LAST MEETING

#4 William & Mary 17, #2 Delaware 16 WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (October 23, 2010) -- The University of Delaware traded too many sevens for threes and it cost them dearly.

The No. 2 ranked Blue Hens fell from the unbeaten ranks at Zable Stadium as their inability to score touchdowns instead of field goals deep inside William & Mary territory resulted in a 17-16 Colonial Athletic Association football setback to the No. 4 ranked Tribe before a Homecoming crowd of 12,259.

William & Mary (6-1, 4-1 CAA), which posted its sixth straight victory, scored the winning points when Jonathan Grimes hit Chase Hill on a six-yard halfback option pass with 6:25 left to play.

Delaware, which was playing its fourth top five ranked team this season, had the chance to win the game in the final seconds but Mike Perry, who had connected on three field goals earlier in the day, was wide to the left on a 42-yard attempt.

After pinning William & Mary on its five-yard line after a well-placed punt by Ed Wagner, Delaware held the Tribe and forced them to punt. The Hens got the ball on their own 46-yard line with 2:52 left to play and moved down to the 35-yard line on completions by senior quarterback Pat Devlin to Tommy Crosby, Phil Thaxton, and Nihja White.

After an incompletion, Devlin was sacked by Dante Cook back to the 33-yard line. Devlin came back to hit White on an eight-yard shovel pass to the 25-yard line to set up the field

goal attempt.

After a timeout by William & Mary, Perry lined up for the 42-yard attempt but it was wide left and never had a chance, setting off a celebration by the Tribe.

Perry, who earlier in the year kicked the winning field goal in the final seconds of a 13-10 upset over James Madison, converted tries from 19, 40, and 20 yards earlier in the contest Saturday to help give the Hens the lead.

His 40-yarder on the final play of the first half gave the Hens a 13-3 lead and his 20-yard conversion with 10:49 left in the game gave the Hens a 16-10 lead.

Devlin had another impressive day as he completed 23 of 32 passes for 293 yards and a touchdown. WR Nihja White had the best day of his career as he caught 10 passes for 146 yards and had the Hens' biggest play of the day as he caught a Devlin pass over the middle and outran Terrell Wells, stiff-arming him all the way into the end zone for a 51-yard score with 2:25 left in the first quarter to give UD a 10-3 lead.

BLUE HEN TOUCHDOWN CLUB AWARD WINNERS

This week's lone Blue Hen Touchdown Club Most Valuable Player for the Maine game is redshirt freshman defensive back **Brandon Cheaton**.

Cheaton earned the Special Teams Player of the Week Award and is scheduled to be honored at the weekly Blue Hen Touchdown Club Luncheon this Friday, Oct. 7, at the Bob Carpenter Center.

No players of the week were selected from the offensive and defensive side of the ball.

Cheaton, from nearby Middletown, Del., was outstanding on punt and kick coverage during the Hens' 31-17 loss at Maine Saturday in Orono, Maine.

He posted one tackle and helped Delaware limit the Black Bears to zero yards on two punt returns and just 23 total yards on three kickoff returns.

LAST TIME OUT FOR DELAWARE

Maine 31, #6 Delaware 17

ORONO, Maine (Oct. 1) -- Delaware took a three-point lead late in the third quarter on a 13-yard touchdown run by **Andrew Pierce**, but Maine scored the final 17 points of the game as the Black Bears won their Colonial Athletic Association opener with a 31-17 victory over the sixth-ranked Blue Hens Saturday afternoon at rain-soaked Alford Stadium.

Delaware (3-2, 1-1 CAA) had its three-game winning streak snapped and lost for just the fourth time in 14 trips to Orono. The Blue Hens had won two straight over Maine, and had taken three of their last four trips to Alford Stadium.

The Black Bears (3-1, 1-0 CAA), whose only loss this season came by six points to Big East opponent Pittsburgh, gave head coach Jack Cosgrove his 100th career victory in his 19th season at Maine.

Maine enjoyed a big 477-278 advantage in total offense as running back Pushaun James ran for 193 yards and three touchdowns, including two in the final stanza. Quarterback Warren Smith was equally adept, completing 18 of 27 passes for 264 yards and a touchdown.

The Black Bears had four plays go for 37 or more yards from scrimmage, including a 70-yard jaunt by Jones that set up a fourth quarter score.

Delaware QB **Tim Donnelly** was intercepted four times on the day, including twice in the final stanza as the Hens were thwarted in their final quarter comeback attempt.

Pierce rushed for 120 yards and a touchdown to lead the Blue Hen running game and also caught eight passes for 34 yards on the day.

Donnelly threw a 16-yard scoring pass to TE **Colin Naugle** and **Sean Baner** connected on a 46-yard field goal to provide the rest of the UD offense.

LAST TIME OUT FOR WILLIAM & MARY

William & Mary 20, Villanova 16

VILLANOVA, Pa. (Oct. 1) -- Senior All-American running back Jonathan Grimes rushed for 137 yards with two touchdowns, and the William and Mary defense allowed just 80 yards in the second half as the No. 11 Tribe earned a 20-16 victory at Villanova on Saturday afternoon.

