ANNAPOLIS, Md. -- Ricky Dobbs' five-touchdown performance was too much to handle for Delaware at Navy-Marine Corps Stadium as the Blue Hens missed on several prime opportunities in the first half and fell to Navy 35-18 in a game much closer than the final score indicated.

Delaware kicker **Jon Striefsky** converted a school-record four field goals, including three in the first half to stake the Hens to a 9-7 lead at the break, but the Hens could not hold off the high-powered Midshipmen offense in the second half and dropped the non-league verdict.

The No. 23 ranked Blue Hens had won four of their last five games while Navy won for the second straight game and for the seventh time in its last eight outings.

The Mids were coming off a 23-21 win over No. 19 Notre Dame last week and ranked No. 30 in the latest NCAA Division I FBS Associated Press poll.

Dobbs dominated the game with his adept running as he carried 26 times for 100 yards and scored five touchdowns, one shy of the Navy single game record. He increased his season touchdown total to an NCAA-leading 22, setting a new Navy single season record and moving into third place on the NCAA single season list in that category.

Dobbs scored on runs of three, two, and three yards in the fourth quarter alone as Navy pulled away from a 14-12 lead in the final quarter. His one-yard dive with 9:12 left in the third stanza put the Mids ahead for good at 14-9.

Striefsky's four field goals, which broke the school record of three that was set 18 times earlier, just weren't enough. Two of his field goals in the first half came after the Hens had wasted two solid opportunities to score touchdowns.

Delaware's defense put in an outstanding effort, holding the high-powered Navy triple-option attack to just 320 total yards, including 242 on the ground, and forcing just the 10th Midshipmen turnover of the season. Navy entered the game averaging 286.0 yards rushing per game, the third highest total in the nation, but was held to its fourth lowest total offensive effort of the season.

GAME PREVIEW

Delaware, coming off one of the finest seasons in school history in 2010, will look to keep that momentum going this week as the Blue Hens step up a division to take on Navy in the season opener for both teams.

The Blue Hens, who captured a share of the Colonial Athletic Association title and advanced all the way to the NCAA Division Football Championship Subdivision game a year ago, bring a No. 5 national ranking into the game against the FBS Midshipmen.

Delaware opens the season on the road for just the third time in head coach **K.C. Keeler's** 10-year career with the Blue Hens and for the first time since a season-opening 14-7 loss at Maryland in 2008.

SEASON PREVIEW

The Blue Hens look primed for another NCAA play-off run in 2011 as head coach **K.C. Keeler** welcomes back 11 starters and 44 letterwinners from a squad that went 12-3 and advanced to the national championships game a year ago.

Offensively, the Hens must replace All-American quarterback **Pat Devlin**, who earned CAA Offensive Player of the Year laurels and is currently with the Miami Dolphins.

But the loses on the offensive side of the ball don't go much further than that as the Hens return four

starting offensive lineman - including three pre-season All-Americans in guard **Gino Gradkowski**, **Shea Allard**, and **Rob McDowell**.

Sophomore **Andrew Pierce**, the 2010 CAA Offensive Rookie of the Year who compiled 1,655 yards on the ground, is back to lead a run game that returns the top three rushers while All-CAA tight end **Colin Naugle** and top returning receiver, **Nihja White** (60 receptions) are also back.

Things are not quite as bright on the defensive side of the ball where Keeler returns just three full-time starters from a squad that was the top unit in the country, leading the nation in scoring defense at 12.1 points per game and ranking No. 4 in total defense (280.7 yards per game).

The Hens must replace four All-CAA defensive backs, including All-Americans **Anthony Walters** and **Anthony Bratton**, but do welcome back a pair of All-CAA performers in DE **Michael Atunrase** and LB **Paul Worriolow**. Also returning to the starting lineup is outside linebacker **Andrew Harrison**.

DELAWARE IN SEASON OPENERS

Delaware has put together a record of 7-2 in season openers under head coach **K.C. Keeler**, including two straight wins with shutout victories of 35-0 over West Chester in 2009 and 31-0 over that same Golden Ram team last season.

The Hens, who are 13-3 in season openers since 1995, will be facing Navy in the season opener for just the second time.

The teams met in the 1988 season opener in Annapolis with the Mids posting a 30-3 victory. The three points is the lowest opening day point total for Delaware since falling to Lehigh 21-0 in the 1950 debut.

MOVIN' ON UP:

Delaware is one of six Colonial Athletic Association teams opening its season against an NCAA Division FCS opponent this week - joining James Madison (North Carolina), New Hampshire (Toledo), Richmond (Duke), Villanova (Temple), and William & Mary (Virginia).

But the Hens go into this week's game at Navy not just looking to put in a good effort, but to win.

The days of NCAA Division I FCS teams (formerly NCAA I-AA) being pushovers for the bigger FBS schools may be over as upsets are becoming more and more prevalent each season.

Delaware is 78-63-4 (.552) all-time vs. current NCAA FBS teams but will be looking to snap a two-game losing streak and down an upper division foe for the first time since a 59-52 win at Navy in 2007 when current Baltimore Ravens starting quarterback **Joe Flacco** led the Blue Hen charge.

WHO STARTS AT QUARTERBACK?

Although the season opener is just a week away, the starting quarterback spot for the Blue Hens is still up in the air.

Sophomore **Trevor Sasek** and junior **Tim Donnelly** have battled all spring and this summer to take over the spot vacated by All-American **Pat Devlin**, who graduated last spring and is now in the Miami Dolphins camp.

The 6-6 Sasek has the most experience after seeing action in seven games a year ago, including starting and leading the Blue Hens to a 30-6 win over Duquesne and spelling Devlin early in the James Madison game and pacing Delaware to a thrilling 13-10 last second win in which he engineered the winning drive.

For the season, Sasek (pronounced Sass-ick) completed 20 of 32 passes for 199 yards and one touchdowns while rushing for 50 yards and two scores.

Donnelly, a 6-4 former walk-on, has seen action in two games during his career, seeing time vs. Towson in both 2009 and 2010.

In addition to Sasek and Donnelly, 6-6 redshirt freshman **Justin Burns** has also enjoyed a solid pre-season camp and will be the team's No. 3 signal-caller.

Whoever gets the start will become the first home-grown signal-caller to get the nod in the opener in 10 seasons under Keeler.

Delaware has attracted some top-notch transfers at

quarterback during Keeler's tenure, including **Andy Hall** (2002-03), **Sonny Riccio** (2004-05), **Joe Flacco** (2006-07), **Robbie Schoenhof** (2008), and **Devlin** (2009-10).

