the first four rounds of the NCAA playoffs. Villanova's schedule is the toughest with opponents posting a .664 winning percentage. New Hampshire is second (.608) followed by Delaware (.606), Savannah State (.602), James Madison (.600), William & Mary (.598), Eastern Washington (.593), Chattanooga (.591), Georgia Southern (.579), and Robert Morris (.565) in the top 10.

THREE BLUE HENS IN THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE THIS FALL

Delaware football has three former standouts competing on the field and one on a practice squad in the National Football League this fall. In addition to QB **Joe Flacco**, now in his third season as the Ravens' starting quarterback after leading the team to the AFC title game in 2008 and a playoff berth in 2009, TE **Ben Patrick** is in his fourth season as a backup with the 2008 Super Bowl runner-up Arizona Cardinals, and DB **Mike Adams** is now in his seventh NFL season as a part-time starting safety, including his fourth year with the Cleveland Browns.

Flacco has led the Ravens to the NFL playoff for the third straight season this fall and will be playing this weekend vs. the Kansas City Chiefs.

In addition to those three, TE **Robbie Agnone** is on the Atlanta Falcons develop-

mental squad and **Ronald Talley**, who was released in pre-season by Green Bay, is on the Arizona Cardinals developmental squad. DT **Brandon Gilbeau** (Tampa Bay) was released during the summer after signing with the team as a free agent following the draft.

DEVLIN TOP 10 FINALIST FOR JOHNNY UNITAS GOLDEN ARM AWARD:

Senior quarterback **Pat Devlin** was selected as one of 10 finalists for the prestigious Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award midway through the 2010 season.

However, Devlin did not make the Top 5 finalists that were announced in late November.

The Downingtown, Pa. native (Downingtown West High School) survived the first cut as the list, originally a field of 22, was cut down to 10. Devlin was the only NCAA Division I Football Championship Division player among the finalists.

Named after the man many refer to as the greatest quarterback ever to play the game of football, the prestigious Golden Arm Award is presented annually to the nation's top senior college quarterback by the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation, Inc. and presenting sponsor, Transamerica, a leading provider of innovative business and personal financial services. An 18-year veteran of the NFL and a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Unitas played his collegiate career at the University of Louisville (1951-1954), passing for 3007 yards and 27 touchdowns.

Devlin was joined in the final 10 by Andy Dalton of TCU, Nathan Enderle of Idaho, Colin Kaepernick of Nevada, Jake Locker of Washington, Greg McElroy of Alabama, Christian Ponder of Florida State, Ricky Stanzl of Iowa, Tyrod Taylor of Virginia Tech, and Scott Tolzien of Wisconsin.

Devlin was also listed among the Top 20 finalists for the Walter Payton National Player of the Year Award but did not make the final three.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware posted another early-season win over West Chester as freshman running back Andrew Pierce ran for 119 yards in his collegiate debut, All-American candidate Pat Devlin threw for three touchdowns, and Anthony Walters led the defense with two interceptions as the No. 16 Hens cruised to the win.

The Blue Hens (1-0) didn't show mid-season form just yet, fumbling the ball away twice and committing six penalties, but it was an effective effort as Delaware downed the NCAA Division II power Rams for the 17th straight time and posted a shutout over the Golden Rams (0-1) for the second straight year. The Hens have won each of the last eight meetings by at least 18 points.

Pierce, a sturdy 5-11, 200-pounder, earned the starting nod over two returning veterans during pre-season and showed just why Thursday night as he rushed 13 times for 119 yards, including a 22-yard burst around the left side that gave Delaware a 14-0 lead just over a minute into the second half.

Devlin, a senior and second-year starter who is a candidate for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision, was efficient as usual, completing 14 of 23 passes for 163 yards and three touchdowns before giving way to backup Trevor Sasek late in the third quarter.

Delaware, looking to rebound from a 6-5 record a year ago, treated the opening night crowd of 19,421 to a fun evening as the Hens jumped out to a 21-0 lead at halftime and never looked back.