The victory was the 89th conference win for head coach Jimmie Laycock, which ties for the third most triumphs in league history with former Delaware head coach **Tubby Raymond**.

With the 137-yard performance, Grimes moved into second on W&M's career rushing list with 3,552 yards and now only trails former Tribe great Derek Fitzgerald (3,744). He also registered 87 kickoff return yards and became the program's all-time record holder (1,798), eclipsing the previous mark of 1,772 established by Komlan Loneragan.

In addition to holding Villanova (1-4, 0-2) to just 80 yards in the second half, the Tribe (3-2, 1-1) outgained the Wildcats 344-200. W&M also held VU to just 10 first downs and controlled the time of possession by more than 10 minutes (35:25-24:35).

Villanova kicker Mark Hamilton booted his third field goal of the game on a 25-yarder with 12:01 left to give the Wildcats a 16-14 lead, but William & Mary came back to post the win as

Drake Kuhn connected on field goals of 34 and 23 yards, the later with 14:24 left for the game-winner.

The Colonial Athletic Association made a little history this week as eight members of the league appeared in The Sports Network Top 25 media poll.

That impressive feat marks the first time that ANY conference has placed eight of its members into the Top 25.

Not only did eight CAA teams get listed in the Top 25, Massachusetts and Rhode Island also received votes. That means 11 of the 12 CAA teams this week - all but Villanova - are receiving national notice.

New Hampshire leads the CAA parade with a No. 6 ranking followed by No. 7 James Madison, No. 9 William & Mary, No. 13 Delaware, No. 14 Richmond, No. 19 Maine, No. 21 Old Dominion, and No. 25 Towson.

The Southern Conference, Big Sky Conference, and Ohio Valley Conference each placed four teams in the Top 25 this week.

KEELER TEAMS BOUNCE BACK STRONG FROM ROAD DEFEATS

The Blue Hens had their three-game win streak snapped in Saturdays' 31-17 loss at Maine, but if history is an indicator, chances are excellent that Delaware will bounce back with a solid effort this week at home against No. 10 William & Mary at Delaware Stadium.

Since Delaware head coach **K.C. Keeler** took over the reigns of the program in 2002, Blue Hens teams have posted a 16-4 record when playing at home the week after a road loss.

Included in the mark is a 28-17 win over West Chester in this year's home opener following a season-opening 40-17 loss at Navy.

HENS TOUGH ON THIRD DOWNS - ON BOTH SIDES OF THE BALL

Delaware has been impressive on both sides of the ball on third down situations this season.

In this week's NCAA rankings, the Blue Hens rank fifth in the nation at the FCS level in third down defense, stopping opponents 75.81 percent of the time (15 of 62) while ranking No. 23 in third down offense, converting 44 percent of the time (33 of 75).

The Hens are one of just eight teams in FCS who rank in the Top 25 in both categories, joining Tennessee-Martin, Jackson State, Montana State, Duquesne, Northern Iowa, Sam Houston State, Towson, and Portland State.

Over the last four games, Delaware opponents have converted on third down just 8 times in 49 attempts (16.3 percent), including a 1 of 9 performance vs. Maine Saturday.

DELAWARE VS. TOP 25 OPPONENTS

Delaware will be facing its first Top 25 opponent of the season this week when the Hens play host to No. 9/9 William & Mary.

Following its 20-16 win over Villanova Saturday, the Tribe moved up two spots from No. 11.

Delaware, which posted a record of 7-3 vs. Top 25 teams last season, is 27-19 (.587) vs. Top 25 teams in 10 seasons under head coach **K.C. Keeler**, including an 18-7 (.720) mark at Delaware Stadium.

Against Top 10 teams, the Hens are 16-12 since Keeler took over in 2002, including a mark of 9-5 at Delaware Stadium.

BLUE HENS TOUGH IN LEAGUE PLAY

Delaware has enjoyed great success in conference play since joining the Yankee Conference (now CAA) back in 1986. The Hens, who have won outright or shared nine league titles during that time, own the best record in league play among all current CAA teams, posting a record of 132-71, good for a 65.3 winning percentage.

Since **K.C. Keeler** took over as head coach of the Blue Hens in 2002, Delaware has won 57 percent of its league games and captured three league crowns. Delaware is 6-4 in CAA openers under Keeler.

HOME SWEET HOME

Delaware boasts one of the top home-field advantages in all of college football. Not only do Blue Hen fans pack Delaware Stadium each week - helping UD become the only NCAA FCS team in the nation to average 20,000 or more fans per regular season home game each of the last 12 seasons - they see consistently winning football.

Delaware has posted an impressive record of 53-16 (.768) in 10 seasons under **K.C. Keeler** at Delaware Stadium - among the top marks at any division.

The Blue Hens are currently riding a six-game winning streak at home, a skein that includes NCAA playoff wins over Lehigh, New Hampshire, and Georgia Southern last season and victories over West Chester, Delaware State, and Old Dominion this season.

The streak is the sixth longest current home winning streak in NCAA Division I FCS, trailing only Jacksonville (10), South Alabama (9), Western Illinois (8), Drake (7), and North Dakota State (7).