Keeler isn't expected to make a decision about the starter until later this week.

TRIPLE DUTY FOR NEW BLUE HEN KICKER BANER; PERRY LEAVES TEAM

Sophomore **Sean Baner**, who was solid as the Blue Hens' kickoff specialist last season, will add two more responsibilities to his gameday duties this fall.

The Southampton, Pa. native will take over at punter for two-time All-Colonial Athletic Association pick Ed Wagner and has also earned the starting placekicking duties from second team All-CAA pick Mike Perry following a tough pre-season battle.

Perry, who booted 20 of 26 field goals a year ago, decided to leave the team this week. Walk-on freshman Garrett Greenway will take over as Baner's backup on placements.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION:

Thanks to last season's national runner-up finish and the return of 11 starters, including seven on offense, the Blue Hens have earned some impressive pre-season accolades. The Hens appear in the Top 10 in virtually every pre-season Top 25 poll and have been picked No. 3 in the pre-season Colonial Athletic Association poll.

SCORE FIRST AND THINGS WILL BE FINE.....

That has usually been the case for the Blue Hens of late. Delaware was a dominant team early on last season, outscoring opponent 94-34 in the first quarter and 242-80 in the first half. The Hens scored first in 12 of the team's 15 games. Delaware had won 12 straight

games when scoring first before the NCAA championship game loss to Eastern Washington last January. Still the Hens have won 16 of their last 18 games since 2009 when getting on the board first. Delaware teams are 58-14 (.805) when they score first in head coach **K.C. Keeler's** nine seasons at the helm.

YET ANOTHER WINNING RECORD; HENS REACH 12-WIN MARK...AGAIN

The Blue Hens have posted a winning record seven times in nine seasons under head coach **K.C. Keeler**, failing to reach the .500 mark just twice when the team went 5-6 in 2006 and 4-8 in 2008.

But the Hens have more than made up for those two down years, advancing to the NCAA Tournament four times under Keeler, winning the national title in 2003 and finishing as national runner-up in both 2007 and 2010. Along the way, the Hens have also captured three conference titles, earning the Lambert Cup Trophy three times, and the ECAC Team of the Year three times.

Delaware has not suffered back-to-back losing seasons since 1938-39, a milestone that few college teams in the nation at any level - and none in the CAA - can match. The Hens have reached 12 wins seven times in school history, most recently in 2010.

Delaware posted a 7-0 start for the ninth time in school history last season and for the second time under Keeler. The Hens started out 9-0 on the way to the 2003 national championship campaign.

HOME SWEET HOME

Delaware boasts one of the top home-field advantages in all of college football. Not only do Blue Hen fans pack Delaware Stadium each week - helping UD become the only NCAA FCS team in the nation to average 20,000 or more fans per regular season home game each of the last 12 seasons - they see consistently winning football.

Delaware has posted an impressive record of 50-16 (.757) in nine seasons under **K.C. Keeler** at Delaware Stadium - among the top marks at any division of college football.

Delaware had won seven straight at home - its longest home win skein since winning nine straight between 2004-05 - before falling to Villanova 28-21 in overtime in the regular season finale on Nov. 20.

Of the 16 losses, seven have come by six points or less or in overtime. The Hens have scored more than 20 points in all but nine of those 65 games.

Delaware has won 21 of its last 28 home games and is 278-87-4 (.763) in 59 seasons all-time at Delaware Stadium, including a mark of 20-5 with eighth straight wins in the post-season.

SCORING STREAK REACHES 186...AND COUNTING

Delaware extended its streak of scoring a point to 186 straight games in the 20-19 loss to Eastern Washington in the national title game last January

Delaware has not been shutout in any game since falling at Villanova 27-0 back on Sept. 14, 1996 and have not been held off the scoreboard at home a Delaware Stadium since suffering a 24-0 setback to Holy Cross way back on Nov. 12, 1983 (a streak of 184 straight games).

The current scoring streak breaks the previous UD record of consecutive game scoring a point of 154 set in 1983-98. **Delaware's streak of consecutive road games scoring a point now stands at 84 games.**

During the streak, the Hens have scored 30 or more points 81 times (42 percent of the time). The current streak ranks No. 3 among Colonial Athletic Association teams, trailing only Massachusetts (188) and New Hampshire (186).

SUCCESS FOR THE COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The claim that the Blue Hens play in the most competitive conference in the nation - the Colonial Athletic Association - continues to ring true. CAA teams combined for a non-league record of 25-16 last season, including James Madison's 21-16 major upset over Virginia Tech on Sept. 11. Of those 16 losses, eight came at the hands of NCAA FBS opponents, including William & Mary's tough 21-17 setback at North Carolina.

In addition to Delaware, CAA foes Villanova, New Hampshire, and William & Mary all advanced to the NCAA Tournament this season.

Villanova, the defending national champion, fell to Eastern Washington in the national semifinals on Dec. 17.

POSITIVE PUNT PROTECTION

Delaware will look to break in a new punter this season after the graduation of two-year regular and 2010 All-CAA selection **Ed Wagner**.

Also gone is four-year deep snapper **Zack Reed**. Sophomore **Sean Baner** will most likely take over those punting duties and a group that includes senior wide receiver **Mark Schenauer**, sophomore tight end **Corey Olsen**, and freshman tight end **Nick Boyle** will be expected to continue an impressive streak by the punt team.

Delaware has now gone 280 straight punt attempts without having a kick blocked since the 2005 season vs. William & Mary. The streak covers 66 games.

BEEN AROUND THE BLOCK A FEW TIMES

Few college teams in the country can boast the vast coaching experience of Delaware's offensive and defensive coordinators.

Blue Hen defensive leader **Nick Rapone** and third-year offensive head man **Jim Hoffer** have combined for an incredible 60 years of college coaching experience - each with 30 campaigns under their belts - including 24 years as coordinators.

Hoffer served as head coach at his alma mater, Cornell, in 1990-97 and at Buffalo in 2001-05. Together they have coached over 620 games on the college level.

MILESTONES & STREAKS

- Senior C **Rob McDowell** and senior LB **Andrew Harrison** own the team's longest current starting streaks entering the Navy game. McDowell, who has started every game of his career for the Blue Hens, will start his 39th straight game while Harrison will earn his 27th straight starting nod vs. Navy.

- Senior RB **David Hayes** enters the season with 937 career rushing yards, leaving him just 63 shy of becoming the 55th player in UD history to reach that plateau.