The Hens opened the scoring late in the first quarter as Devlin hit sophomore wide receiver Nihja White in the right flat and White outraced a Ram defender to sneak into the front corner of the end zone.

Pierce gave the Hens a 14-0 lead on his 22-yard burst early in the second quarter, and Devin found Tommy Crosby on a fade pattern in the left side of the end zone with 3:12 left in the half. Delaware had the chance to make it even more, but sophomore Rob Jones fumbled just two yards shy of the end zone with just 21 seconds left in the half.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware dominated both sides of scrimmage, piling up 257 yards behind the running of freshman RB Andrew Pierce and holding South Dakota State to just 25 yards on the ground as the No. 16 Blue Hens posted an impressive win over the No. 9 Jackrabbits.

The Blue Hens (2-0) snapped a six-game losing streak vs. Top 10 opponents - posting their first win since a 20-17 victory over Southern Illinois in the 2007 FCS semifinals - and did so in a big way, jumping out to a 17-0 lead after the first quarter and never looking back in a battle of FCS powers. South Dakota State (0-1) was an NCAA Tournament participant a year ago.

Pierce, a 5-11, 200 lb. freshman, was a workhorse, carrying 26 times for 165 yards and a touchdown and becoming the first player in UD history to run for over 100 yards in each of his first two collegiate games. His 165 yards was the third highest single game mark ever for a UD freshman and was just 12 shy of teammate Phillip Thaxton's record of 177 set in 2007.

Delaware QB Pat Devlin, a candidate for the Walter Payton National Player of the Year Award, completed 14 of 25 passes for 143 yards and finding seven different receivers in the first quarter alone for Delaware. He tossed a seven-yard scoring strike to Thaxton just five minutes into the game as the Hens jumped out to a 7-0 lead and never looked back.

The Blue Hen defense was just as impressive for the second straight week. After shutting down West Chester by a 31-0 score the previous week, the Hens almost equalled that effort again as they held the Jackrabbits to just 250 total yards, including just 25 yards rushing.

SDSU All-American running back Kyle Minett, who ranked among the national leaders with 1,304 yards and 16 touchdowns a year ago and entered the game with over 3,000 career rushing yards, was held to just 32 yards on 14 carries, his lowest single game total since taking over the starting duties as a sophomore.

The Hens also picked off SDSU quarterback Thomas O'Brien three times, including two by safety Anthony Bratton. Delaware kept the Jackrabbits out of the end zone all day, stopping the final drive of the game when Matt Marcorelle intercepted a pass in the end zone. The Hens have now intercepted six passes in two games this season and have held opponents without a touchdown for the last 143 minutes of game action over three games dating back to last season.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware freshman sensation Andrew Pierce continued his dominant running, setting a UD rookie record with 200 yards and two touchdowns, Trevor Sasek was solid in his first collegiate start at quarterback, and Tyrone Grant set the tone by returning an interception for a touchdown two minutes into the game as the No. 11 Blue Hens ran past Duquesne.

The Hens (3-0), off to their best start since the 2007 national runner-up season, dominated the line of scrimmage, rolling up 373 yards on the ground behind Pierce and holding the Dukes (1-2) to 326 total yards for the game while also intercepting three passes.

Pierce carried 16 times for 200 yards and two scores, setting a UD single freshman rushing record and becoming just the sixth player in school history to reach the 200-yard plateau. He became the first UD player to rush for over 100 yards in three straight games since Omar Cuff in 2007. The old UD freshman mark was 177 set by Phillip Thaxton in 2007.

Meanwhile, the Delaware defense that entered the game leading the nation in scoring (1.5) and total defense (182.5), was at it again, holding the Dukes to just two field goals. The Hens have not allowed a touchdown since the third quarter of last year's season finale, extending a streak to 13 quarters and 203 minutes of action. Delaware has now gone three straight games without allowing a touchdown for the first time the 1977 and 1978 seasons.