The last loss here in Newark for the Hens was a 28-21 overtime setback to Villanova last Nov. 20 which snapped a seven-game win streak, the team's longest since a nine-game streak in 2004-05.

In addition, the Hens have won 13 of their last 14 home games since a 20-8 setback to James Madison on Oct. 31, 2009.

Of Keeler's 16 home losses, seven have come by six points or less or in overtime. The Hens have scored more than 20 points in all but nine of those 69 games.

Delaware has also won 24 of its last 31 home games and is 281-87-4 (.766) in 60 seasons all-time at Delaware Stadium, including a mark of 20-5 with eighth straight wins in the post-season.

SCORING STREAK REACHES 191...AND COUNTING

Delaware extended its streak of scoring a point to 191 straight games in the 31-17 loss at Maine Saturday.

Delaware has not been shutout in any game since falling at Villanova 27-0 back on Sept. 14, 1996 and have not been held off the scoreboard at home a Delaware Stadium since suffering a 24-0 setback to Holy Cross way back on Nov. 12, 1983 (a streak of 187 straight games).

The current scoring streak breaks the previous UD record of consecutive game scoring a point of 154 set in 1983-98. Delaware's streak of consecutive road games scoring a point now stands at 86 games.

During the streak, the Hens have scored 30 or more points 83 times (40 percent of the time).

The current streak ranks No. 2 among Colonial Athletic Association teams, trailing only Massachusetts (192).

ANDREW PIERCE POSTINGS

There has been no sophomore slump for star University of Delaware running back **Andrew Pierce** in the early going of the 2011 season.

Pierce was hampered by a knee injury in the 27-17 win over Old Dominion Sept., carrying 14 times for a career-low 21 yards. He missed the final quarter due to the injury. His previous career low was 55 yards vs. James Madison and William & Mary last season.

But Pierce returned to action last week vs. Maine was impressive again, rushing 24 times for 120 yards and a 13-yard touchdown that put the Hens ahead 17-14 late in the third quarter.

Pierce, the 2010 Colonial Athletic Association Rookie of the Year and this year's CAA pre-season Co-Player of the Year, has already rushed for 489 yards and seven touchdowns in just five games, surpassing the 100-yard mark four times. His streak of five straight 100-yard games, one shy of the UD records, was snapped vs. ODU.

He currently ranks No. 3 in the CAA and 26th nationally in rushing (97.8 yards per game) and ranks No. 4 in the league and No. 26 nationally in scoring at 8.4 points per game.

He ran for 106 yards and three touchdowns in the win over Delaware State Sept. 17 and became the first sophomore in school history to surpass the 2,000-yard mark, upping his total to 2,003 yards on a third quarter touchdown run.

In just two seasons, the All-American already ranks No. 3 among active NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision players in yards rushing per game (107.2), ranks No. 10 in yards rushing (2,144) and carries (427), No. 11 in touchdowns (21), and No. 14 in yards per carry (5.02).

With 2,144 career yards, Pierce already ranks No. 10 all-time at Delaware in that category.

NIHJA WHITE JOINS 100-YARD RECEPTION CLUB

University of Delaware junior wide receiver **Nihja White** has been impressive over the last three games, bouncing back from a hand injury that kept him out of the West Chester game Sept. 10 to put up some big numbers.

White, who led the team in receiving a year ago when he hauled in 60 passes for 752 yards and six touchdowns, caught seven passes for 122 yards and a touchdown vs. Delaware State on Sept. 17 and snared seven passes for 117 yards and a touchdown to go with a two-point conversion catch vs. Old Dominion on Sept. 24.

This past week vs. Maine, White pulled down seven passes for 52 yards - giving him three straight games with seven receptions each.

The Wayne, Pa. native now leads the team in receiving with 23 catches for 307 yards (13.3 avg.) and two touchdowns with a long gain of 59 yards. He ranks No. 4 in the CAA and in the top 40 nationally in both receptions per game and receiving yards per game.

White has now caught at least one pass in 27 straight games in which he has played. The streak is the fourth longest in school history, just one shy of the No. 3 spot of 28 straight held by current UD tight ends coach David Boler.

White has gone over the 1,000-yard receiving mark for his career with 1,297 (No. 16 all-time at UD) and his 104 career receptions ranks him No. 14 all-time at Delaware.

DONNELLY'S 3-0 START AMONG BEST EVER FOR DELAWARE QUARTERBACKS

Rich Gannon didn't do it and neither did **Jeff Komlo**, **Scott Brunner**, **Andy Hall**, **Sonny Riccio**, **Joe Flacco**, and **Pat Devlin**.

But **Tim Donnelly** has.

Since 1975, only four University of Delaware quarterbacks have been victorious in their first three starts and none of them are named Gannon, Komlo, Brunner, Hall, Flacco, or Devlin.

But Donnelly has already accomplished a feat that those six NFL players were unable to accomplish.

Donnelly joined a short list that includes **Rick Scully** (3-0 start in 1980), **Bill Vergantino** (3-0 in 1989), and **Dale Fry** (5-0 in 1991 and 1993) among Blue Hen quarterbacks who have won their first three starts.