- Junior WR **Nihja White** enters the 2011 season having caught at least one pass in 23 straight games, the team's longest current pass reception streak and the eighth longest in school history. He also has 990 career pass receiving yards and needs just 10 yards to become the 25th player in UD history to reach the 1,000-yard mark. His 81 career receptions make him the team's active leader and he needs 19 catches to become the 15th Blue Hen to reach 100 for a career.

A BLUE HEN IN THE WHITE HOUSE...AND AT DELAWARE STADIUM

When U.S. President **Barack Obama** and running mate, former Delaware Senator **Joe Biden**, won the 2008 presidential election, it was big news. And even bigger news for the citizens of Delaware and those affiliated with the University of Delaware.

A 1965 graduate of the University of Delaware with degrees in history and political science, Biden played on the Blue Hen freshman football team in 1961 under head coach **Scotty Duncan**. Biden, a member of the UD Wall of Fame and an ardent Delaware football fan, considered himself "a half-baked halfback" during his brief UD football career.

Biden made his first visit to Delaware Stadium as Vice-President on Saturday, Oct. 9, 2009 as he attended the Maine game and sat with UD President Patrick Harker and current New Jersey Governor Chris Christie (also a UD graduate) throughout the entire contest.

He made another visit to Delaware Stadium in 2010 when he attended Delaware's 16-3 NCAA quarterfinal win over New Hampshire on Dec. 10.

He also attended the Hens' 2010 national championship game in Frisco, Tex. with Christie and Delaware Gov. Jack Markell.

Biden met with head coach **K.C. Keeler** and members of the team on Sept. 19, 2008 when Biden's plane was parked on the same tarmac as the Delaware charter at New Castle County (Del.) prior to its trip to Furman. Biden later made an appearance at the Blue Hens' game vs. Maine at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 11, 2008 and received a rousing applause while being mobbed by well-wishers.

VERY PRESIDENTIAL...

No less than six members of the University of Delaware football team have the same surnames as former U.S. Presidents, including the Hens' top two running backs - **Andrew Pierce** and **Dave Hayes**.

Other Blue Hens with presidential surnames are **Andrew Harrison**, **Leon Jackson**, **Bobby Kennedy**, and **Michael Johnson**.

NINE BLUE HENS IN THE NFL....

Nine former Blue Hen players are currently in National Football League camps this summer, trying to make lifelong dreams a reality.

The list includes two veterans in Baltimore Ravens QB **Joe Flacco** and Cleveland Brown DB **Mike Adams**.

Flacco begins his fourth NFL season, all as a starter, and will be looking to lead Baltimore to yet another playoff berth. Adams begins his eighth season in the NFL this fall, including his fourth with Cleveland.

Among the rookies looking to make NFL teams after signing free agent contracts this summer are QB **Pat Devlin** (Miami), LB **Matt Marcorelle** (Houston), FS **Anthony Walters** (Chicago), SS **Anthony Bratton** (Green Bay), CB **Tyrone Grant** (Washington), and TE **Josh Baker** (New York Jets).

Baker played last season at Northwest Missouri State after competing for the Blue Hens in 2006-09.

In addition, DT **Brandon Gilbeaux** is in camp with Tampa Bay this season after being released during the pre-season last year.

One other Blue Hen player, TE **Ben Patrick**, signed a free agent contract with the New York Giants this past summer after three years with Arizona, but retired before camp began.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware posted another early-season win over West Chester as freshman running back Andrew Pierce ran for 119 yards in his collegiate debut, All-American candidate Pat Devlin threw for three touchdowns, and Anthony Walters led the defense with two interceptions as the No. 16 Hens cruised to the win.

The Blue Hens (1-0) didn't show mid-season form just yet, fumbling the ball away twice and committing six penalties, but it was an effective effort as Delaware downed the NCAA Division II power Rams for the 17th straight time and posted a shutout over the Golden Rams (0-1) for the second straight year. The Hens have won each of the last eight meetings by at least 18 points.

Pierce, a sturdy 5-11, 200-pounder, earned the starting nod over two returning veterans during pre-season and showed just why Thursday night as he rushed 13 times for 119 yards, including a 22-yard burst around the left side that gave Delaware a 14-0 lead just over a minute into the second half.

Devlin, a senior and second-year starter who is a candidate for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision, was efficient as usual, completing 14 of 23 passes for 163 yards and three touchdowns before giving way to backup Trevor Sasek late in the third quarter.

Delaware, looking to rebound from a 6-5 record a year ago, treated the opening night crowd of 19,421 to a fun evening as the Hens jumped out to a 21-0 lead at halftime and never looked back.

The Hens opened the scoring late in the first quarter as Devlin hit sophomore wide receiver Nihja White in the right flat and White outraced a Ram defender to sneak into the front corner of the end zone.

Pierce gave the Hens a 14-0 lead on his 22-yard burst early in the second quarter, and Devin found Tommy Crosby on a fade pattern in the left side of the end zone with 3:12 left in the half. Delaware had the chance to make it even more, but sophomore Rob Jones fumbled just two yards shy of the end zone with just 21 seconds left in the half.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware dominated both sides of scrimmage, piling up 257 yards behind the running of freshman RB Andrew Pierce and holding South Dakota State to just 25 yards on the ground as the No. 16 Blue Hens posted an impressive win over the No. 9 Jackrabbits.

The Blue Hens (2-0) snapped a six-game losing streak vs. Top 10 opponents - posting their first win since a 20-17 victory over Southern Illinois in the 2007 FCS semifinals - and did so in a big way, jumping out to a 17-0 lead after the first quarter and never looking back in a battle of FCS powers. South Dakota State (0-1) was an NCAA Tournament participant a year ago.

Pierce, a 5-11, 200 lb. freshman, was a workhorse, carrying 26 times for 165 yards and a touchdown and becoming the first player in UD history to run for over 100 yards in each of his first two collegiate games. His 165 yards was the third highest single game mark ever for a UD freshman and was just 12 shy of teammate Phillip Thaxton's record of 177 set in 2007.

Delaware QB Pat Devlin, a candidate for the Walter Payton National Player of the Year Award, completed 14 of 25 passes for 143 yards and finding seven different receivers in the first quarter alone for Delaware. He tossed a seven-yard scoring strike to Thaxton just five minutes into the game as the Hens jumped out to a 7-0 lead and never looked back.

The Blue Hen defense was just as impressive for the second straight week. After shutting down West Chester by a 31-0 score the previous week, the Hens almost equalled that effort again as they held the Jackrabbits to just 250 total yards, including just 25 yards rushing.