Sasek, a redshirt freshman who was making his first career start in place of the injured Pat Devlin, was solid, completing 7 of 9 passes for 75 yards and a 23-yard touchdown pass to Thaxton to cap the scoring. Devlin was available to play but was held out after fracturing his left wrist in the 26-3 win over South Dakota State this week.

Delaware got all the points they would need in the opening minutes when Grant intercepted a pass by Duquesne's Sean Patterson and weaved his way through a maze of Dukes players for a 45-yard touchdown just over two minutes into the game. Grant, who later intercepted another pass to increase Delaware's national leading total to nine, tied a school record with his third career interception for a touchdown, equalling the mark set by Kenny Bailey in 1993-96.

The Hens came up with a huge defensive stand on Duquesne's next possession when Delaware kept the Dukes out of the end zone, stopping running back Larry McCoy on a fourth and goal at the one with middle linebacker Matt Marcorelle making the tackle. All the Dukes could manage on the night were two field goals by Eric Duale.

RICHMOND, Va. -- No. 7 ranked Delaware left little doubt of how ready it is for the rigors of CAA football action, breaking open a close game and racing to the victory over No. 5 Richmond.

Blue Hen QB Pat Devlin, returning to action after missing a week with a fractured wrist, didn't miss a beat as he threw for 240 yards despite wearing a cast on his non-throwing hand, and freshman sensation Andrew Pierce had another big game, grinding out 114 yards on the ground and scoring three touchdowns to lead the victory.

The Delaware defense allowed its first touchdowns of the season, but it hardly mattered as the Hens held Richmond to 14 first downs and 234 total yards. The Hens (4-0, 1-0 CAA) downed the defending CAA champion Spiders (1-2, 0-1 CAA) for the first time since the 2006 season.

After Richmond tied the game at 13-13 midway through the third quarter, Delaware came right back and posted three scoring drives of 77 yards or more to put the game away.

Devlin, an All-American nominee and a candidate for the Walter Payton National Player of the Year Award, shook off his first interception of the season on the Hens' first drive and finished the day completing 14 of 21 passes for 240 yards. He hit eight different receivers on the day and had 12 completions go for 10 or more yards.

Pierce had to work for everything he could in carrying 26 times for 114 yards, breaking the 100-yard barrier for the fourth straight week. His two-yard scoring run early in the second quarter gave the Hens a 13-0 lead and his touchdown runs of 13 and 8 yards in the second half helped increase the Delaware lead to 27-13 with 12:06 left to play. His backup, sophomore David Hayes, finished with 82 yards on the day, capped the scoring with a 40-yard burst with 2:30 left. The two helped the Hens gain 236 of their impressive 476 total yards on the ground.

The Blue Hen defense, which entered the game as the only NCAA school in the country that had not allowed a touchdown all season, continued to dominate, holding the Spiders to just 234 total yards. Richmond broke the Hens' streak when QB Aaron Corp hit TE Kevin Finney on an 11-yard scoring strike in the back of the end zone with just 30 seconds left in the first half to cut the lead to 13-6 at the break. Delaware had not allowed a touchdown all season and had not allowed an opponent in the end zone since the third quarter of the Villanova game last season, a span of 14 quarters and 233 minutes of game action.

HARRISONBURG, Va. -- On a day when Delaware QB Pat Devlin played just two snaps and Andrew Pierce found rushing yards tough to come by, it was the reliable Blue Hen defense that rode to the rescue once again.

Delaware, which won for the first time at James Madison since 2001, posted its third victory over a top-five ranked opponent this season and put itself in the CAA driver's seating.

Trevor Sasek was pressed into action early when Devlin suffered a concussion on the Hen's second offensive play, ending his day. Sasek rose to the occasion as he completed 13 of 21 passes for 124 yards and engineered the winning drive that saw the Hens go 69 yards on 14 plays to set up Perry's game-winning kick.

Perry, in his first year as the Blue Hen kicker, also did his job in a big way. His career-long 47-yarder on the first play of the fourth quarter capped a 39-yard drive and knotted the score at 10-10. His winning kick marked the first time since Oct. 10, 1987 that Delaware won a game on a field goal in the final minute of regulation.