Since taking over the starting quarterback spot from **Trevor Sasek**, Donnelly has been solid.

A former walk-on, Donnelly is now 3-1 as a starter, having led the Hens to wins of 28-17 over West Chester, 45-0 over Delaware State, and 27-17 over Old Dominion before falling for the first time this past week vs. Maine.

Donnelly has completed 91 of 135 passes for 921 yards and six touchdowns this season with five interceptions. He ranks No. 6 in the CAA in passing rating (131.97). He had thrown 55 straight passes without an interception before being picked off in the first quarter vs. Maine last week.

BLUE HENS RANK IN TOP 10 NATIONALLY IN ATTENDANCE

Delaware's average attendance at Delaware Stadium has taken a slight dip after three games this season, but the Blue Hens are still the envy of most every NCAA Division I FCS program in the nation.

Delaware's home game average attendance now stands at 18,141 after three games, ranking the Blue Hens No. 10 nationally among 116 schools in average attendance.

Appalachian State leads the nation with an average home attendance of 26,212 while James Madison leads the CAA with an average of 25,422 fans per game (No. 3 nationally).

Delaware is the only school in the nation at the FCS level that has averaged over 20,000 fans per regular season home game each of the last 12 seasons.

MILESTONES & STREAKS

- Senior C **Rob McDowell** and senior LB **Andrew Harrison** own the team's longest current starting streaks entering the William & Mary game.

McDowell, who has started every game of his career for the Blue Hens, will start his 44th straight game while Harrison will earn his 32nd straight starting nod vs. William & Mary.

McDowell is a National Football Foundation Post-Graduate Scholarship nominee.

Harrison, who coordinates Delaware's Fellowship of Christian Athletes group, ranks No. 13 among active NCAA FCS tacklers with 264 for his career, including a career-high tying 14 last week vs. Maine.

- Junior RB **David Hayes** rushed for 51 yards on 10 carries vs. West Chester and reached the 1,000-yard mark for his career on his first carry of the night. After a 40-yard performance vs. Delaware State, a team-high 66-yard effort vs. Old Dominion, and 28 against Maine, he now has 1,183 career yards and is the 55th player in UD history to reach the 1,000-yard mark.

BLUE HENS GETTING THEIR KICKS FROM FIRST-YEAR SPECIALISTS

The Blue Hen kicking game has been solid this season behind a pair of first-year regulars in sophomore kicker **Sean Baner** and junior punter **Rauley Zaragoza**.

Although he handled only kickoff chores last season as a true freshman, Baner added placements duties to his repertoire this fall after beating out second team All-CAA selection **Mike Perry** for those duties.

Baner has been impressive, converting all 15 of his extra point attempts and hitting 7 of his 11 field goal attempts. He ranks second on the team in scoring with 36 points and is No. 18 nationally in field goals per game (1.40)

He enjoyed his biggest game vs. Old Dominion when he tied a school record with four field goals on a school-record six attempts. He converted kicks from 40, 39, 20, and 43 yards on the day with his final 43-yard boot with 42 seconds left icing the win.

His four field goals ties the UD record set by All-American **Jon Striefsky** vs. Navy in 2009 and his six attempts broke the previous mark of five by Brad Shushman vs. New Hampshire in 2003.

Zaragoza, a first-year team member who played at Citrus (Calif.) College the last two seasons, has averaged 39.0 yards per punt on 21 attempts this season and ranks No. 6 in the CAA in that category.

The rugby style kicker who can punt with both feet, enjoyed an outstanding game vs. ODU, averaging 43.6 yards on five punts and placing three punts inside the opponent 20-yard line. He also had a career-long 60-yard punt.

For the season, he has placed 8 of his 21 punts inside the opponent 20-yard line.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN SEE TIME

Five true freshmen have seen action for the Blue Hens so far this season, including middle linebacker **Patrick Callaway**, who started his third straight game last week vs. Maine and registered seven tackles. He registered a career-high 10 tackles to rank second on the team in the 27-17 win over Old Dominion on Sept. 24.

Callaway got the start when outside linebacker **Jessel Curry** suffered a concussion vs. West Chester Sept. 10. That moved regular MLB **Paul Worriow** to the outside.

Callaway, who is schedule to start in the middle once again this week, now has 20 stops on the season to rank No. 6 on the team.

Also for the Hens, linebacker **Derek Battle** has seen action on special teams in all five games, wide receiver **Michael Johnson** has seen backup action in four games, backup defensive tackle **Logan Shultz** has played in two games, and tight end Nick Boyle made his collegiate debut vs. Maine last week, even catching an 11-yard pass on his first career play in the first quarter.

SCORE FIRST AND THINGS WILL BE FINE.....

That has usually been the case for the Blue Hens of late. Delaware was a dominant team early on last season, outscoring opponent 94-34 in the first quarter and 242-80 in the first half. The Hens scored first in 12 of the team's 15 games.

Delaware had won 12 straight games when scoring first before the NCAA championship game loss to Eastern Washington last January.