SDSU All-American running back Kyle Minett, who ranked among the national leaders with 1,304 yards and 16 touchdowns a year ago and entered the game with over 3,000 career rushing yards, was held to just 32 yards on 14 carries, his lowest single game total since taking over the starting duties as a sophomore.

The Hens also picked off SDSU quarterback Thomas O'Brien three times, including two by safety Anthony Bratton. Delaware kept the Jackrabbits out of the end zone all day, stopping the final drive of the game when Matt Marcocelle intercepted a pass in the end zone. The Hens have now intercepted six passes in two games this season and have held opponents without a touchdown for the last 143 minutes of game action over three games dating back to last season.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware freshman sensation Andrew Pierce continued his dominant running, setting a UD rookie record with 200 yards and two touchdowns, Trevor Sasek was solid in his first collegiate start at quarterback, and Tyrone Grant set the tone by returning an interception for a touchdown two minutes into the game as the No. 11 Blue Hens ran past Duquesne.

The Hens (3-0), off to their best start since the 2007 national runner-up season, dominated the line of scrimmage, rolling up 373 yards on the ground behind Pierce and holding the Dukes (1-2) to 326 total yards for the game while also intercepting three passes.

Pierce carried 16 times for 200 yards and two scores, setting a UD single freshman rushing record and becoming just the sixth player in school history to reach the 200-yard plateau. He became the first UD player to rush for over 100 yards in three straight games since Omar Cuff in 2007. The old UD freshman mark was 177 set by Phillip Thaxton in 2007.

Meanwhile, the Delaware defense that entered the game leading the nation in scoring (1.5) and total defense (182.5), was at it again, holding the Dukes to just two field goals. The Hens have not allowed a touchdown since the third quarter of last year's season finale, extending a streak to 13 quarters and 203 minutes of action. Delaware has now gone three straight games without allowing a touchdown for the first time the 1977 and 1978 seasons.

Sasek, a redshirt freshman who was making his first career start in place of the injured Pat Devlin, was solid, completing 7 of 9 passes for 75 yards and a 23-yard touchdown pass to Thaxton to cap the scoring. Devlin was available to play but was held out after fracturing his left wrist in the 26-3 win over South Dakota State this week.

Delaware got all the points they would need in the opening minutes when Grant intercepted a pass by Duquesne's Sean Patterson and weaved his way through a maze of Dukes players for a 45-yard touchdown just over two minutes into the game. Grant, who later intercepted another pass to increase Delaware's national leading total to nine, tied a school record with his third career interception for a touchdown, equalling the mark set by Kenny Bailey in 1993-96.

The Hens came up with a huge defensive stand on Duquesne's next possession when Delaware kept the Dukes out of the end zone, stopping running back Larry McCoy on a fourth and goal at the one with middle linebacker Matt Marcorelle making the tackle. All the Dukes could manage on the night were two field goals by Eric Duale.

RICHMOND, Va. -- No. 7 ranked Delaware left little doubt of how ready it is for the rigors of CAA football action, breaking open a close game and racing to the victory over No. 5 Richmond.

Blue Hen QB Pat Devlin, returning to action after missing a week with a fractured wrist, didn't miss a beat as he threw for 240 yards despite wearing a cast on his non-throwing hand, and freshman sensation Andrew Pierce had another big game, grinding out 114 yards on the ground and scoring three touchdowns to lead the victory.

The Delaware defense allowed its first touchdowns of the season, but it hardly mattered as the Hens held Richmond to 14 first downs and 234 total yards. The Hens (4-0, 1-0 CAA) downed the defending CAA champion Spiders (1-2, 0-1 CAA) for the first time since the 2006 season.

After Richmond tied the game at 13-13 midway through the third quarter, Delaware came right back and posted three scoring drives of 77 yards or more to put the game away.

Devlin, an All-American nominee and a candidate for the Walter Payton National Player of the Year Award, shook off his first interception of the season on the Hens' first drive and finished the day completing 14 of 21 passes for 240 yards. He hit eight different receivers on the day and had 12 completions go for 10 or more yards.

Pierce had to work for everything he could in carrying 26 times for 114 yards, breaking the 100-yard barrier for the fourth straight week. His two-yard scoring run early in the second quarter gave the Hens a 13-0 lead and his touchdown runs of 13 and 8 yards in the second half helped increase the Delaware lead to 27-13 with 12:06 left to play. His backup, sophomore David Hayes, finished with 82 yards on the day, capped the scoring with a 40-yard burst with 2:30 left. The two helped the Hens gain 236 of their impressive 476 total yards on the ground.

The Blue Hen defense, which entered the game as the only NCAA school in the country that had not allowed a touchdown all season, continued to dominate, holding the Spiders to just 234 total yards. Richmond broke the Hens' streak when QB Aaron Corp hit TE Kevin Finney on an 11-yard scoring strike in the back of the end zone with just 30 seconds left in the first half to cut the lead to 13-6 at the break. Delaware had not allowed a touchdown all season and had not allowed an opponent in the end zone since the third quarter of the Villanova game last season, a span of 14 quarters and 233 minutes of game action.

HARRISONBURG, Va. -- On a day when Delaware QB Pat Devlin played just two snaps and Andrew Pierce found rushing yards tough to come by, it was the reliable Blue Hen defense that rode to the rescue once again. The No. 5 Blue Hens (5-0, 2-0 CAA) used a superb defensive effort in the second half and two fourth-quarter field goals by Mike Perry, the second a 28-yarder down the middle with just three seconds left to play, as they posted a hard-fought CAA victory.

Delaware, which won for the first time at James Madison since 2001, posted its third victory over a top-five ranked opponent this season and put itself in the CAA driver's seating. No. 3 James Madison (3-1, 0-1 CAA), which posted a victory over nationally-ranked Virginia Tech earlier this season, had a seven-game win streak dating back to last season snapped.

Trevor Sasek was pressed into action early when Devlin suffered a concussion on the Hen's second offensive play, ending his day. Sasek rose to the occasion as he completed 13 of 21 passes for 124 yards and engineered the winning drive that saw the Hens go 69 yards on 14 plays to set up Perry's game-winning kick.

Perry, in his first year as the Blue Hen kicker, also did his job in a big way. His career-long 47-yarder on the first play of the fourth quarter capped a 39-yard drive and knotted the score at 10-10. His winning kick marked the first time since Oct. 10, 1987 that Delaware won a game on a field goal in the final minute of regulation. The previous honor belonged to Don O'Brien, who helped Delaware post a 37-34 victory over Massachusetts at Delaware Stadium on another 28-yarder with seven seconds remaining.