While Sasek and Perry stepped up to do their part, once again top honors went to the Delaware defense, which entered the game ranked No. 1 among all NCAA Division I teams, allowing a stingy 5.5 points per game as well as a No. 1 ranking in interceptions (10) and a third place ranking in total defense (231.2 yards per game).

The Hens, who got 11 tackles from strong safety Anthony Bratton, 10 stops and an interception from free safety Darryl Jones, and 10 tackles from linebacker Paul Worrilow, allowed James Madison just 69 of its 283 total yards in the second half.

All the Dukes could manage on the day was a one-yard scoring run by Scott Noble that tied the game at 7-7 with 9:43 left in the second quarter and a 20-yard field goal by Dixon Wright just 59 seconds before halftime that put them up 10-7 at intermission. Noble's touchdown was set up by a 47-yard jaunt down the middle to the Delaware six-yard line by Jamal Sullivan, who finished with a game-high 93 yards rushing but managed only 11 of that after the break.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware may not have played perfectly, but the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens stayed perfect with a CAA victory over Maine on a picture-perfect sunny day.

Delaware, which remained undefeated with a 6-0 mark (3-0 CAA), took advantage of three Maine turnovers and All-American candidate Pat Devlin bounced back with a solid passing effort to send the Hens to a relatively easy victory against a tough opponent. They did so in front of a special guest as former Delaware Senator and current U.S. Vice-President Joe Biden attended the game to cheer on his alma mater.

Maine (2-4, 1-2 CAA), which was coming off a 17-14 overtime victory over then No. 14 New Hampshire last week, could never overcome the miscues and managed just 237 total yards on the day.

The Hens, who entered as the top defensive unit in the nation at the NCAA Division I level, allowing just 6.4 points per game, jumped out to a 19-0 lead at halftime and built the margin to 26-0 early in the third quarter before allowing a late third-quarter score by the Black Bears.

Delaware linebacker Paul Worrilow opened the scoring when he returned a fumble 11 yards for a touchdown midway through the first quarter, cornerback Tyrone Grant intercepted a pass just in front of the UD goal line late in the second quarter to set up a Blue Hen field goal just before the half, and linebacker Andrew Harrison put an end to another Black Bear drive when he recovered a fumble at the Delaware 24-yard line early in the final quarter.

Devlin, who missed all but one play in last week's 13-10 win over James Madison due to a concussion, bounced back with a solid effort as he completed 20 of 36 passes for a season-high 283 yards and fired a 10-yard touchdown pass to freshman running back Andrew Pierce in the second quarter. Devlin's favorite target on the day was sophomore Rob Jones, who caught six passes for 105 yards.

Pierce, who leads all NCAA FCS freshmen in rushing at 130.6 yards per game, had another big day as he ran for 96 yards and scored on a three-yard run in the third quarter to push the lead to 26-0. He upped his season rushing total to 749 yards, breaking the UD season freshman record of 708 set by Craig Cummings in 1997. The Hens, off to a 6-0 start for the first time since a 9-0 start vaulted them to the NCAA I-AA national championship title, have now won their first three conference games for the first time since the 2007 season when the Hens also advanced to the national championship game.

NEWARK, Del. -- The resounding sigh of relief heard throughout Delaware Stadium might have been stronger than the high winds that blew all afternoon.

No. 2 Delaware won the turnover battle once again and it needed all three of the take-aways as the Blue Hens jumped out to a 17-0 lead but had to hold on down the stretch to remain unbeaten with a CAA victory over upset-minded Rhode Island before a wind-swept sellout crowd.

Delaware (7-0, 4-0 CAA), one of four unbeaten teams in the nation at the FCS level, held on to that distinction as freshman RB Andrew Pierce ran for 131 yards and two touchdowns, LB Paul Worrilow returned a fumble for a touchdown for the second straight week, and CB Marcus Burley came up with two big interceptions, including the game-clincher in the final minutes.