Still the Hens have won 18 of their last 20 games since 2009 when getting on the board first. Delaware teams are 560-14 (.810) when they score first in head coach **K.C. Keeler's** 10 seasons at the helm.

This season, Delaware is 2-0 when scoring first and have outscored opponents 38-27 in the first quarter and 86-43 in the first half.

At home this season, the Hens have outscored opponents 38-7 in the opening stanza and 69-17 in the first half.

POSITIVE PUNT PROTECTION

Delaware is breaking in a new punter this season after the graduation of two-year regular and 2010 All-CAA selection **Ed Wagner**. Also gone is four-year deep snapper **Zack Reed**.

Junior **Rauley Zaragoza** has handled all the punting

chores in the first four games with junior tight end **Corey Olsen** handled the deep snapping chores.

Delaware has now gone 301 straight punt attempts without having a kick blocked since the 2005 season vs. William & Mary. The streak covers 70 games.

YET ANOTHER WINNING RECORD; HENS REACH 12-WIN MARK...AGAIN

The Blue Hens have posted a winning record seven times in nine seasons under head coach **K.C. Keeler**, failing to reach the .500 mark just twice when the team went 5-6 in 2006 and 4-8 in 2008.

But the Hens have more than made up for those two down years, advancing to the NCAA Tournament four times under Keeler, winning the national title in 2003 and finishing as national runner-up in both 2007 and 2010.

Along the way, the Hens have also captured three conference titles, earning the Lambert Cup Trophy three times, and the ECAC Team of the Year three times.

Delaware has not suffered back-to-back losing seasons since 1938-39, a milestone that few college teams in the nation at any level - and none in the CAA - can match. The Hens have reached 12 wins seven times in school history, most recently in 2010.

Delaware posted a 7-0 start for the ninth time in school history last season and for the second time under Keeler. The Hens started out 9-0 on the way to the 2003 national championship campaign.

QUICK SEASON PREVIEW

The Blue Hens look primed for another NCAA playoff run in 2011 as head coach **K.C. Keeler** welcomes back 11 starters and 44 letterwinners from a squad that went 12-3 and advanced to the national championship game in 2010.

Offensively, the Hens must replace All-American quarterback **Pat Devlin**, who earned CAA Offensive Player of the Year laurels and is currently with the Miami Dolphins.

But the losses on the offensive side of the ball don't go much further than that as the Hens return four starting offensive linemen - including three pre-season All-Americans in guard **Gino Gradkowski**, **Shea Allard**, and **Rob McDowell**.

Sophomore **Andrew Pierce**, the 2010 CAA Offensive Rookie of the Year who compiled 1,655 yards on the ground, is back to lead a run game that returns the top three rushers while All-CAA tight end **Colin Naugle** and top returning receiver, **Nihja White** (60 receptions) are also back.

Things are not quite as bright on the defensive side of the ball where Keeler returns just three full-time starters from a squad that was the top unit in the country, leading the nation in scoring defense at 12.1 points per game and ranking No. 4 in total defense (280.7 yards per game).

The Hens must replace four All-CAA defensive backs, including All-Americans **Anthony Walters** and **Anthony Bratton**, but do welcome back a pair of All-CAA performers in DE **Michael Atunrase** and LB **Paul Worriow**. Also returning to the starting lineup is OLB **Andrew Harrison**.

BEEN AROUND THE BLOCK A FEW TIMES

Few college teams in the country can boast the vast coaching experience of Delaware's offensive and defensive coordinators.

Blue Hen defensive leader **Nick Rapone** and third-year offensive head man **Jim Hoffer** have combined for an incredible 60 years of college coaching experience - each with 30 campaigns under their belts - including 24 years as coordinators.

Hoffer served as head coach at his alma mater, Cornell, in 1990-97 and at Buffalo in 2001-05. Together they have coached over 620 games on the college level.

Rapone, whose 2010 defensive led the nation in scoring defense at 12.1 points per game, earned an impressive honor in 2010 when he was selected NCAA Division I FCS Coordinator of the Year by FootballScoop.com.

HOW ABOUT THAT '10 DEFENSE

The 2010 season was quite a campaign, especially for the Blue Hen defense that ranked among the top units in the country.

Delaware led the nation in scoring defense (12.1 points per game) and ranked in the Top 10 nationally in turnover margin (4th/+1.13), total defense (5th, 280.7), passing efficiency (9th/148.49), and passing efficiency defense (9th/102.7).

Delaware's scoring defense of 12.1 points per game was the best mark by a UD defense since 1982 when opponents averaged just 11.6 points per game.

The Hens had to replace eight starters from that unit, including four All-Colonial Athletic Association defensive backs and three All-Americans in defensive backs **Anthony Walters** and **Anthony Bratton** and linebacker **Matt Marcorelle**.

The Hens will try to improve from a tough opener last week as Delaware dropped a 40-17 decision with the Mids piling up 437 total yards and 22 first downs.

A BLUE HEN IN THE WHITE HOUSE...AND AT DELAWARE STADIUM

When U.S. President **Barack Obama** and running mate, former Delaware Senator **Joe Biden**, won the 2008 presidential election, it was big news. And even bigger news for the citizens of Delaware and those affiliated with the University of Delaware.