While Sasek and Perry stepped up to do their part, once again top honors went to the Delaware defense, which entered the game ranked No. 1 among all NCAA Division I teams, allowing a stingy 5.5 points per game as well as a No. 1 ranking in interceptions (10) and a third place ranking in total defense (231.2 yards per game).

The Hens, who got 11 tackles from strong safety Anthony Bratton, 10 stops and an interception from free safety Darryl Jones, and 10 tackles from linebacker Paul Worrilow, allowed James Madison just 69 of its 283 total yards in the second half.

All the Dukes could manage on the day was a one-yard scoring run by Scott Noble that tied the game at 7-7 with 9:43 left in the second quarter and a 20-yard field goal by Dixon Wright just 59 seconds before halftime that put them up 10-7 at intermission. Noble's touchdown was set up by a 47-yard jaunt down the middle to the Delaware six-yard line by Jamal Sullivan, who finished with a game-high 93 yards rushing but managed only 11 of that after the break.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware may not have played perfectly, but the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens stayed perfect with a CAA victory over Maine on a picture-perfect sunny day.

Delaware, which remained undefeated with a 6-0 mark (3-0 CAA), took advantage of three Maine turnovers and All-American candidate Pat Devlin bounced back with a solid passing effort to send the Hens to a relatively easy victory against a tough opponent. They did so in front of a special guest as former Delaware Senator and current U.S. Vice-President Joe Biden attended the game to cheer on his alma mater.

Maine (2-4, 1-2 CAA), which was coming off a 17-14 overtime victory over then No. 14 New Hampshire last week, could never overcome the miscues and managed just 237 total yards on the day.

The Hens, who entered as the top defensive unit in the nation at the NCAA Division I level, allowing just 6.4 points per game, jumped out to a 19-0 lead at halftime and built the margin to 26-0 early in the third quarter before allowing a late third-quarter score by the Black Bears.

Delaware linebacker Paul Worrilow opened the scoring when he returned a fumble 11 yards for a touchdown midway through the first quarter, cornerback Tyrone Grant intercepted a pass just in front of the UD goal line late in the second quarter to set up a Blue Hen field goal just before the half, and linebacker Andrew Harrison put an end to another Black Bear drive when he recovered a fumble at the Delaware 24-yard line early in the final quarter.

Devlin, who missed all but one play in last week's 13-10 win over James Madison due to a concussion, bounced back with a solid effort as he completed 20 of 36 passes for a season-high 283 yards and fired a 10-yard touchdown pass to freshman running back Andrew Pierce in the second quarter. Devlin's favorite target on the day was sophomore Rob Jones, who caught six passes for 105 yards.

Pierce, who leads all NCAA FCS freshmen in rushing at 130.6 yards per game, had another big day as he ran for 96 yards and scored on a three-yard run in the third quarter to push the lead to 26-0. He upped his season rushing total to 749 yards, breaking the UD season freshman record of 708 set by Craig Cummings in 1997. The Hens, off to a 6-0 start for the first time since a 9-0 start vaulted them to the NCAA I-AA national championship title, have now won their first three conference games for the first time since the 2007 season when the Hens also advanced to the national championship game.

NEWARK, Del. -- The resounding sigh of relief heard throughout Delaware Stadium might have been stronger than the high winds that blew all afternoon.

No. 2 Delaware won the turnover battle once again and it needed all three of the take-aways as the Blue Hens jumped out to a 17-0 lead but had to hold on down the stretch to remain unbeaten with a CAA victory over upset-minded Rhode Island before a wind-swept sellout crowd.

Delaware (7-0, 4-0 CAA), one of four unbeaten teams in the nation at the FCS level, held on to that distinction as freshman RB Andrew Pierce ran for 131 yards and two touchdowns, LB Paul Worrilow returned a fumble for a touchdown for the second straight week, and CB Marcus Burley came up with two big interceptions, including the game-clincher in the final minutes.

After falling behind 17-0, Rhode Island (2-4, 1-2, CAA) got back into the game thanks to a 75-yard kickoff return by Travis Hurd late in the first half, but could never get closer than a touchdown the rest of the way and dropped its 10th straight road game since 2009.

Delaware, which entered the game ranked No. 3 in the nation in turnover margin with a +9 ranking, defeated Maine 26-7 last week thanks to three turnovers, including an 11-yard fumble return for a touchdown by Worrilow. The Hens have won 81 percent of their games when tying or winning the turnover battle in nine seasons under Keeler.

Pierce, the nation's leading freshman rusher at 124.8 yards per game, picked up his fifth 100-yard effort of the season as he carried 26 times for 131 yards and scored on runs of 15 yards to open the scoring four minutes into the game and one-yard late in the first half to stake the Hens to a 24-7 lead. All-American quarterback Pat Devlin also spearheaded the offense as he completed 18 of 23 passes for 161 yards.

The Delaware defense, which entered the game leading all NCAA Division I teams in scoring defense at 6.5 points per game, allowed a season-high 17 points, but did its job by forcing the three turnovers, including Burley's second interception of the game with 3:13 left to play that ended Rhode Island's last-ditch drive.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. -- Delaware traded too many sevens for threes and it cost them dearly as the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens suffered their first setback of the season.

Delaware's inability to score touchdowns instead of field goals deep inside William & Mary territory resulted in the Hens' third straight setback to the No. 4 ranked Tribe (6-1, 4-1 CAA), who won their sixth straight and moved into a tie with Delaware for the CAA lead.

William & Mary scored the winning points when Jonathan Grimes hit Chase Hill on a six-yard halfback option pass with 6:25 left to play.

Delaware (7-1, 4-1 CAA) pushed the ball inside the Tribe five-yard line three times on the day and was only able to get six points out of the effort.

Delaware, which was playing its fourth top five ranked team this season, had the chance to win the game in the final seconds but Mike Perry, who had connected on three field goals earlier in the day, was way wide to the left on a 42-yard attempt.

After pinning William & Mary on their five-yard line after a well-placed punt by Ed Wagner, Delaware held the Tribe and forced them to punt. The Hens got the ball on their own 46-yard line with 2:52 left to play and moved down to the 35-yard line on completions by senior quarterback Pat Devlin to Tommy Crosby, Phil Thaxton, and Nihja White.

After an incompleton, Devlin was sacked by Dante Cook back to the 33-yard line. Devlin came back to hit White on an eight-yard shovel pass to the 25-yard line to set up the field goal attempt. After a timeout by William & Mary, Perry lined up for the 42-yard attempt but it was wide left and never had a chance, setting off a celebration by the Tribe.