After falling behind 17-0, Rhode Island (2-4, 1-2, CAA) got back into the game thanks to a 75-yard kickoff return by Travis Hurd late in the first half, but could never get closer than a touchdown the rest of the way and dropped its 10th straight road game since 2009.

Delaware, which entered the game ranked No. 3 in the nation in turnover margin with a +9 ranking, defeated Maine 26-7 last week thanks to three turnovers, including an 11-yard fumble return for a touchdown by Worrilow. The Hens have won 81 percent of their games when tying or winning the turnover battle in nine seasons under Keeler.

Pierce, the nation's leading freshman rusher at 124.8 yards per game, picked up his fifth 100-yard effort of the season as he carried 26 times for 131 yards and scored on runs of 15 yards to open the scoring four minutes into the game and one-yard late in the first half to stake the Hens to a 24-7 lead. All-American quarterback Pat Devlin also spearheaded the offense as he completed 18 of 23 passes for 161 yards.

The Delaware defense, which entered the game leading all NCAA Division I teams in scoring defense at 6.5 points per game, allowed a season-high 17 points, but did its job by forcing the three turnovers, including Burley's second interception of the game with 3:13 left to play that ended Rhode Island's last-ditch drive.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. -- Delaware traded too many sevens for threes and it cost them dearly as the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens suffered their first setback of the season.

Delaware's inability to score touchdowns instead of field goals deep inside William & Mary territory resulted in the Hens' third straight setback to the No. 4 ranked Tribe (6-1, 4-1 CAA), who won their sixth straight and moved into a tie with Delaware for the CAA lead.

William & Mary scored the winning points when Jonathan Grimes hit Chase Hill on a six-yard halfback option pass with 6:25 left to play.

Delaware (7-1, 4-1 CAA) pushed the ball inside the Tribe five-yard line three times on the day and was only able to get six points out of the effort.

Delaware, which was playing its fourth top five ranked team this season, had the chance to win the game in the final seconds but Mike Perry, who had connected on three field goals earlier in the day, was way wide to the left on a 42-yard attempt.

After pinning William & Mary on their five-yard line after a well-placed punt by Ed Wagner, Delaware held the Tribe and forced them to punt. The Hens got the ball on their own 46-yard line with 2:52 left to play and moved down to the 35-yard line on completions by senior quarterback Pat Devlin to Tommy Crosby, Phil Thaxton, and Nihja White.

After an incompleton, Devlin was sacked by Dante Cook back to the 33-yard line. Devlin came back to hit White on an eight-yard shovel pass to the 25-yard line to set up the field goal attempt. After a timeout by William & Mary, Perry lined up for the 42-yard attempt but it was wide left and never had a chance, setting off a celebration by the Tribe.

Perry converted field goals of 19, 40, and 20 yards while Devlin finished the day hitting 23 of 32 passes for 293 yards with White hauling in 10 passes for 146 yards and a 51-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter that gave Delaware a 10-3 lead.

William & Mary, which became the the first team to score a point in the first quarter and the final quarter vs. the Hens this season, converted 7 of 15 third downs. Backup QB Mike Callahan, who relieved starter Michael Paulus and finished with 93 yards on 7 of 10 passing, hit TE Alex Gottlieb on a 15-yard scoring pass with 3:51 left in the third quarter to pull the Tribe to within 13-10.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware could do little wrong on both sides of the ball as the No. 5 Blue Hens piled up 589 yards of total offense and held Towson to just eight first downs on the way to a CAA rout before an appreciative Homecoming crowd.

The Blue Hens (8-1, 6-0 CAA), playing for the first time since suffering their first loss of the season in a 17-16 setback to William & Mary two weeks ago, stormed back in stunning fashion as Pat Devlin completed 29 of 38 passes for 318 yards and one touchdown while running for another score, Nihja White finished with nine receptions for 108 yards and one touchdown, Leon Jackson scored on a 63-yard run and finished with a game-high 88 yards on the ground, and Andrew Pierce scored two TDs and went over 1,000 yards for the season with 79 rushing yards.