A 1965 graduate of the University of Delaware with degrees in history and political science, Biden played on the Blue Hen freshman football team in 1961 under head coach **Scotty Duncan**. Biden, a member of the UD Wall of Fame and an ardent Delaware football fan, considered himself "a half-baked halfback" during his brief UD football career.

Biden made his first visit to Delaware Stadium as Vice-President on Saturday, Oct. 9, 2009 as he attended the Maine game and sat with UD President **Patrick Harker** and current

New Jersey Governor **Chris Christie** (also a UD graduate) throughout the entire contest.

He made another visit to Delaware Stadium in 2010 when he attended Delaware's 16-3 NCAA quarterfinal win over New Hampshire on Dec. 10.

He also attended the Hens' 2010 national championship game in Frisco, Tex. with Christie and Delaware Gov. **Jack Markell**.

Biden met with head coach **K.C. Keeler** and members of the team on Sept. 19, 2008 when Biden's plane was parked on the same tarmac as the Delaware charter at New Castle County (Del.) prior to its trip to Furman.

Biden later made an appearance at the Blue Hens' game vs. Maine at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 11, 2008 and received a rousing applause while being mobbed by well-wishers.

VERY PRESIDENTIAL...

No less than six members of the University of Delaware football team have the same surnames as former U.S. Presidents, including the Hens' top two running backs - **Andrew Pierce** and **Dave Hayes**.

Other Blue Hens with presidential surnames are **Andrew Harrison**, **Leon Jackson**, **Bobby Kennedy**, and **Michael Johnson**.

ALL-TIME HIGH 11 BLUE HENS IN NFL CAMPS THIS SUMMER:

An all-time high of 11 former Blue Hen football players took part in National Football League camps this summer.

In addition to established veterans **Joe Flacco** (Baltimore) and **Mike Adams** (Cleveland), also in camps were free agents **Brandon Gilbeaux** (Tampa Bay), **Ronald Talley** (Arizona), **Matt Marcorelle** (Houston), **Anthony Walters** (Chicago), **Anthony Bratton** (Green Bay), **Pat Devlin** (Miami), **Tyrone Grant** (Washington), and **Josh Baker** (N.Y. Jets).

In addition, **Ben Patrick**, who played the last three seasons with Arizona, signed with the New York Giants this summer but has since retired.

All but Flacco and Adams were released by their teams but Devlin, Walters, Talley, and Baker have each signed on with their respective team's taxi squads.

Talley and Baker were activated by their teams this past weekend.

CONFERENCE SUCCESS

The name of the Blue Hens' conference affiliation changed to the Colonial Athletic Association from the Atlantic 10 prior to the 2007 season, but the 10 teams stayed the same.

Delaware is maintaining its outstanding success in league play just the same. Delaware is currently playing its 26th season in the CAA (originally the Yankee Conference before becoming the Atlantic 10 in 1997) this fall.

Delaware has been the pride of the CAA since joining the league in 1986, capturing its 100th conference victory in 2003 with a 51-45 overtime win over UMass.

9-9-9-9

The Blue Hens, who are now 131-70 (.652) overall in league play since joining the conference in 1986, have won eight CAA/A-10 titles (1986-88-91-92-95-2000-2003-2004).

The .652 winning percentage is tops among the 11 league schools with Massachusetts (.634) the only other team that has won more than 60 percent of its league games all-time.

SHAMELESS SELF PROMOTION

Delaware Assistant AD/Media Relations **Scott Selheimer** will cover his 245th straight UD football game this week vs. William & Mary. He has staffed every game - home and away - since the 1992 season opener. The streak includes 28 NCAA playoff games and three national championship contests.

2011 GAME BY GAME RECAPS

ANNAPOLIS, Md. -- Navy quarterbacks have a history of big games against the University of Delaware. Senior Kriss Proctor added to that legacy as he ran for 176 yards and three touchdowns and passed for another score as the Mids spoiled the season opener for the Blue Hens.

The No. 5 ranked Blue Hens, last year's NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision national runner-up, were able to pile up 363 yards of offense but too many missed opportunities proved to be Delaware's undoing.

Sophomore All-American running back Andrew Pierce, the 2011 Colonial Athletic Association Co-Player of the Year, led the way for the Hens, rushing for 119 yards and capping the scoring with a one-yard burst with 2:54 left that capped a 78-yard drive. The 100-yard effort was the eighth of Pierce's young career as a Blue Hen.

Quarterbacks Trevor Sasek and Tim Donnelly also showed signs of good things to come. Sasek, who started the game after winning a battle with Donnelly, completed 9 of 19 passes for 82 yards and scored the Hens' first touchdown on a 21-yard run before leaving the game in the second half with a knee contusion. Donnelly hit on 7 of 9 passes for 60 yards.

Proctor, a first-year starter for the Mids, broke away on a 75-yard scoring jaunt on just the fourth play of the game and later scored on runs of 27 yards in the third quarter and one-yard early in the final stanza. He also hit Aaron Santiago on a 12-yard scoring toss midway through the final stanza to push the Navy lead to 40-10.