Perry converted field goals of 19, 40, and 20 yards while Devlin finished the day hitting 23 of 32 passes for 293 yards with White hauling in 10 passes for 146 yards and a 51-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter that gave Delaware a 10-3 lead.

William & Mary, which became the the first team to score a point in the first quarterback and the final quarter vs. the Hens this season, converted 7 of 15 third downs. Backup QB Mike Callahan, who relieved starter Michael Paulus and finished with 93 yards on 7 of 10 passing, hit TE Alex Gottlieb on a 15-yard scoring pass with 3:51 left in the third quarter to pull the Tribe to within 13-10.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware could do little wrong on both sides of the ball as the No. 5 Blue Hens piled up 589 yards of total offense and held Towson to just eight first downs on the way to a CAA rout before an appreciative Homecoming crowd.

The Blue Hens (8-1, 6-0 CAA), playing for the first time since suffering their first loss of the season in a 17-16 setback to William & Mary two weeks ago, stormed back in stunning fashion as Pat Devlin completed 29 of 38 passes for 318 yards and one touchdown while running for another score, Nihja White finished with nine receptions for 108 yards and one touchdown, Leon Jackson scored on a 63-yard run and finished with a game-high 88 yards on the ground, and Andrew Pierce scored two TDs and went over 1,000 yards for the season with 79 rushing yards.

Towson (1-8, 0-6 CAA), which lost its seventh straight game, played without dual-threat QB Chris Hart who was suspended on Friday due to a violation of team rules. With Hart gone, the Tigers managed just 158 total yards and eight first downs and punted 10 times - one shy of the school record of 11 set vs. Delaware in 2004. The Tigers crossed midfield just twice the entire day, never got closer than the Delaware 34-yard line, and had just one play go for 10 yards.

The Blue Hens, who remained in a tie for first place in the CAA standings with William & Mary with a 5-1 league mark, reached the eight-victory milestone with the win. Since 2003, each of the 21 CAA teams that have won eight or more regular season games have advanced to the NCAA Division I FCS playoffs.

The victory was the most lopsided in Keeler's nine-year tenure at Delaware and was the largest since an 84-0 victory over West Chester back in 2000 and biggest in conference play since a 61-0 triumph over Maine during the 1995 campaign.

Delaware, which has led the nation in scoring defense for each of the last seven weeks and entered the game allowing just 9.1 points per game, posted its first shutout since a 35-0 blanking of West Chester in the 2009 opener. The Hens have yet to allow more than 17 points in any game this season.

AMHERST, Mass. -- The Delaware offense played the starring role as the No. 2 ranked Blue Hens piled up 510 yards of total offense and QB Pat Devlin threw touchdown passes to four different receivers on the way to a win over No. 14 Massachusetts on a perfect autumn day.

And not only did they cruise to their second straight victory, the Blue Hens (9-1, 6-1 CAA) clinched at least a share of the Colonial Athletic Association title - their first since 2004 - as William & Mary dropped a 30-24 decision to James Madison Saturday.

Devlin, a Top 10 finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award as the top quarterback in the nation, proved worthy of that lofty honor as he completed 16 of 22 passes for 240 yards and matched a career-high with four touchdowns, hitting Rob Jones, Andrew Pierce, Phillip Thaxton, and Colin Naugle on scoring tosses.

The Hens got the job done on the ground as well as David Hayes, playing his first game since Oct. 9 due to an ankle injury, enjoyed an impressive return as he rushed for a career-high 107 yards, including a 61-yard touchdown burst up the middle in the third quarter. Pierce, the nation's leading freshman runner at the FCS level, added 66 yards on the ground. Devlin also ran for a career-high 55 yards as the Hens totalled 270 yards on the ground.

Massachusetts (6-4, 4-3 CAA), who will most likely need a win over Rhode Island in their season finale next week to earn a post-season berth, had a two-game win streak snapped despite putting up 27 points and 424 yards - both seasons highs against a Delaware defense that entered the game ranked No. 1 in the nation in scoring defense at 8.1 points per game.

Delaware had allowed a previous high of 17 points vs. Rhode Island and William & Mary and a high of 350 yards to William & Mary. The Minutemen had surpassed the 350-yard mark by the middle of the third quarter. Delaware surpassed the 40-point and 500-total yardage marks for the second straight week and also converted on 11 of 17 third downs.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware, counting on a victory over longtime rival and No. 15 Villanova to sew up the top seed in the 20-team NCAA Tournament field, got heartache instead and dropped a CAA verdict in the regular season finale.

Delaware (9-2, 6-2 CAA) fought back from a two-touchdown deficit in the first five minutes of play and sent the game into overtime on a touchdown pass from Pat Devlin to Andrew Pierce in the final seconds of regulation, but Villanova scored on its first possession of the extra session to take the lead and Hens' hopes were dashed when Pierce was stripped of the ball on the one-yard line and the Wildcats Martel Moody recovered the fumble to end the game.

The No. 1 ranked Blue Hens had a seven-game home win streak snapped and lost to the Wildcats (7-4, 4-3 CAA) for the fifth straight time in the Battle of the Blue series. Delaware still gained a share of the CAA regular season title but lost out on the automatic NCAA berth.

Devlin enjoyed yet another impressive showing as he completed 30 of 45 passes for 305 yards and three touchdowns, including scoring strikes of 18 yards to Nihja White and nine yards to Rob Jones in the first half and the one-yard toss to Pierce with 18 seconds left in regulation that tied the score at 21-21 and sent the game into an extra session - the Hens' first overtime appearance since a 62-56 five overtime setback to Richmond in 2007.

Villanova QB Chris Whitney completed 14 of 19 passes for 150 yards, hitting TB Lawrence Doss on a four-yard toss to up the Villanova lead to 14-0 early in the first quarter and running eight yards for a score with 11:35 left in the fourth quarter to give Villanova a 21-14 lead.

Angelo Babbaro set the tone when he returned the opening kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown and Aaron Ball scored what proved to be the game-winner for Villanova when he leaped over a pile of bodies and into the end zone from one-yard out on the Wildcats first possession of overtime.

Delaware had the chance to send the game into a second overtime but came up short. Devlin moved the Hens into scoring position after hitting Phillip Thaxton for six yards, Pierce for eight, and Tommy Crosby for eight more down to the two-yard line. Pierce ran up the middle on the next play but was stripped of the ball while fighting for extra yards and Moody fell on the ball to end the game.