Towson (1-8, 0-6 CAA), which lost its seventh straight game, played without dual-threat QB Chris Hart who was suspended on Friday due to a violation of team rules. With Hart gone, the Tigers managed just 158 total yards and eight first downs and punted 10 times - one shy of the school record of 11 set vs. Delaware in 2004. The Tigers crossed midfield just twice the entire day, never got closer than the Delaware 34-yard line, and had just one play go for 10 yards.

The Blue Hens, who remained in a tie for first place in the CAA standings with William & Mary with a 5-1 league mark, reached the eight-victory milestone with the win. Since 2003, each of the 21 CAA teams that have won eight or more regular season games have advanced to the NCAA Division I FCS playoffs.

The victory was the most lopsided in Keeler's nine-year tenure at Delaware and was the largest since an 84-0 victory over West Chester back in 2000 and biggest in conference play since a 61-0 triumph over Maine during the 1995 campaign.

Delaware, which has led the nation in scoring defense for each of the last seven weeks and entered the game allowing just 9.1 points per game, posted its first shutout since a 35-0 blanking of West Chester in the 2009 opener. The Hens have yet to allow more than 17 points in any game this season.

AMHERST, Mass. -- The Delaware offense played the starring role as the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens piled up 510 yards of total offense and QB Pat Devlin threw touchdown passes to four different receivers on the way to a win over No. 14 Massachusetts on a perfect autumn day.

And not only did they cruise to their second straight victory, the Blue Hens (9-1, 6-1 CAA) clinched at least a share of the Colonial Athletic Association title - their first since 2004 - as William & Mary dropped a 30-24 decision to James Madison Saturday.

Devlin, a Top 10 finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award as the top quarterback in the nation, proved worthy of that lofty honor as he completed 16 of 22 passes for 240 yards and matched a career-high with four touchdowns, hitting Rob Jones, Andrew Pierce, Phillip Thaxton, and Colin Naugle on scoring tosses.

The Hens got the job done on the ground as well as David Hayes, playing his first game since Oct. 9 due to an ankle injury, enjoyed an impressive return as he rushed for a career-high 107 yards, including a 61-yard touchdown burst up the middle in the third quarter. Pierce, the nation's leading freshman runner at the FCS level, added 66 yards on the ground. Devlin also ran for a career-high 55 yards as the Hens totalled 270 yards on the ground.

Massachusetts (6-4, 4-3 CAA), who will most likely need a win over Rhode Island in their season finale next week to earn a post-season berth, had a two-game win streak snapped despite putting up 27 points and 424 yards - both seasons highs against a Delaware defense that entered the game ranked No. 1 in the nation in scoring defense at 8.1 points per game.

Delaware had allowed a previous high of 17 points vs. Rhode Island and William & Mary and a high of 350 yards to William & Mary. The Minutemen had surpassed the 350-yard mark by the middle of the third quarter. Delaware surpassed the 40-point and 500-total yardage marks for the second straight week and also converted on 11 of 17 third downs.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware, counting on a victory over longtime rival and No. 15 Villanova to sew up the top seed in the 20-team NCAA Tournament field, got heartache instead and dropped a CAA verdict in the regular season finale.

Delaware (9-2, 6-2 CAA) fought back from a two-touchdown deficit in the first five minutes of play and sent the game into overtime on a touchdown pass from Pat Devlin to Andrew Pierce in the final seconds of regulation, but Villanova scored on its first possession of the extra session to take the lead and Hens' hopes were dashed when Pierce was stripped of the ball on the one-yard line and the Wildcats Martel Moody recovered the fumble to end the game.

The No. 1 ranked Blue Hens had a seven-game home win streak snapped and lost to the Wildcats (7-4, 4-3 CAA) for the fifth straight time in the Battle of the Blue series. Delaware still gained a share of the CAA regular season title but lost out on the automatic NCAA berth.