Delaware's defense, which lost eight starters and three All-Americans from a unit that led the nation in scoring defense a year ago when it gave up just 12.1 points per game, allowed its highest point total since a 41-7 setback to CAA foe James Madison in 2008.

Navy, which went 9-4 a year ago and advanced to the Poinsettia Bowl, always features one of the most explosive running attacks in NCAA Division I football and this year will be no different. The Mids' triple-option attack piled up 391 yards rushing and 437 yards total.

NEWARK, Del. -- All-American RB Andrew Pierce needed just two plays to cover 56 yards and his 44-yard touchdown vault early in the final stanza was just what the No. 8 Hens needed to pull away for a hard-fought victory in the home opener.

The Blue Hens (1-1) jumped out to a 21-0 first quarter lead after scoring two touchdowns in a span of just 17 seconds and held off the Golden Ram comeback. The Hens upended their nearby NCAA Division II rivals for the 17th straight time since 1993 but the margin of victory was the smallest since a 24-17 triumph in 1996.

Pierce, the 2010 CAA Rookie of the Year, ran 25 times for 153 yards and two touchdowns to lead the attack. He also caught a career-high seven passes for 32 yards during the game.

The game looked like it would be a blowout early on as the Hens scored three touchdowns in the first stanza to take a 21-0 lead. Sophomore LB Jessel Curry, a first-year transfer from Auburn, made his Delaware Stadium debut memorable as he rambled 34 yards with an interception return to open the scoring just over six minutes into the contest.

Pierce scored his first touchdown of the night when he ran seven yards and leaped into the end zone with 34 seconds left in the stanza for a 14-0 lead. Just 17 seconds later, the lead was up to 21-0 as Irv Titre recovered a bad snap at the West Chester 28-yard line to set up Donnelly's first career touchdown pass, a 28-yarder to a wide-open Mark Schenauer.

However, the Rams held tough and never let the Hens pull away. Rondell White got the Rams on the board with a two-yard scoring run just under two minutes into the second stanza, ending a streak of nine quarters and 143 minutes that Delaware had held West Chester without a point in the series. The Rams (0-2) pulled to within 21-10 on 27-yard field goal by Shawn Leo.

Following a scoreless third quarter, West Chester pulled to within 21-17 with 10:56 left in the final quarter as backup QB Matt Carroll scrambled out of the pocket and hit LaRonn Lee with a 14-yard touchdown pass in the left corner of the end zone.

But the Hens quickly put a damper on the Rams' upset plans. After Travis Hawkins returned the kickoff 38 yards to the Delaware 44-yard line, Pierce took over. He ran for 12 yards on first down and then broke loose on his pivotal 44-yard scoring run down the right side on the next play to give Delaware some breathing room with 10:10 remaining.

Delaware locked up the win as they burned 5:15 off the clock with an 11-play drive and then got the ball back when Leon Jackson intercepted a with 3:13 left.

NEWARK, Del. -- This rivalry game was over early as No. 7 Delaware clicked on every cylinder, jumping out to a 35-0 halftime lead and posting a big victory over in-state foe Delaware State.

Tim Donnelly was nearly flawless, completing 13 of 14 passes for 221 yards and two touchdowns, backs Andrew Pierce and Walter Davis each went over the 100-yard mark, and Nihja White caught seven passes for 122 yards to lead an offense that piled up 512 yards of total offense. Davis (108 yards) surpassed the mark for the first time.

Donnelly, who completed his first seven passes, was selected as the Nate Beasley MVP for the game. Donnelly's .928 passing percentage was the second best in school history, trailing only an 11 for 11 performance by Bill Vergantino vs. Towson in 1992. His 272.6 passing rating was the sixth best mark in UD history.

The two schools, the state's only NCAA Division I institutions and located 45 miles apart, never met on the football field until a 44-7 NCAA playoff win by the Blue Hens in 2007. The teams met again in 2009 with Delaware claiming a hard-fought 27-17 victory.

The Delaware defense was just as dominating as the Blue Hens held the Hornets (2-1) to just four first downs and 112 total yards while forcing three turnovers, including a 32-yard fumble return for a touchdown by Jake Giusti that extended the lead to 28-0 in the second quarter. The Hornets produced -3 yard rushing for the night and were 0 for 10 on third downs.

Pierce carried 15 times for 106 yards and scored three touchdowns, including a seven-yard scamper with 11:25 left in the third quarter that pushed him over 100 yards for the game and over 2,000 for his career. He is the first Blue Hen runner to pass the 2,000-yard mark as a sophomore.

In addition to his 11-yard touchdown reception, White set up Pierce's one-yard scoring dive midway through the second quarter with a nifty career-long 59-yard grab off a perfect pass from Donnelly to the Delaware State one-yard line.

Delaware got things going early as Donnelly hit TE Colin Naugle all alone over the middle for a 43-yard scoring toss on the Hens' first possession and Pierce capped a season-long 96-yard march on the second drive of the game with a three-yard dive for a 14-0 lead first-quarter lead. The Hens controlled the ball for nearly 12 minutes in the opening stanza.