NEWARK, Del. -- While the brisk temperatures and strong winds lowered the wind chill near freezing, No. 5 Delaware rode the red-hot throwing arm of QB Pat Devlin and used 28 unanswered points to wear down Lehigh and advance in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoffs.

Devlin, the Colonial Athletic Association Offensive Player of the Year and a top 10 finalist for the Johnny Unitas Gold Arm Award, posted his fourth straight 200-yard passing effort as he threw for 256 yards and connected for touchdowns with four different receivers. His four touchdowns matched a career-high and upped his total to 11 over the last three games.

Delaware (10-2) rolled up 450 total yards against a No. 19/18 ranked Lehigh squad that had entered the game ranked 10th in the nation in scoring defense (17.2) and was riding an eight-game win streak - the longest among the 20 teams in the NCAA tournament field.

The Patriot League champion Mountain Hawks ended their season with a 10-3 mark despite a big effort from QB Chris Lum, who had a career day as he connected on 35 of 58 passes for 362 yards and two touchdowns but was intercepted twice. All three of their losses came to Colonial Athletic Association opponents.

Delaware head coach Keeler improved to 9-2 all-time in NCAA FCS playoff action and stayed unbeaten at home in six playoff games at Delaware Stadium. Delaware, the 2003 national champion and the NCAA runner-up in 2007, has now advanced to the quarterfinals four times in nine seasons under Keeler.

Devlin connected for touchdowns with four different receivers on the afternoon, hitting Mark Schenauer on a 29-yard scoring strike and Chris Campbell on a one-yard toss in the second quarter and hooking up with Tommy Crosby from 38 yards out and with Nihja White on a 20-yard scoring play as part of a 21-point third quarter. After Lehigh took a 14-13 lead midway through the second stanza, the Hens reeled off 28 straight points to take command.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware has thrived all season long behind its dominating defense and the pinpoint accuracy of QB Pat Devlin. That combination rose to the occasion once again as the No. 5 ranked Blue Hens (11-2) shut down No. 11 New Hampshire, holding the Wildcats to a single first quarter field goal and moving on to the NCAA Division I FCS quarterfinal victory.

Delaware's defense, which entered the game as the nation's top-ranked scoring defense, allowing just over 12 points per game, held the potent UNH offense in check all night, limiting the Wildcats (8-5) to just 237 total yards and stopping them on 11 of 13 third down opportunities. The Hens also recorded three sacks and forced the game's only turnover when CB Anthony Walters on a fourth down at the Delaware 27-yard line with 5:47 left to play.

New Hampshire, which had a five-game winning streak snapped, had scored 28 or more points in six of its last seven games, including a 45-20 win over Bethune-Cookman in the NCAA second round the previous week. The Wildcats advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the seventh straight year but have yet to advance past the quarterfinal round.

Devlin was nearly flawless, completing 27 of 38 passes for 261 yards and putting the game away in the second for the Hens with scoring tosses of 24 yards to WR Nihja White midway through the third quarter and nine yards to WR Mark Schenauer early in the final stanza. Devlin surpassed the 200-yard mark for the seventh straight game.

The Blue Hens snapped a personal three-game losing streak vs. their Colonial Athletic Association foes to advance to the NCAA semifinals. Delaware head coach K.C. Keeler improved to 10-2 all-time in NCAA playoff action for the Hens, including a perfect 7-0 mark at home.

Devlin, the CAA Offensive Player of the Year, directed an offense that overcame a sluggish first quarter to put up 383 total yards. White caught eight passes for 94 yards while Tommy Crosby had seven catches for 55 yards. RB Andrew Pierce, the CAA Rookie of the Year and the league's leading rusher, led all ground gainers with 90 yards on 23 carries. The Hens managed just one first down and 14 total yards in the first quarter before coming to life.

New Hampshire QB R.J. Toman, who returned to action after sitting out the Bethune-Cookman game with an ankle injury, completed 20 of 36 passes for 136 yards. All-CAA wide receiver Terrance Fox snared a career-high 11 passes for 72 yards while defensive end Brian McNally recorded a first half sack to set a UNH single season record with 12.5.

Among the crowd was U.S. Vice-President Joe Biden, a 1965 Delaware graduate who was a running back on the Blue Hen freshman team, and Chip Kelly, head coach of the top-ranked University of Oregon football team and a former UNH assistant coach.

NEWARK, Del. -- Delaware can once again give thanks to the Blue Hen defense. And this time the reward is a trip to Frisco, Tex. and a chance at yet another national football championship.

The fifth-ranked Blue Hens took advantage of four Georgia Southern turnovers, including one at UD's own goal-line in the first quarter that set the tone for the rest of the day, as Delaware rode that momentum to a NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision semifinal victory.

Delaware (12-2), the tournament's No. 3 seed, posted its third straight victory and earned the right to take on No. 1 ranked and fifth-seeded Eastern Washington (12-2) in the national championship game Jan. 7 at Pizza Hut Park in Frisco, Tex.

The loss ended a storybook post-season for the 20th-ranked Eagles (10-5), who earned at-large berth in the tournament and knocked off South Carolina State, No. 2 seed William & Mary, and Wofford in succession before having its six-game win streak snapped by the Blue Hens.

Delaware head coach K.C. Keeler improved to 11-2 in NCAA playoff action in his nine seasons at Delaware and remained undefeated at home in the post-season with a mark of 8-0.

All-American senior safety Anthony Bratton recorded a team-high 14 tackles, sophomore linebacker Paul Worriow added 12 tackles and forced two fumbles, and junior defensive end Chris Morales, hobbled by a sore hamstring that almost kept him out of action, recovered two fumbles, including one on the goal-line on Georgia Southern's first drive of the day when it looked like the Eagles were moving in for the first score of the day.

Delaware, which entered the game ranked No. 1 in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 11.6 points per game, didn't capitalize on that turnover, but it set the tone for the rest of the day as the Hens won despite gaining 316 total yards, just six more than the Eagles, whose vaunted tripe-option attack netted 310 yards, including 257 on the ground.

Devlin was efficient as usual for the Hens, completing 14 of 20 passes for 137 yards and touchdown tosses of six yards to junior Mark Schenauer to open the scoring early in the second quarter 24 yards to Phillip Thaxton in the third quarter that pushed the Blue Hen lead to 17-3.

Andrew Pierce enjoyed his most productive day since early in the season, rambling for 186 yards on 26 carries and piling up 53 yards on two successive carries in the third quarter that set up a seven-yard scoring run by David Hayes that put the game out of reach at 24-10 with 6:05 remaining. Kicker Mike Perry also made a big contribution, converting two field goals, including a 20-yarder with 3:32 left to play that pushed the lead to 27-10 and iced the win.