Devlin enjoyed yet another impressive showing as he completed 30 of 45 passes for 305 yards and three touchdowns, including scoring strikes of 18 yards to Nihja White and nine yards to Rob Jones in the first half and the one-yard toss to Pierce with 18 seconds left in regulation that tied the score at 21-21 and sent the game into an extra session - the Hens' first overtime appearance since a 62-56 five overtime setback to Richmond in 2007.

Villanova QB Chris Whitney completed 14 of 19 passes for 150 yards, hitting TB Lawrence Doss on a four-yard toss to up the Villanova lead to 14-0 early in the first quarter and running eight yards for a score with 11:35 left in the fourth quarter to give Villanova a 21-14 lead.

Angelo Babbaro set the tone when he returned the opening kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown and Aaron Ball scored what proved to be the game-winner for Villanova when he leaped over a pile of bodies and into the end zone from one-yard out on the Wildcats first possession of overtime.

Delaware had the chance to send the game into a second overtime but came up short. Devlin moved the Hens into scoring position after hitting Phillip Thaxton for six yards, Pierce for eight, and Tommy Crosby for eight more down to the two-yard line. Pierce ran up the middle on the next play but was stripped of the ball while fighting for extra yards and Moody fell on the ball to end the game.

NEWARK, Del. -- While the brisk temperatures and strong winds lowered the wind chill near freezing, No. 5 Delaware rode the red-hot throwing arm of QB Pat Devlin and used 28 unanswered points to wear down Lehigh and advance in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoffs.

Devlin, the Colonial Athletic Association Offensive Player of the Year and a top 10 finalist for the Johnny Unitas Gold Arm Award, posted his fourth straight 200-yard passing effort as he threw for 256 yards and connected for touchdowns with four different receivers. His four touchdowns matched a career-high and upped his total to 11 over the last three games.

Delaware (10-2) rolled up 450 total yards against a No. 19/18 ranked Lehigh squad that had entered the game ranked 10th in the nation in scoring defense (17.2) and was riding an eight-game win streak - the longest among the 20 teams in the NCAA tournament field.

The Patriot League champion Mountain Hawks ended their season with a 10-3 mark despite a big effort from QB Chris Lum, who had a career day as he connected on 35 of 58 passes for 362 yards and two touchdowns but was intercepted twice. All three of their losses came to Colonial Athletic Association opponents.

Delaware head coach Keeler improved to 9-2 all-time in NCAA FCS playoff action and stayed unbeaten at home in six playoff games at Delaware Stadium. Delaware, the 2003 national champion and the NCAA runner-up in 2007, has now advanced to the quarterfinals four times in nine seasons under Keeler.

Devlin connected for touchdowns with four different receivers on the afternoon, hitting Mark Schenauer on a 29-yard scoring strike and Chris Campbell on a one-yard toss in the second quarter and hooking up with Tommy Crosby from 38 yards out and with Nihja White on a 20-yard scoring play as part of a 21-point third quarter. After Lehigh took a 14-13 lead midway through the second stanza, the Hens reeled off 28 straight points to take command.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware has thrived all season long behind its dominating defense and the pinpoint accuracy of QB Pat Devlin. That combination rose to the occasion once again as the No. 5 ranked Blue Hens (11-2) shut down No. 11 New Hampshire, holding the Wildcats to a single first quarter field goal and moving on to the NCAA Division I FCS quarterfinal victory.

Delaware's defense, which entered the game as the nation's top-ranked scoring defense, allowing just over 12 points per game, held the potent UNH offense in check all night, limiting the Wildcats (8-5) to just 237 total yards and stopping them on 11 of 13 third down opportunities. The Hens also recorded three sacks and forced the game's only turnover when CB Anthony Walters on a fourth down at the Delaware 27-yard line with 5:47 left to play.

New Hampshire, which had a five-game winning streak snapped, had scored 28 or more points in six of its last seven games, including a 45-20 win over Bethune-Cookman in the NCAA second round the previous week. The Wildcats advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the seventh straight year but have yet to advance past the quarterfinal round.