White hauled in an 11-yard touchdown pass from Donnelly just over a minute into the second stanza and Giusti followed with his fumble return for a score just three minutes later. A one-yard burst by Pierce with 7:58 left in the second quarter gave the Hens a 35-0 cushion at the break.

Unlike last week when the Hens let a 21-0 first quarter lead against West Chester vanish before holding off the Rams for a 28-17 victory, Delaware did not let up this time. Pierce's seven-yard scoring run with 11:25 left in the third quarter pushed the lead to 42-0 and Sean Baner's career-long 47-yard field goal with 4:44 left capped the scoring.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware overcame some early miscues to post the victory over league newcomer Old Dominion as Tim Donnelly's 32-yard touchdown pass to Rob Jones early in the final stanza put the No. 7 Blue Hens up for good.

ODU (3-1, 0-1 CAA), a first-year member of the CAA in only its third season of football, lost for the first time this season while the Hens (3-1, 1-0 CAA) won their third straight.

Donnelly, the national leader with an 80 percent pass completion mark, continued his hot play as he completed 26 of 39 passes for 304 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winning toss to Jones with 9:29 left to play to help the Hens overcome a 17-16 deficit.

Delaware gave up a touchdown off a bad punt snap, had a field goal blocked, and fumbled the ball away deep inside ODU territory in the first quarter to go down early.

Donnelly hooked up with Jones on the first play from scrimmage after Travis Hawkins had returned a kickoff 60 yards to ODU 32-yard line. Donnelly found Jones across the middle and junior receiver just barely got into the end zone for the score. Donnelly then connected with Nihja White on the two-point conversion to give Delaware some breathing room at 24-17.

Delaware then put the final touches on the win as kicker Sean Baner booted his school-record tying fourth field goal of the game with 42 seconds left from 43 yard out to push the margin to 27-17. Baner, who tied the UD record of four field goals in a game set by Jon Striefsky vs. Navy in 2009, earlier had converted kicks from 20, 39, and 40 yards.

The Monarchs, who were held under 40 points for the first time this season and to 24 points under their scoring average, had taken the lead when QB Thomas DeMarco hit Antonio Vaughan on a nine-yard scoring strike with 9:50 left in the game to complete an 81-yard drive that was highlighted by a 15-yard run by punter Jonathan Plisco off a fake on fourth down play at their own 23-yard line. Plisco, an All-American, also averaged 48.6 yards on seven punts on the day.

Delaware, however, came right back with Hawkins' 60-yard kickoff return, Donnelly's scoring toss to Jones, and Baner's record-tying field goal to put the game away.

ODU took the early lead when Chris Lovitt recovered a bad snap on a punt by Delaware and returned the fumble 18 yards for a 7-0 lead. But Delaware came back, using two Baner field goals, including a 40-yarder that was set up by a Marcus Burley interception, and a seven-yard scoring strike from Donnelly to White 42 seconds before halftime to take a 13-7 into the break.

ORONO, Maine -- Delaware took a three-point lead late in the third quarter on a 13-yard touchdown run by Andrew Pierce, but host Maine scored the final 17 points of the game as the Black Bears won their CAA opener at rain-soaked Alford Stadium.

No. 6 ranked Delaware (3-2, 1-1 CAA) had its three-game winning streak snapped and lost for just the fourth time in 14 trips to Orono. The Blue Hens had won two straight over Maine, and had taken three of their last four trips to Alford Stadium.

The Black Bears (3-1, 1-0 CAA), whose only loss this season came by six points to Big East opponent Pittsburgh, gave head coach Jack Cosgrove his 100th career victory in his 19th season at Maine with their second straight victory.

Maine enjoyed a big 477-278 advantage in total offense as running back Pushaun James ran for 193 yards and three touchdowns, including two scores in the final stanza as the Black Bears pulled away. Maine quarterback Warren Smith was equally adept, completing 18 of 27 passes for 264 yards and a touchdown. The Black Bears had four plays go for 37 or more yards from scrimmage, including a 70-yard jaunt by Jones that set up a fourth quarter score.

Delaware quarterback Tim Donnelly lost for the first time in four career starts as he was intercepted four times on the day, including twice in the final stanza as the Hens were thwarted in their final quarter comeback attempt.

Pierce rushed for 120 yards and a touchdown to lead the Blue Hen running game and also caught eight passes for 34 yards on the day.

In a game that featured four lead changes, Maine struck first as Brown scored his first touchdown of the day on a 26-yard romp with 6:31 left in the opening stanza. But Delaware came back to take a 10-7 lead into intermission as Donnelly hit tight end Colin Naugle with a 16-yard over-the-shoulder catch in the end zone just over a minute into the second quarter and Sean Baner connected on a 46-yard field goal just over two minutes later.

Maine regained the lead on a 37-yard scoring pass over the middle from Smith to Damarr Aultman with 8:58 left in the third stanza, but Delaware answered again as Pierce scored on a 13-yard burst around the right side with 3:40 left in the third quarter for a 17-14 UD lead.

The rest of night belonged to the Black Bears as Brown scored on an 18-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter to give Maine the lead for good at 21-17 and added a five-yard scoring run six minutes later.