FRISCO, Tex. -- In the end, another national championship was just not in the cards for the University of Delaware football team.

The No. 5 ranked Blue Hens, who were looking to capture their seventh national championship in school history, held a 19-0 lead until late in the third quarter, but a torrid comeback by Eastern Washington that included three touchdowns passes by Bo Levi Mitchell over the final 17 minutes resulted in the Eagles' comeback victory.

"We obviously lost to a pretty good football team tonight," said Delaware head coach K.C. Keeler, who was looking to guide the Hens to their first NCAA championship since 2003. "I don't think I've ever been associated with a loss like this. We pretty much dominated the first half but our concern was not having enough points on the board. We knew Eastern Washington was a big play team and you just waited for them to make a couple of big plays. We had some opportunities to put the ballgame away and we didn't but the ballgame away."

The top-ranked Eagles (13-2), who captured their first-ever national championship in football with a school-record 11th straight victory, converted a disputed fourth down play deep inside Delaware territory and scored what proved to be the game-winner with 2:47 left when Mitchell hooked up with Brandon Kaufman for an 11-yard touchdown to tie the game and Mike Jarrett's extra point put Eastern Washington ahead.

"To lose by one point in the national championship game is pretty tough," said Delaware sixth-year senior linebacker Matt Marcocorelle.

Tough indeed.

The Blue Hens (12-3), who had a three-game win streak snapped, had jumped out to a 19-0 lead on a short touchdown run by freshman Andrew Pierce and two field goals by Mike Perry in the first half and on a one-yard dive by David Hayes with 7:12 left in the third stanza. But the Hens just couldn't put any more points on the board.

Eastern Washington, which averaged 32.3 points per game during the season, finally found its offense behind the play of Mitchell, who completed 29 of 43 passes for 302 yards and three touchdowns. He hit Kaufman on a 22-yard scoring pass with 1:48 left in the third quarter to get the Eagles on the board and added a nine-yard strike to Nicholas Edwards with 8:16 left in the game before firing the key touchdown toss to Kaufman less than six minutes later.

Kaufman's winning catch was set up after Eastern Washington converted a fourth down at the Delaware 22-yard line on a one-yard dive by Mario Brown. The Eagles were granted a first down by the official but Keeler challenged the spot and the decision moved up to the replay booth. The ball was re-spotted but was still enough to continue the drive. After an incomplete pass, Mitchell hit Edwards on an 11-yard pass to the 11-yard line and followed with the pivotal 11-yard touchdown toss to Kaufman.

"We stopped them," said Keeler of the fourth down play. "There are no ifs, ands, or buts about it. The way the ball was spotted originally was a first down, but the chain was not on the 22-yard line, it was past it. I usually don't complain about things like that but that one hurt."

Delaware had one last chance to pull out the victory but Pat Devlin's fourth down pass to Mark Schenauer came up short of a first down at the Eastern Washington 39-yard line with 47 seconds remaining. The Eagles then ran out the clock to set off a wild celebration in front of 13,027 fans.

"It's all somewhat overwhelming right now," said Eastern Washington head coach Beau Baldwin. "When it comes down to it, beating an incredibly talented team like Delaware was about our guys on the field. Our guys just never quit fighting."

Mitchell, a transfer from SMU and a native Texan, rescued an offense that managed just 62 first half yards by leading the three-pivotal second half drives. Kaufman caught nine passes for 120 yards for the game while Edwards hauled in six passes for 74 yards and a score. Linebacker J.C. Sherritt, the Buck Buchanan Award winner as the top player in the nation at the FCS level, posted a game-high 18 tackles and helped limit the Hens to just 147 second half yards.

The loss ended a great run by the Blue Hens, whose stellar senior leadership helped Delaware bounce back from a 6-5 record a year ago by sharing the Colonial Athletic Association title and advancing to the title game with decisive NCAA victories over Lehigh, New Hampshire, and Georgia Southern.

Devlin, the CAA Offensive Player of the Year and an All-American this season, ended a stellar two-year career for the Blue Hens after transferring from Penn State "to win championships".

A surefire NFL draft prospect, Devlin came up just short despite completing 22 of 34 passes for 220 yards for his ninth 200-yard passing effort of the season. Pierce, the CAA Rookie of the Year and the nation's leading freshman rusher, finished his first collegiate season by running for 142 yards.

"We just didn't execute like we have all season," said Devlin, who had a streak of 175 straight passes without an interception snapped early in the third quarter. "I missed some reads and some throws. We had to be efficient and we weren't and it hurt us. They covered our receivers well and a couple of times I had to hold on to the ball just a hair longer and they got to me. I just didn't get enough steam on that last throw to Schenauer. He made a great catch but we just came up a little short. We weren't overconfident. We knew we needed to put more points up but we couldn't get it done."

Delaware came out strong, scoring on each of its first three possession to take a 12-0 lead into halftime. After stopping Eastern Washington on its first drive the Hens got the ball at the 20-yard line. Backed by the running of Pierce and Devlin, the Hens then proceeded to drive 80 yards on 14 plays with Pierce capping the march with his 14th rushing touchdown of the season from one-yard out. Perry's extra point was wide, giving the Hens a 6-0 lead with 5:14 left in the opening stanza.

The Hens scored first for the 12th time this season but had a streak of 12 straight wins when scoring first snapped dating back to last season. Perry then capped the next two drives with field goals as his 21-yard kick finished off a 76-yard march with 12:29 left in the half and his 33-yard conversion capped a 10-play, 49-yard drive.

Eastern Washington managed just 62 yards on 25 plays and converted just four first downs, never getting closer than Delaware 46-yard line. It appeared the Eagles would get their first scoring opportunity early in the second half when Allen Brown intercepted a Devlin pass at the EWU 39-yard line that was bobbled by Schenauer.

But Delaware came right back three plays later when Blue Hen senior safety Daryl Jones picked off Mitchell at the 40-yard line. The Hens marched 60 yards on 10 plays with Hayes bursting into the end zone from one-yard out with 7:12 left in the third stanza to push the lead to 19-0. Pierce picked up 37 yards on the drive and caught two passes, including a four-yard toss from Devlin down to the four-yard line. Hayes scored on the next play.

Unfortunately for the Hens, that would end the offensive output for the remainder of the night. Delaware managed just four first downs and 86 total yards the rest of the game as Eastern Washington mounted the comeback.