Devlin was nearly flawless, completing 27 of 38 passes for 261 yards and putting the game away in the second for the Hens with scoring tosses of 24 yards to WR Nihja White midway through the third quarter and nine yards to WR Mark Schenauer early in the final stanza. Devlin surpassed the 200-yard mark for the seventh straight game.

The Blue Hens snapped a personal three-game losing streak vs. their Colonial Athletic Association foes to advance to the NCAA semifinals. Delaware head coach K.C. Keeler improved to 10-2 all-time in NCAA playoff action for the Hens, including a perfect 7-0 mark at home.

Devlin, the CAA Offensive Player of the Year, directed an offense that overcame a sluggish first quarter to put up 383 total yards. White caught eight passes for 94 yards while Tommy Crosby had seven catches for 55 yards. RB Andrew Pierce, the CAA Rookie of the Year and the league's leading rusher, led all ground gainers with 90 yards on 23 carries. The Hens managed just one first down and 14 total yards in the first quarter before coming to life.

New Hampshire QB R.J. Toman, who returned to action after sitting out the Bethune-Cookman game with an ankle injury, completed 20 of 36 passes for 136 yards. All-CAA wide receiver Terrance Fox snared a career-high 11 passes for 72 yards while defensive end Brian McNally recorded a first half sack to set a UNH single season record with 12.5.

Among the crowd was U.S. Vice-President Joe Biden, a 1965 Delaware graduate who was a running back on the Blue Hen freshman team, and Chip Kelly, head coach of the top-ranked University of Oregon football team and a former UNH assistant coach.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware can once again give thanks to the Blue Hen defense. And this time the reward is a trip to Frisco, Tex. and a chance at yet another national football championship.

The fifth-ranked Blue Hens took advantage of four Georgia Southern turnovers, including one at UD's own goal-line in the first quarter that set the tone for the rest of the day, as Delaware rode that momentum to a NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision semifinal victory.

Delaware (12-2), the tournament's No. 3 seed, posted its third straight victory and earned the right to take on No. 1 ranked and fifth-seeded Eastern Washington (12-2) in the national championship game Jan. 7 at Pizza Hut Park in Frisco, Tex.

The loss ended a storybook post-season for the 20th-ranked Eagles (10-5), who earned at-large berth in the tournament and knocked off South Carolina State, No. 2 seed William & Mary, and Wofford in succession before having its six-game win streak snapped by the Blue Hens.

Delaware head coach K.C. Keeler improved to 11-2 in NCAA playoff action in his nine seasons at Delaware and remained undefeated at home in the post-season with a mark of 8-0.

All-American senior safety Anthony Bratton recorded a team-high 14 tackles, sophomore linebacker Paul Worriow added 12 tackles and forced two fumbles, and junior defensive end Chris Morales, hobbled by a sore hamstring that almost kept him out of action, recovered two fumbles, including one on the goal-line on Georgia Southern's first drive of the day when it looked like the Eagles were moving in for the first score of the day.

Delaware, which entered the game ranked No. 1 in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 11.6 points per game, didn't capitalize on that turnover, but it set the tone for the rest of the day as the Hens won despite gaining 316 total yards, just six more than the Eagles, whose vaunted tripe-option attack netted 310 yards, including 257 on the ground.

Devlin was efficient as usual for the Hens, completing 14 of 20 passes for 137 yards and touchdown tosses of six yards to junior Mark Schenauer to open the scoring early in the second quarter 24 yards to Phillip Thaxton in the third quarter that pushed the Blue Hen lead to 17-3.

Andrew Pierce enjoyed his most productive day since early in the season, rambling for 186 yards on 26 carries and piling up 53 yards on two successive carries in the third quarter that set up a seven-yard scoring run by David Hayes that put the game out of reach at 24-10 with 6:05 remaining. Kicker Mike Perry also made a big contribution, converting two field goals, including a 20-yarder with 3:32 left to play that pushed the lead to 27-10 and iced the win.
